

Washington Heights is uniform in character, with most of its population in the middle-income group. The majority of families in this residential section are housed in good apartments. Smaller apartments and a few tenements of the better class appear on Amsterdam Avenue. The quality of the stores is good throughout, with numerous retail outlets along Broadway, St. Nicholas, and Amsterdam Avenues. The upper end of St. Nicholas Avenue assumes some importance as a shopping street. Traffic approaching the George Washington Bridge passes directly through this area.
