



I am also in favor of development, but not at the cost of the environment. I do not believe that these philosophies have to be opposed to each other, but all issues need to be considered in the context of each other. At a time when the species was endangered, the DNR went looking for Butler Garter Snakes in February when they were hibernating and allowed nearly three acres of mature hardwood trees to be cut down, so that an oversized freeway exit ramp could be put into a roundabout placed next to a theater. An alternative was proposed that would have handled three times the traffic, saved costly land for development and would have been safer, but the DNR and the DOT allowed middle management to make decisions that were in their personal benefit. This was before your terms, but it suggests that the personal heading these departments should be chosen more carefully and monitored frequently. I hope that you will consider saving this fine publication that helps keep the public informed of Wisconsin's natural resources.







In fact, the two positions that you say it will cut are vacant. Tom Evenson stated that, "It is not the government's role to produce magazines that duplicate what is available in the private market." However, the Madison State Journal interviewed private market magazines publishers who indicated that the magazine does not duplicate their publications. I support the DNR and its work. They are professionals and scientists. Not only should we not eliminate the magazine, we should allow it to publish MORE articles on controversial topics like climate change. Ignoring and denying the facts, does not make the problem go away. Climate Change is real as is man's role in climate change! A consensus of scientific experts believes temperatures are rising; sea ice is melting; ocean levels are rising; and that fossil-fuel consumption is driving global warming. While we may not be exactly able to predict the effects of increased greenhouse gasses, the science behind how man-made green-house gasses lead to increased temperatures is basic and well known. We can directly measure the increased carbon dioxide levels that have risen directly with our increased use of fossil fuels. We can demonstrate that carbon dioxide absorbs heat reflected from the Earth's surface — heat that would otherwise pass freely into space. As CO2 levels increase, the pace of warming accelerates. Satellite measurements confirm that less heat is escaping the atmosphere today than 40 years ago. In fact, I just subscribed to the magazine myself to show my support for the DNR.

• Please continue to require school boards, city councils, village boards, etc. to print summaries of their actions in local newspapers and on the state wide public notice board. I do NOT support Assembly Bill 70 or Senate Bill 42.

• Please do not support Senator Fitzgerald's bill to relax regulations for some wells. It is important that we maintain governance over high capacity wells, including repair, replacement, reconstruction and transfer of ownership. High capacity wells can deplete groundwater, lakes and streams and need to be well regulated. Thank you for considering these points.

In 1984, a barrel at the Oak Creek facility of Mid-America exploded in a worker's face, killing him on the spot. Despite this tragic loss of life, the dangerous procedures that lead to the explosion have not been changed.

In the case of Mid-America Steel Drum Company, exposure to chemicals contained on the facility can negatively impact the health and well-being of our neighbors.

Due to the violation and disregard of critical safety practices, workers at the six facilities operated by Greif, Inc. have suffered chemical and heat-related burns, inc. nave suffered chemical and near-related burns, injuries, breathing difficulties and other health problems, according to the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel*. Three of the locations are in Wisconsin.

Additionally, one facility in Indianapolis was significantly damaged after a fire broke.

The facilities have repeatedly been cited by safety The facilities have repeatedly been cited by safety regulators for dumping too much mercury into public wastewater and for toxic emissions into the neighborhood air. In fact, at the Milwaukee location, a safety manager, and plant workers admitted that chemical residue was washed down a floor drain, which eventually leads to Lake Michigan. Additionally, reports also indicate that the company burned hazardous chemicals, releasing toxic emissions into the air. This threatens the health of workers in the plant as well as the community at-Jarge and is in violation of the as the community at-large and is in violation of the Clean Air Act. This is also dangerous because it pollutes Lake Michigan -- drinking water source -- putting it at risk of contamination.

What should be even more alarming to neighbors in Wisconsin and elsewhere is that the article reveals Greif's executives knew of the hazardous risks being taken by the plants, but surgested by the plants, but suggested to their shareholders that they



Wisconsin Values Betrayed

Two of the deepest held and most enduring values we have is to require safe places for our neighbors to work and a clean environment for all of us to enjoy.

From forming some of the first unions in the country to being influential in the fight for an eight-hour workday, Wisconsin has been a vital force in many of the workplace protections we have today.

During the 20th century, Wisconsin's workforce continued to seek fair treatment and safe working conditions for all under Robert La Follette's progressive movement. In 1911, the State Legislature passed the first workman's compensation law. Then in 1932, our first unemployment compensation laws mere enacted. Wisconsin continued to support its workers by passing the Wisconsin Employment Relations Act in 1937, which provided workers with the right to organize.

In addition to our traditional commitment to workers' In addition to our traditional commitment to workers' rights, Wisconsin has been on the forefront of protecting our shared lands and waters. In fact, the first Earth Day was observed nationwide on April 22, 1970, and served as a day to increase environmental awareness. The holiday was founded by Gaylord Nelson, a former Wisconsin Governor and U.S. Senator delicated to cleaning up polluted waterways, protecting our shared lands, creating sustainable green jobs, and bolstering the state's recreation infrastructure.

Unfortunately, under Walker and legislative Republicans, we've seen attack after attack on these shared values of community safety and stewardship. Continuous betrayals of these shared Wisconsin values invites bad actors to willfully continue their dangerous and neglectful behavior. Stripping away resources from those charged with enforcing our safety laws has also been a destructive pattern of the current administration.

In fact, an audit released last year by the nonpartisan Legislative Audit Bureau confirmed that the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has not been consistently following its own policies, due in part to chronic understaffing.

Despite the environmental danger of intentional understaffing, Governor Walker stripped the DNR of research and science positions in the last state budget.

Republican lawmakers have consistently made poor decisions that have had negative repercussions on our lands and waters. Now, as we are seeing shocking practices at the Greif plants in Milwaukee, St. Francis, and Oak Creek, we are left wondering what options are left to pursue these alarming behaviors. The *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* revelation of the shocking and dangerous practices at the Greif plants are a strong reminder that Walker's dismantling, understaffing, au under-funding of the DNR leaves us with a toothless and vatch dog

This has led to U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin and U.S. Representative Gwen Moore to call for an immediate federal investigation.

Time and time again, the plants have been cited by regulators for releasing toxic emissions into the air and pouring hazardous chemicals down drains into the local sewer system, yet little action has been taken to effectively address these hazards and heed the danger.

#### Take Action: CBD Oil and "Lydia's Law"

Three years ago, the Legislature passed a watered down version of "Lydia's Law," which sought to allow families with seizure disorders to access non-psychoactive annabidiol (CBD) oil with a prescription from a Wisconsin provider. Despite bipartisan support and strong public advocacy, special interests and lobbyists won the day. The final bill still prevented production and distribution of CBD oil in Wisconsin Families are still suffering, and the majority party has continued to delay access to this critical treatment option.

On the last day of session in 2014, Republican's abruptly ended the senate session in 2014, Republican's abruptly ended the senate session to avoid discussing and voting n a measure that would have provided real relief for those suffering debilitating seizures.

The Senate took up Senate Bill 10 this week, which made minor changes to "Lydia's Law." While the bill passed unanimously on February 22, 2017, it does not go far enough to address the barriers in obtaining CBD readilisition for suffering hidres. medicine for suffering kids.

For these reasons, I introduced a substitute amendment to create a process for CBD to be manufactured and distributed in Wisconsin. Unfortunately, the Republicanled Senate rejected this substitute amendment.

After the bill's passage, I heard from neighbors who again asked that the Legislature do something to fully address this critical issue.

TAKE ACTION: The full Assembly will likely take up the bill in March. I am working with state representatives to make sure this substitute amendment gets brought up on the floor of the Assembly. Therefore, I encourage you and your neighbors to contact your assembly representative and ask that they amend Senate Bill 10 to allow for CBD to be produced and distributed in Wisconsin

Representative Jimmy Anderson and I also introduced a bill that would create a process for CBD to be manufactured in the state. Please also contact your assembly person or senator and ask that they sign on as a co-sponsor to LRB 2105.







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#### Budget Update: Potential Timeline

Earlier this month, Governor Walker presented his proposed 2017-2019 biennial budget bill to the people of Wisconsin. When he made his remarks, the Governor provided legislators and the public with a document titled, "Budget in Brief" which provides his narrative on budget proposals. Much of the reporting on the budget that you have seen or heard is based upon this document.

Presently the budget bill is in the Joint Finance Committee (JFC). Over the next month, the nonpartisan Legislative Fiscal Bureau will analyze the legal language of the 989 page budget bill, which has been assigned the number Assembly Bill 64 (AB 64). When the analysis is complete, state government agency staff will appear before JFC to explain portions of the budget related to their departments and to answer questions. When that process is complete, JFC will hold a few public hearings on the bill. The number of hearings and locations for these hearings has not yet been determined.

Once the public hearing process is completed, the Legislative Fiscal Bureau staff will prepare papers on each budget topic. The papers explain the issue in detail, restate the position of the Governor and then outline options for the members of JFC to consider. Members of JFC are also free to introduce their own budget motions. By June, JFC should have a substitute version of the budget that will be sent to the Assembly and Senate to be acted on by each house.

The goal is to have a new budget passed and in the Governor's hands so it can be signed and in place for the next fiscal year which begins on July 1st. Unlike the federal government budget process, if a new state budget is not in place by July 1st, things do not come to a standstill. State government programs and agencies continue to operate under the current budget. However, extended delays in the passage of a state budget can have detrimental impact on the budget process of schools and local governments.

Throughout this process I will be working with other legislators to support provisions in the budget that move our state forward. I will also work to see the most egregious provisions removed.

We have all heard the old adage that if something looks too good to be true, it probably is. That adage holds true when it comes to Republican tax gimmicks in the state budget. The Governor and Republicans in the legislature insist that family supporting jobs are created by giving tax breaks to Wisconsin's wealthiest individuals. Unfortunately, this too-good-to-be-true fallacy is costing us all. Take, for example, the Manufacturing and Agriculture Tax Credit, passed in a previous budget by the Republican majority. Sounds good, right?



When the Wisconsin economy did well, we were among the leaders in family supporting manufacturing jobs. The problem with this particular tax break is that there is absolutely no job creation requirement needed to actually claim the credit. Worse yet, 11 people making over \$30 million claimed a full \$22 million in giveaways under this credit, and not a single new job needed to be documented.

Even something that sounds good, like increasing the School Levy Tax Credit by \$87 million in the second year of the budget is problematic. There is no income ceiling to the credit and, rather than limiting the credit to taxpayers with their primary residence in Wisconsin, the credit can be claimed on commercial and vacation properties that aren't even owned by Wisconsin residents. These giveaways to wealthy out-of-state residents are particularly alarming given that the second year of the Governor's budget is projected to end with a \$738 million structural deficit.

### **Feeling Climate Change**

While the Walker Administration has taken steps to scrub the Department of Natural Resources website of references to climate change and is seeking to eliminate the subscriber supported publication of the Wisconsin Natural Resources Magazine – fortunately he does not control the news media.

Since Saturday, weather forecasters have reported on high temperature records being broken - every day.

Records are expected to fall this entire week. Having record high temperatures recorded for two or three days in a row in a single given year has occurred in the past. Not only are we seeing year-after-year in which the average high temperature for the year is the highest on record, but if the forecasts hold true for this week, we will see an inordinate number of record setting days in a row. We have to recognize that climate change is real and scientifically proven and take steps to reduce our impact on the environment. Governor Walker's insistence on sticking his head in the sand and denying the reality of climate change will have disastrous consequences for the people, wild life and future of Wisconsin.

In honor of Black History Month, all of February's fun facts will be about African American contributions to Wisconsin's history.

Louis Bennett Butler, Jr. was the first – and currently the only – African American Justice on the Wisconsin Supreme Court. Butler was appointed to the Supreme Court by Governor Jim Doyle in August 2004 and served until his term expired on July 31, 2008.

Butler served as an assistant state public defender from 1979 to 1992, and was then appointed to the Municipal Court in Milwaukee. He served as a municipal judge until 2002, when he was elected to the Milwaukee County Circuit Court. Butler also served as an adjunct professor at Marquette University Law School.

President Barack Obama nominated Butler to serve as United States District Court for the Western District of Wisconsin, but was never confirmed.

And when I learned that the Walker administration required the magazine to submit articles and that it was necessary for them to sign off on the articles with their approval before publication, I was hopping mad.



The DNR is realigning to become more efficient and effective. This magazine is not a part of the DNR's core mission. The DNR's core mission, which hasn't changed, is to protect and enhance our natural resources, to provide a healthy and sustainable environment, and to ensure the right of all people to use and enjoy these resources. It is not the government's role to produce magazines that duplicate what is available on the private market.

Ceasing to publish this magazine will reduce FTE's by 2 and save \$136,200 in FY18 and \$544,800 in FY19. The savings unrelated to the FTE's would be passed onto conservation patron license holders through a reduction in the fee by \$8.95 per license. The savings to license purchasers equates to roughly \$75,000 in FY18 and \$300,000 in FY19. The lower amount in FY18 is due to the delayed elimination date of spring 2018.

#### **Budget Highlights and Lowlights**

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Governor Walker and Republicans have passed three failed budgets over the past six years. Unfortunately, the budget Governor Walker has proposed for the next biennium follows the same recipe for failure.

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Far from being a blueprint for a bright future, the budget proposed by the Governor will have a structural deficit of over \$738 million at the end of

the second year of the biennium. Here's what that means: He is increasing spending over the course of the biennium to gain favor with a few groups that have every reason to oppose his election in 2018. At the same time, he is handing out even more tax breaks to his supporters. The result is that after the 2018 election is said and done, the state will find itself in the position of spending about \$738 million more than we can reasonably expect to come in from various taxes. Other lowlights of the budget include:

- The budget continues to chip away at local control over Wisconsin's public schools. Under the budget proposed by Walker, districts wishing to see an increase in per pupil aid are forced to cede control of the school/employee relationship to the state. The Madison school district has worked well with employees to keep health care cost in check and ensure the employee contributions varied based upon employee pay. Unfortunately, Governor Walker is still in the Act 10 mindset and determined to erode local control and the ability of public schools to provide an excellent education.
- After being bashed in the past three state budgets, UW Madison and UW System leaders are relieved not to face additional cuts. However, this budget will do long term irreparable harm to the UW System. The Governor's budget further dictates how professors teach and how they carry their workloads, jeopardizing critical research funding. He also proposes making student activity fee payments optional which will reduce funding available for sexual assault prevention efforts and reduce the ability of students to have a say in policy matters. It will also, very likely, increase fees paid by students who choose to not opt out of funding necessary programs.
- The Governor's budget borrows more for transportation, without addressing the long term funding crisis. This means the average family will pay more to repair damage to vehicles and more for gasoline consumed while stuck in traffic on roads that are inadequate.
- · In addition to scrubbing the Department of Natural Resources website of references to climate

change, the Governor is undertaking another effort to deny the public scientifically accurate information about environmental issues. The budget eliminates publication of the Wisconsin Natural Resources magazine. Even though the magazine is entirely self-supporting – paid for by 75,000 subscribers.

The Governor wishes to eliminate the Labor and Industry Review Commission. The three members provide a forum to resolve disputes involving unemployment insurance, workers compensation and equal rights. Without the Commission in place it is likely employers and employees both will find it necessary to spend money to take disputes to circuit courts.

# Good Government Under Attack in Budget

As we review the proposed budget over the next few weeks, I will continue to highlight items that may be of particular interest to you. This week's article focuses on two destructive measures in the budget that further the decay of good government in Wisconsin.

Governor Walker is proposing to dismantle the

independence of the Judicial Commission. The Commission was created in 1978 to investigate misconduct or disabilities of any judge or court commissioner in Wisconsin. The Commission, independent of the courts, would investigate and then bring cases to a 3 judge panel whose recommendation would ultimately be reviewed by the Wisconsin State Supreme Court to determine if the judge should be reprimanded, censured, suspended, or removed. The Governor's proposed budget removes the commission's independence by folding it into the Wisconsin Supreme Court's authority.

Governor Walker is also proposing a 30 percent cut to the Elections Commission. This will result in the elimination of six staff positions. While the newly formed Commission is attempting to settle in and assist election officials with voter ID and the new electronic registration they will be have catastrophic impact. Now is not the time to be eliminating resources for the agency in charge of ensuring fair and free elections.

These attacks on Wisconsin's tradition of good government are appalling but not surprising. Over the last six years, Governor Walker and legislative republicans have continuously attacked Wisconsin's good government. The proposed changes to the Judicial Commission and the cut to the Elections Commission further their assault.

That's a ridiculous claim. The DNR is realigning to become more efficient and effective. This magazine is not a part of the DNR's core mission. It is not the government's role to produce magazines that duplicate what is available in the private market.

Ceasing to publish this magazine will reduce FTE's by 2 and save \$136,200 in FY18 and \$544,800 in FY19. The savings unrelated to the FTE's would be passed onto conservation patron license holders through a reduction in the fee by \$8.95 per license. 





The rationale to cease publication of the Wisconsin Natural Resources Magazine had nothing to do with so-called controversial stories. The decision was based on our core-work analysis conducted during the department-wide alignment process which is now being implemented. While the magazine is self-sustaining through subscriptions, and is apparently popular among the subscribers, it doesn't meet the definition of core work necessary to the DNR's mission of protecting and enhancing our natural resources. If the budget recommendation remains intact during the budget process, it would also mean DNR employees who often took time to research and write the stories needed to fill the pages, could focus on their own core-work duties. 


