On May 6, 1952, the Conference, composed of Messrs. Ladd, Glavin, Mohr, Belmont, Rosen, Clegg, Gearty, Tolo. Mose. Holloman and Harbo, was advised of the Director's instructions that regular checks should be made of the home and office telephones of all members of the Executives Conference and the SAC and ASAC of the Washington Field Office, and that the check had been completed with negative results.

Under a program previously approved by the Director, office telephones of members of the Conference are checked The Conference unanimously recommends that the residence phones of members of the Conference be checked on a quarterly basis. This will be limited to the lines between the telephone exchange and the individual residence, with a check inside the telephone exchange being made semiannually and an actual check of the telephone instrument in the residences of the Conference members being made only once a year. The schedule for the SAC and ASAC of the Washington Field Office would be the same as proposed herein for the Conference members. Under date of 11-20-52, a suggestion was made, by the writer, that an examination of the offices of key Bureau officials and supervisors of the Domestic Intelligence Division be made to determine if resonant cavities or other listening devices may be present. At that time the necessary equipment to conduct such a check was not available.

This suggestion was made, in part, due to the fact that during the past several months various types of listening devices have been discovered secreted in the offices of the US diplomatic officials located in the Soviet Ploc. Thile no such devices have been found, to my knowledge, within the United States, it is felt that we cannot afford to adopt the position that the FBI is immune to such attempts at Soviet penetration, since, as the foremost intelligence agency of the Western powers, we are a logical Soviet intelligence target. The study of the resonant cavity device, the seriousness of which has just been discovered within the past six months, likewise prompted the suggestion at this time. The range of its effectiveness depends upon the power of the activuting mechanism, which conceivably might be concealed in any of the private buildings fronting on Fennsylvania Avenue.

RECONTENDATION:

Inusmuch as the Radio-Electrical Section is now in possession of the necessary equipment, it is recommended they be requested to conduct an examination of the offices of key Bureau officials and supervisors of the Domestic Intelligence Division to determine if resonant devices or other listening devices may be present.

Reference is made to memo from Supervisor O.A. Ezell to The Branigan dated 3-10-53 renewing a recommendation that examination be made of the offices of key Bureau officials and supervisors of the Domestic Intelligence Division to determine if resonant cavity the microphones or other listening devices may be present.

As indicated in my memo of 12-5-53 in response to the earlier recommendation we were equipped at that time to make the security search for everything except the cavity microphone, and search equipment for the cavity microphone was not purchased by the Bureau because of lack of funds. However, the Bureau subsequently has purchased one set of equipment for cavity microphone searches. As previously indicated the minimum searching party consists of 2 men and it is estimated that a minimum of 3 days time will be required to search a single room of average size for the cavity microphone alone. In addition, prior to beginning active search for the cavity type microphone, a "listening" type of search should be conducted for several hours in order to determine whether cavity microphones might be being activated by the enemy, it being noted that active search as distinguished from "listening" would immediately inform the enemy of our activities.

One additional day's time for 1 man is required to search a single room of average size for other types of microphones. Accordingly, it is estimated that a total of 6 man days will be required for the complete search of each average size room involved. Certain phases of the search for the cavity type microphone will necessarily have to be carried out during the hours in which the office is occupied and in use. This will mean that approximately 1 of the above 6 man days per room will involve a technician in the space to be searched during the normal working day.

As previously pointed out by me, the "room search" approach will not as a practical matter insure 100 per cent against the presence of microphones since it is entirely possible to conceal microphones in such a way that they cannot be detected with present day equipment, without substantial damage to wall surfaces, and, of course, the destruction of wall surfaces is not a practical approach.

RECOMMENDATION

In view of the security checks which we are making for other government officials, I certainly agree that it is desirable to insure insofar as possible the security of our own critical offices. It is suggested that we start with a survey of the offices of the Director, Mr. Tolson, Mr. Ladd and Mr. Nichols.

Security Surveys

On March 30 the Conference composed of Messrs. Tolson, Tadd, Callahan, Tracy, Clegg, Gearty, Holloman, Belmont, Mohr and Harbo considered the suggestion of Special Agent O. A. Ezell of the Domestic Intelligence Division that the Laboratory make an examination of the offices of key Bureau officials and supervisors of the Domestic Intelligence Division to determine whether resonant cavity microphones or any other listening devices may be present.

The Conference was advised that it would require 6 man days per room to make such a search, that it would not insure one hundred per cent against the presence of microphones since they could be concealed without detection unless substantial damage was done to wall surfaces.

The Bureau now has the equipment needed to search for the cavity type microphones. It is anticipated that a request to search for such devices will be received from the White House. The Conference was opposed to the suggestion of Mr. Ezell. Mr. Ladd was likewise opposed to a proposal that a search for listening devices be made only in the Director's Office on the ground that it is extremely unlikely that hidden listening devices would be found, due to the practical difficulties of gaining access to the space to install any concealed microphones.

Messrs. Tolson, Callahan, Tracy, Mohr, Belmont, Clegg, Gearty, Holloman and Harbo recommend that a search for cavity type microphones and other listening devices be made in the Director's Office. They recognize that it is unlikely any concealed listening devices will be discovered but feel that since we are making such searches for other agencies we should make such a search of the Director's Office as a precautionary measure.

The Director has previously approved that we comply with the Secret Service request to make search of two White House rooms for resonant cavify listening devices.

Arrangements have been made with the Secret Service to conduct passive monitoring for several hours today beginning at 11:00 A. M. Our activity today will consist in having a specially designed receiver in the room to ascertain whether any such listening device is being activated by an outside source. The purpose of the passive monitoring is to detect such a microphone without advising the unknown source that it has been detected.

We have tentative arrangements to conduct an active search for cavity listening devices on May 9 and 10 in the same two rooms of the White !House; this will involve the use of actual transmitters on our part to activate any cavity listening devices which might be present. This assignment will be handled by Special Agents Roger W. Swartz and of the Laboratory.

SECURITY CHECK OF DIRECTOR'S OFFICE.

Under date of 3-30-53 the Director approved an

Executives Conference recommendation that the Director's office space be checked for clandestine listening devices including the so-called resonant cavity type microphone recently discovered in Moscow.

Accordingly, beginning on 4-6-53 and on such occasions thereafter as the Director's office space was available during the normal work day, listening tests were conducted to determine whether any radio beams could be detected as activating sources for listening devices. You will recall that the limitation to the normal work day arises from the fact that such activating radio beams would not be expected to be in operation after hours.

After completing sufficient monitoring of this type to provide reasonable assurance that no such beams were in operation, an active, exhaustive search of the Director's offices was made after hours, which search included all wall, ceiling and floor space in the Director's immediate offices. No clandestine listening devices of any kind were found.

It is noted that although this security check reflects the office space to be free of such clandestine devices at present, assurance of the continuation of such a secure condition is, of course, partially dependent upon the degree of physical security afforded the Director's office after hours.

SECURITY CHECKS AND TELEPHONE Service COUNTERMEASURE INSTALLATIONS

Mr. Conrad's memorandum July 30 advised of the completion of security checks and the installation of telephone countermeasures for State Department officials. With one exception this completes the security checks and countermeasure installations for all Cabinet members and for all other Government officials from whom requests have been received.

The one exception is that the telephones in the Office of the Attorney General have not been checked since he took office. Such checks were made for Attorneys General McGrath and McGranery. We have had no information on what telephone changes might have been made since Mr. Brownell. took office.


RECOMMENDATION

SYNOPSIS: Following information supplied by Laboratory's telephone company contact . White House officers have advised American Telephone and Telegraph Company and Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company officials in strict confidence that "a manufacturer" received confidential White House information by means of a telephone tap., White House refused to supply details of tap and identity of manufacturer. White House requests that telephone company make security Survey of its telephone facilities; make telephone lines as secure as possible; supply information as to all known methods of wire tapping; and furnish opinion as to how alleged tap occurred. Telephone company will make physical (but not electronic) survey; will remove all multiple (extra) appearances of White House lines; will advise White House of only two most widely known forms of tapping, thus protecting itself and Bureau on other forms; and will not offer opinion as to how tap occurred due to poor security practices at White House and belief that leak was by word of mouth. Telephone company will not mention FBI in fany capacity to White House unless the Bureau indicates a desire that such mention be made and will protect Bureau's interest in countermeasures installed on White House lines. Contact requests Bureau not 🕖 divulge information regarding alleged tap outside Bureau. Above in- 🎢 formation should not be discussed with White House officials, telephone company officials or any other persons outside of Bureau due to risk of embarrassment to Laboratory contact in phone company.

b6 DETAILS: On 2-16-54 the Laboratory's contact at the Chesapeake and b7C Potomac Telephone Company advised SA of the following which occurred early in February, 1954. Assistant to the President, and Assistant to the Assistant to the President, conferred with of the American Telephone and Tele-plant officials of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company regarding security of the telephone system at the White House. who requested the conference, reported that the White House had definite "proof" that a manufacturer had secured confidential White House information through a telephone tap. He would not supply the "proof" nor would he identify the manufacturer or the nature of the information. The President, according to is gravely concerned over the security problem and has requested that something be done about it. requested the following of the A.T. & T. Co. and C. & P. Co. officials:

- 1. A complete security survey of the White House telephone system. This includes the White House Board (normal commercial service), the Security Board (Armed Services operation) and the Police Board (Secret Service operated) with suggestions for improvement.
- 2. The application of all measures necessary to guarantee the greatest possible security within "prudent reason" as to cost.
- 3. Information as to all known methods of telephone tapping.
- 4. Opinion as to how the alleged wire tap (previously mentioned) was accomplished.

The Laboratory contact advised that the phone company was going to recommend and do the following in complying with the White House request:

1. Make a complete physical check of all White House lines. The company is not going to use any electronic equipment, such as, amplifiers, because, while the engineers know that the microphones in telephones can be made to pick up room conversation when a telephone instrument is not in normal use, the company officials do not wish to bring this fact to the attention of plant employees who

will be used in making the security survey. The officials feel that if plant employees had such knowledge, security of telephone communications would be jeopardized in the future.

2. Remove at its own expense all multiple appearances (terminals on a line at other than the place where the phone is being used so that the line can be used at more than one location) both inside and outside of the White House. This will entail considerable cable work and expense.

Auggest the locking of all terminal boxes, wire closets and cross frames, but leave it up to the Government to see that this is done, since primary responsibility for physical security of the buildings lies with the Government.

Make periodic security checks of the White House phone system in the future.

3. Advise that there is tapping by means of mechanically connecting to the line, and also by means of inductive coupling (using an induction coil near the phone or line to pick up the conversation without actually connecting to the line).

The phone company is not going to mention other forms of tapping, such as, making the mouthpiece microphone in an instrument pick up room conversation when the phone is not in normal use. Since this technique also permits overhearing phone conversation when the phone is in use, a serious breach of security of telephone communications is involved. The company officials feel that an admission of the same would be most undesirable from the standpoint of the company's reputation and also from the standpoint of non-security minded White House personnel repeating it as a "choice bit of information."

Memorandum for Mr. Tamm **b**6 and if the White House is desirous of Bureau services it has only to use well-established channels. b7C further pointed out that the company mentioning the FBI as qualified in these matters could indicate a close relationship between the company and the Bureau on telephone work, and that this would be most undesirable.) The company-is going to offer no opinion as to how the alleged wire tap was accomplished. The company feels that with one or two secretaries monitoring the phone conversations of their White House superiors, with the knowledge and consent of the latter, good security is breached from the beginning and that the leak most likely occurred by word of mouth rather than by telephone tapping. The company feels that to suggest the discontinuing of this monitoring would be presumptuous and tantamount to telling the White House how to conb6 duct its business. b7C raised the question of security of Bureau-installed countermeasures on some White House lines. He was advised that the phone company employees making the security survey would be briefed in such a manner that these countermeasures would not be removed and their confidential nature would not be disclosed. If need for any explanation arises, they will be described as special "security devices for the White House" and no mention of FBI installation will be made. The Laboratory contact requested that the Bureau make no inquiry of the White House as to the alleged wire tapping incident. He pointed out that the information had been given the A.T. & T. Co. and C. & P. Co. officials in the strictest of confidence by __and that it would reflect badly on the officials involved if the White House even suspected a breach of this confidence. The whole matter was brought to the attention of the FBI as a matter of close cooperation on the part of our contact so that the Bureau will know what is going on and be in a position to protect its interests and its relations with the phone company. The contact stated that the company feels that if there had actually been a tap, the White House would have reported it to the Bureau immediately because of the Bureau's jurisdiction in these matters. In making his request to the Laboratory contact that the FBI not be mentioned at this time, ____ had in mind the objective of affording the Bureau an opportunity to review the situation before becoming

involved.

 - a. Agencies of the Federal Government and the government of the District of Columbia, for official use.
 - b. Officially recognized agencies, clubs, or educational units of the Federal Government or the government of the District of Columbia.

The foregoing shall not be construed to include sponsored meetings, meetings of a political, sectarian, fraternal, or similar nature, or meetings held for the purpose of promotion of commercial enterprises or commodities.

2. Application for the use of the Auditorium or Conference Rooms should be submitted at least one week in advance. It should be addressed as follows and include the information outlined below:

General Services Administration, Region 3 ATTENTION: Triangle Area Manager Room 1408 New Post Office Building 12th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, N. W. Washington 25, D. C.

- a. Name of agency in whose behalf the application is submitted.
- b. Date of requested assignment, and hours proposed for its commencement and termination.
- c. Nature of the contemplated program.
- d. Approximate number of persons expected to attend.
- e. Whether motion pictures or lantern slides are to be exhibited, stating (1) size of film, 35 or 16mm; (2) size of lantern slide.
- 3. No program shall continue beyond midnight.
- 4. If the projection of motion pictures or lantern slides is a part of the program, competent operators will be furnished under the supervision of the General Services Administration.

- 5. Music racks, ushers, and attendants for checking wraps, if needed, must be furnished by and at the expense of the permittee.
- 6. No admission fee shall be charged, no indirect assessment shall be made for admission, and no collection shall be taken. Commercial advertising or the sale of articles of any character will not be permitted.
 - 7. The serving of refreshments is prohibited.
- 8. A sample of any literature or folders to be distributed or posted shall be forwarded for review when formal request is made for either the Auditorium or Conference Rooms.
- 9. All persons attending meetings will be required to go directly to the Auditorium or Conference Rooms and to leave by the most direct exit. They shall be provided with tickets or other identification, except when the general public is invited. No one will be admitted to other parts of the building unless in the possession of a properly signed pass.
- 10. All persons attending meetings will be subject to the "Rules and Regulations Governing Public Buildings and Grounds," promulgated by the Administrator of General Services.
 - 11. SMOKING IS PROHIBITED WITHIN THE AUDITORIUM.





I. SYNOPSIS:

In accordance with the request contained in the memorandum to you from the Director's office dated 3-10-54, an unobtrusive security check was made by technical personnel of the FBI Laboratory on 3-12-54 and 3-15-54 of the Departmental Auditorium. The auditorium and three conference rooms along the rear were thoroughly checked, except for normally inaccessible points that would require scaffolding or necessitate considerable damage to the interior decoration. All logical surfaces and areas were covered in the security check with negative results, but extreme vulnerability was found for the entire building because of architectural construction permitting accessible areas around the walls and ceilings. The building is normally open to the public and personal or technical surveillance could be readily established.

II. ACTION:

Such information as deemed necessary should be brought to the attention of the Attorney General.

- 2. Small panel in Room 5C-07 assigned to International Training Section handling foreign exchange students giving access to space above entire auditorium.
- 3. Access to area below stage is through the boiler room in the basement.
- 4. Accèss to space above stage and between Auditorium and Room B is small panel in wire closet off left rear of stage.
- 5. Auditorium and Room B permanently wired up for public address system with numerous microphone outlets available on stage.
- 6. Radio and television loops available in terminal boxes at each side of auditorium.

- 7. Telephone main frame on fifth floor directly adjacent to area above auditorium.
- 8. Building is normally open to public. Side doors must be left unlocked whenever one or more rooms are reserved for use. Single guard usually stationed at desk in front lobby.
- 9. Tables and chairs are continually moved in and out of three conference rooms, depending upon plan of use for a particular reservation. Microphones and radios could be concealed in such furniture.

In connection with your recent inquiry to me concerning the constituty of microphones or other listening devices existing in the Departmental Anditorium I have had the personnel of our own Laboratory conduct a survey-for the location of such devices. The s ruly has been connected with negative results.

Incidental to this survey the Laboratory technicians made some interesting observations which I feel should be nassed along. For example, from the security standardist, weatnesses of such magnitude were found that a person familiar with the building would not necessarily need to resort to technical lintering devices in order to overhear and in some instances clandes incly view proceedings in process. This insecure condition exists primarily because of the building's architectural design, which provides accessible areaways above the ceilings, catwalks behind the wall panels and the like.

Hany other factors, including the expensive mublic address-wiring system, are responsible for the unsuitability of this space for closed or confidential meetings.



The contact was requested to add to the above list of published telephone numbers all nonpublished telephone numbers serving any of the embassies. Later in the same day the contact supplied the following information:

Some wires associated with and connected to the telephone lines of the and one or two other embassies do appear on the premises of the In addition, wires associated with a newly installed White House telephone line did appear on the premises of the until recently. However, the telephone company has since removed these wires, in the latter instance.

In October, 1954, the Washington telephone company initiated its own security program consisting of a planned elimination of extra wires associated with telephones subscribed to by U. S. Government and friendly governments which appeared in diplomatic establishments of Soviet and satellite governments. This program was being carried on along with other regular telephone work. However, as a result of the Bureau's request, the company will accelerate this program, completing this phase of the work in approximately one week, reporting the results to the Bureau. Within this period every effort will be made by the company to eliminate immediately any U. S. Government and friendly government telephone wires appearing on the premises being occupied by Soviet and satellite governments. Complete elimination of such wires associated with U. S. Government telephones which may be appearing in buildings occupied by friendly governments will take a longer period of time. Complete elimination of such extra wires associated with lines of one friendly nation which appear in buildings occupied by other friendly nations may prove to be impossible without going into considerable extra rewiring expense.

For approximately one year the telephone company has been making a quarterly check of 111 White House telephone lines, these particular lines having been specified by the White House. These lines do not have wires associated therewith which appear at other locations where listening in might be accomplished. The company will examine the wiring diagrams or charts which show all White House telephone lines, in addition to the 111 mentioned above, and, if other lines do exist, they will eliminate any extraneous appearances of wires associated with these telephone lines.

SECURITY OF BUREAU LINES:

Security checks of the office and residence telephone lines of the Director and members of the Executives Conference have been made quarterly by FBI Laboratory personnel for the past several years. There are no extra wires associated with any of these telephone lines which appear on the premises of Soviet, satellite or friendly foreign governments.

Reference is made to the memorandum to the Attorney General from this Bureau dated May 6. 1955, furnishing the results to date of the survey being made by the telephone company with respect to possible appearances of U.S. Government lines on the premises of foreign establishments in Washington, D. \tilde{C} .

There may be a substantial question of security involved if there are similar appearances of U.S. Government telephone lines in foreign missions in New York City and in other points in the United States. Because of the implications in the field of Government operations and Government communications, you may wish to consider the advisability of presenting the bread problem to the Interdepartmental Committee on Internal Security or such other Government body as you may deem competent for the purpose of examining the problem and taking any necessary action.

New York Office, advised at 2:50 p.m., May 6, 1955, that the repair work has now been completed and it has been determined that the appearances of the lines where we would cover them have now been transferred which is the building to the basement of occupied by the Italian Consulate. SYNOPSIS:

Re memo from C. E. Hennrich to A. H. Belmont, May 6, 1955, reporting that appearances of telephone lines serving Soviet UN Delegation have been noted in the basement of the Italian Consulate building in New York City.

It was recommended that the Interdepartmental Committee on Internal Security (ICIS) be told that there appeared to be a substantial question of security involved if there are appearances of U. S. Government telephone lines in missions of foreign governments and elsewhere in order that ICIS can give the problem appropriate consideration and take any necessary action.

You asked "Just what can ICIS do about it?"

Certain of the agencies belonging towics, such as Defense, State and Treasury Departments, have a primary interest in the security of their establishments in areas such as New York. The ICIS agencies and specifically the Office of Defense Mobilization (ODM) are responsible for タインインイイ UNRECORDED the broad planning regarding security of Government operations. ICIS has had the responsibility for making recommendations in the security field aside from intelligence consideration to the appropriate agencies of the Government.

It would appear desirable, therefore, to place the responsibility for any broad survey regarding security of Government communications of the type involved on the ICIS. This is particularly true during the current period when Congressional investigations into wire tapping are in progress.

Reference is made to my memorandum of April 1, 1955, reporting results of a preliminary check with the telephone company as to what U. S. Government and friendly foreign government telephone lines might have branch connections appearing on the premises of Communist-controlled diplomatic establishments. Telephone lines having such branches can be readily tapped wherever the branch connections appear. The inquiry was further extended to include any U. S. Government lines which might appear on the premises of friendly foreign government diplomatic establishments. At that time, the telephone company indicated that a survey would be made and steps would be taken to eliminate any undesirable situations.

You will recall that this matter was predicated upon a report of that a White House line branch connection appeared on the French Embassy premises. As reported in my memorandum of April 1, 1955, the telephone company confirmed the report relative to the White House line but advised that the situation had been corrected. With regard to the survey, Mr. Tolson commented "When this has been done, we should send memo to AG and Rogers and write Dillon Anderson. 4/3." The Director commented "Yes." The telephone company now has advised that although they have had a crew of men working on the project, because of the great amount of work involved, it has not yet been possible to complete the entire survey; however, at our request, priority was given to a check of Communist-controlled establishments, and this portion of the survey has just been completed. The results, together with the identity of the White House line formerly appearing on the premises of the French b6 Embassy, are as follows:

- 3. Branch connections of eleven phone lines of the District of Columbia Government appear on the premises of the Yugoslav Commercial Counselor's Office.
- 4. Branch connections of a total of 43 telephone lines of friendly foreign governments appear on the premises of the various Communist-controlled diplomatic establishments. It is noted that telephone lines of 24 commercial companies and lines of 221 private individuals likewise appear on the premises of these diplomatic establishments.

The telephone company has initiated a program to eliminate all telephone lines from the Communist-controlled establishments except the specific lines which are serving the respective Communist-controlled establishments themselves. As of April 29, 1955, this program had been completed in the Soviet Embassy and Chancery and in the Polish Embassy. Completion of the program with respect to the remaining Communist-controlled establishments is in progress.

Although, because of the unexpectedly large amount of work involved in making the survey and correcting the situations found, it has not been possible for the telephone company to complete the survey with respect to telephone lines which appear on the premises of friendly foreign governments, it is suggested that we have sufficient information to warrant furnishing a report at this time.

I further pointed out that, as has been reported telephones. in the newspapers recently, there are various ways by which a telephone may be modified to provide microphone coverage if physical access can be had to the telephone instrument itself, and that therefore, unless a relatively high degree of physical security were given to telephones equipped with countermeasures, the installation of countermeasures would not provide a solution. (Access to the telephone by an enemy would permit modification of both the telephone and the countermeasure and render the countermeasure useless.) Accordingly, I suggested that one basis on which a decision might be made as to what phones should be protected would be the consideration as to which phones warranted the necessary high degree of physical security. This seemed to be a new thought to them and it was generally agreed that this would greatly reduce the contemplated scope of countermeasure installations.

At the conclusion of the meeting, a revised draft instruction was proposed by _______ for consideration by all of the military branches which would merely serve to alert the various military agencies to the general telephone security problem. This draft instruction, a copy of which is attached, received tentative concurrence from the military representatives present.

1. Developments in the telephone communications field have proved the susceptibility of telephones to an increasing variety of eavesdropping techniques of such a nature that unwitting breaches of security are possible. These techniques are not all in the category of so-called "wire taps" where the actual telephone conversation can be intercepted, but also involve numerous ways of utilizing the telephone as a microphone even when the handset is properly placed on its cradle. In effect, normal conversation in an average sized office can be picked up by the telephone when the instrument is not in use, unless steps are taken to insure the absolute electrical separation of the handset from the telephone line. Net all Department of the Army installations are at present taking steps adequate to insure against the security threat which these techniques pose.



- 2. The Department of the Army is now participating in a governmental study to determine the full measure of the threat to our security through hostile exploitation of our telephones: As a part of this study, an adequate program of telephonic safeguards will be formulated.
- 3. Pending the issuance of Department of the Army instructions resulting from this study, the following suggestions are furnished for providing interim counter-measures:
- a. Remove, where practicable, telephones, including intercom systems, from conference rooms and war rooms, wherein matters of a SECRET or higher classification are discussed, or "deplug" the instruments while conferences are in progress.

-b. Remove execusive telephone instruments from hep-efficers

Inspect periodically for any indications of tampering with telephone instruments, terminals, switchboards and wire lines.

SECRET or higher electification in areas containing telephones or intercom equipment.

- 4. Report information pertinent to this matter through G-2 channels to DA.
 - 5. You will be kept advised of developments.

Government telephone line had an unused branch connection existing on the Embassy premises of a friendly foreign government in the District of Columbia. Government telephone lines, the telephone company was requested to advise whether branch connections of any other U. S. In my memorandum to the Attorney Beneral dated May 6, 1955, information was furnished regarding preliminary results of a survey being made by the telephone company to determine whether there were appearances of any V. S. Jovernment lines on the premises of foreign diplomatic establishments in Baskington, D. C. Also, by my memorandum to you dated May 13, 1955, it was suggested that you might wish to refer this matter to the Interdepartmental Committee on Internal Security for possible consideration of this problem in New York and other cities.

This survey has now been completed. As reflected in my memorandum of May 6, 1955, no U. S. Government lines were found to exist in any of the 13 diplonatic establishments of Communist governments in Fashington, D. C. In addition, the telephone company has now eliminated from the premises of these establishments all lines except those actually needed to serve the establishments themselves.



Reference is made to my memorandum of August 12, 1955, relative to the above-entitled matter reflecting the results of an interview with officials of the local telephone company.

You will recall that at the request of the FBI, the telephone company recently made a survey to determine whether any extra telephone connection of U. S. Government lines appeared on the premises of foreign governments. The results of this survey, upon the Director's instructions, were furnished to the White House and to the Attorney General. It is noted that as a result of the survey, 13 U. S. Government lines and 3 District of Columbia lines were found with extra appearances on the premises of friendly foreign governments as previously reported. At the time of the completion of the survey, the telephone company representative advised that these extra appearances would not be elimib6 nated except upon specific request.

Since informal discussions had indicated that the telephone company might change this policy, I contacted August 30, 1955, in order to keep in touch with the situation. advised in response to my inquiry that the telephone company has the matter under consideration with the objective of removing the apparent U. S. Government and District of Columbia telephone connections which appear on the premises of foreign governments at this time. I requested to be advised when such removal had been completed on the 16 lines indicated that this job was approximately mentioned above. 50% completed and he expected all of the work to be done by the end of the week. He further indicated that he would advise, the Bureau upon completion.

Telephone company progress in removing U. S. Government and ACTION: District of Columbia lines from the premises of friendly foreign governments will be followed by the Laboratory and reported upon completion.

In my memorandum of Lay 13, 1955, to Deputy Attorney General Rovers it was suggested that he might wish to refer to the Interdepartmental Committee on Internal Courity (ICIL) the question of possible similar appearance of U. S. Government lines in foreign establishments in cittee other than Cashington. Ur. Rogers advised me by memorandum of June 13, 1955, that this matter had been taken up with ICIS which would subsequently follow the matter with General Services Administration. ICIS will also determine what Government buildings are not under General Services jurisdiction. I also informed in Rogers of the appearance of U. S. Sovernment lines in six friendly foreign government establishments by memorandum dated August 8, 1955.

Hr. Dillon Anderson, Special Assistant to the Fresident, has been advised of the results of this survey by letters dated May 5, 1955, and August 8, 1955.

We have been advised by the local telephone company that its present policy is to remove the existing extra connections of U.S. dovernment telephone lines from foreign government premises. This matter will be followed with the telephone company to insure removal of the above-listed lines.

Telephone company will eliminate branches on any highly sensitive lines if specifically requested to do so.

Colonel Andrew Goodpaster, Staff Secretary to the Goody-President, contacted Philox of Liaison 3/9/56. He stated that there is particularly sensitive work going on in some of the rooms occupied by the staff of Governor Harold Stassen, the Special Assistant to the President on Disarmament. He asked if it would be possible for the Bureau to make a security check of these rooms to insure that there are no microphones or other listening devices hidden. He stated that this would include Stassen's office, a conference room, and possibly several other rooms. He stated that similar sensitive work is being carried on by

who recently replaced Nelson Rockefeller. He said no request has been received from office but it is possible that such a request could be received in the future.

Colonel Goodpaster asked if the Bureau can make such a security check and if so, what arrangements are necessary to have it done. This was discussed with Assistant Director D. J. Parsons of the Laboratory, who stated that the Bureau is equipped to conduct such a survey and that we are in a position to handle this for the White House.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that Liaison advise Colonel Goodpaster that the Bureau is in a position to handle this request for the White House and that the Laboratory will work out the necessary details with representatives of Governor Stassen's office.

"Security of Telephone Service

On March 28, 1956, Colonel M. A. Quinto, Chief, Security Division, Assistant Chief of Staff, Intelligence, (ACSI), Department of the Army, advised SAD. J. Sullivan, Liaison Section, that the Chief of Staff of the Army had put a requirement on ACSI to check certain offices and conference rooms in the Pentagon in an effort to ascertain if they were secure from clandestine listening devices. Colonel Quinto stated that he has been requested by Major General Gaither, ACSI, to ascertain if the Bureau might be able to help ACSI in this matter. Colonel Quinto stated that the Counter Intelligence Corps had certain detection equipment for "sweeping" but that both he and General Gaither were of the opinion that the Bureau would be much more efficient and would no doubt have better techniques than the CIC agents.

Colonel Quinto stated that he was not requesting that the Bureau do the actual physical "sweeping" in this instance, but was requesting that if at all possible the Bureau allow personnel of the CIC to be briefed by Bureau technicians as to methods and procedures of such an operation and to give the CIC personnel the benefit of any experiences that the Bureau might have in such matters.

This question has been discussed with the Bureau Laboratory and it is thought that the Bureau could be of material assistance to ACSI concerning Colonel Quinto's request.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. That Colonel Quinto be advised that the Bureau will brief designated CIC personnel in methods, procedures and techniques used in a "sweeping", RECORDED - 83 62-97308operation.

Major Mann called at the Laboratory to discuss security precautions to be taken by U. S. Air Force officers during their visit to the air show at Moscow, U. S. S. R., on July 24. Mann indicated that he was responsible for briefing this group of 14 officers for 20 minutes on the subject of security prior to their departure from the United States.

Special Agent ddvised Mann that the Burt could not presume to indicate to the Air Force how their officers should conduct themselves from the standpoint of security during their forthcoming visit to Moscow but that he, would be glad to answer specific questions. Mann inquired about microphones in general, about the use of surreptitious photography, the use of closed TV circuits, the use of miniature transmitters, the possible destruction of film, and the possible use of drugs in order to secure information from the officers during their stay in Moscow. explained that microphone development was such that effective coverage could be had with units ranging in size from the size of a dime to those 6 feet in diameter utilizing a parabolic reflector. As to photography, was possible to secure good photographs from concealed positions with either still or movie cameras and that concealment of a TV camera was be not beyond possibility. It was pointed out that with the development b7C of transistors, transmitters had been reduced to a size even smaller than a cigarette package and that small amplifiers were available on the market no larger than a cigarette lighter.

As to the destruction of the film, it was pointed out that the use of X-ray or radio-active material could very well be employed to damage new or exposed film without the user being aware of such destruction. indicated that the use of drugs was more or less a medical question which should be discussed by the Air Force with qualified persons.

SECURITY CHECK REQUESTED BY SENATOR JOHN E. McCLELLAN

Pursuant to arrangements made by the Director, I saw Senator McClellan Saturday afternoon. He said he didn't know enough about the technical aspects to really know what he wanted until he had talked to the Director. He did now feel that he wanted the hearing room of the Committee on Government Operations checked, his office and home phones, as well as those of Committee Counsel Robert Kennedy. He asked that countermeasures be put in the Committee room phones and his home and office phones. I assured the Senator that we would be glad to do this and we would get started immediately.

I explained to the Senator that the countermeasure did not prevent a tap to overhear conversations over the telephone line but did prevent the telephone from being used as a microphone to pick up conversations in the room. He said he understood this and that frankly he was not concerned about his conversations over the phone even to the extent that when he got annoyed he told some of the people he was talking to to go ahead and record his conversations. I did tell him that we would, of course, check all of the telephone lines and determine whether there were any taps in existence or any indications that the phones had been tapped.

Messrs. and Pfafman of the Laboratory started the check of the premises in the Senate Office Building immediately and made a search for micro-b6 phones insofar as it was possible without damage to walls or fixtures. Nothing was found. Countermeasure devices were installed in the Senator's office phone, four phones in the Committee room, four in Kennedy's office. This work was completed Saturday night so that we are now through in the Senate Office Building premises. It will require two to three days more to complete the check of the telephone lines and cables but we expect to complete all of the work including the Senator's and Kennedy's home phones by Wednesday evening.

Senator McClellan also asked if we would make a recheck of whatever we thought was necessary at some reasonable period and I told him we would do this. The Senator was most appreciative and said he realized that it was desirable from our standpoint as well as his not to have this spread around and that he and Kennedy were the only ones aware of our security check and protective measures.

' ,	Reference is made to your memorandum of 2-18-57 to Mr. Tolson setting forth a request by Senator John L. McClellan for installation of countermeasure devices and the making of security checks in his Committee room, office and residence, and in the office and residence of Robert F. Kennedy Chief Counsel of the Senate Select Committee on Improper Activities in the Labor or Management Field.
	On February 16, 19 and 20, 1957, SA Supervisors R. F. Pfafman and b6 b7C completed all work in connection with the Senator's request. No evidence of concealed microphones or of tampering with the telephone lines was discovered.
	A total of six man days were required to perform the following work: (1) Microphone surveys of three rooms in the Senate Office Building - the Government Operations Committee room (Room 357), the Senator's office (Room 137A), and Kennedy's office (Room 103). (2) Telephone security checks of 17 lines involving 19 instruments in all of the above rooms and at the apartment of the Senator in the Fairfax Hotel, Washington, D. C., and the residence of Kennedy at McLean, Virginia. (3) The installation of 15 countermeasure devices in telephone instruments at the above locations.
