# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF STANFORD UNIVERSITY

FOR THE FIFTY-FOURTH ACADEMIC YEAR ENDING AUGUST 31, 1945

Professors Spalding, Phillips, O'Malley, and White will participate in this work, and Professor Brand will serve as chairman of the staff.

The Stanford Department of History has seldom lost members of its faculty to other institutions. But this year we record with regret the loss of two members of our faculty. Professor Barker, who has been a member since 1933, goes next year to Johns Hopkins University as Professor of History. Professor Bradley terminates fifteen years of service at Stanford at the close of the year, going to Claremont Graduate School as Professor of History and Dean of the Graduate School.

At the close of the academic year, Dr. Payson Jackson Treat, completing forty years of membership in the Department, became Professor Emeritus.

#### JOURNALISM

Although the staff of the Division of Journalism consisted of only Chilton R. Bush, professor, and Clifford F. Weigle, associate professor, class enrollment, exclusive of practice courses, was 255 - a decrease from the previous year of only three students. Four courses were omitted from the usual offerings because of the shortage of teaching personnel.

The graduating class of sixteen was larger by two students than in the previous year. All of the graduates except one were women. Three are employed by press associations, two in research agencies, one in the Office of War Information, and the others on California newspapers.

The Division sponsored the twenty-first annual convention of the Central California Scholastic Press Association. The annual Midyear Editors' Conference was omitted for the first time in several years in order to comply with the regulations of the Office of Defense Transportation.

Mr. Bush conducted readership studies of daily newspapers in five California cities to test the hypothesis that newspapers of eight to fourteen pages are read more intensely than newspapers containing eighteen or more pages. With Mr. Weigle, he also made a study for the San Francisco Chronicle to compare the reading of Sunday comics by adults and juveniles. He served as chairman of the Library Committee and (during autumn quarter) of the Committee on Public Exercises and was a member of the Executive Committee of the School of Social Sciences and the Annual Appeal Committee of the Stanford Fund as well as of several special committees. He became a member of the Executive Committee of the Academic Council during the latter part of the academic year.

Approximately 1,750 attended the Founders' Day Exercises which were arranged by the students and faculty of Stanford University.

SPECIAL SERVICES AND EXERCISES

On April 15, services were held in the Memorial Church at 11:00 o'clock in the morning in memory of ex-President Franklin D. Roosevelt (1,500).

On May 8, V-E Day Services were held in the Memorial Church at 11:30 o'clock in the morning. President Donald B. Tresidder gave the address (1,850).

On August 14, V-J Day Services were held in Memorial Church at 11:00 o'clock in the morning. Alvin C. Eurich delivered the address (1,925).

On May 30, Memorial Day Services were held in the Memorial Church, 4:15 p.m.

Special graduation exercises were held during the year for the awarding of certificates to trainees who had completed prescribed courses of study and training. The Civil Affairs Training School awarded certificates of graduation to 145 officers at graduation exercises held in Cubberley Hall on March 17 and June 29, 1945. The Army Specialized Training Program completed three cycles and awarded 91 certificates during the year: on March 3, 1945, 6 candidates completed the required work, though no graduation exercises were held; on June 1, 1945, 52 candidates were awarded certificates at exercises held in the Stanford Stadium; and on August 31, 33 candidates were awarded certificates at exercises held in the Basketball Pavilion. The Army Specialized Training Reserve Program continued during the year.

ASSEMBLIES

Three all-University Assemblies were held during the year. The opening assembly of the academic year was held on October 13, 1944, when the Ordnance Distinguished Service Award was presented by General R. S. Chavin to Arthur B. Domonoske, who accepted it for the University; President Donald B. Tresidder gave the address (2,157). Two other assemblies, February 20 (1,569) and July 26 (945) were also addressed by President Tresidder.

The Associated Students of Stanford University held an election assembly on May 16, 1945 (910).

Though wartime restrictions and manpower shortage continued to limit conferences, the following meetings were held during the year:
