6	CAPTAIN HOLT: This is Captain Jason Holt, J-A-S-O-N, H-O-L-T, of the
7	Oklahoma Department of Public Safety, Oklahoma Highway Patrol. Today's date is
8	May, 2014. The time is approximately 10:20AM. I am present at the Oklahoma
9	State Capitol Building, Room 122, Small Conference Room, and present in the room
10	with me is Captain Paul Christian and Um, the interview is being
11	conducted pursuant to case number 14-0189SI regarding the execution that took
12	place at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary on April 29 th , 2014. Captain Christian,
13	please state and spell your name for the recording.
14	CAPTAIN CHRISTIAN: Paul Christian, P-A-U-L, C-H-R-I-S-T-I-A-N and
15	I'm a Captain with the Highway Patrol.
16	CAPTAIN HOLT: Um, if you would please state and
17	spell your name for the recording.
18	
19	CAPTAIN HOLT: , are you aware that this interview is
20	being recorded and may be reduced to a typed official record at a later date?
21	: Yes.
22	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay, if you would please walk us through what
23	your duties were and what what you know to have happened from the time on the
24	29 th that you became involved until that involvement ended that day.
25	Um, the first involvement that I had was about probably
26	5:15 What typically happens is someone from the State Penitentiary will call our

offices to basically to mak – establish the line and make the line is good. And so they had contacted our office. That happened at about 5:15, 5:20. We established the line. The individual I spoke with said that they would be calling back at about 5:45, which is typical. They always give us the option of whether we want to stay on the line and keep it open or do we just call back and we typically always say just call us back. I think it's kinda an antiquated process but it's part of what we do. At about 5:45 we got a call back from the State Penitentiary to establish the line that would be -- that would be on through the duration of the execution. At that time he indicated to us that the inmate was in the chamber and they were going to begin bringing witnesses down, which is what they typically do. So at that point there's really not a whole lot of communication between our office and the State Penitentiary. As they're bringing witnesses - I think they start with the victim's witnesses, um, bring them in first and he just says they're bringing down the witnesses. There's, you know, however many. I think there were two or three, maybe four. Next they're bring in either the dignitaries or the inmates' witnesses, or no maybe media is next. I'm trying to recall. Either way they bring in media. Dignitaries are the very last to come that come in. They come in with the warden or with the director before we give the go ahead.

CAPTAIN HOLT:

Okay.

media there. There was a large amount. Some of them actually had to not be left in. And they brought in the defendant's witnesses and then brought in dignitaries. This time Director Patton was the one that I spoke with on the phone. At this time I was the only person — there were multiple people in the room. Steve Mullins is the General Counsel, was in the room. Jennifer Chance who is a Deputy General Counsel was also in the room. And this was all in my office.

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1	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay.
2	Audrey Rockwell who is our paralegal and then A. J.
3	Mallory who is the Executive Assistant to the Chief of Staff in our office.
4	CAPTAIN HOLT: I'm sorry, last name Mallory?
5	: Mallory. M-A-L-L-O-R-Y I believe.
6	CAPTAIN HOLT: Um hmm.
7	: And then Travis Brower, who is the Aide to the Governor
8	was also there. And Travis and A. J. were more so in the waiting area in front of our
9	offices but they were kind of in and out throughout the evening. Once we gave the
10	go ahead on the "you may proceed with the execution", because Patton gets on the
11	phone there's a dialogue back and forward at which point I authorize Patton and
12	Director Patton then directed him to proceed with the execution. And then typically
13	what – that was kind of the first abnormality was that it took longer to begin the
14	execution than what normally happens. At about 6:15 or 6:20 the person who
15	established the connection, I can't remember name and the one that kind of
16	gives us the play by play, said that there was an issue with the vein. That they're
17	having to do a cut down. And so we didn't know if that cut down meant we had
18	we had no idea. So we sat there for a second and kinda thought to ourselves and
19	then finally I asked him a cut down on the number of people because there were so
20	many
21	CAPTAIN HOLT:Um hmm.
22	:if that's what the issue was and he said, no. I think
23	they've having to cut down the vein. And then onceI'm trying to think.
24	CAPTAIN HOLT: What time was that about?
25	: I wanna say 6:15, 6:10 because typically it's usually right
26	at 6 o'clock it starts. I mean they do the last words and begin the execution and

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1	usually it's done by about 6:08, 6:09. And so I'm trying to make sure I keep the
2	the order of events correct. said that they're having to do the cut down and that's
3	kinda what's taking so long. They do the cut down. Establish the line I assume,
4	didn't confirm that I don't believe, establish the line and then I wanna say maybe
5	before that is when they asked for I'm trying to think. Because typically there's not
6	that issue and so I'm trying to think about how it usually goes and how it went that
7	night. He didn't give any last words, I do remember that. Typically they do,
8	sometimes they don't. Once the line was established I wanna say the actual
9	execution began and the doctor began administering the drugs at 6:20, 6:25,
10	somewhere in that window. And then 5 or 10 minutes later we were informed that
11	the doctor was going back into the chamber or was checking the the vitals of the
12	inmate, which typically hadn't happened before. It was a new protocol and so at that
13	time whenever they said the doctor was checking to see if he was conscious,
14	Jennifer Chance and I both began I began looking at the electronic document.
15	She began looking at the actual physical document just to figure out to make sure
16	that was in line with the protocol. So we were kinda doing our own checks internally.
17	We
18	CAPTAIN HOLT:what protocol are you talking about? Just the
19	DOC
20	:the DOC's
21	CAPTAIN HOLT: execution protocol?
22	:yeah, execution day protocol.
23	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay.
24	: And so then we established okay, yeah, they've got to
25	determine that he's unconscious before they can go on to drugs two and three. And
26	so I think at that initially his initial check I don't believe was unconscious.

back in probably not even 10 minutes after that, declared the inmate unconscious and then we were informed that they'd be pushing through drugs two and three. It's probably a 10, 15 minute window and about probably 6:45 doctor went back in to basically to check the vitals, to see if everything was all right. And I wanna say at that time is whenever there were kind of some noises from the chamber. I know reports — what I've — what I've read and what I've heard kinda contradict as far as the paper goes. From our end we can hear everything that's — basically everything that's said in the chamber.

CAPTAIN HOLT:

Um hmm.

: And so typically when they give the last words, I mean we can write them down verbatim.

chamber but I couldn't make out any words. It sounded more just kinda grumble, mumble and so to me I mean I — it didn't sound like words. Whether it was or not, I mean people that were there might have different versions but from what I heard on my end of the line it didn't sound like he was making any sort of communication, verbal communication that I could understand. That's I believe when the doctor realized that — and from my end obviously it's kind of difficult — because now I know kind of what happened based on what DOC's released and so I'm just trying to...

CAPTAIN HOLT:

...um hmm.

that there was an issue with the execution. That something clearly hadn't gone right based on the fact that the curtains were ordered down and then the doctor and other people came back into the chamber. And so at that point in our office we started to kind of -- at that point we realized, okay, something's not right if they're lowering the

blinds. We know basically -- we were waiting on the phone. We were informed that Director Patton, Tom Bates, and Commissioner Thompson were talking in the hall which I -- I'm not -- I've never been there so I'm just trying to visualize...

CAPTAIN HOLT: ...um hmm.

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...where everything is in the hall outside of the chamber with the doctor. At that point I looked over at Steve Mullins who's the General Counsel and told him once Commissioner Thompson, Director Patton or anyone from the AG' office -- because on the phone I said Steve you're -- you're the General Counsel, I'm not - this is - this is over me. Because my role is typically - I get on the phone, I establish the line. I write down the last words. I write down the number of dignitaries and everyone that's there. It's done by 6:08. I send an email to the Governor and staff saying this is what happened. I call the Gate House, tell them the execution went through and that's all I do. And so I said Steve - they get on the phone like you're -- you're making these calls, which he said he was fine with. Initially Commissioner Thompson picked up -- was the first person we talked to after something had kinda gone wrong. Commissioner Thompson indicated to us -- I believe that there was an issue with the IV and the drugs getting through but at that time didn't say -- it said the inmate is still currently alive. He hadn't died at this point so it was probably 6:45, 6:50. Steve I wanna say asked Commissioner Thompson if there were going to halt the execution, if they were going to call it off. Commissioner Thompson was unsure. Tom Bates got on the phone next from the AG's office. Steve asked him if we wanted to go ahead -- kind of if he had given the Warden any options or the Director any options cause the Director is acting as Warden under that authority. Tom said he wasn't sure. Steve talked to Director Patton and asked him, do you wanna call the execution off under your authority? Would you rather have us as - under our authority order you to call off the execution. Director Patton was

unsure. He just indicated to us that he wanted it to be called off at that time. So Steve ordered the execution be called off under the authority of the Governor. At that time kind of a preliminary matter Jennifer Chance and I and Audrey, all three started trying to pull up the last stay of execution that we had issued and basically draft documents. We were working on two different documents. One for just the one inmate, one for both to be stayed at that time, to kind of prepare just in case we were going to stay and we wanted to make sure that we were ready. Audrey was, I think at that time trying to get a hold of people from the Secretary of State's office to make sure if we -- if we typed it up and we file it and get it signed that there's somebody down there to accept it so it's a legitimate document at that point. Steve during this time was calling the Governor and letting her know that the first execution, something went wrong with it. The inmate -- the drugs didn't work for whatever reason. We didn't know at the time. And basically let her know that -- that it had been called off and we were asking her if she wanted to stay both or the next one or what we wanted to do in trying to figure it out. About probably 7, 7:10, Steve got back on the phone with the Director -- the line was still open but there was no communication between the two - their of -- the State Penitentiary and our office. About 7, 7:10 Steve got back on with the Director because one, we wanted to know have you decided on if you wanted to stay the second one and two where the Lockett was being sent? What hospital he was going to? Kind of what was going to happen with his body? Where -- where we were in the process.

CAPTAIN HOLT: Um hmm.

: As soon as Steve started to ask him that the Director said, Steve, well it appears that he just suffered a heart attack and died and so that kind of negated most of the questions that Steve had at that time. Steve and the Director then talked about do we want to stay the next one? How long do we want to

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stay it? We wanna, you know, we wanna make sure that you have whatever time you need to prepare for the next one. The Director indicated I think two or three weeks to stay and then that gives us time to figure out if we want a longer one, if we want kind of — it allows everything to settle down and for us to figure out what exactly we want to do going forward. At that point Steve directed Jennifer and I to finalize the document for the stay for Charles Warner. I think for three weeks and then I think that was pretty much the end of the communication between our office and the Department of Corrections because once we decided, okay, we're doing the stay, Lockett had passed away, that was really the end of — and there were other communications I think with Steve between the Director and Tom Bates on cell phones.

CAPTAIN HOLT: Um hmm.

But as far as the main line that's connected from the beginning of the execution to the end, um, that line I think was cancelled at that time. And then we proceeded to issue the stay for Charles Warner and once we got that filed probably 7:45 or 8 and then I think everyone in our office left. At least Audrey, myself and Jennifer left around 8. I think Steve stayed to about 8:15 or 8:30 to talk with the press to make sure that we...

CAPTAIN HOLT: ...um hmm.

: ...were all coordinating with whoever was going to be the focal point. I think Director Patton was the one who spoke with the media at the event – or at the event – at the execution, at the facility and so I think Steve was just briefing our press. Secretary Michael McNutt, kind of on what had happened. What the questions you'll likely get are, you know, that sort of stuff so.

CAPTAIN HOLT: Um hmm. Okay. How many -- how many executions have you been involved in as the person that -- that tells them to

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1	proceed?
2	.: Um, I began doing it in
3	between four and six because there's one in
4	CAPTAIN HOLT: Um hmm.
5	.: But every other one in that sense the
6	end of October I've been responsible for.
7	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Has any of the others have any others
8	been off you talk kinda bout a normal schedule.
9	.: Um hmm.
0	CAPTAIN HOLT: It starts at 6, you know, ends by 6:08, 6:09. Has
1	any of the other ones been off schedule other than this one?
2	No, typically they all start right at 6 o'clock.
3	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay.
4	Um, there have been issues with - they didn't, you
5	know, maybe the the witnesses weren't the victim's family wasn't where they
6	were supposed to be and they were in a different room for whatever reason and so
7	we're a couple of minutes behind but typically by 6:10 I've sent the Governor and
8	called the Gate House and let them know.
9	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Did you - did you personally or [inaudible
0.	15:32] this, did you did you personally have any conversations with the State
1	Penitentiary prior to 5:15 that day?
2	No, I don't believe so.
3	CAPTAIN HOLT: Prior to the initial time that the line was was
4	connected?
5	: Um umm.
6	CAPTAIN HOLT: Um. do you know if anybody in the Governor's

1	office did have conversation with them prior to 5:15 that day?	
2	I'm not sure. Um, Steve was constantly I mean his	
3	kind of the way it worked that day is Jennifer was in contact with a lot of the officials	
4	at DOC because she's our - kind of liaison between our office and Department of	
5	Corrections.	
6	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay.	
7	And then Steve is in constant contact with the Attorney's	
8	General and with Director Patton so what conversations they had, I don't know.	
9	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay.	
10	My role was really just wait for the phone call and	
11	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Once you started at 5:15 until you handed	
12	the the the bulk of the responsibility to to Steve did you make any decisions	
13	that would normally be off script for you to make other than start the execution or	
14	begin the execution? Did you make any decisions at all in between there?	
15	Um umm.	
16	CAPTAIN HOLT: Were you asked to make any decisions?	
17	:: No.	
18	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Between the time of between the time	
19	when when Steve decides that he' going to call off he's going to make the	
20	decision	
21	:um hmm.	
22	CAPTAIN HOLT: from under the authority of the Governor call off	
23	that execution, um, until the time that you guys learned that he's deceased, about	
24	how long is that?	
25	.: 20, 25 minutes probably.	
26	CAPTAIN HOLT; Okay. Were you ever told or made aware of any	

1	life-saving efforts that were going on in an attempt to to save Mr. Lockett now that	
2	some drugs have been put into his system?	
3	: I I really don't remember. You know I think the line for	
4	the most part was quiet. Just because everything on their end and everything that	
5	was going on in the chamber and so I think because there was so much commotion	
6	we weren't informed of anything I don't believe.	
7	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Could you hear anything going on in the	
8	chamber during that time that sounded like life-saving efforts?	
9	I I I don't really remember. I mean I don't know what	
10	that would have sounded I mean	
11	CAPTAIN HOLT:okay.	
12	I don't know what that would have sound like versus	
13	normal being in the room would sound like so I can't	
14	CAPTAIN HOLT: Um, they they called you back and said that	
15	they were having an issue with the vein you say between 6:10 and 6:15. Did they	
16	tell you what the issues were?	
17	.: Um umm, no.	
18	CAPTAIN HOLT: Is that the first time that you had learned that	
19	that he had had vein issues that day?	
20	: Yeah, they and they didn't we were on I mean so the	
21	line was established the whole time starting about 5:40 or 5:45.	
22	CAPTAIN HOLT: Um hmm.	
23	.: And we once we realized that things were not going as	
24	they usually do we asked kind of what the situation was. We were informed they	
25	were doing a cut down and at that time we didn't know what that meant which is why	
26	I asked for clarification. I mean I assumed that they were cutting down in his arm. I	

didn't know that they had gone to the arms and gone through the feet and the legs and everything else at that point. 2 CAPTAIN HOLT: 3 Okay. What is -- did you hear the conversation -you say that Commissioner Thompson was the first person to get on the phone or 4 5 that you heard... um hmm 6 7 CAPTAIN HOLT: ...and then Tom Bates, from the OAG's office but was Director Patton on the phone before those two? I don't believe so. I remember we were indic -- it was 9 10 indicated to us that the Director would be getting on the phone and then Commissioner Thompson was the first one that actually picked up the phone, which 11 is what kind of confused me at first. Because I didn't - I knew it wasn't Director 12 Patton but I didn't know who it was which is why I'm glad Steve was there because 13 he recognized the Commissioner's voice. I believe Commissioner Thompson or 14 15 Director Patton was the third person to be on the phone. Okay. What -- tell us your best recollection of 16 CAPTAIN HOLT: what you heard Commissioner Thompson tell Steve on the phone as far as -- run 17 through that again as far as what he told him was going on -- what the situation was? 19 Commissioner Thompson had indicated to -- to us that there was an issue I believe with the IV. I think he had said that it had come out or there was -- we weren't sure whether or not the drugs had gotten in. I think he had 21 indicated that there was clearly some fluid around where the IV was. He didn't say 22 whether or not that was the first drug, second drug, third drug, blood, just bodily fluid 23 24 but said that there was I believe some fluid around where the insertion point on the IV was. I don't think he gave an opinion on whether or not to halt the execution. 25 26 And if he did that might have been when -- that might have been what directed Tom

1	Bates from the OAG's office to get on the phone.
2	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Tell us what the conversation was or what
3	you remember Tom Bates saying on on the phone when he was talking to Steve.
4	Um, once Steve I think asked Tom what he thought we
5	should do, Tom said something to the effect of kind of based on what I've seen I
6	think we should not proceed with the execution, um, and call off the second one.
7	Steven then asked, you know, under what legal authority do you want us to do it?
8	Do you want the Director to do it, since the AG is there acting as the counsel for
9	DOC? Steve gave Tom kind of the opportunity to do that. Tom was unsure kind of
10	what he wanted to do. I mean I think everything kind of just happened so quickly
11	that it kind of caught everybody off guard. So once Tom indicated to us that he
12	didn't he wasn't sure if he wanted us to do it or if the Director wanted to do it
13	because he hadn't briefed the Director about that issue yet, that's when the Director
14	got on the phone with Steve.
15	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. So at some point the Director does get on
16	the phone with Steve after Tom.
17	Yes.
18	CAPTAIN HOLT: What's that conversation?
19	: Steve asked the Director do you wanna basically do
20	you want to halt the execution or do you think we should proceed. He indicated I
21	think almost immediately that we should not proceed with the execution. And so
22	Steve asked do you want to call it off? Do you want us to? Kind of what authority
23	and kind of ran quickly ran through the options of you have the authority to do it as
24	Director of DOC or we have the authority as the Governor's Office, we can direct you
25	to halt the execution.
26	CAPTAIN HOLT:um hmm.

1	.: Director Patton, I think was still trying to process it and
2	so Steve just said, okay, well as the Governor's office we're ordering you to halt the
3	execution.
4	CAPTAIN HOLT: Is that before he talked to the Governor or after
5	he talked to the Governor?
6	I wanna say before but I'm not sure.
7	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay.
8	.: Because I think once once the blinds went down a
9	whole lot of moving parts starting going and so the order of everything is still kinda
10	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Um, you have any follow ups at this point?
11	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN Well I'm trying to remember exactly but
12	several times in the beginning you said at that time, you know, I knew this,
13	this, and this
14	:um hmm.
15	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN:and at that time I knew this, this and this.
16	So it it kind of tells me that you know more now then what you did then
17	so
18	yeah.
19	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN:so you had conversations with people or
20	I guess my question is what conversations have you had with other people
21	and what additional information have you learned as far as facts about the
22	case since all of this happened? We I mean obviously we're interested in
23	what happened at the time but
24	.:yeah.
25	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN:it appears that you have additional
26	information that we may not have. So what what what additional

1	:um
2	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN:that we don't have?
3	: I mean I think you've guys have seen what DOC
4	released as far as how the timeline goes.
5	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN: Right.
6	Um, you know, I I'm trying to think. I mean most of
7	what I know is based on conversations that I've had with Jennifer and with Steve
8	since they're the two main people.
9	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN: Okay.
0	: Um, you know, the days following probably the next
1	two or three days afterwards, um, I was having conversations with multiple people at
2	the Attorney General's office that were different from the conversations Jenn
3	people she was talking to and the different people Steve was talking to and so there
4	was a whole lot of I don't want to say misinformation but different information floating
5	around. You know I think at at this point I think based on what I know he was
6	intentionally dehydrated, at least what I've heard, he intentionally dehydrated
.7	himself. Wasn't eating
8	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN: Well let me if I if I can let me just stop
9	you there
20	yeah.
21	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN:real quick. You said you've heard that
22	he was intentionally dehydrated. Where where did that come from?
23	: Um, I think that was in DOC's report in both in
24	conversations that we've had internally in our office.
25	CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN: Did you read that in a report somewhere?
6	I believe the report said that he was at least wasn't

eating.

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CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN: Okay. Um, was that in the timeline that you read or --

I don't think it was in the timeline. But my, you know, my dad's a pathologist and so obviously just kinda mentioning him and my mom were out of town at the time of the execution and so they get back and they haven't been in -- in town for a couple of weeks and you know he's -- he asks me about it and I said well kinda on based on everything I've heard and seen, there was just an issue getting the IV in. And so they ended up having to go in through the groin and then there was a blown vein and at that point I still didn't even know what that meant. As a doctor he told me well blown lines is pretty much whenever the IV just kind of -- or the -- it just comes out. Because it kind of -- cause I asked him was it kind of where it just backs up because it can't get the fluid through because there's not enough liquid in your body. And he said yeah, pretty much. It's -- and not -- on a beautiful term of art for it but it's basically what it is. And so I asked him, I said well how can that happen kind of based on not being -- like if I was purposely hydrated would that happen? And he goes typically no. It happens in really old people and people who are dehydrated. So that's kind of where I came to my own conclusion that okay, well, if it says he's not eating, probably wasn't drinking anything. So I mean if they had that much issue with getting an IV in chances are probably dehydrated.

CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN: Okay, I guess my main concern is officially what have you seen. Obviously you've had conversations with people that --

CAPTAIN HOLT: So, just so we clear that up is that -- is that your opinion of what you think happened...

...um hmm.

CAPTAIN HOLT: ...or is -- have you seen officially from somewhere

1	that that happened?
2	: I've not seen officially from anywhere that that
3	happened.
4	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. That's your opinion
5	.:that's my opinion based on conversations I've had with
6	multiple people.
7	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay.
8	.: But no it did my only role in any of it afterwards was
9	with John Hadden at the Oklahoma Attorney General's office who was there and
10	their litigation office as far as what they wanted to do going forward with the stay,
11	with litigation and after two or three days of me talking to them and Jennifer talking to
12	other people, kind of Jennifer and Steve are now the two focal points and I'm
13	basically out of it.
14	CAPTAIN HOLT: Did you talk to anybody personally yourself
15	have you talked to anybody that was present at the execution since that night?
16	.: I'm trying to think. I don't believe I talked to
17	Commissioner Thompson. I don't believe I've talked I know I haven't talked to
18	Tom. And I don't believe I've talked to Director Patton and if I have I've seen him in
19	passing and said morning Commissioner, afternoon Director. I haven't had extensive
20	conversations with any of them.
21	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Have you been contacted by any other law
22	enforcement agencies or anybody else other than us that have stated that they're
23	investigating this?
24	I have not.
25	CAPTAIN HOLT: Okay. Anything else specific to the execution that
26	night, um, anything that you've heard or told that you did that you haven't told us

about or that we haven't asked you about that you think could be important for this investigation?

: I don't think so. I mean I think I've been -- I mean kind of walked you guys through what I can recall and I mean really the only action I took was, you know, authorizing them to proceed with the execution. And then I mean I, you know, handed it off to Steve once clearly something went wrong. But I don't believe there's anything else.

CAPTAIN HOLT:

Okay. Do you have anything else?

CAPTAIN PAUL CHRISTIAN: I think that's good.

CAPTAIN HOLT:

Okay. We'll end this interview at 10:58.
