

Miss Marshall continued her work in the division of neuropsychiatry of the medical school and completed a research on the mental conditions of paretics undergoing treatment. This study was carried out under the joint direction of the psychology faculty and Dr. H. G. Mehrtens, of the School of Medicine.

During the year the Department of Psychology was made a constituent member of the School of Social Sciences. Three members of the department faculty are members of the School of Biology, three of the School of Education, one of the School of Medicine, and one of the Graduate School of Business. It is the purpose of the department faculty to maintain the closest possible relations with departments in allied fields.

DIVISION OF JOURNALISM

The staff of the Division of Journalism for the year consisted of Everett W. Smith, professor; Buford O. Brown, associate professor; and John M. Baker (of the University of Hawaii) who was acting instructor during the summer quarter. In addition, Mr. Frank J. Taylor, editor of The Stanford Illustrated Review and a writer of varied experience, generously gave his services in guiding a course in article-writing offered in the autumn, winter, and spring quarters.

Professor Brown was again head of the Department of Journalism of the Summer Session in Los Angeles of the University of California. During the year he has completed the manuscript of a book on the business management of newspapers, which will be published by Harper & Brothers.

The division sponsored the annual meeting of the California Scholastic Press Association, which was held, as has been customary, on the campus in the autumn quarter. In April, acting on the suggestions of a number of neighboring newspaper publishers, the division arranged for and participated in a two-day meeting of newspaper men from San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, and northern Monterey counties. Those who attended expressed a desire for other such meetings on the campus to exchange experiences and discuss matters of common interest.

In the revision of the constitution of the Associated Students made during the spring quarter, Professor Smith presided at meetings of representatives of campus publications called to formulate the views of this group with regard to the control of student publications, and at conferences between this group and the student-body committee drafting the new constitution, and was made a member of that committee while it was preparing the part of the constitution dealing with journalism. The new constitution as adopted by student-body election places control of student publications in a Publications Council, composed of the editor and manager of each student publication and the head of the Division of Journalism, thus centralizing responsibility and initiative in student publication matters in the group actively in charge of those activities.
