# **Research Design**

- Sponsored By: University of Denver and Crossley Center for Public Opinion Research
- Conducted By: Floyd Ciruli, Director of Crossley Center for Public Opinion Research
- Sample: Random sample of registered likely voters in State of Colorado
- Sample Size: 550 likely voters
- Conducted by telephone with live interviews, both landline and cellphone. Landline 47%, cellphone 52%.
- Margin of Error: Total sample: ±4.2 percentage points in 95 out of 100 cases
- Date in Field: October 29-31, 2016

#### ColoradoCare

9. One proposal, Amendment 69, on this November's election ballot would create ColoradoCare, a universal health care system for Colorado residents, partially paid for by a \$25 billion dollar increase in state taxes. As of today, will you vote for ballot Amendment 69 or vote against it? PEOPLE WHO ALREADY VOTED, ASK: If you already voted, how did you vote on the ColoradoCare amendment?

#### Minimum Wage

10. An amendment to the Colorado Constitution would increase Colorado's minimum wage to \$9.30 per hour with annual increases of 90 cents each January 1 until it reaches \$12 per hour in January 2020. #### Medical Aid in Dying

11. #### Amend the Constitution

12. Another amendment to the Colorado Constitution will make it more difficult to amend the state constitution. It would require new constitutional ballot amendments to have signatures from at least 2 percent of all voters in each of the state's 35 Senate districts. In addition, the measure would require approval from 55 percent of voters in November to amend the state constitution. As of today, will you vote for it or vote against it? PEOPLE WHO ALREADY VOTED, ASK: If you already voted, how did you vote on the amendment?

# **Cigarette Tax**

13. Another proposal would amend the Colorado Constitution so that, starting in January 2017, taxes on a pack of cigarettes would increase from 84 cents per pack to \$2.59 per pack. The tax on other tobacco products would increase by 22 percent of the manufacturers' list price. The revenues would be spent on tobacco- and medical-related programs. ### **Primary Election**
