This letter responds to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request dated March 15, 2017, addressed to the Department of Homeland Security, Customs and Border Protection (CBP), and the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement seeking records concerning suspicionless searches of individuals' electronic devices at the nation's borders. On April 4, 2017, CBP referred your request to the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) FOIA Branch for search and direct response to you.

TSA completed its search and located records responsive to item (5) of your request: documents, including tear sheets and TRIP records, containing or relating to complaints filed by individuals or organizations about CBP's and/or ICE's search, review, retention or sharing of the information on travelers' electronic devices. Portions of the documents are being withheld pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552. Please refer to the Applicable Exemptions list at the end of this letter that identifies the authority for withholding the exempt material, which is indicated by a mark appearing in the block next to the exemption. An additional enclosure with this letter explains these exemptions in more detail.

The rules and regulations of the Transportation Security Administration applicable to Freedom of Information Act requests are contained in the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 6, Part 5. They are published in the Federal Register and are available for inspection by the public.

Referral

While processing your request, TSA located records that fall under the purview of the Customs and Border Patrol (CBP) and Department of State (State). Accordingly, your request and 47 pages of responsive records were referred to CBP and 5 pages were referred to State for processing and direct response to you. 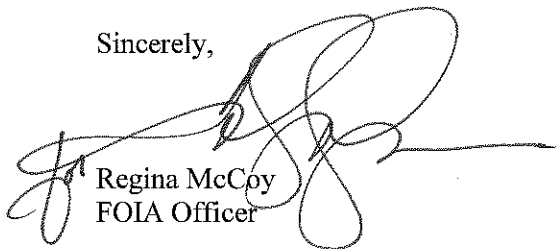

**Exemption (b)(3):** Records specifically exempted from disclosure by Title 49 U.S.C. Section 114(r), which exempts from disclosure Sensitive Security Information (SSI) that “would be detrimental to the security of transportation” if disclosed.

**Exemption (b)(4):** Records that contain trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person that is privileged or confidential.

**Exemption (b)(5):** Inter- or intra-agency records that are normally privileged in the civil discovery context. The three most frequently invoked privileges are the deliberative process privilege, the attorney work-product privilege, and the attorney-client privilege:

- Deliberative process privilege – Under the deliberative process privilege, disclosure of these records would injure the quality of future agency decisions by discouraging the open and frank policy discussions between subordinates and superiors.
- Attorney work-product privilege – Records prepared by or at the direction of a TSA attorney.
- Attorney-client privilege – Records of communications between an attorney and his/her client relating to a matter for which the client has sought legal advice, as well as facts divulged by client to attorney and any opinions given by attorney based on these.

**Exemption (b)(6):** Records that contain identifying information that applies to a particular individual when the disclosure of such information “would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.” This requires the balancing of the public’s right to disclosure against the individual’s right to privacy.

**Exemption (b)(7)(A):** Records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that production of such law enforcement records or information...could reasonably be expected to interfere with law enforcement proceedings.

**Exemption (b)(7)(C):** Records containing law enforcement information when disclosure “could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy” based upon the traditional recognition of strong privacy interests ordinarily appropriated in law enforcement records.

**Exemption (b)(7)(E):** Records compiled for law enforcement purposes, the release of which would disclose techniques and/or procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law.

**Exemption (b)(7)(F):** Records containing law enforcement information about a person, in that disclosure of information about him or her could reasonably be expected to endanger his or her life or physical safety.

This responds to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Privacy Office (PRIV) dated March 15, 2017, seeking records relating to CBP and ICE electronic device searches. PRIV referred item 4(a) of your request to the DHS Office of Inspector General (OIG) for processing and direct response to you. DHS-OIG received that referral on March 31, 2017.

DHS-OIG previously responded to item 4(a) of your request on June 27, 2017, stating that DHS-OIG's Office of Audits has an ongoing matter which was withheld pursuant to FOIA Exemption 5. DHS-OIG has since conducted the searches proposed in emails between Scott Wilkins and David Glass; by email dated September 5, Mr. Wilkins confirmed that you would consider DHS-OIG to have fully complied with your request if we conduct the proposed searches and produce all non-exempt portions of responsive records. As such, this is a final response to your FOIA request.

The proposed searches agreed upon by Mr. Wilkins and Mr. Glass resulted in the enclosed page containing complaint narratives responsive to item 5 of your request. We reviewed the responsive records under the FOIA to determine whether they may be disclosed to you. Based on that review, this office is providing the following:

OIG redacted from the enclosed documents, names and identifying information of third parties to protect the identities of these individuals. Absent a Privacy Act waiver, the release of such information concerning the third parties named in these records would result in an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy in violation of the Privacy Act. Information is also protected from disclosure pursuant to Exemptions 6 and 7(C) of the FOIA further discussed below.

**Exemption 6, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6)**

Exemption 6 allows withholding of “personnel and medical files and *similar files* the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.” 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6)(emphasis added). DHS-OIG is invoking Exemption 6 to protect the names of third parties and any information that could reasonably be expected to identify such individuals.

**Exemption 7(C), 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(7)(C)**

Exemption 7(C) protects from public disclosure “records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes . . . [if disclosure] could reasonably be expected to cause an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.” 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(7)(C). DHS-OIG is invoking Exemption 7(C) to protect the identities of third parties, and any information contained in these investigative records that could reasonably be expected to identify those individuals.

**Referral**

Additionally, 188 pages of potentially responsive records have been referred to Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). ICE will process the records under the FOIA and respond to you directly.

**Appeal**

Although I am aware that your request is the subject of ongoing litigation and appeals are not ordinarily acted on in such situations, I am required by statute

Ms. [REDACTED] states that on September 2, 2013, she attempted to re-enter the United States through a Niagara Falls after attending her cousin's wedding in Toronto, Canada. She alleges that CBPOs of whom are U.S. citizens, was detained for six hours on the basis of their race and religion. She further claims that BP inappropriately questioned her husband [REDACTED] away from her about his religious beliefs and asking him when he practiced his religion. A guest on the show, an attorney with the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), who has noted that CBP has a pattern of asking Muslim travelers invasive and personal questions about their protected religious activity. Ms. [REDACTED] also reports that her friends [REDACTED] and his family, all U.S. citizens, were detained on racial and religious grounds at the Detroit border crossing when returning to the U.S. from a recent wedding. On OTM, Ms. [REDACTED] states that she was aggressively searched "two or so separate times" by CBPOs to heavily retaliate each time "during the detainer." Ms. [REDACTED] alleges that her family's electronic devices were searched and confiscated. On the OTM show, an American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) attorney says, "The Federal Government has the authority to search electronic devices at the border without any suspicion that they contain evidence of wrongdoing." [REDACTED] another wedding guest and U.S. citizen, was also subjected to secondary inspection at the Detroit POE. On OTM, he said that CBP kept his phone overnight during his inspection. [REDACTED] had him he could return the following day to pick up his phone, even though he had told CBP that it was his work phone and he needed it immediately because he was on call. Ms. [REDACTED] other allegations include the confiscation of electronic devices, a CBPO's inappropriate behavior including "intimidating" and "roughing" and being subjected to "frisking" and "strip searches" in CBP custody. Ms. [REDACTED] asks for DHS and CBP to reform its policies at ports of entry and to provide more transparency about their activities. She says that her family was not given a reason for being detained, claims that CBPOs refused to give her their names, other. She claims that she attempted to contact CBP and DHS, including CRCL, to seek information about CBP policies and was provided links only to public websites. She alludes an impact assessment CRCL conducted regarding CBP searches of electronic devices. 	(b)(6)	<p>RE: I fly a fair amount and I am in favor of security that would make a difference. However, I was profiled recently at the airports. I am not a terrorist to be picked up twice, within two months; at JFK upon exiting the airplane by two JFK police officers like a criminals. I am an academic physician; scientist; author of medical books, and national and international speaker and I AM NOT A terrorist. I am US citizen who is living in the US since Nov. 1985 26 years. I am now the (h)(6) and also the (b)(6) center Rank number 12 in the USA. I am academically active with a lot of medical publications including two recent text books in pathology. I always receive national and international invitations to give lectures, seminars and workshop in my specialty. I am also member of the Cytopathology Committee of the College of American Pathologists CAP who are in charge of all regulations; policies and proficiency testing related to specialty in the US. In 20062007, I have also helped the Saudi government the Saudi National Guard Health Affair establishing a school of Cytotechnology in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia in 2007 with western Board Certification. This is the first and the only school of this specialty in the Middle East. With this school, I have establishing an annual Symposium in cytopathology at Riyadh Saudi Arabia sponsored by the Saudi National Guard Health Affair they provide me with a government visit visa each year. I attend this symposium Annually as guest speaker since 2007, which attract 150200 pathologists and cytotechnologists from all the middle eastern countries. Therefore, currently, I do a lot of traveling about 10 trips per year with 23 at least international to cover these activities. I have changed my passport June 15, 2011 due to no more pages available for visas. My trouble started with the first trip with my new passport. While I am coming back from Dubai trip August 6, 2011; I noticed that my boarding pass has the code SSSS. Prior to the boarding, I was subjected to extra search which I agree with it, to keep our flights safe. However, once I reached the JFK and upon exiting the airplane, two JFK police officers were outside the airplane checking passports. Once I arrived and recognize my name they escorted me to the Security office at JFK. For the first time in my life, I felt and treated like a criminals, It took about one hour and half with a lot of question and details search and documentations of everything that I have wallet, pockets, and luggage. When I finished and they realized that nothing is suspicious and I am academic physician and not a terrorist, they released me with no apology. I had ample time at the time to my next flight to Pittsburgh and I took this incidence as unusual, and I thought this would be my final trouble. My next trip was to Istanbul September 15, 2011 to attend and speak three lectures at the European Congress of Cytology. This meeting is the largest meeting in my specialty in Europe and it occurs in different cities each year in Europe. When I left Pittsburgh airport heading to Istanbul, I have granted SSSS flight code and no assigned seat in my boarding pass. This was cleared at the boarding gate with extra manual search at the gate. The flight was a small number, and I am the only one who subjected to such search. I was the last one to enter the airplane with every eyes on me from the passengers and the crew who saw the detailed search prior to boarding. I felt like a criminal again. Upon returning from Istanbul, I have a connection in Amsterdam Airport AMS. At AMS the boarding pass has also SSSS code. At the gate there were about 8 TSA American officers with portable laptops equipped with passport scanning capabilities. They scanned all passports and asked all passengers few questions prior to boarding. Everyone pass except me and asked me to wait for the chief of US immigration officer to arrive from other gate. Once I arrived and recognize my name they again escorted me to the Security office at JFK. 		<p>This complaint refers to my travels between the dates of 07/19/2011 09/30/2011. I had applied for a new passport in the spring time of 2011 and was pleasantly surprised to receive it back so fast. The problem begins on 07/19/2011 leaving Aruba and headed back to Raleigh, North Carolina. The reason for my trip being to scout out a possible location for my fianc and I to get married. While departing Aruba and going through customs I was stopped. I was asked to have a seat on the wall and wait for further instructions. I cooperated and took a seat. After about 15 minutes two customs officers approached me and asked me to come with them. I was taken off to the side where I was told I was going to be searched. I put my bags on the table and the customs officer began dumping out the first bag. This bag contained expensive electronics, and the officer treated the items as if they were of no importance. After all bags were searched and nothing illegal was found, I was asked if I wanted to take my pants off. I answered that I didnt want to. The officer then said that he had to pat me down. His pat down was extremely intrusive and uncomfortable to say the least. After the strip search was over I was given back my passport and sent on my way with no explanation of why this just occurred. The second situation occurred again leaving Aruba on 09/20/2011 while going through customs. My fianc and our families along with 38 guests were there to celebrate our wedding. While going through customs again I was asked to take a seat on the wall, but this time my wife was told to do the same. After 10 minutes a customs officer approached us and told us to go with him. This time both my bags and my wifes bags were searched. Along with being searched the officer asked a series of very personal questions about my background. I answered the questions to the best of my ability. He then proceeded to ask me questions if I was ever charged with rape or child molestation. Even when I gave him a stern no he asked the question three more times. All this is going on while my newly wed wife is standing right next to me. I do not see why it was necessary for your officer to talk to me that way and treat me like that in front of my wife. My background proves that I have never been charged with either offense. After the absurd questions we were sent on our way. The third situation occurred on 09/30/2011 in Miami. My wife and I were on our way back from Playa del Carmen, Mexico from our honeymoon. This time when I handed my passport to the customs agent he said there was something wrong with my passport and that my wife and I needed to follow him. After 10 minutes another officer came along and escorted us to get our checked bags and then onto a room that resembled a jail cell. Along the way the agent was not courteous and was very rude. After leaving us in this room for 20 minutes another customs agent approached us and brought us over to a counter where he went through our belongs. He asked if we had electronic devices. We informed him that we had a couple cameras, cell phones, headphones and a couple iPods. He went through our stuff and put the electronics on the side. After telling us to zip up our bags he said he would be right back. After 10 minutes he came walking back and said we could put our electronics away and to have a nice day. All this drama for what? I am an American citizen and I am proud of that. I always back up law enforcement and admire the job that they do. I have no problem going through a search to make our country a safer place, but what I have had to endure the past three times going through customs is way beyond making this country a safer place. Its flat out harassment. <p>Dear Sirs, My wife has a business as a wholesale dealer of collection minerals since 2007. She works with many dealers in Canada and USA. I help her in different tasks, mostly as a driver she does not drive a car, photographer, some general task etc. In order to reach the USA dealers we applied for Visas with our original Bulgarian passports in 2007. We obtained tourist and business visas B1 and B2. We believed that these business visas give us the right to legally make business in USA. In 2008 we received and our Canadian citizenship and passports. Since 2007 we have made many trips probably more than 20 to USA in order to deliver collection minerals to American dealers. Almost all our USA entries are at Derby Line, Vermont Port of Entry. Before the trips she contracts with the American dealers what minerals they are interested and then we deliver them. During these years we have been verified couple of times at the border both USA and Canada sides but always everything was ok. In order to enter in USA we use both passports the Bulgarian ones with the tourist and business visas and recently mostly just the Canadian passports. In 2009 during one verification at the Derby Line, Vermont Port of Entry we presented just the Canadian passports and the border officer told us that we cannot sell to the public without business visas but our business visas were in the Bulgarian passports they were not with us so we presented the necessary evidences that we deliver minerals to Carnegie Museum and he let us enter in USA. In January 2011 we decided to make a mixed vacation/business trip to Arizona. We wanted to visit some parks like Grand Canyon etc. and in January/February in Tucson are held many minerals shows and almost all American dealers are there. In order to reach them easier my wife decided to rent a room in a hotel where a mineral show is held. On 22 January 2011 on our way to Tucson we were stopped for verification at Derby Line, Vermont Port of Entry. I want to mention that the custom officers treated us with the necessary respect and their actions were very professional. We presented both Bulgarian and Canadian passports and explained that we will visit Tucson in order to meet some minerals dealer we have made arrangements. The border officer told us that he cannot be sure that we will not sell to the public and we argued that we have and business visas. He responded that these visas do not give us the right to do business in USA. That surprised us very much. Till that moment we believed that with these business visas we can make deals in USA and everything is legal. After that the border officer inspected our vehicle and our laptop. He started to ask us separately, questions about details concerning deals made during the years. He found difference between my answer and the answer of my wife concerning one particular deal. He told me that I am not telling the truth. Later we discussed with my wife this difference and I realized that I have mixed two different deals with the same mineral dealer. As I mentioned above this is my wife business and I am not very well familiar with many details. All that verification continued 56 hours and at the end the officer told me that I must swear and I can be arrested. That was too much after hours of questioning and pressure I was very confused and scared. I am not familiar with the USA laws and in front of the possibility to be arrested I decided to not make any further statements, swears etc. Finally the custom officer told me that I am prohibited to enter in the USA for 5 years. My wife did not receive any penalties. That was very big shock. All my intentions and actions during these multiple entries in USA were made with my hard believe that I am doing something right and completely legal due to the business visa and now I have found myself with so severe punishment like some kind of criminal. That was very hard to accept and during the last couple of months I have passed through many internal struggles trying to understand why and how my good intentions led me to that bad situation. After these month the emotions diminished and I realize that it is my fault, that I was not well informed concerning the rights that my USA business visa gives me and due to lack of detailed knowledge about my wifes business I have not responded well to the customs officers question. Even realizing my involuntary mistake one thought does not give me peace finally all my intentions were good thats why I find too severe that I am punished for 5 years not to enter in USA. As I mentioned I realize that this is my mistake but I cannot find guilt in all I have done and thats why I find too severe these consequences of my actions so I would like to kindly ask you to examine that case and to reconsider this 5 years USA entry prohibitions. (b)(6)	<p>PORT OF ENTRY INCIDENT REPORT On Sunday, October 16, 2011 I was detained temporarily at the Fort Lauderdale/Hollywood International Airport by the Custom &amp; Border Protection Authorities while returning from a 5day trip from Jamaica. I traveled from Kingston, Jamaica on Caribbean Airline flight BW 037 on Sunday, October 16, 2011 and arrived at the Fort Lauderdale/Hollywood Airport at 8:30 PM. I had no problem through the screening device when boarding the aircraft in Kingston, Jamaica. Immediately as the aircraft door was opened I heard my name over the aircraft intercom that I should move to the front of the aircraft quickly. I proceeded to the front of the aircraft with my hand luggage and stepped out the aircraft and moved toward the walkway that leads into the building. Suddenly, I was accosted by three CBP authorities. One of the three officers (b) grabbed me furiously and pushed me back up against the wall searching my arm and body for tattoos. He forcefully turned me and pushed me face up against the wall. Kicked my legs apart and searched me viciously from my feet up to my private parts pulling as if he found a weapon. He then pushed his left hand into my left front jeans pocket as I faced the wall, twisting his hand in my pocket up against my left leg as he tried to remove a small piece of paper a receipt from my pocket. Officer (b) did not say anything to me concerning the reason for him treating me the way he did. During the search I asked him the reason for such violent search. He told me to shut up. I realized that once again the system has failed to remove my name and date of birth from the criminal record of another person despite New York Supreme Court Judge Leventhal's order. I told officer (b) to remove from my hand luggage a letter given to me by Judge Leventhal and read the content of the letter. He threatened me with the tone of his voice and told me to shut up. He had two other officers with him that could have checked the content of the Judges letter. After the completion of the search, I said that I was sick and tired of the authorities jostling me as if I am a criminal. I told the officers that they are going to apologize when it is all over, because they refused to read the content of the Judges letter. I was told to carry this document with me at all times if a situation like this should occur. Officer (b) told me to shut up and threatened to hand cuff me. I become silent as officer (b) held my arm tightly and pushed me quickly through up the walk way leading to the immigration custom desk. Officer (b) asked me a question after he threatened to hand cuff me and I said I will remain silent. He became very angry. I thought he was going to jump me somewhere through the walk way before I get to custom. I was so terrified and I remained silent. I was pushed past the immigration custom desk. One of the officers removed my passport from my hand luggage and gave it to the intake immigration custom officer. He quickly scanned my United States Passport and told the officer s that it is a match. I was pushed into a detention room and forcefully placed on a metal seat and was told not to move by Officer (b). Officer (b) searched my hand luggage by removing everything from my hand luggage. He showed no interest in the Judges letter he pulled from my hand luggage. When he was finished searching my belongings, I told him that this is all a big mistake and this is not the first time I had this experience. I told him that I was a medical doctor and someone stole and used my identity. He moved quickly upon me and placed his face approximately 23 inches close to my face, staring in my eyes for about a minute and shouted in my face that I was a dumb doctor and I should shut up. I stood there in shock looking in his eyes. I thought to myself that he has gone crazy. I remained silent during that one minute stare down. I never said a word to him after he stared me down. I sat in the metal seat and closed my eyes to prevent myself from looking at him as he guarded the door of the detention room. About 15 minutes later I was taken to another room with about 6 CBP officers. Before I was finger printed one of the officers took the Judges letter from my hand luggage and told me that the letter was no good because there were other charges showed up on the record. I was finger printed and my prints did not match the person they have on record. The supervisor then apologized to me and said that he would be ticked off if he was in my position. I told the supervisor that Officer (b) tried to jump me because I was ticked off because of this dreadful encounter. Officer (b) did not apologize but he and the officer who introduced himself as the supervisor walked me to the aircraft checkedon luggage receptacle area and escorted me past the checkout desk. My boyfriend lives in Las Vegas so during my time there I stay with him. I flew to Las Vegas from Bellingham on July16th with a few friends and I did not have a problem going through security. On August6th I flew by myself from Vancouver and was asked to go through secondary screening where they took me to another room. The security officer interrogated me with so many questions that it startled me. I was 21 years old at the time and have not done anything in my life which would put me in a situation where I'd be face to face with a security guard/police officer, getting interrogated. I told the officer that I was going to see my boyfriend but it seemed hard for him to believe. He said that my record showed that I have been in the states numerous times during the year of 2011. The only other places I have been to were San Jose. He asked me for the specific dates and I was not able to give that to him, rather I told him the months which I went and told the officer that my friends booked the tickets so I didn't have the itinerary information in my email account. The officer then searched through my check in luggage, my carry on, as well as my purse. He also asked for my password on my cell phone and went through every single picture I had. It didn't bother me because I have nothing to hide, but is that of normal procedure?! They finally let me go 5 minutes into my flight boarding. On my most recent trip to Las Vegas on September13 I was taken the secondary screening again !! This time, I was in the waiting room for a lot longer and I did NOT want to miss my flight so I spoke with a male officer who was at the front desk. I told him that this was the 2nd time I had been taken to secondary screening and didn't want to go through it anymore because all I am trying to do is see my boyfriend in the states with NO INTENTIONS for anything else. The officer began to question me again and I gave him all the answers he needed. He told me that I will be denied entry into the US next time if I fail to provide any information that will prove commitment to coming back to Canada. He says my records show I am currently being seen as trying to live in the states illegally. I told the officer that I do go to school. I am enrolled in the Criminology program at Douglas College in Canada. I attended the summer semester and had enrolled in the winter semester for Full Time. The reason why I am not in their winter semester was because hardship came along with finances with my family so we were not able to pay for my fall tuition and then the dead line for tuition fees passed so my courses were given away. I also offered to show the officer on my laptop of the courses I had chosen with the date which I had done so but he said no. I also explained to the officer that this is why I have been going to Las Vegas numerous times this year because it is the first time where I haven't had school for a semester nor do I have a job so for the time being I want to be able to spend some time with my boyfriend because once January hits Winter Semester which is JanApril I will be enrolled Full Time and I will not be able to travel anymore to see my boyfriend.</p>	<p>I am just so frustrated with this whole situation that it makes me want to cry. I cried during the most recent time I was taken the secondary screening because I'm put in a situation where I feel like a criminal and I have told them nothing BUT the truth and only the truth. I love my boyfriend and it makes it hard for me to know that there is a possibility that next time I try to go see him they may deny me from it. I have NO intentions to live in the US when my family lives in Canada and I go to school here too. I only visit the US with the intentions to see my boyfriend, go shopping or to sight see. In addition to my qualification I have 17 years of Information Technology experience in automotive, manufacturing, Tier 1 automotive suppliers, utility, electrical, electronics and health care industries. I have five kids in the family all were born here in the United States of America. Being a law biding citizen and a decent person I have never been involved in any kind of indulge activities. I have been living in the U.S. for almost 18 years. Before September 2001 I did not have any problem traveling overseas. Since then, I have always been delayed entry into U.S. at port of entry. I have repeatedly referred to additional screening. Every time I am on my way back home from overseas I have to go through secondary scrutiny. I get separated from other passengers going through immigration process line. Homeland security officer conduct a background check which takes a while and this cause missing connecting flight as well as impact on family and kids stress. The following incident occurred while visited Pakistan to see family relatives mother, brother and sisters in 2004. I went to this extra security check which caused 3 hours delay. The 2nd incident was in 2008 when I was coming back from Pakistan with my two little kids tired of a long flight. The 3rd incident happened on 2009 when I visited Pakistan to see my mother as she was very sick and passed away. The 4th incident happened last year September 2010 when I was coming with all my family members including 5 kids I was pulled and separated from my family for secondary screening when clearing US immigration and custom which I feel my civil rights have been violated because it was kind of insult and abuse to the family and kids waiting for me with tension and stress as coming from lengthy traveling. I am sure with DHS help with full dignity and enthusiasm I can prevent the evil interfering into my transparent personality. I would like to file an inquiry to seek resolution regarding difficulties that I am experiencing during my travel screening at airport. Please correct inaccuracies in government records of my personal information which make my travel difficult. I seek help from DHS TRIP to resolve inconveniences resulting from name similarities. I however could not meet that flight as I was slightly indisposed and needed to get a grip on myself as that was my very first flight outside West Africa. I eventually re booked the flight on 12th so as to obtain copies of the program and also spend the rest of the ten days as vacation I have since been made to see my error in that. This is because I have professional and personal interest in cancer work in a cancer centre as a doctor and a research officer and I am at risk of breast cancer. I arrived in New York and was checked in by the immigration officer. I had a little trouble finding my luggage. I eventually found it and was on my way out when I was stopped by an officer who asked to check my luggage. I obliged him. He found my clothes and medication and then proceeded to puncture my box. He then led me to a place where I was searched further and thereafter taken to another group of officers. I was asked questions that I answered calmly. I was then given some forms to fill amongst which was an FBI form. This made me uncomfortable and a bit jittery as I wondered what I had done to involve the FBI. I asked and was told the forms were a viable alternative to the DHS forms which were said not to be available. This did not sit well with me and I declined. I sense I was being viewed as uncooperative after that and my interrogation took a downward trend. My government Identity card which proved I served my one year internship training as a doctor was considered not tenable had told the officers I had finished my training and now work in a cancer centre. I was also treated like I had drugs of abuse on me. I asked for the confirmatory tests that would prove or dispel this and was told it was not necessary. The officers took a statement from me, after which I was given a choice. To withdraw my application or face being barred for a minimum of five years. I chose what seemed to be the better option. I was then told I would be taken to a 'relaxation centre'. This turned out to be a correctional centre where I was detained and treated like a prisoner as I had to change my clothes into prison wears. My single entry visa was cancelled. I did not see a need for this as the visa was already used and could not be used anymore. Third time was on August 18, 2010. The first time I was here there were no problems at the US airport or with any of the connecting flights at the other airports. Both the second and third time there were problems, but only with the US Customs and Immigration police. There was no problems with any of the connecting flights at the other airports. There was never any problems leaving the US, only when returning the last two times. Before I came to the US the first time on May 13, 2009 I was married to (b)(6) who was in the Saudi Arabia army. (b)(6) two daughters and I came to the US to study at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County UMBC. Since (b)(6) had been in the Saudi Arabia army I was issued a Special passport and I got my US Visa with a F1 status to study at UMBC. (b)(6) my first husband was a terrible man. I stayed here in the US for just two months just long enough to finish and pass my beginning classes at UMBC. Then I left the US to go back home to Saudi Arabia so I could file for a divorce with (b)(6) Six months latter I was divorced from him. Without knowing (b)(6) had my Special passport canceled. I was not told and therefore did not know that my passport had been canceled. I was going to travel by plane to visit Dubia in the United Arab Emirates with my family from the Riyadh airport in Saudi Arabia. But as I was about to board the plane I had to show my passport at the Riyadh airport. I was told that my passport had been canceled and I could not go with my family to Dubia. So after that I got a new passport but the Visa was affixed to my first Special Passport which had been canceled but not my Visa. I still wanted to study and graduate from UMBC. I went to the US Embassy in Saudi Arabia and explain to them what had happen and they said it would be ok to use my new passport and to use the still valid Visa that is affixed to my first Special Passport that had been canceled. Since my Visa is still valid and in good order I had only needed to get a new Passport, which I did. So I came back to the US to continue my studies at UMBC and this is where the problems began. When I flew from the Riyadh airport in Saudi Arabia I showed them my new passport and my Visa that is affixed to my canceled Special Passport. There where no problems there at that airport nor was there any problems with the connecting flight at the airport in Frankfurt Germany. But when I arrived at Washington D.C. airport I was detained, separated from my new husband and put through all of questions for a very long time; which was more like being interrogated. I was taken and detained and placed in a small room that had no windows but had two cameras; it did have a toilet and a small thin mat on the floor. It was a day of detention with no one to help me. I could not speak with my husband nor could he be with me. My husband was told that my status with UMBC had been closed and for my husband to give them money to buy a ticket for me to be deported back Saudi Arabia. My husband had to find a nearby hotel to sleep that night. It was a very terrible, humiliating, and a very scary and a most emotionally stressful experience for me to be put through such an ordeal as that and without any explanations ever given to me. I had never felt so alone and scared or ever treated like that in all of my life. It was unjustified; it was very bad; and it was just plain wrong. My husband on the next day went to UMBC and they issued a new I20 and they had confirmed that I was going to school there and every thing was now in order and I was then free to go. My husband and I went back to Saudi Arabia to visit my family during semester break. But it all happen again when we flew back to the US to begin the fall semester at UMBC. There were no problems at the other airports just as it was before until we landed at BWI airport and it all happen again except at that this time I was then five months pregnant. They said the I20 and Visa did not match. They ask why I was here and I told them I was going to school at UMBC and they called me a liar. This went on for several hours until they finely figured it out and they wrote the new I20 onto my Visa and said I was free to go. I would like to get this matter resolved and to receive a detailed explanation about these situations and to make sure that it will not happen again. We design and make systems to help companies who assemble products by hand, and our customers are all over the world. They include large US customers like Hewlett Packard, Apple, and Intel. These days the main reason for my business trips to the USA is to support our US joint venture partner, Vision Engineering Inc, of Danbury, CT. I have no complaints about my treatment, as the DHS guys are usually very courteous. But the process is a waste of DHS resource, and a waste of my time. Every time I am asked if I had overstayed back then. I HAVE NEVER OVERSTAYED ON ANY VISIT TO THE USA, OR COMMITTED ANY OFFENCE. When this problem started, I was on holiday with my wife and 2 boys in Toronto, where my father grew up. We spent a last night at Niagara Falls, and then had to drive back to Newark NY for our flight home to London. We underestimated how long this would take, and we were very late arriving at Newark. I dropped off my wife and 2 boys so they could check in, and went to drop off the hire car. When I got to check in, my wife had primed airport officials, who shouted at me to run straight to the gate. I got to the waiting aircraft; the door was shut, and immediately left for London. The customs officer asked if I had ever been denied entry to the US. I indicated that I had been denied entry in February 2010 when my application for a Management Consultant TN Visa was denied. We were then sent inside for secondary screening. I explained the circumstances of the refusal related to the Visa application, and the officer suggested that given the frequency of my business trips to the US I should file a DHS TRIP inquiry to expedite future travel. In February 2009 I was doing consulting work from my home in Canada for a US based consulting firm called Parsa Wireless Communications. They provide patent analysis services to companies involved in intellectual property licensing and litigation. They hired me in a consulting capacity because they were looking to expand their consulting business by adding semiconductor and electronics reverse engineering services to their offerings. Reverse Engineering is commonly used by patent attorneys to prove infringement of technology patents. Prior to accepting the consulting contract from Parsa Wireless I had been employed by a Canadian company based in Ottawa called Chipworks, one of 2 Canadian companies considered the world leaders in reverse engineering for intellectual property support. The consulting work that I completed for Parsa consisted of providing an overview of the semiconductor reverse engineering market, including an assessment of the competitive landscape, and making recommendations for a business strategy that would enable them to compete in this market as a new entrant. My suggestion was that they hire engineering consultants to complete the intellectual property patent analysis on an as-needed basis, using test and measurement results provided by external laboratories. After completing this market analysis I was asked to identify external laboratories that could provide testing, measurement and analysis services. I identified Evans Analytics in North Carolina and another facility called Silicon Investigations in Wisconsin as the best sources of reverse engineering device testing and semiconductor circuit and process analysis, and suggested they engage the services of these two companies when they had a project requiring that type of analysis. I was then asked to identify prospective customers, and put together a business plan for rolling out these new services to them. I completed these tasks from my home in Canada, and on Sunday February 21, 2010 I was driving down to the Parsa office in Connecticut to discuss the next steps. I was informed by US customs agents at Alexandria Bay New York that I would need to apply for a TN Visa as a Management Consultant if I was going to do any work for Parsa in the US, and they suggested that I apply for the TN at the border when I had the proper paperwork. I returned to Canada, and put together the documentation required to apply for the TN Visa resume with work history, academic transcripts, letter from Parsa Wireless Communications but when I submitted the application the following week I was informed that the role as defined by Parsa would not qualify for TN status because there would be a sales component in the future. This conversation took place at the US customs and border facility in Massena New York. I was advised at that time that we could alter the application and reapply, but if that application was denied I risked being prohibited from entry to the US for a five year period. At this point I informed Parsa Wireless that I would not be able to do any work for them in the US, and my consulting contract was changed so that I would be their representative in Canada, Asia and Europe, with no involvement in US operations. I continued working for Parsa from my home in Richmond Ontario in this capacity until June of 2010. In late May of 2010 I was offered full time employment as a local sales representative for the Ottawa region by Newark Electronics. I traveled to the US for training purposes twice while I was employed by Newark and was sent for secondary screening both times. I traveled from Ottawa to Cleveland Ohio the last week of May, 2010, and was sent for secondary screening when I went through US customs in Toronto at Pearson International Airport. I was informed that this was because I had been flagged as a result of the denied TN Visa application, and I could expect to receive secondary screening for the foreseeable future. I traveled from Ottawa to Denver Colorado in September of 2010, and was again sent for secondary screening at US customs at Pearson in Toronto. In September of 2011 I began a new job as Director of Business Development for Aurora Wireless, a technology company based in Ottawa Ontario. We are a Canadian company, with no US operations. My application for J1 visa was rejected and by the time I received the letter from the immigration office I had already started attending high school. Now I understand better why this will be a cause for a concern, however back then the decision was made and I stayed to finish what I started. Not to say that I did not have mind of my own but it was more of a decision that was made and I just followed. I was barely fourteen years old. I did graduate Orchard Lake St. Marys Preparatory in Michigan. Its a private school and I stayed at the school dormitory on weekdays and went to stay the weekends with my uncles family in Novi, Michigan. As I grew older it became clearer to me that it wasnt right to stay on without proper visa status. I had received acceptance notices from few universities however I left the U.S. right after high school graduation and moved to Canada in 1996. This time I had made sure all the visas and paperwork was in place. After graduating from Brock University, my whole family immigrated into Canada in 2000 and I became a Canadian citizen in 2004. I currently reside in Richmond Hill, Ontario, Canada with my wife, a local real estate agent, and two daughters, aged 4 years and 3 months. I am working at Samsung Electronics Canada as a (b)(6) and have been in the Consumer Electronics industry for the past 12 years. Both in U.S. and in Canada, my background clearances will show that I have a clean record and never got in trouble with law. I regret not having proper status in place while attending high school even if it was in the name of pursuing quality education, this is an incident that is out of my character and which will not even be an option if I were to be in any situation remotely close. I get questioned and treated horribly every time I cross the border, but the worst treatment was on January 30, 2012. Furthermore, my children grew up in America and love America but every time my kids and I get detained for no reason they start to question me and ask, Dad, why do we always get detained? After that my visits to the USA were normal until I entered through SEA on January 23rd 2012. The secondary inspections had started again! I do not know why this has started again. The officers in LAX assured me that my record was now OK. I am now 68 years old and my wife and I plan on making frequent trips to our camper that we keep in Tucson, AZ. I first came to the United States as a F1 student old passport number (b)(6) F1 visa control number: (b)(6) for my Ph.D. study in Natural Resources and Wood Science at Michigan State University in East Lansing, MI. East Lansing is a beautiful university town, very safe and sound. Students often leave their own stuff inside their cars and dont need to worry about any safety issues. In addition, every parking building has several security cameras installed. So after 4 years of oncampus living, I totally lost my awareness of personal safety, and believed all modern Western countries were as safe as the United States. My ignorance directly resulted in an irreversible travel disaster which had turned a pleasant family vacation into an unforgettable nightmare. I, my husband and my parents became victims of a violent car robbery when we traveled to Toronto, Canada in Aug. 2004. My parents father: (b)(6) DOB: (b)(6) mother: (b)(6) DOB: (b)(6) came to visit me and my husband (b)(6) DOB: (b)(6) in the summer of 2004. Considering that we would come back very soon, I only took my small purse with me, and left the important file folder inside the car. When we came back, we were totally stunned by the scene in front of us. The rear passenger window of our car was smashed, and doors and the back trunk were opened. My laptop computer, my husband cell phone, and most unfortunately, the leather file folder which contained all of our passports as well as other visa application documents were taken by the car robbers. We reported this car theft to the local police department, and hope they could help us to get our passports back soon so that we could return to the U.S. first. But they found that there wasnt any security camera installed in that parking building. All of us were so upset and devastated, and we stopped the vacation, and headed back to Detroit. The CBP officers at Detroit border told us our drivers licenses were not enough for the reentry, especially for my parents situation they didnt have US drivers license, and we had to go to the U.S. Consulate General in Toronto to get new visa. We first visited the China Consulate General in Toronto, and received Travel Permit which was like a temporary or emergency passport. Then, my husband a Ph.D. student at Central Michigan University at that time and I called the International Centers of Graduate School at CMU and MSU, and explained our situation. The schools issued us the replacement I20s and sent them to our hotel in Toronto by FedEx. The U.S. Consulate General in Toronto issued each of us a new visa on our Travel Permit on August 12, 2004. Then we had our car window fixed and returned to the U.S. on August 14, 2004. After we came back to the U.S., following the passport replacement policy of China, my husband and I announced our stolen passports (b)(6) invalid in a local Chinese newspaper. We obtained replacement passports on Oct. 14 2004 from the China Consulate General in Chicago. Passport numbers are (b)(6) for (b)(6) and (b)(6) for my husband. Dear Homeland Security, On Tuesday Feb. 21, 2012, I (b)(6) my aunt (b)(6) and her husband (b)(6) tried to enter the USA to go to Los Angeles to attend my uncle (b)(6) son's wedding. I was initially allowed to enter the USA and after crossing the preclearance area, I waited for them, they were taken inside by the officer for questioning, after waiting about 20 minutes an officer came and said if I was their relative and I said yes, he told me to come with them, that was around 7:10 pm, our flight was at 7:55 pm. They started questioning (b)(6) and of course we missed our flight, they then questioned my aunt and then me for a bit. We stayed there for approximately 5 to 6 hours when we where finally released. The officer told (b)(6) and (b)(6) that they were denied entry and were advised to visit the US consulate and apply for a visa in order to be eligible to reenter the US. They said I had no problem and that I can travel tomorrow if I wanted to, I came in the next morning to travel, checked in and I was told I was denied yesterday to enter and I am also being denied today to enter as well, I told them the officer yesterday said, but they told me it appears to them that I was denied access last night as well and I will also have to visit the consulate for a visa to enter the US and ask for an SAC Security Advisory Concern for all three of us. The next day we went to the consulate and they said that they do not issue Canadains visas, that we dont require one to enter the US, and that the consulate doesn't deal with Canadains, to go back to the CBP, and to email us about the issue and if we have any concerns about the issue. We went back to the CBP in Toronto airport and talked with a CBP supervisor and he said that we need to submit a DHS TRIP to the Homeland Security through their website and we are currently doing that and that is the main reason as to why we are writing to you this letter, we still currently are unaware of the reasons that lead to us to be denied entry to the US. On the Application for Admission Withdrawal it says, We were not admissable to enter the US pursuant to section 212 a 7 A I of the INA. We were advised that we must visit the US consulate and apply for a visa in order to be eligible for reentry into the US. This paper was issued and given to both (b)(6) and (b)(6) for some reason I (b)(6) was told verbally by the officer to go to the consulate to get a visa and I did not sign any paper and was not given any paper of any sort. I hope we get a reply soon, and an explanation outlining what procedures that are needed to be completed by us in order for us to be able to reenter the US, as the US consulate said that our case or file needs to be closed in order for us to go to the US, although we will of course be missing the wedding that is scheduled this saturday in Los Angeles. I have already sent this email to the US consulate in Toronto and have sent a similar email in a form of a complaint to the Custom and Border Protection on their website. In 2008, I travelled to Israel to visit a friend. Upon my return to the airport to come home, I was detained before even entering the airport proper. I was surrounded by soldiers with machine guns, placed in a holding cell while my luggage was searched, and my friend was questioned. In the airport, my luggage was searched again, as was other passengers, and I was escorted by a soldier to another detention cell where my carryon, wallet and all electronic devices were taken from me to be searched, I was also searched yet again. Finally, I was escorted to another counter where my pasport was taken, and I was again asked 100 questions about why I visited, who was who did I visit, names addresses etc... the lady made a phone call I do not speak Hebrew, and typed for a good 5 minutes in the computer. I noticed that this was not the case at the counters around me. People surrender their passports, asked a question or two, got a stamp and left. About 3 minutes total... I asked the lady what was the problem, and she said, No problem, but I am not able to return to Israel. I did not break any laws, I did not disturb anyone or anything. I do feel as though the landlord of the apartment I rented at the time filed a complaint, and notified authorities upon arrival at the airport. No idea why. I was treated very inhumanely at the airport, I know that security is very tight at Ben Gurion, however, I was treated like a dog.

As disgusted as I was with this experience, people told me There is nothing I can do about it. I never filed a complaint, I didn't know that I could. However, now every time I travel internationally, I have difficulty getting back into the states. I am constantly pulled when my passport is ran, searched, asked questions etc...even when returning from a cruise, which is very unusual. Now, the last time I travelled, I was stopped BEFORE boarding the plane. Their were two officers waiting for me, search my carry on, tested my bottle of water, they even called me by name, and I did not notice that this happened to other passengers. I would like to know if my passport is red flagged, if I am on a watch list, and why, and also what the Israeli government has on my record. I would appreciate a referral as to what type of attorney I need to see, I am clueless, or what steps I need to take to amend this issue. Thank you for your assistance.

(b)(6)	<p>I was actually detained while trying to surrender my I95 / get an exit stamp from the US as I had spent 88 days in the US. I also wanted to inquire about what I would need to do, where I would need to go in order to transit overland to Canada from Mexico, NOT to reenter the United States. It is at this point that the CBP officials decided that I intended to stay in the US as an immigrant. While I did have ambitions to spend more time exploring the US, I had no intension to staying there permanently and had secured employment in Toronto, Canada. It was at this point I was told that my vehicle was going to be impounded when they find that it was stolen. It was not stolen. I was then informed that my vehicle was going to be impounded for the crimes I had committed. I have no criminal record in any country. I was then repeatedly asked how I was funding my travel. My answer was that I had been living on my savings, and living for the majority of my travels camping. On being asked why I owned a vehicle registered in the US, I answered that it is cheaper than renting a hire car. Renting a hire car is inexpensive. Insuring a hire car for a foreign national with no car insurance is expensive. Cheaper to buy a car, insure it, drive it and then sell it when you are finished. I was also informed that the officers here would be more than happy to answer my questions but failing to do so, when I did ask any questions. After going through the personal and correspondence details on my phone, for some arbitrary reason the officers concluded that I did intend to be an immigrant in the US and ordered my detention. I then spend 2 nights sleeping on the floor of a 10 x 12 foot cell with a one point 16 other people. I was then interviewed twice again just a carbon copy repeat of the previous evenings conversations and at 4am I was asked to sign a declaration that I had all of my personal effects from my vehicle. I managed to get the officer to recover my backpack and my laptop. My expensive parachute and camera equipment, may or may not be in a tow yard in San Diego, as for some reason retrieving these items would be impossible. From here I was then taken to another facility where I spent another night, before being taken to CCA San Diego Correctional Facility. Here after 4 days was my first opportunity to make a 3 minute phone call, provided that you knew the number. Once I was processed and placed in a Cell, I then set about trying to resolve my situation. On attempting to contact my embassy, the 2 numbers provided did not work or were for the Singapore consular. I then decided to contact my parents, they then contacted to consular officials on my behalf. I then made a request to the manager of the wing for the contact details of the British Consular. She said that I should ask an ICE officer. I contacted the few friends I had made on my journey around the US so that they could help me recover my truck, or at least recover my possessions from it, with no success. On being interviewed by an ICE officer I was informed that I had to sign the papers presented to me stating that I was to be deported, or I would face months in prison. I was also told that I ineligible for a bail hearing or voluntary departure. On a subsequent visit to the law library I discovered that this was not entirely true. I was eligible for a Casas Bond or Custody Redetermination Hearing. I also subsequently learned that I had the right to see a judge and ask that I voluntarily remove myself from the US. So after 20 days in prison I was taken to San Diego airport, deported minus the majority of my belongings and band from the US for a period of 5 years. Thus becoming possibly the first person to be deported from the United States for being an illegal immigrant, while trying to leave. The Immigration officer told me I must have some enemies as there were several comments in my file that could not be true since I was a member of Global Entry. During the Secondary check a lime was found in my bag. The officer also reviewed my laptop and cell phone for some reason but nothing was found. I was detained close to 3 hours. I was also forced to pay a \$500 fine. In addition my membership in your Global Entry program was revoked. Since then I have entered the US some 6 times and always have been subjected to secondary screening and twice in Miami been detained for an excessive amount of time. Also the agents in Miami hand searched my belongings and never was anything illegal found. I checked on the USDA website to see what items from Guatemala are allowed in the US. I was shocked to find limes are permitted. The origal arresting officer wrote I was carrying a sweet lime which I have never seen in person or actually heard of. The lime I was carrying was medium sized and green, not yellow and large like a sweet lime. I returned from Guatemala on Feb. 26, 2012 carrying the same type of limes and declared them. I have many pictures of my friends who are body builders and there was no frontal nudity. Can US Customs show me the pictures he was refering to? In February 2009 me and my commoninlaw partner Claudia Fabiana Scholl left Brazil and we immigrated to Canada, Montreal. Since then we live and work here as Permanent Residents. A few months after our arrival in Canada, we decided to rent a car for the first time to go from Montreal to Niagara Falls Canadian side. I was not very used with the roads in that time, so I was following the GPS device. At certain point on the road the GPS pointed me to take an exit where there was a clear sign if I remember saying BRIDGE TO USA or EXIT TO USA. Since I was following the GPS and I didnt know I was so close to the border, I took the indicated exit because I thought I was going to drive parallel to the border. For my surprise 1 minute later I ended up in a line of cars to cross to USA and I could not see any way to return. When I was approached by a US officer, I explained the situation, I told him we were not carrying our passports because we were not planning to cross any border and that we would like to go back to take the road to Niagara. The US officer explained us that it was not possible to drive backwards or simply do an Uturn. He told us that there was no problem with what happen, they have many of these GPS cases everyday and asked us to enter US to simply fill a document just to register the incident but he told us this would never appear in our records and it was just an internal control for them. We did not have our passports with us, but we filled a form and our fingerprints were collected. Everything was very simple and fast as he told us. Until this incident in May/2009 we had never had any problem to enter US, I entered 3 times 1996/Atlanta/Orlando, 1999/Miami, 2007/New York, but since that incident everytime I try to enter US I am sent to an interview with an US Border Officer, I am asked the same questions about the incident above but at the end I am allowed to enter US. Last time happened in 2011, I was going to Orlando/Disney again with my commoninlaw partner and we almost missed the flight because we had to wait 90 minutes to be interviewed. Now, everytime we think about going to US on vacation or holiday, I am a little bit concerned about the possibility of being rejected or missing the flight/hotel reservations due to delays in the interview. I was detained more than four hours each time and both time I missed my flight and I had to stay overnight in New York City and go to different airport to get flight next day to come home. I went through same mortifying process both times, but I will describe little more detail the most recent one on 03/29/2012. March 29, 2012 my travel has started in CHM Columbus, Ohio to visit my family in Cairo Egypt. I went through tree different types of security checks from individual questioner, metaldetector, to stripsearch. I was in transit through JFK New York and I went through same security process all over again in a lot more sadistic way. The real nightmare started on my way back home from Cairo Airport where they took my Passport and started making many calls. After couple of hours in the dark of what was going on finally they gave me back my passport and inform they had to get security clearance for my passport so I can travel to United State. Again I was in transit through Istanbul Turkey and went through the same or even more demeaning security process, but this time it took a lot longer to the point where I had to miss my flight back home and stay one night in Istanbul Turkey. Both the Egyptian and Turkish airport security officials have informed they have to do that because of what is on my passport, travel, or security record in the United States. After those two rough experiences and ten hours flight from Istanbul to New York the biggest surprise and main issue of my complain was waiting me in JFK airport New York. For some reasons that I dont know yet there ware around 400 people on the plane both American citizens and foreigners, but I was the only one who was escorted and detained by fully armed officers to my dismay. Two armed CBP officers have escorted from the gate of the plane to the CBP detention area and confiscated everything I was carrying except the two pieces of clothes that I was wearing. Compare to those security officers I have seen in both in Cairo and Istanbul airport CBP officers ware more professional and help full when it comes to communicating what was going on process. After confiscating everything I was carrying they searched all my bags and copied all the papers and documents I had with me like Passport, Passport card, Driver license, Credit Cards, and many other papers and documents. They also seize my laptop and smart phone and took to outside facility of where I was detained and called back after three hours in detention asking me the passwords. It cost me time and money, but most importantly, great embarrassment with my client director of an engineering company who was traveling with me. Can you give me any information that I should be aware of to prevent this from happening again, or at least understand what the situation is? My biggest concern is potential loss of a valuable client and damage to my professional reputation because of being detained by customs security. I had participated as phosphate consultant for a major engineering & construction company at the Phosphates 2012 convention in Morocco. Upon arrival at JFK from Casablanca on RAM200 around 5 PM March 23, I was escorted to Customs Security. They had me bring my small carryon bag with me, but demanded I leave my briefcase outside their facility. I was concerned that my briefcase was unattended without security for an hour or two exposing it to potential theft or mischief. I was not allowed to get my checked bag, so it was also exposed to potential theft or mischief. They had to check with FBI to figure out what to do with me. That took a very long time. Eventually they brought in my checked bag, searched all my bags, viewed photos in my camera, and scrutinized my laptop. When they eventually released me it was too late to make my 7:50 PM flight AA1787 to Tampa. They offered to pay only for flight rebooking fees, but not for overnight costs, flights on any other airline, or my lost time. I spent the night in New York and flew to Tampa the next day. I had been scheduled to arrive in Tampa that evening, but was delayed until the following afternoon. The delay at JFK had cost me over \$1,000 for 14 hours of lost time and expenses in addition to the awkward situation with my client. I had lesser encounters with Customs on arrival from my two previous foreign flights. Upon arriving in Orlando after visiting a clients phosphate fertilizer plant in India on LH464 from FRA arriving MCO 6:20 PM Dec. 22, 2010 the agent scrutinized my luggage extremely thoroughly. He even opened cosmetic bottles and viewed all photos in my camera. He said he would recommend to authorities up the line that I be removed from the list of people to detain. Last November I had made a speech and chaired a session at an international fertilizer convention in Jordan. Upon arrival in Chicago on RJ263, arriving 4:15 PM Nov. 25 from Amman, the agent questioned me and seemed to be very satisfied and even apologetic. After checking my luggage, he sent me on my way. I dont understand why I get searched for contraband when I have never even been accused of such? What law or ruling causes me to be detained? Do you know of any way to stop this problem? Its causing me a lot of grief and potentially loss of valuable clients who need my consulting services and damage to my career. I can honestly say that I am a good person and not a danger to anyone. Its wasting valuable time for Customs agents who need to spend their time keeping everyone safe. It is my pleasure as well as my business to help the phosphate industry nourish crops to feed everyone and prevent massive starvation. Around 7pm, we arrived at Ogdensburg/Prescott US/Canada border and my wife was driving the van. We were stopped and asked normal procedure questions. We were asked to sit with one seat apart and after that I was asked to step ahead and was performed a body search by one of the officers. After the body search, I was asked to leave my belongings including but not limited to cellphones, watch, keys, belt without given any information. I was separated and detained in a locked room. I was denied to any access to any communication even to my wife. When I was inside the room, at different times, different officers came over and questioned me several times about my previous US visits, whether if I have different names, finger printing, filling forms, etc. At the same time, my wife and friends were questioned regarding myself. Several hours later, around 2:30am, the supervisor apologized for the delay and asked me to follow him to an office. In the office, they were two officers dressed in civilian clothes. One of them introduced himself and asked me to sit. The supervisor asked me several questions: purpose of the current and previous visit, places of visit and destinations and how long we will be staying in the USA, my profession. The officer dressed in civilian clothes asked me whether I have another name and have been to US recently. And to both questions, my answer was No. About 15 minutes later, the supervisor asked the agent if he has any other questions and his response was, everything check out and he has no further questions. The agent said to me that I should understand that this is a normal procedure and apologized for the delay. The supervisor asked me to go back to the other room and waited there for a couple of minutes. Few minutes later, around 3am, the supervisor came back, apologized for the whole delay and slow response and asked me to join my wife and friends. While waiting, another officer took picture and finger printing of my wife and my friend and his family which from what I understood is a normal process to enter to USA. Around 4:30am, the supervisor came and talked to my wife and friend and gave their passports and told them that their entries to USA were denied and their B1/B2 visa was cancelled under section 221i. In late 2007 I had recently joined National Interlock Service Canada. After my employment probation period, I was set to receive additional training for Interlock Installation and Monitoring for the DUI Programs in Maryland. Due to the higher priced airline tickets in Toronto, I was asked if I could fly out of Buffalo for a lower cost; I agreed to this. While crossing the border I explained to the border patrol officer that I will be traveling to Millersville Maryland for training. The Patrol Officer proceeded to ask me about my occupation and I advised him at the time I was employed in computer tech support. Upon mentioning my occupation, the patrol officer had asked if I had documentation relating to my occupation; I did not. I questioned the patrol officer why I needed this documentation and was simply told I needed it; I believe at this point there may have been a misunderstanding that I was going to Millersville Maryland to train, instead of receiving training from the Millersville location. At the conclusion of this conversation, the Patrol Officer sent me to secondary inspection. I explained to the Patrol Officer that I am traveling to Millersville Maryland for training. I explained that I work for National Interlock Service Canada and was simply traveling to Millersville to be trained on the installation and monitoring of interlock devices for clients on the DUI program. When speaking to the second Patrol Officer, he constantly asked me if I was going to Millersville to work and if I would be receiving any monetary compensation for traveling to Millersville; my answer was no. At this point I felt as if the first Patrol Officer had indicated to the second patrol officer that I was going to Millersville to train instead of being trained. The second Patrol Officer advised me for him to allow me to go through the border check I would need to provide documentation of my employment with National Interlock Service Canada through a recent pay stub or my most recent T1 Canadian Tax Form. Unfortunately I do not carry this information with me at all times and thus was unable to provide this information. I had asked the second Patrol Officer if I could have a family member fax this information to the office since I was 2 hours away from home and my flight was leaving shortly; I was told that it would not be acceptable. The second Patrol Officer reviewed my statement and all relevant information to this case and was advised without the pay stubs, T1 Canadian Tax Form, or some form of Canadian Employment Record physically on hand, that I would be denied entry. During the conclusion of my conversation with the second Patrol Officer, I asked if this would hinder me from entering the United States of America again and I was advised it would not but to be safe to always bring my most recent pay stubs and/or T1 Canadian Tax Form to have proof of employment in Canada. The patrol officer was very courteous and respectful during this misunderstanding. Since this incident I have never been denied entry into the United States of America. Unfortunately I am constantly subject to secondary inspection. In addition to my pay stubs and T1 Canadian Tax form I am subject to bringing a letter from Cors & Bassett Attorney at Law Inc indicating my Canadian Employment and clearly stating I am not receiving any payment from any entity in the United States of America. Going through secondary inspection has caused me to miss one flight; I would like this to not happen again under these circumstances if possible. Based on my conversation with various Border Patrol Officers I have met through secondary inspection, most feel that I do not need to enter secondary inspection, but have always been told that I should expect this forever due to a flag in my record. I once had an experience when entering the Buffalo border inspection, I was asked to exit my car with my hands raised. I noticed a Border Patrol Officer approach me with a weapon drawn and immediately felt embarrassed, threatened, and scared. After being in secondary inspection for 12 hours I was allowed to carry on with my travels; I would like this experience to never happen again as well. Finally during my last visit to the United States of America in April 2012, the initial Border Patrol Officer and the Border Patrol Officer in secondary inspection explained to me that I should apply for a Redress through DHS Trip on CBP.Gov. I would like to travel to the United States of America without constantly having to go through secondary inspection once again, thank You.

This has been the ordeal since 2007 on my trip back from India if I recall correctly. Now my entire family including my new wed wife is escorted off the air plane every time we come back from overseas and have SSSS printed on the boarding passes. We have to endure pat downs even though we are asked to walk through a fullbody scanner. We all feel very humiliated and makes our travel very burdensome. My family and I have nothing to hide. We are law abiding US citizens. I understand the need of security and the possibility of mix up in names. I appreciate your assistance in this regard. Please let me now how I can be of assistance in clearing our name. I was greeted by 2 agents at the door of the plane on arrival and escorted till baggage claim. I was questioned for 25 minutes while my bags were searched upon which I was released.

I totally understand that in the climate we live in, there needs to be extra security at our country's boarders. However, I have been vetted by HS officers for hours already and there is obviously nothing in my record that I know of that would suggest I have ever intended harm to my country or to my fellow citizens. Once after a lengthy interview, the officers interviewing me confessed that America needed more Muslim leaders and imams like myself. However, they they took my cellphone right after and downloaded all my contacts and messages. I really felt very hurt at how I was being treated. Most recently, the my keys sounded off an explosive alarm. After much unrest and missing my flight, they realized that it was residue from my lotion that caused the alarm. Travelling by air and especially international now causes me much anxiety and worry. So I would like someone to review my file and let me know if there is any area of concern that I can address.

However, the agent searching my bags and laptop said that I face a lifetime of secondary searches because of this offense. While I was alone this time, I do not wish to go through a U.S. airport in the future with my wife and be subjected to the same line of questions. It will upset her. Is there anything that can be done in the future?

I was detained in a room for 2 hours at Houston, with no explanation why. I eventually had passport stamped and told it was something to do with my fingerprints. I had a similar experience at San Francisco airport on October 28th 2006, with no explanation what the problem was with my fingerprint scans. I had no intervening trips to the US between 2006 and this year, so the past two visits resulted in a secondary inspection caused by an issue with fingerprint scans. I think important to state that an earlier visit to the US to Washington DC May 31st 2005 was the first time I provided a fingerprint scan, and there were no issues. However, could it be I inadvertently presented wrong finger not index? to the device, and that's why there was subsequent mismatch for my next visits in 2006 and 2012? Since the Houston visit April/May 2012 resulted in ALL my fingers being scanned, is it not possible for all previous scans to be correlated and proven to come from one person i.e. me?

I would be very grateful for this issue to be resolved as I am expected to travel more frequently to the US with my company British telecom in coming months. There is obviously a problem with how my fingerprints have been scanned in the past, and the fact that I was ultimately admitted into US on both occasions would suggest no fundamental problem with me travelling. But being detained for 2hours in a small room after 1012hour flight while work colleagues are waiting for me in departure lounge, is not a great start to a business trip to the US.

Good morning. My name is (b)(6) I am a US licensed physician with a current DEA license. During the past 12 years I have been traveling back and forth to the needy, impoverished nation of Niger in West Africa, to help at Galmi Hospital, a large Christian charity hospital run by SIM Serving in Mission. Most recently my family and I have been serving at this mission hospital in Niger from August 2011 until our return to Seattle on June 14, 2012. When we left the country in August 2011, we brought with us some medications that were needed by the hospital. Among these medications was one controlled substance, specifically, hydrocodone/APAP. We applied for and obtained official DEA authorization to export 3000 tablets of this medication to this hospital in Niger. We also applied for and obtained official permission from the government of Niger to import this medication. The medication has been dispensed under the control of a licensed pharmacist for patients with severe pain. Upon our return to the US through the port of Seattle on June 14, 2012, our bags were searched in SeaTac customs and no concerns were expressed by US Customs agents. I assume this search was to ensure we did not return with any of the hydrocodone, which was one of the conditions which we agreed to at the time of the exportation. On June 20, 2012, we drove from Seattle to Vernon, British Columbia, to visit family. Upon our reentry into the US on June 26, 2012 at the Aldergrove Border Crossing, we were detained and our entire van was searched. In my opinion, the search at the SeaTac airport on 14 June 2012 was reasonable, as it was our first reentry into the country following our work in Niger. This search at SeaTac was quick, efficient, and respectful. I have no complaints about it. However, this second search and extended delay on 26 June 2012 at the Aldergrove Canadian border crossing seems excessive and unwarranted. All of the belongings of myself, my wife, and my three children were gone through resulting in a significant setback in our travel plans. I am writing to you to request an explanation of why there was a concern for us reentering the US on June 26th when no concern was expressed by border control agents on June 20th. What is the nature of this flag on my record? Is my family going to be subject to heightened scrutiny each time we reenter the United States from this time forth? If the concerns are related to our exportation of hydrocodone in August 2011, it should be known that this was done completely legally and openly with written approval of both US and Nigerian drug enforcement authorities. These medications were used legitimately for patient care in accordance with sound medical principles and under the direction of the licensed physicians and pharmacist at SIM Galmi Hospital. My son and I arrived at the airport approx 4:30am for our 6:15 flight to Chicago where we would transfer to a Scandinavian flight to Stockholm, final destination Oslo to visit family. We checked in, got our boarding passes, went through security and approached the customs officer who looked at our passports and directed us to a separate room for secondary inspection where officers questioned us and went through our cell phones, iPad and laptop and our luggage. The focus appeared to be on me. We were held up for 45 minutes and had to run to catch our flight. The plane had already boarded and we were the last passengers to board. This was a huge inconvenience and we missed the opportunity to visit the business lounge which my son had been looking forward to for weeks. This was the 3rd time in 7 months the I have been stopped, sent to secondary inspection. The first time I was stopped with my husband we were driving through the Peace Arch crossing on October 22, 2011 to attend a memorial in Bellingham of 2 close friends who were killed in the Reno Air Races disaster. We were held up for almost one hour at the border while customs officers asked questions and searched our car and cell phones. We missed most of the memorial. I was devastated. The 2nd time I was held up at the border was at the Sumas crossing was in December 2011. My sister (b)(6) who lives in Abbotsford, and I went across to do some grocery shopping. Again, we were held up for almost an hour while officers questioned us, searched my car and both of our cellphones. In 7 months I have been detained 3 times, every time I have entered the US. Obviously these were not random checks.

I would like to know the reason for these secondary inspections. I am concerned that my identity may have been stolen or that someone of the same name has committed a crime and I am being confused with that person. I would like to know what can be done to clear up this confusion. I enjoy traveling occasionally to the US with my husband and also like to go across with my sisters or friends to shop for groceries and get gas. Next weekend I was planning to join my sister in Lynden to camp with her family and in August my husband and I will be holidaying in Orville with friends. I am very concerned about having more problems at the border and would like to clear this up. Please let me know what my next step is.

I went to The Bahamas for a site visit and meetings regarding this project. I flew from Nassau to Miami and ave to change plane in Miami and go thru security to get to my gate. When I was in line a security officer was looking at me all the time until I got to do the screening. The way he was looking at me when I was in line makes me very nervous and very uncomfortable, it was a very intense look and to a point he was looking at me like mad, I was very nervous because I did not know why I was he was looking at me like that. After the screening I was pulled out for more questions. The officer call a female officer to check my carry on bag and my personal effects. The male officer was asking me questions of why I was in the US, mt purposes of my traveling. He was checking my passport, I just renew my passport it did not have any stamps until this trip. He ask me where I am from and I told them I was from Puerto Rico but I live in Tampa Florida area. He asked my name and I told him my name, (b)(6) Then he mention that he did not know how a middle eastern person has Latin name. I told him because I am not middle eastern I am Hispanic. While all this questioning was going on the female officer was going thru all personal effects including my wallet. The look thru my computer bag and my work related documents. She took every single paper, card, money from my wallet. She was telling him that everything is in order. The male officer continue with his questions he ask me what kind of work I do, where I study, if I am college graduate. All this time I answer the questions in a polite and calm way. I got a little aggravated and angry when he start asking how many times I travel to the middle eastern, I said never been in that area the farther place I had been it was Greece. He ask me if I have explosive training and I had the training when I was in the middle eastern. I told him I never had a explosive training and never been in the middle east. After all this questions I was a little upset and mad. He ask a couple of more questions but I was upset to a point that I told him to check my previous passport, I had a copy of my passport in my bag. I also had a copy of my Birth Certificate, I told him to confirm this to see that I was born in Puerto Rico and not in other place as he suggest. He told to take it easy since it was routine questioning and I told him that you are treating me as I did something bad and wrong, and you haven't found anything wrong with me and my personal effects. I ask him why all the questions to me and he reply that I look suspicious, I told him I was uncomfortable the way he was looking at me at the line, I had the feeling that something was wrong because on the way he was looking at me. At that point I open my laptop computer and I ask him if you don't believe what I was doing out of the country and what I do for living to turn my computer on. He said it is not necessary and I turn on the computer and show him that computer belongs to the construction company that I work and the emails in my computer are work related. The female office told him that she did not find anything and everything is fine. After that he told me everything is OK and thanks and I can leave. I also show him my original SS Card that I had with me and he told me it was OK not necessary to see it. I pack all my things and left.

After that incident I felt violated in the way the questioning it was going. I was stop before in screenings at the airport but it was the firsts time that I had a intense questioning like that. I was feeling more angry after the incident just thinking about it. It make me feel like I was accuse of been a terrorist because of the way that I look. I did not carry anything suspicious, just a laptop carry on bag and my cloth it was shorts tennis shoes and a polo shirt, nothing strange. I had incidents before that check my bags and ask a few questions but not like this. I had other incidents that I have been hold because need to check my name. I also hold flights because the need to do extra check in my personal bags and information. I had been hold at immigration to check my identity. I travel frequent because of my work and it make it a little difficult to be screen all the time because the way I look, sound or my name. Regards, (b)(6)

On the date mentioned above, I attempted to travel into the USA through the Queenstown Lewiston Bridge and was harassed by a customs officer for the duration of 3 hours. The customs officer did his routine checks of going through my car, cell phone, tablet and personal belongings, which I understand can be random and standard routine. However, the officer started accusing me of lying by stating "I'm full of fucking shit, why did I see information about rent checks and lease agreements on your blackberry?" I explained to the officer that I have a rental property and rent to students close to my place of employment, York University. I also mentioned the students who I rent to would commence the lease in May when the summer semester started. For one reason or another, The officer refused to believe me. He also accused me of having a one way ticket as he said "I saw a one way ticket on your blackberry, I'm full of shit". I explained, I always fly out of the Buffalo Niagara Airport as Pearson International Airport in Toronto is too expensive. I continued by asking him to allow me to go back to my car and show him that he was wrong and I do have a two way ticket. He did not allow me to do this and continued to interrogate me in an unprofessional manner by yelling and detaining me for approximately 3 hours. I repeatedly asked the officer for the reason I am being treated like a criminal, I also asked him for the reason I am being held for such a long duration of time if my records were squeaky clean and nothing was found in my car. He continued to yell at me by asking me the same questions over and over again periodically within the 3 hour span. I was later asked to have my fingerprinting electronically scanned along with my retina. He stated the reason for this "was to check the Homeland Security database if I have a criminal record or historical issues in the USA". I later researched the true reason and realized that was a lie! At the conclusion of this horrific experience the officer was well aware that he caused me to miss my flight, lose my hotel reservation and lose the rental car that I had booked. I did not have trip insurance and booked everything through various discount travel websites. While standing in the office in front of other people he asked me to take my jacket off and empty my pockets. I was humiliated, embarrassed and very uncomfortable with how I was treated. I was also revoked entry into the USA after the officer found an unpaid speeding ticket in my pocket close to the 3rd hour of being detained. I explained to the officer that the payment was mailed off and asked him to call for confirmation but he refused to do so and that gave the officer ammunition to refuse my entry into the USA for that day. I must say the other officers who I dealt with that day were professional and courteous and definitely did their job. On the 26th of April, I attempted to cross the border once again and was held for further inspection. As soon as I drove up to the customs officer, my passport was scanned and I was asked to get out of my car without any questions. To my surprise the same officer was inside and stated "remember me, I see your trying to cross yet again, you obviously don't learn, go have a seat you will be here for a while". This time around I was held only for an hour, however a different officer dealt with me and was very professional with me. Once my car was searched, he asked me a few more questions, asked me to fill out a declaration form, which I found strange for crossing the border via car and did not notice anyone else filling one out. I did overhear him saying to the problematic officer "I checked him out, he is fine and I have no reason to hold him longer". I was then released. I have crossed the border by air or ground on a number of occasions since April 4th, 2012 and each time I was pulled to the side and questioned as soon as my passport was scanned. This is obviously not "a random check" anymore, it seems as though whatever comments were made has put me on a watch list of some sort which guarantees I will be searched each time I enter the USA. I understand if I was a criminal of some sort, but to be treated like a criminal all because of the hard time I was given by one CBP officer is not fair.

I am seeking an explanation as to why I am discriminated against each time I cross into the USA, I would like to see what comments were made by the CBP officer on April 4th, 2012. I am confident that this officer made negative comments on my passport because one of the CBP officers asked me a question that lead me to believe that I was portrayed as some sort of a hot head who gave him a hard time. My passport will show that of all the times I have traveled and entered into any countryside have never had an issue with keeping calm and being professional. I have been a manager at York University for 8 years where I have managed 65 employees daily and I'm sure my employer and staff can vouch that whatever comments made by the CBP officer that day are the furthest from the truth,

While I was driving back from a one week trip to Canada, I entered United States through Border crossing at Samia, Michigan; on 30th of June 2012. When I presented my documents in my Indian passport with valid H-1b visa and my EAD card to the CBP officer, initially I was told that computers were not working and I will have to come to their office inside. I was travelling with my wife (b)(6) who is also an Indian citizen and has valid H4 visa and EAD card, and our two children (b)(6) aged 9 years and (b)(6) aged 7 years who are united states citizen and we had their passports with us. Our car keys, cell phones were taken and asked to sit in a small room and asked questions about my job and residence in USA. I told the officer I am a Physician/MD working in Tennessee. After about one hour, then we were given a lengthy questionnaire to fill for each of us, which we did. Then we waited for another two hours, and then a person came who informed us that he is the supervisor, and said many different things to us ranging from questions about my true identity to that visas were expired, to that EAD cards have not been processed in right manner. After one more hour (now a total of four hours have passed sitting in that room) they said that our case has been referred to another "agency" and that only after getting clearance, will we be allowed to enter USA. We were asked to give passwords to our cellphones and Ipads, and our e-mails and facebook accounts were checked. When after 4 1/2 hours I asked how long it's going to take, the officer got very upset and asked me to come to another room and separated me from my family and handcuffed me and said that he will search me, which I said is fine and after doing his detailed search for 5-10 minutes he took off my handcuffs and brought me back to be with family. Then officer again came back, and asked me to give my social security number. Then finally, after 5 hours in that room from 5.00pm to 10.00pm, were we allowed to reenter United States. We were quite shaken and disturbed by the whole experience, especially as we are law abiding and tax paying residents, with no criminal records; and has had multiple FBI clearances prior to getting my medical licenses for Louisiana and Tennessee. I had a valid stamped visa, valid I-94 form and valid EAD cards and still had to spend so much time at the crossing which of course pushed all our travel plans out of the window.

I will be more than happy to provide any demographic or any other information, so that this does not happen again with me or my wife or my children.

On April 2, 2012 I attempted to enter the United States at Chicago-OHare Airport (Chicago, IL) on a valid F-1 visa (b)(6). My file number is (b)(6). The Event Number was (b)(6). When I arrived at O-Hare, I had a valid Employment Authorization Document (receipt L1N1290177341) based on Optional Practical Training (OPT), and an employment letter from my OPT employer, CyberThink Inc. I was taken to secondary inspection, and a CBP Officer opened up my laptop computer and looked through document files in my laptop and found several resumes. He asked me many questions and took my statement. I explained that I had graduated from California State University, Los Angeles with a Master of Science in Information Systems in 2010, and applied for Optional Practical Training (OPT). My first OPT employer was Oneness Enterprise, where I was a Business Analyst, which is an IT position related to my degree field. In September 2011 I applied for job with CyberThink Inc. When I applied for the CyberThink job, my resume showed that I had almost 3 years of software experience, which was true. I was hired on October 17, 2011 by CyberThink as a Business Analyst, also related to my degree field. At that time, CyberThink had a consulting agreement with two other companies, Jupiter Consulting, and Accenture. CyberThink wanted me to provide services to its clients Jupiter and Accenture on a project in accordance with the consulting agreement, and the CyberThink recruiter told me that I had the technical abilities but I needed to present more experience on my resume or else the clients would not accept me. Therefore when interviewing with Jupiter and Accenture I presented a resume that showed I had 5 years of experience (which I did not have) instead of 3 years. The end-clients accepted me as the consultant and I then began performing IT services for them on behalf of CyberThink. The resume I presented to the end-clients did contain false information. The CBP Officer then said that I was inadmissible to the United States pursuant to Section 212(a)(6)(C)(i) of the INA for misrepresentation and fraud, and denied me entry into the USA. He had me withdraw my application for admission, and then cancelled my F-1 visa by stamping Application for Admission Withdrawn on the visa and in my passport.

I should not be subject to INA 212(a)(6)(C)(i) because I never made a Closed misrepresentation to a U.S. immigration official. I had a valid F-1 visa issued in 2008 for me to study at California State University, Los Angeles, and I graduated. I had a valid EAD to work for my OPT employer who was registered with E-Verify. I had presented the fake resume to the end-clients of my OPT employer, so that I could provide services for those end-clients, as my employer had a consulting arrangement for a project with those end-clients. I never presented the resume to an immigration official for a benefit. I also believe there may be some misunderstanding with some of the Officer questions and my answers. The Officer asked if the resume I presented to CyberThink when I applied for the job was true and complete, and I said yes. I had used my true legitimate resume to apply for the CyberThink job and was hired based on my actual experience. CyberThink was my OPT STEM employer as indicated on my Form I-20. The Officer then asked about CyberThink end-clients, and asked if I would have my current job if I did not use a fake resume. I said no, and I meant that I would not be providing services for Jupiter or Accenture if I did not use the fake resume. I would still have my CyberThink job without the fake resume. I was an employee of CyberThink at all times during the OPT STEM period. I was supervised by CyberThink and I was paid my wages by CyberThink. I did not sign an employment agreement with Jupiter or Accenture. Neither Jupiter nor Accenture was ever my employer, just the end-client. At O-Hare Airport, I was re-entering the USA on a valid F-1 visa to resume my employment with CyberThink. I had an employment letter from CyberThink to confirm my ongoing employment with the company since October 17, 2011. I request that the section 212(a)(6)(c)(i) finding be removed from my immigration record.

Complainant, (b)(6) is a 30 year old businessman from Cerritos, California. (b) immigrated to the United States from Palestine to be an entrepreneur. (b) currently works as a private investigator while exploring business opportunities. Complainant was in Boston in 2009 due to a flight layover. While in Boston, the complainant toured the city with his carry-on baggage in hand. During the complainants visit of the site of a historical monument, a worker asked complainant if he would like to leave his bag in the care of the museum workers. When complainant returned for the bag, the FBI had seized and placed all of complainants belongings across tables. FBI questioned complainant for a couple of hours and scanned and shipped his laptop to the FBI office in Long Beach. Complainant has experienced difficulties flying internationally and even domestically since this incident. Complainants flight tickets read SSSS as a result of this incident. Complainant attempted to visit the Palestinian territories in October 2010 but was denied entrance by Israel. Upon return to the United States, the DHS questioned the complainant at LAX because they thought complainant was the owner of his brothers store. Complainants brother was arrested for possession and selling counterfeit merchandise in April, 2010. During the April arrest of complainants brother, complainant verbally protested the handcuffing of his mother and was subsequently thrown to the floor, kicked, handcuffed, and thrown in a police car. An officer told the complainants brother that complainant was no good and involved in a criminal enterprise. The LAX DHS searched through complainants computer, phones, and other belongings for approximately 5 to 6 hours. The complainant suffers from anxiety and was stressed throughout the search process. Complainant also traveled to Jordan in June 2011. Again, Israel would not let him enter the Palestinian territories. Upon his return to New York, at JFK airport, complainant was approached by 2 officers that were checking I.D.s. The officers escorted him and a Somali man away to be searched whereupon the complainant was held for approximately 4-5 hours. The officers checked complainants computer and other belongings. Complainant also traveled to Mexico for half a day in September of 2011 to pick up anxiety medications because he did not have insurance. Complainants passport was checked upon his reentry to the United States at the Tijuana border crossing and complainant was subsequently handcuffed and taken to a room where he was questioned for approximately 5-6 hours. Officers asked questions like why were you in Mexico and what business did you have there? Complainant seeks clarification and a resolution to his traveling difficulties. Restrictions on the complainant travels have affected his employment abilities. Complainant believes he is unable to obtain a security patrol state license because of his inclusion on the terrorist watch list despite working in the security industry for over 7 years. Complainant is stressed that he may miss his sisters wedding in Palestine because of the aforementioned issues. Finally, complainant is engaged and can not visit his fiance unless his issues are resolved.

My wife and I were returning from a short day trip to Campobello Island and were detained. I was asked to present my Maine driver's license in addition and then was told to park the car in section 3 and go to the station with my wife. I was asked to fill out a customs form (no purchases) and asked a number of questions. Our car was searched and after about 25 minutes we were allowed to go. One of the agents handed me a form stating I could query this incident.

What makes this a concern is that when we returned from France on July 8, 2012 my wife and I were also pulled aside and asked to do further inspection (in Logan airport). We were singled out from all the passengers aboard an airbus and the only ones to have our luggage searched and they took our passports while we went to get our luggage. My wife had one agent who inspected her luggage but sent her out into the lobby way ahead of me. My agent requested that I open my luggage and remove the laptop and enter the passcode. (The laptop was my wife's). He searched part of the luggage, went through all parts of my wallet, he also made "strange" comments about our cameras (both of which I was holding). He wanted to know if I had a website that I put my photos on and he look down the name of it. I am concerned that somehow I have been put on some sort of watchlist and want to be cleared since I do not do anything illegal or improper and think that somehow I have been mixed up with someone else. My wife says that it is because I color my hair (gray in passport, now brown). I can't imagine that would cause this problem. I am asking that my files be reviewed and if something "funny" is in there -- that be investigated for the truth. I am a Fire inspector for Bangor, Maine, and would not like anything "shady" to be on my record - nor do I wish to be pulled aside for additional scrutiny every time I travel outside the U.S.

I was directed to Customs and Border Protection. I was interrogated by a female CBPO (b)(6)/(b)(6) permit me to refer to her as (b)(6)/(b)(6). With other CBPOs, first they took one of my laptops and turned it on and started going through it. I then enquired to find out if they needed help going through the laptop and they declined. After rigorous questioning as to the purpose of my visit (b)(6)/(b)(6) then embarked on searching through my luggage, intermittently asking me to reveal why I was carrying for example 6 suits, professional and birth certificates, amongst others; she insinuated that she did not believe I was telling her the "real" purpose of my visit. I told her I was a computer consultant, and given the time I was going to be visiting would likely do some study, and certification exams if I felt competent to do so. After at least 6 hours of detention (to their credit I was offered some pasta, much appreciation) I was photographed, fingerprinted and escorted by uniformed officials to a return flight bound for the UK that night. I was given a document and told I was no longer eligible to enter the US under the visa waiver program, effectively invalidating ESTA for me. I understand that CBP and Homeland security has the right to delay, detain and screen travelers and to check their belongings, but I believe having personal information shared by every member and keeping a traveler with no explanation for over 5 hours with after a 20 hours flight is against any human right I was not offered any kind of explanation and I had to ask the officers for a phone call to notify my family that I am alive and detained by the CBP, as it did not matter what was my state or my health condition I am certain that I was treated unfairly and was discriminated as the officer who lead me there could not comprehend the fact that there are American Citizens who are born in the US and speak with an accent due to their heritage or where they grew up, I was treated not as a US Citizen who was born, live and Work in the US, but rather an Arab who came from Jordan and should be bothered I realize that the CBP officers are doing their job and I appreciate that and grateful for what they do, but the treatment and the circumstances that I had to deal with were extreme and not necessary and Insulting. <p>For the last three years at least, I've faced great difficulties during air travel, especially while returning to the US from abroad. Although I understand the need to go through additional screening occasionally to ensure the security of the nation, the constant screening and examination that I'm subjected to has increased to the point where I can afford it no interpretation but deliberate harassment. Why is it that I'm screened twice - sometimes three times - before boarding a plane? Why is it that after three years of asking the same questions, I'm still asked the same exact questions upon entering the US? Why is it that I'm met at the plane door and sometimes even called out before anyone else deplanes to be escorted to immigration like a criminal? With this complaint, I seek redress from DHS and a correction of the wrongs indicated above and detailed below. Prior to 2009, I was selected for additional pre-flight screening a few times, but it appeared at the time to be random. However, at least since 2009, I've gone through additional TSA screening every time I travel within the US or abroad. Since then, the "SSSS" notation has never once disappeared from my boarding pass. Likewise, during my last four entries to the US (since 2009), I've been detained by CBP for examination, my detention ranging from two to six hours. In the process, I was at least twice delayed from my connecting flight. All my electronics were taken and examined at least twice. Likewise, both my person and bags were inspected, and even the gifts I carried torn up. Some of the questions I was asked were clearly standard border control questions, but many of them were questions asked to gauge my constitutionally protected views. The four times CBP detained me upon entry were: 1) 08/28/09 when I arrived at DFW on flight GF6671L at 2:30pm. 2) 06/26/11 when I arrived at JFK on flight AA6006 at 4:30pm. 3) 07/12/12 when I arrived at JFK on flight SV021 at 11:30am. 4) 08/28/12 when I arrived at JFK on flight SV023 at 12:17pm. I was also questioned on 08/25/12 while heading overseas from JFK by two CBP officers at the gate. It was a little before boarding when an airline representative called me to the gate desk for "an important message." There I met two CBP officers: a man who later identified himself as (b)(6) and a woman who didn't identify herself. (b)(6) explained a procedure which required travelers to declare any money they transport into or out of the US if it is \$10,000 or more. He claimed that, in enforcing this policy, CBP chose a few individuals to be questioned in this regard. He asked me if I was carrying the amount of money he mentioned. I said no. He asked me approximately how much money I had, emphasizing more than once that it only needed to be an approximation. I said about \$10. He asked if I was carrying money for anyone else. I said no. He asked whether I had any money in my checked bags. I said no. He then produced a card which appeared to be an official government form except that he had crossed out part of a line and had written a few words by hand. He asked me to write how much money I had above the line and to sign the bottom of the card - an informal signature line which he added. He said I could read the form if I wished. I read it but was concerned of proceeding as the whole incident raised my suspicions. I then went on to ask him why I was chosen. He said that I wasn't the only one and that they would be approaching other passengers later, asked him on what basis the choice was made. He said he didn't know. I then clarified my concerns to him and asked whether it was required. He said yes. I displayed hesitation until the lady cried out, "OK, don't sign it! I'll be a witness. Just write how much money you have." I asked whether foreign currency was considered; they said no. I took out my wallet to see the exact amount of USD I carried and wrote "\$11" on the card. He then asked about the purpose of my travel, my permanent address in Nashville, and other things. He also took my driver's license and copied information from it. He led me to a back room and looked through one of my carry-on bags while the lady looked through the other. When they finished, he said that I'd now need to sign the back of the same card on which he had written "all my money was returned to me". He clarified that this was my confirmation that none of my money was taken from me. I voiced concern over signing it with that wording as obviously none of my money was taken to begin with. I suggested that he write instead "no money was taken from me" which was more accurate and which I would readily sign. He then appeared angry and said that now "we will do things by the book". He said that he "tried to make things easy" for me, but that I was being uncooperative. He then looked through my wallet, took the \$11 out, frisked me, returned the money to me, and requested that I sign the back of the card. (CONTINUED IN THE COMMENTS BOX)</p>	<p>I signed it. They then escorted me out to the gate area. The whole incident looked suspicious to me and smelled of setup. They tried to assure me that this was standard procedure, but I wasn't convinced. They also claimed many times that I was just one of others to be questioned, but it was obvious that I was the only one and the airline representatives later confirmed this. Needless to say, these additional screenings and examinations are a great source of harm to me and my family. Not only am I suffering both physically and in terms of wasted time, but I'm subjected to a great level of stress and emotional harm which is even worse. The harm this causes my family is far greater as they worry over my safety. All this is besides the great harm done not just to me but all Americans by transgressing against my constitutional rights and freedoms. It is quite obvious that I'm only subjected to this due to my immigrant background, Muslim faith, and interest in the Islamic sciences. In conclusion, I'm a law-abiding citizen and condemn all crime, whether it is done in the name of religion or not. I'm also a student of Islam, and that does not make me a criminal. I've neither done nor want to do nor associate with anyone who does anything to threaten the security of this country. While I understand the importance of having security measures and policies that ensure the safety of the American people, and while I see the work of security agencies not only as important, but necessary to maintain the security that is vital to the proper operation of any modern sovereignty, I fail to understand or accept the constant and almost mindless questioning, examination, and (quite frankly) harassment to which TSA and CBP continue to subject me for over three years when I'm completely innocent of any misplaced suspicions they may hold and they well know that. I went with a travel group who arranged all my travel accommodations. My mother and younger sister also traveled with me and through the same group. We were together the entire trip except on the return when my mother went on to Pakistan to visit relatives and I returned home with my sister on November 11, 2011 Before traveling overseas, I registered our full detailed itinerary with the U.S. State Department. On my return home, I was detained briefly, before departing Paris, France at CDG airport. The French officer (in plain clothes) asked the purpose of my international trip, where I visited and where I was headed. This is, of course, after collecting all my personal information. After he wrote that down he left me board the plane. This was also after a second security pat down at the gate. As for the detainment at the border, after deboarding my international flight at JFK International in New York City, the entire plane was being asked to show their ID upon exit by CBP officers. As soon as they looked at my sister's and my passports, they detained her and me, and let the rest of the plane go without showing their IDs. After that I was detained for 3 1/2 hours while I was held for an "extended interview" where I was asked highly personal and invasive questions. Every belonging was searched, all highly sensitive personal documents were read/copied and all electronics were collected and examined while not in my sight. The officers conducting the interview and search were professional and courteous. However, I still believe that this procedure still violated my civil rights because the types of questions regarding my religious activity, civic engagement and political affiliation as well as charitable contributions have nothing to do with my travel or the security of our country. Furthermore I had personal and sensitive documents like my tax documents and people's prayer requests (deeply personal) that were collected, read, copied, and returned to me at the end before I was released. My lost baggage tag was not returned to me and because of that Delta/Air France refused to locate my bag so I never got it back. All my electronics were taken away and examined (not sure if my data was copied) without my consent. Lastly only about 1 hour after being detained was I allowed to contact relatives who were drove two hours to pick me up and were waiting to pick me up outside the airport. I was also patted down and screened at every gate on the way back to Memphis, even on domestic flights. That has not happened before.</p>	<p>Since this incident I've been asked to meet with my local FBI office who interviewed me about this incident along with a Homeland Security representative. After the interview was over, they assured my my name would be cleared from any list but I continue to be directed to secondary on every leg of every domestic flight since this incident on November 11, 2011. I need to understand why I was detained and how I can be removed from any list or anything else that is causing me to be detained at the border. This also happened on a return from a car trip to Toronto in 2008 at the Niagra Falls border. My family and I were detained for 2 1/2 hours without any explanation and went through the same unreasonable search and seizure tactics. After that incident I filled out a TRIP request. I was sent heavily redacted reports and an option for a judicial review. I had to contact local FBI agent to get my laptop back. I drove to Canada last year and again I was detained for more than 10 hours by the Canadian authorities and the CBP. CSL is an engineering consultancy that provides clients with expertise in the specification, analysis and verification of critical software-intensive systems. CSL has earned international recognition for its expertise in a variety of technologically advanced domains including automotive systems, rail signaling, high-energy physics, defense and medical devices. In October 2011, my employer, CSL was contracted by McKesson Medical in Westminster, Colorado, USA for the provision of training services in the area of safety risk management for software-intensive medical devices. McKesson Colorado selected CSL because CSL has been providing similar services to the branch of McKesson Medical Imaging in Richmond, BC-Canada. Our role was mostly to help transfer knowledge created in this Canadian branch of McKesson to another branch of McKesson. Given that CSL had helped create this knowledge for the Canadian branch of McKesson, it was a natural follow-on of our work in Canada for CSL to be asked to share this knowledge with other branches of McKesson. This contract included a series of presentations on this knowledge in the form of a 2-day training course on site in Westminster, Colorado. As part of this contract, my employer assigned me that task of presenting this training course in Colorado and made necessary travel arrangements for me, e.g., airline reservation, hotel reservation, rental car reservation. Therefore on Tuesday, October 11th, 2011 I intended to travel from Vancouver, BC to Denver, CO to teach the training course. My travel plans included a flight departing from Vancouver international airport. The planned duration of my stay in Colorado was three (3) days. I thought I could enter the USA through the 'Visitor for Business' type of visa (B1 I believe). The US custom officer at Vancouver international airport reviewed my situation and asked me further questions that have been fully documented in the 'Record of Sworn Statement in Administrative Proceedings' Event Number (b)(6) did not have any documents from either Critical Systems Labs or McKesson Medical with me on that day to justify this temporary visit to the USA. The custom officer concluded that my business visit to the USA required an immigrant visa. As a result I was denied entry to the USA since I did not have an immigrant visa. Following this failed attempt to enter the US for this business purpose, CSL and McKesson helped me to put together a package for a non-immigrant TN Visa application. I received advice from both companies regarding this TN application package. The NAFTA occupation that was selected for this application was 'Computer System Analyst' because this appeared to be the best match among the options available with the nature of work for CSL. On November 4th, 2011, I drove from Vancouver, BC to the Peace Arch border crossing between British Columbia and Washington states. I intended to apply for a TN visa that would then allow me to conduct the training session at McKesson Medical in Westminster, Colorado. The US custom officer reviewed my application package and told me that the visa I was applying for would not allow me to perform the training services that I intended to provide in the USA. I understood that the nature of visa I was applying for was not adequate for the purpose I intended. Following this second failed attempt, McKesson Colorado and Critical Systems Labs decided jointly to terminate this small training contract. In this context, I stopped pursuing any related visa application and I have not been trying to enter the USA for this matter any more. However and since these events, I am systematically sent to the secondary inspection when I attempt entering the USA even for pleasure type visits as I have experienced in July of this year. The agent asked me my occupation and looked at my business cards, laptop, etc. As a photographer in my country of Peru I travel quite a bit, in and out of my country, but I work and still have residence in Peru. I explained several times that I do not live nor work in the US, but I do have family and my partner there. After much discussion, because I have a US phone number so as to stay in contact with friends and family here, the agent unilaterally and erroneously decided that I must be working in the US, and so re-involved immigrations and denied my entry. After 26 hours of detention I was finally placed back on a plane to Lima. My family and partner were helpless to try to assist me, as the system refuses to grant access in the customs area. My partner finally left after 3 hours of waiting, with no definitive word on what was happening. I was told I could "voluntarily" return to Lima if I signed their (inaccurate) paperwork, and my visa would be revoked, but I could start the visa application process all over again in Lima. If I refused, they would also stamp on my passport that I could not re-apply for a visa for five years. I had no choice but to return home, and I don't know if this information is even valid or true. As one can see, my passport shows I have travelled all over the world, including the Caribbean, Europe and the US. I've always returned and worked back in Peru. Furthermore, I have respected and worked hard and within the rules and system of the visa process. I've never overstayed the visa or caused any reason to have the visa rescinded. Over the past two weeks, my partner and I have both tried in vain to speak to someone, either at the US Embassy in Lima, or the Embassy in the US. The automatic response is to pay money again, and then "we'll see what's going on". I don't even know if my visa is actually invalid or not, as this has been a very confusing and frustrating event. We were again directed inside, questioned again at length, photographed and finger-printed again, and again denied entry. Whenever I'm coming back to US from an international destination, two US Immigration officers are always waiting for me on the gate of arrival and escort me to the immigration center where I spend 1-3 hours (As the case in past 6-7 years which started with 5-6 hours). All my personal items and belongings get searched, my phone and electronic devices are taken and I don't know what happens with them or the information on them and I get asked same exact questions every time then the officer hands me the regress form. I filled it here on November of last year and still didn't get any response. Note that I was travelling to Canada on a vacation with my family on May 25, 2012 and coming back to USA on June 7, 2012. At the MIA airport as I was boarding the flight I was stopped along with my family and was told I have to go thru additional screening plus I will miss my flight. I fully cooperated with the authorities, however, note that we had to sit in the room for nearly 8 hours with my 3 yr old son. Eventually in the morning at 4 AM they cleared me and my family. However, they did not immediately return my electronic media (2 laptops) and after approx. 4 months when I received them, they were broken and when I claimed the damage, I was denied the compensation. Similar additional screening happened when we were coming back from Canada on June 07, 2012 and missed our flight. This is just one incident that I have explained. I have been going thru this ordeal every time I go out of or come into USA.

I know this is their right and that they are doing their jobs and that anyone is subject to being randomly searched, etc., but what I am being put through is nothing short of harassment and now my reputation at work as well as my emotional and physical health is being effected by it and so I am finally writing you in hopes that you can put a stop to me being treated so. A little background as to how this all started is in order... Several months ago, and just after I began being stopped, detained, searched, etc., I was given a piece of plain white paper by USCBP Agent (b)(6) with the hand written name (b)(6) on it and the cell phone number, (b)(6) and told that I would continue to be stopped until I spoke with (b)(6) (Special Agent (b)(6) of the FBI) I phoned him that very same morning and while I had been up all night and still had a 3 hour drive home to contend with I still made arrangements to meet with he and his partner at MIA International Airport later that same day. He said the smuggling ring was smuggling information out of the US that was intended for international terrorists. He implied I was being something less than a good American for failing to be able to help him. Today I, in a last ditch effort, I texted Special Agent (b)(6) and asked him to please take me off the list. I told him I didnt want to have to make this report. He phoned me back (twice) and told me HE HAD taken me off the list, that he had cleared me of any wrong doing some time ago, and that NOW I am on the list because USCBP, (the very people who keep telling me they have nothing to do with this and that their hands are tied until the FBI says to let me go) must still want me there? He also told me it might be because his department and the USCBP at MIA International Airport havent been getting along very well. REALLY? As I have stated, my health and professional reputation are at stake here. This is my career. I am god at and love what I do. I am also the sole support of my elderly mother and we cannot afford for me to be sick. I commute after most of my trips 137 miles by motorcycle to LaBelle, Florida. (b)(6) aggressively told me that he was going to handcuff me because he felt as if he was being threatened from me walking towards the office behind him while 4 officers were right beside him, he did not tell me where the office was located he did not tell me weather to walk in front of the car or behind it, he just simply said go into the office. I am sure 99% of people do not know where to go when they are sent in for screening. I felt very threatened and harassed by the officer behaviour and this is not the way to treat anyone, I am not a dog. The same thing happened another time when I was in transit in Germany. What probably made things worse, is that I was going to Lebanon, and there had been some problems in Lebanon at the time. Another thing that made the security officials suspicious is that I had some electronics with me from school projects. They were mostly concerned about the quadcopter that I took with me to Lebanon. We made two quad copters, my friend (b)(6) kept one which is in this video (b)(6) and I kept one which is in this video (b)(6). The one that I took to Lebanon is in the second video. Please note that in order to use the two previous links, you would need to replace (equal sign) with an equal sign. When Canadian Customs came aboard to clear the ship they searched everyones room. I was asked about my hard drives. I was asked how many movies I had. I told them that I did not know because I had not been thru them all. I had about 11 TB worth of info on these drives. They spent several hours going thru only part of them and I was arrested and detained by Canada for 24hrs then they deported me. I was not charged but they kept all my electronics. When I came home I went back to work on another ship called the Maersk Montana. The ship went from Houston TX to mobile AL. When we pulled into port in Mobile on either May 3rd 4th or 5th. There was about 7 very large men that looked and acted like something straight out of Arnold Schwartznegger terminator movie. I was called to the captains office and in front of my crew I was singled out. The chief mate came with us to my room where they demanded that I sign a consent form to look at my computer. They went thru the whole room and all the contents. They demanded I remove 2 pad locks from a cabinet. I explained to them that this stuff belong to the crew member who is on vacation and I nor anyone else had the keys. The officers asked for the bolt cutters and broke the locks off. They delayed the ship from starting cargo leaving all the crew very worried wondering what was wrong. The officers after looking then just left not taking anything with them. On May/26/13 aboard the very same ship 2 Customs officers came on when the ship came into in port Elizebeth NJ. The Captain came on the pa asking everyone to come to the captains office to clear customs. I was one of the first ones up there and I was told by the captain that the customs wants to see me last. I was not allowed to leave customs sight and all the crew was coming up to clear customs and I was made to look like I had done something bad in front of my co workers. I mean I was made to stand there like I was going to jail. Everyone was asking me what the hell is going on. I was really uncomfortable. When all the crew cleared customs I was asked to come into the captains office then the customs made the captain leave his own office and shut the office door. I was asked questions including if I was a male or female and if I was surgically altered down below. They said they just wanted to be sure they had the right person. I told them I was going home today and that my suitcases are all packed. They again in front of every was taken to my room and searched unpacking everything, all the while the vessel has been delayed you got about 9 crewmember waiting at the gangway to board the ship and about 9 people waiting to leave the ship. I mean everything was at a stand still while customs is busy with searching my room and asking all their questions. The 2 customs men kept asking me if this was all my stuff several times. They then once they went thru everything left the ship. I am 41 yrs old with no criminal record. I have been married for 21yrs and we have a 20 yr old son. Because of work I travel all the time by plane and ships. I am very concerned that I also will be singled out by customs or screeners at the air port causing me to miss my flights and not even make it to my ship in time before it goes back to sea. I would be stranded and fired for failing to turn to for my ship. I am afraid the constant searches is going to cause me to loose my job. I did not know what was on all the hard drives. I was always trading hard drives on the ship it is a common practice. I did not think anything of it

I am absolutely horrified and upset about the arrest and now the fact that I am being singled out and harassed in my place of work. I now am afraid to go to work. Please if you feel the need to search or investigate me go ahead but please not in my place of work. Please this is going to cause me to loose my job. Thanks

I was locked in a cell for several hours while my family sat in the lobby and my vehicle was searched. Upon re entering my vehicle after the search my laptop screen was broken and apparently dropped. The agents were very rude and disrespectful. This past Saturday June 22 when I re entered at DIA from a flight originating in Tokyo Narita Airport. The agent here was very polite, professional and understanding. I am always referred for secondary screening despite having applied for GOES trusted traveler and being a honorably discharged US Marine. In 2002 I was charged with a State (not Federal) misdemeanor charge. For various reasons despite my innocence consented to a "plea" on the conditions that I would not be entering a plea of guilty would not have criminal record would serve 2 years unsupervised probation on a Suspended Imposition of Sentence I successfully completed the probation and have had no further findings of guilt in any criminal proceeding.

In 2002 I was alerted that information regarding the possibility of child pornography being downloaded to a computer network under my name was reported. Long story short there were less than 3 images of what was reported to be child pornography found unknowingly to me under my custody or control amongst gigabytes of other downloaded internet material. I did not download these images. However, in an effort to put the situation to rest, and understanding that this was not a deliberate effort on my part, the prosecutor, the judge, and myself all agreed that if I made an Alford plea to the state misdemeanor charge that the images were in my custody, regardless of intent, that I would receive an SIS and 2 years un supervised probation. A clean record and everyone goes home happy. I agreed as a former Marine and single father of 2 young children whom I still have custody of and adore. This seemed like a quick and easy resolution to the problem. I was naive in the ways of our legal system. I had completed my probation successfully and completed both a Bachelorette and Graduate degree in this time. All while working full time and raising my 2 kids as a single father. 6 years later US Attorney General John Ashcroft, formerly the Gov. of Missouri Passed the Adam Walsh Act that provided GUIDELINES for states sex offender laws and registration. Mo state law as applied does not require me to register. I was charged with a misdemeanor and granted an SIS in good faith. I have taken polygraphs and psycho sexual evaluations at my own request in an attempt to prove I am a good man with good values who is an asset to his community. (b)

I also have family and a business in Ghana. Whenever, I travel I am being put in secondary, getting my bags searched and subjected to some really silly questions. What bothers me is that the questioning is insinuating that I cannot possibly afford to travel to Ghana regularly! I was asked what I do for a living numerous times. I was asked what my wife does for a living. I was asked why we "had so many laptops". Enough is enough...I am NOT a terrorist or a drug dealer. If you have anything to ask me, you know exactly where to find me. Please use your resources for the real threats out there. Thank you.

I think it is a bit comical that you are spending resources on an immigration attorney who is easy to find. Meanwhile, there are other people out there who are probably walking right by you who you probably need to be stopping.

Only starting 2012 and at every entry to the US coming back from my work assignment in the Middle East, I am being directed for a Secondary Check (Letter C of Yellow Color is commented on my Customs Declaration Form by the main immigration counter officer) taking about two to three hours to be checked out resulting in missing my connection domestic flight. In May 2013, I have scheduled an appointment with and visited the USCIS Office in Fairfax, Virginia, and explained the situation and extended my concerns to the officer who has checked and confirmed that there is nothing wrong and advised me to write and mail to the US Customs and Border Protection Customer Service Center, which has been done in May 2013. At the last arrival on June 29th, it has been the worst, most offensive, and different than the typical ones in the previous arrivals since I have started to be secondarily checked, as I stayed for the secondary check for almost 6 and half hours (in between which I have seen and talked to the officer handling my passport for a maximum of 20 minutes) resulting in a major inconvenience for my family in the US and missing few scheduled commitments, in addition to luggage and personal belongings abnormal detailed search and check including my office laptop and project related documents, questions about friends, college mates, or colleagues of certain nationalities living or working in certain states. Please let me know of what is needed to be done to clear the situation and smoothen my arrival as it has been before 2012. I really appreciate your understanding.

On April 2, 2012 I attempted to enter the United States at Chicago-OHare Airport (Chicago, IL) on a valid F-1 visa (b)(6). My file number is (b)(6). The Event Number was (b)(6). When I arrived at O-Hare, I had a valid Employment Authorization Document (receipt (b)(6) based on Optional Practical Training (OPT), and an employment letter from my OPT employer, CyberThink Inc. I was taken to secondary inspection, and a CBP Officer opened up my laptop computer and looked through document files in my laptop and found several resumes. He asked me many questions and took my statement. I explained that I had graduated from California State University, Los Angeles with a Master of Science in Information Systems in 2010, and applied for Optional Practical Training (OPT). My first OPT employer was Oneness Enterprise, where I was a Business Analyst, which is an IT position related to my degree field. In September 2011 I applied for job with CyberThink Inc. When I applied for the CyberThink job, my resume showed that I had almost 3 years of software experience, which was true. I was hired on October 17, 2011 by CyberThink as a Business Analyst, also related to my degree field. At that time, CyberThink had a consulting agreement with two other companies, Jupiter Consulting, and Accenture. CyberThink wanted me to provide services to its clients Jupiter and Accenture on a project in accordance with the consulting agreement, and the CyberThink recruiter told me that I had the technical abilities but I needed to present more experience on my resume or else the clients would not accept me. Therefore when interviewing with Jupiter and Accenture I presented a resume that showed I had 5 years of experience (which I did not have) instead of 3 years. The end-clients accepted me as the consultant and I then began performing IT services for them on behalf of CyberThink. The resume I presented to the end-clients did contain false information. The CBP Officer then said that I was inadmissible to the United States pursuant to Section 212(a)(6)(C)(i) of the INA for misrepresentation and fraud, and denied me entry into the USA. He had me withdraw my application for admission, and then cancelled my F-1 visa by stamping Application for Admission Withdrawn on the visa and in my passport.

I should not be subject to INA 212(a)(6)(C)(i) because I never made a Closed misrepresentation to a U.S. immigration official, I had a valid F-1 visa and EAD to work for my OPT employer, CyberThink. I presented a fake resume to the end-clients of CyberThink, so I could provide services on a CyberThink consulting project. I never presented the resume to an immigration official for a benefit. I also believe there may be some misunderstanding with my answers to the Officer questions. When asked if the resume I presented to CyberThink when I applied for the job was true, I said yes. I had used my legitimate resume to apply for the CyberThink job and was hired based on my actual experience. When asked about the end-clients, and if I would have my job if I did not use a fake resume, I said no. I meant I would not be providing services for the end-clients if I did not use the fake resume. But I would still have my CyberThink job without the fake resume. I was supervised by and paid wages by CyberThink during the OPT period. At OHare, I was re-entering to resume my employment with CyberThink. I previously submitted a DHS TRIP - control number (b)(6). On Dec. 10, 2012 the CBP sent me a letter confirming that a CBP officer determined I was inadmissible when I arrived on Apr. 2, 2012, and that I would need a waiver if I wish to return to the USA. I applied for an immigrant visa as a derivative of my parents, and the U.S. Consulate denied my visa, because I have a misrepresentation finding in the system. I tried to explain to the Department of State, but the DOS stated on May 8, 2013 that consular officers are not allowed to look behind a DHS finding, and that if I wanted to address the factual basis of the ineligibility finding I should submit an inquiry to DHS TRIP. I request DHS to review my case, and re-adjudicate my inadmissibility finding to remove the misrepresentation finding from my record.

On April 11, 2013 around 4:30pm or so, my boyfriend and I were driving home from one of our frequent trips to Toronto when we were told to pull over and go into the office for screening. We drive to Canada and back quite often and have been doing so for the past 8 years so we are use to the usual questions and procedures involved when crossing the border. However, while we were sitting in the office, we were approached by an agent who demanded us to tell him exactly everything that was in our car. We told him we had our clothes, laptop, along with other personal belongings, and a variety of grocery items we had purchased at Korea Town. We had a trunk full of groceries and showed him the receipt which showed everything we had purchased. He then left and came back a few minutes later, visibly infuriated by something, and started to literally yell at us demanding to know why we had lied to him. He accused me of lying for not mentioning the 4 tangerines we had in our front seat with a bottle of water and some other chocolate snacks. My boyfriend and I were speechless for a few seconds as we were shocked by his tone of voice and behavior at which point the agent asked us what we do for a living and asked us if we talk to people on a regular basis at work and why we couldn't respond to him right away. We tried to explain to him that those items didn't even cross our minds and had he asked us directly if we had any fruits, we certainly would've told him. He didn't let me finish what I wanted to say and called me over to the main office desk where he went through my purse, taking out my wallet, going through every credit card, ID cards, etc., while telling me that I will be fined \$600 for lying to him about the tangerines. What was worse was the manner and tone in which he conducted himself while he was telling me this. It became so bad that my boyfriend who was sitting about 25 feet away told another agent to call over the supervisor to know why this agent was screaming at me and treating me that way. When the supervisor and about 3 other agents came, they apologized and told us that we wouldn't be fined and we were free to go right away. However, we found out a week later when we were driving back from Canada that we were now flagged and that we would be subjected to additional screenings from that point on. It is our belief that this agent who harassed us during that incident had either a racial agenda (My boyfriend is Korean and Im Bulgarian) or some alternative motive to treat us the way he did. I cant understand how an agent with common sense would accuse 2 people who frequently cross the border and have crossed the border without any problems over the past 8 years of lying about 4 tangerines. As my boyfriend told the supervisor on the day of the incident, please review the surveillance video. We would be truly surprised if this was the first time anyone as complained about this agent.

My boyfriend submitted a complaint regarding this incident over 3 months ago but when we check the status online, it just says processing and mentions a possible delay due to incorrect information so we are submitting it again. Since then, nothing has changed and we are told to pull over for additional screenings each and every time we cross the border. In addition, I was subjected to a secondary screening at the airport on my way back from Bulgaria due to this incident.

Time & Date: 3:45pm, August 4, 2013 Place: JFK Terminal 4, Agriculture Search At the aforementioned time and place, I was directed by Department of Homeland Security Customs and Border Patrol unidentified officer 1 to an agricultural search because I was a passenger of flight MS985 and had more than two bags of checked-in luggage. After placing my luggage through the x-ray machine, Chief (b)(6) called for an additional invasive search on one of my pieces of luggage with unidentified officer 2 as Chief (b)(6) believed that there were plants inside. Unidentified officer 2 searched my luggage aggressively unfolding several articles of clothing and returned the bag in a disheveled state with my belongings thrown outside the bag. After performing a thorough search, unidentified officer was unable to locate any plants or any items not permitted for entry. I informed unidentified officer 2 that he could have searched my belongings with more care so that I did not have to completely re-pack my bag and re-fold my clothing. Immediately, Chief (b)(6) shouted from a distance, we are just doing our job. I informed Chief (b)(6) that unidentified officer 2 could have searched my luggage with more care so that I could have moved on quicker from the search process. Chief (b)(6) shouted across If you were in Egypt, would you be able to even question the authorities there? I was shocked by the demeanor and discriminatory remark made by Chief (b)(6) as I am born and raised United States citizen. I replied to Chief (b)(6) that the remark was out of place and that he should not be making such remarks. Chief (b)(6) walked over and requested my passport, I cooperated and handed Chief (b)(6) my passport. He informed unidentified officer 2 to perform an IOA and note against me that I was uncooperative. Chief (b)(6) directed me to sit in the seating area while unidentified officer 2 recorded my information. As I waited, I observed another chief (unidentified chief 1) approaching the agricultural search station. I requested to speak with him regarding the incident. I identified myself to unidentified chief 1 and informed him of the incident that took place. While talking with unidentified chief 1, Chief (b)(6) approached us and continued to talk aggressively towards me. Chief (b)(6) further noted that the area was monitored by microphones and cameras. As I was explaining the remarks that Chief (b)(6) made to unidentified chief 1, Chief (b)(6) noted that he had the right as a citizen to make such remarks. Immediately after Chief (b)(6) stepped away. Unidentified chief 1 was very sincere and encouraged me to file a complaint. Unidentified officer 2 walked over with photocopies of my United States Passport (Passport No. (b)(6) and a valid Indian visa and unidentified officer 2 handed back my passport. I walked over to request Chief (b)(6) name and badge number in which Chief (b)(6) complied by giving me his last name. As I walked away, Chief (b)(6) shouted in a patronizing manner from now on, you will be seeing me every time you come through here. I ignored the remark made by Chief (b)(6) and continued to exit the terminal.

I request that a full investigation is performed regarding this incident and in specific Chief (b)(6) conduct. I also request that any action/notations/advisories ordered against me by Chief (b)(6) are reviewed and removed. Thank you.

(b)(6)	<p>I was travelling to Ohio from Brussels via Amsterdam and Detroit to visit a friend for my summer holiday. I was travelling under the visa waiver programme (ESTA). The instant I got off the plane in Detroit, a uniformed person demanded to see my passport, boarding pass and US customs form. He made some sort of mark on my customs form with a red pen; I then proceeded to the photograph/fingerprint station for visitors. Afterwards, I collected my bag and went to the check in desk. Before I handed over my passport, the same uniformed person took my US customs form and made a further mark on it. I was told to follow the blue line which led me to the customs check. The same uniformed officer was waiting for me there and proceeded to go through my luggage; contents of my pockets; demanded my phone password so that he could go through it; went through my wallet; demanded that I entered my password for my laptop and went through all my personal files. One other officer appeared and he also looked through my personal files. I feel this inspection of my personal property violated my civil rights also the sharing of my personal information with another officer additionally violated my civil rights. I was then instructed to proceed with them to the interview room. I was told to face the wall, put my hands on it, spread my legs and the officer searched me. The officers informed me that they had identified photographs on my laptop that my 17 year old friend had sent me from her home in Ohio. One of the officers then said to me; - It is clear that your intention is to have sex with this girl - Such a comment was not only completely untrue, but in my view, unfounded and slanderous. Having had to give him the phone number of where I was going to stay, write down my phone and computer passwords, I was told to sit outside whilst they made some phone calls. Quite obviously, by this stage I was extremely frightened and started to physically shake. The officers attitudes towards me were aggressive, hostile and very intimidating. I did try to explain that I was extremely scared - being only 20 years old and experiencing the first time of travel so far from home alone. Their attitude towards me still did not change. Once more, I felt personally violated by this. One of the officers then informed me that they were not charging me with anything, however they were going to seize my computer: I asked - Why, how is my laptop a threat to national security? - to which he replied: - do you want to be arrested? We can do this our way or your way; you decide - I replied - I do not want any trouble, your way. I was further informed that I was being denied access to the United States because of my lack of ties to my home country. I was then given a phone number to contact when I returned home to find out how I could reclaim my laptop. I have made this phone call and it once more felt that I was being very rudely addressed, whilst I was being told that I would just have to wait to receive a petition to file in order to attempt to have it returned. I was also told that I could be given no time frame for this procedure. As I am a university student and the laptop contains my work and passwords to my online files and bank account (and also represents a significant financial investment), it is clearly imperative to me to get my computer back. Clearly, this entire episode has had a traumatic effect on me; not only have I lost almost a thousand pounds worth of travel fare; I have had to endure a distressing and alarming event; have had my laptop seized and above all, my good name has been tarnished. I told them to visit my friends, (b)(6) and bring gifts I bought to them. They interrogated me for nine hours. There was one officer there who took a dislike to me his name was (b)(6). He was though the one was in charge of my case and would decide my fate. He checked all my iPhone, my laptop and everything in my bag to its innards. He suspected I was a drug person. But I told him that I have nothing to hide and not everyone who goes to Colombia is drug mule. I told please take my Xray if you suspect anything, I have nothing to hide. I gave them business cards of people I met in Colombia. But they never called to confirm and check, and He asked me very very private questions. He asked if Im gay. He asked if I ever shared a housing with anyone who is gay. Im gay but I felt like he was judging me and that my being gay was wrong. I told him I dont discriminate against anyone. When he didnt like my answers, he would send me to a cell room. I have never been inside a detention cell in my life and I was in panic attack. They shut the door and I couldnt believe what was happening. Midnight came and they removed my belt and my iPhone, my bags were in separate room. They gave me only my wallet to hold and my bag of insulin. I become truly traumatized when two correction people came at midnight to take me away. They shackled me. My hands cuffed and my legs through the cuffs. I couldnt believe it. Only 12 hours ago I was in a club in Bogota enjoying with my friends. They took me in a police car to what I later knew was the Houston Processing Center. This is where they hold those they suspect of committing immigration offences. Every person held there was Mexican. After they booked me in they held me in a cell with about 20 others. I couldnt believe what was befalling on me. Everyone there wore orange jump suits like I saw in the documentary films and most were there for months on end while a court looked into their immigration case. Their conditions of the cell was horrific. Humid with no air conditioning, no seats so you had to sleep or sit on the floor. There was a open toilet and water area. The floors were littered by urine and used toilet paper. Everyone looked like they havent showered for weeks on end. The inmates were very nice and jovial people. I asked about them and they asked about me. I stood the whole time, not wanting an inch of my trousers to get dirty. Around 5am they took me back to the airport. They then told me that my visa waiver program was stopped, that I would be inadmissible under that visa waiver to enter the USA ever again. And that I would have to apply for a tourist visa at the embassy. From 5 am to 3pm I waited in a room till they booked me on the next flight out to London. My reason for visiting was to attend Nan Desu Kan, a local anime convention and spend time with friends who live in the area. After checking in my luggage, I went through security and stated my reason for travel. I was eyed suspiciously and asked more about the convention I was planning to attend and the people who I would be staying with, then sent into the secondary screening area. The officer within told me that I knew what I did wrong and that everything that was about to happen was my own fault. This is where I was informed that I had unknowingly overstayed during my last visit of 71 days (January 17th, 2013 to March 28th, 2013), and that I had only been allotted a stay of 43 days. None of this information was relayed to me when I returned home from my last trip, nor was it mentioned when the tickets for the September trip were purchased. Prior to my visit to the across the border in January 2013, I did some research as to the length of time Canadians are permitted to stay in the US. A page on canada.usembassy.gov states that "Canadian citizens do not require a visa to enter the United States directly from Canada for the purposes of visiting or studying" and "Canadian visitors are generally granted a stay in the U.S. for up to six months at the time of entry." I was also directed to the site travel.state.gov Listed are the exceptions when Canadians are required to have a visa to travel to the US, none of which apply to me. When asked about my life, where I live and work, I said that I live at home with my mother and dont have an employer, but have recently begun crafting and posting my work online in hopes to make money while between jobs, and building a portfolio for Niagara College. I was harshly told to tell the truth and accused of living and working illegally in the US. I had my picture taken and index fingers scanned, and was told that I would not be flying anywhere that day. Having my belongings searched through twice by the same officer seemed uncalled for, especially considering I was being turned away and not flying anywhere. When I got my bags back I examined my laptop, as the officer searching my bags was rather rough with it. I found some internal damage and would have to spend several hours backing up and repairing my primary hard drive and reinstalling my graphics driver. Additional papers in regards to my rejection were given to me and as I was sent away I was told to contact the travel agency and try to get a refund. Thank you for taking the time to read this. I hope that these miscommunications can be quickly resolved and I can continue to visit my friends who were born in the US, and participating in special events that are held across the border. Each time I go the USA, I am repeatedly referred for secondary screening when clearing U.S. Customs and Border Protection. I know what the problem is : when I was 10, I travelled to the USA with my family for a touristic trip. In 1995, I was on the same passport as my mother. At that time, when you entered the USA, the agent was giving you a ticket of entry that you had to give back when you were leaving the U.S. For some reasons, this ticket was lost and U.S. Customs and Border Protection had never registered the fact that I left the U.S properly.

I went back to France 3 or 4 weeks after my entrance in the U.S., with my mother and sister in order to attend school in September as every French kid in my country. Since then, each time I travel to the USA, I am always subjected to additional screening, which is very annoying and can be problematic when I travel for business reasons or when I am in transit for another country. Yet, I often go to the United States, all the more as I work in the French media sector, where the United States is advanced and has a lot to teach us. For instance, I was an exchange student in Boston at Tufts University in 2006 - 2007. Last year, I went to the Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas. One time, an agent told me that I would systematically be referred for additional screening unless I write to you. For approximately the next 2 hours I sat in there waiting to be addressed by someone else. This was a very nervous wait for me as I had no idea what was taking the Immigration department so long. After such time, I was briefly informed that the system was down and that there was nothing they could do about processing entry requests nation wide. Another half an hour passed and I was finally called in for questioning. I was then interrogated about my intentions for working in the US and why I did not have a valid visa. I was surprised by this and explained that the J1 sticker in my passport had the incorrect dates. I tried to explain that I thought it had been electronically extended and approved by CCUSA, my visa sponsor. I did not think I had to provide additional documents that proved that my visa was extended; I was completely unaware of this. I requested that the officers please research my case on their computer system to see that my visa had been extended. They refused to contact CCUSA and told me that my visa had been cancelled. I applied for this J1 visa in February 2013 at the Melbourne Consulate General and sometime later the DS2019 form and visa sticker I received both stated the incorrect dates for my intended length of stay in US. I contacted CCUSA to extend the dates so I could participate in the post season program of the camp. Before departing the US for a short visit to Montreal in September, I had received confirmation from my camp director that my visa had been extended and confirmed with CCUSA. An email printout from CCUSA outlining my visa status was shown to me from my camp before I left which stated that my J1 visa had already been extended and confirmed until the 1st of October. I then asked the officer if I could just enter the country briefly on my valid tourist visa and not work at the camp, but just stay there for a couple of weeks because I had friends there and it was a safe place for me to go so far from home. The officer told me that he did not believe me. The officer then read out to me from his computer screen that I had already booked a flight leaving Los Angeles on January 14th 2014 and asked me "Whats with that"? I told him that I intended to be in Canada at that stage and it was my connecting flight from Vancouver home to Melbourne, Australia. I was overwhelmed when further officers entered the very small room. One officer that came in came down quite close to me and loudly proceeded to tell me that I had lied to them and the Canadians and that I was "up for fraud" and that I could "spend time in jail for this". I was scared and lost for words when another officer then reeled off a list of crimes I was apparently trying to commit. It was then recommended that I not try to enter the US again and stay in Canada. After further, loud, demanding questions like "Whats going on Sam Buckland, huh? Whats going on"? I was overcome with emotion and repeatedly said that "I dont know". I then struggled to explain that I did not have anything with me, just my backpack with my laptop and a few of my clothes, with the rest of my belongings back at the camp in the US. I was then asked something along the lines of "cant they just send it to you"? to which I replied by saying that I had 2 full suitcases worth of things back at the camp. With that, the officer then left the room and came back about 5 minutes later saying that they could grant me a temporary visa for 7 days "to get your stuff and get"! I was also told that "were going to watch you" and that they'll know what I am doing and I dont leave. Mortified by my experience I was then left to collect my things and head to my boarding gate almost 3 and a half hours late for my flight, which was fortunately delayed.</p>	<p>I believe the rejection of permission to re-enter the United States on my valid, multiple-entry J1 visa, cancellation of my tourist visa, and the way I was subjectively treated, was harsh and really uncalled for. I was not given any information about my visa or my rights, and was spoken to without any respect or compassion. This was one of the worst experiences of my life. My intentions were truly genuine and I was completely cooperative throughout the process yet I felt humiliated, scared and treated extremely unfairly by US customs. I would now like to know what my current status is, if I am allowed to transit home through the USA as I originally planned and if I will ever be able to enter the USA again.</p>

	<p>On Sunday January 5th 2014 I (b)(6) and my daughter (b)(6) were traveling back to our residence located in Rockport Massachusetts from visiting my immediate in Canada. At approximately 11:30 AM we arrived at the United States Customs in Highgate Springs Vermont. Our passports were checked and we were asked questions such as how long was the duration of our stay if we were bringing anything back into the United States and where we stayed, along with some other procedural questions. After these questions were asked the Customs Border Patrol officer, Officer (b)(6) told us our car was going to be searched and directed us to pull into the parking lot and to walk into their customs building. After being seated for about thirty minutes we called up by a male border patrol officer. He proceeded to hand each one of us a declaration of goods form and instructed us to fill it out. He asked for our car keys, told us to be seated and walked to our car with another female border patrol officer and drove our car into their garage. Our car was searched for over an hour, and during this time another male officer known as Officer (b)(6) asked us to hand over our cellphones. I questioned as to why we had to hand them over and he stated that it was for their officers safety. Yet, during the three hour duration that we were detained I do not recall any other travelers whose cars were being searched asked to hand over their cell phones. Once the female and male officers who searched our car returned, they proceeded to call my son up, myself, and my daughter and fingerprinted each of us, obtaining fingerprints from each and every one of our fingers. In addition, they also took our pictures. After they told us to be seated they continued to be conducting unknown activities with our passports and other information in their possession. After, they directed us to be seated. They continued to come out of their back offices and ask my son multiple questions such as how much he weighed, how tall he was and what his middle name was. They also asked for his drivers license and made a photocopy of it. During the three hours we were detained I asked the supervisor and the border patrol officers multiple times what the reason for our detainment was, and they gave the same answer, that they were unable to disclose that information. After three hours, the officers handed us our keys and told us that we were permitted to leave.</p>	<p>As my only family resides in Canada, I travel during the holiday seasons and school vacations with my children to visit them. I find it increasingly difficult to travel when I am being detained each and every time I try to enter back into the United States. It has been over a decade since the detainments started to occur each time I would return from Canada. At time point, I have found it very frustrating that I have not been provided an answer as to why these detainments are occurring. I am a United States citizen, but I do not feel like I am being treated as one. If you could kindly take my situation into consideration and provide me with the answers I have been looking for, for years.</p>

When I requested an explanation, a supervisor rudely asked my wife if she watched porn and asked me if I had child porn on any of our electronic devices. She continually accused me of lying.</p> <p>Denied online and mobile app boarding pass printing on last three trips (UK, Canada, and domestic trip to Las Vegas - all trips originating from SFO with two being business trips). Required to stand at check-in counter for up to 1hr as agent makes a phone call to clear my boarding pass. Given SSSS screening on every leg of every trip. Detained at UK, CA, and US customs for further questioning lasting up to two hours each time. Full scans of my work issued laptop and mobile phone.</p> <p>It seems that every time I travel abroad, I am always singled out for additional screening, and the agent reviewing my passport needs someone else to authorize my re-entry. Plus, when ordering electronic components for work (I am an electrical engineer), I was informed by both Digi-Key and Mouser Electronics that they needed to verify my identity since I am "on a government watch list". I HAVE ONE OF THE MOST COMMON SPANISH FIRST &amp; LAST NAMES!!!!</p> <p>On the 28-01-14 I arrived at airport to check in with Caribbean airlines. The check in agent told me that she could not check me in and I needed to visit the American Embassy. I visited the Embassy the same day and was told that they were not sure why I was referred to them but their system shows my visa to be valid and I should be able to travel. I left straight for the airport, purchased a ticket With American Airlines and traveled that same evening to the US. When I walked off the plane there were two agents waiting and on checking our passports they told me and my wife that we were randomly selected for additional screening. I was taken to the first immigration officer where you would normally go if you came off a flight and the two officers waited with us while he processed our papers. He stamped our passports with the normal 6 month entry. An attempt was made by one of the officers accompanying us to stop the the passports from being stamped but was unsuccessful. They later scratched off with a pen my wifes initial stamp but left mines. They told us that we would still need to go through the secondary screening. We were taken to the room where our bags were checked we were interviewed. Our cash was taken out and counted. My wallet was run through and credit cards recorded. My phones, I pads etc were taken from us and carried to some other place and returned a few hours later when were eventually allowed to leave the airport. During that time I was asked for the pass codes to access all the devices.</p> <p>I am from Trinidad and Tobago. Based on my darker complexion and Islamic sounding name I believe I was being profiled. While I was flying from Korea to JFK airport New York, USA on January 15th, 2014, my boarding was delayed, and everyone on the plane was told to have our passports ready. When I came out, two customs officers at the gate were checking everyone from the flight. When I came up, they took my passport and green card and stopped checking everyone else, leading me to believe that I was the person specifically targeted. The officers escorted me into a room, where they took all of my phones, laptop, camera, and my bags. My luggage was searched in front of me, but my electronics were searched in another room. There was also a police detective present. They asked me where I was traveling to and from, which I told them. Then, they asked me if I had any contacts with overseas groups or terrorists, and if I knew any terrorists. Of course, I answered truthfully in the negative, even though I was offended by their implication that a Muslim man would know terrorists. Then, one of the officers, Officer [redacted] stated that I need to have my court papers with me, or they will not release me. He was referring to a past case in which I was falsely accused of grand theft, and proved my innocence in court. It appeared that they knew all the former details of that case. As I rightfully pointed out that I have done nothing wrong, and they cannot legally hold me, Officer [redacted] replied that they can, and send me to be fingerprinted. After detaining me for about four hours, I was let go. I feel that I was treated like a wanted criminal for no apparent reason, which is completely unwarranted, unjust, and discriminatory.</p> <p>I was asked why I did not book a return flight during processing as I stated my visit would last approx. 1 month. At the time no date has been set because I was unsure as to how much time I would actually be spending there. I stated that, at the time of booking, I didnt, myself, have the funds to have a return trip scheduled. However, I was able to book a return flight after being originally denied at the Border. The Inspecting Officer asked me several questions, such as if I had a job. I told him I was self-employed. I own a business, registered in Ontario and it was marked on my sheet that I am unemployed for some reason. As I currently live with my parents in Ontario, I do not have any bill statements. During secondary inspection, I was asked about the address in which I was visiting. Off the top of my head, I hadnt memorized it, but had it within my cell phone. Since the signs stated I wasnt allowed to use the device, I didnt bother asking. If I had of known the severity of the situation, such question would have been posed. After being denied once because I was believed to be an "intended Immigrant" I returned to the front desk and purchases a return pass for March 22nd and attempted to go through again. According to the sheet given, this is an article that would have proven OK to use. This was not the case. I have, the following aspects of the list, which were, perhaps not particularly articulated well at the time of inspection: Evidence of Employment (business owner), Cell Phone Bill, Return Flight, sufficient funds for trip, Contact Name, Address/Phone Number in which to be contact in the USA. As I do not carry my business ownership documents around with me, I was unable to clearly prove that I was going for a "visit". I feel this was wrong. I cleared stated I was a self-employed Game Developer at the clearance desk before being sent to secondary inspection.</p> <p>It has been more often that I go through a second screening when entering to the US in San Antonio Intl Airport (I fly most of the time). In 2011 I made a terrible mistake by making a very bad joke, while talking in Spanish, to the Aeromexico employee. He came to tag my baggage, I was eating a sandwich, then he asked (in Spanish) about electronics in my baggage and I said (smiling): "no, una bomba". Then I was reported and arrested. My case was dismissed. After this, my student VISA and OPT expired and I applied for a B1/B2 VISA. I got it for one year with a note saying "post verified charges cleared through TSA". I were screened a couple of times. Now that I have new VISA, for ten years, I am been screened more often.</p> <p>On September 29th 2013, I travelled with a colleague to Buffalo Airport NY from St. Catharines ON. The purpose of the trip was to visit a retailer our company does business with in Chicago, and so my colleague and I had a few consumer electronics samples with us for the presentation we were going to give the following day (clock radios, karaoke machines, toys). Upon reaching the border we were told that the samples we had with us should have been taken through the commercial lane, and that our documentation for these samples was not sufficient - that the incorrect form was used and that the products had to be permanently disfigured, or in non-working condition, in order to mark them as samples. Secondary screening of the vehicle took a few hours and was completely clean except for the electronic samples we had with us. Ultimately we were allowed to cross, but missed the flights we had scheduled due to the delay. Now, for the last 2-3 times Ive crossed the US/CDN border for shopping or dinners out, Im routinely subjected to a search of the vehicle, which is always clean. Id like help to prevent this from occurring every time I cross. Thank you.</p> <p>I frequently need to travel internationally for business purposes. Last year I applied for Global entry program and used it without any problem until December 2013. On December 2013, I got an email saying my Global entry was revoked and since then every time I enter the US I have been taken to an area where an officer ask for my computer and phone. I also need to go to second security search. CBP officials told me they cannot tell me why I am subject for additional search and suggested to review this web page. Please note that I have been working for US firm for more than 7 years, and my job description requires me to travel internationally -specially to Latin America. I have spent up to 4 hours waiting for the search process to be completed and this has become a very uncomfortable and very time consuming situation -plus the to travel internationally frequently. Kind regards, laptop I am carrying belongs to the company, so I need to inform them about every event, since I have customer sensitive information.</p>	<p>My wife and I have traveled to Mexico for the last 9 years and have never been detained or belongings searched until the last three times on 1/16/14, 11/16/13 and 5/9/13. I have never even looked at child porn, let alone handled it. We would like this situation cleared up.</p> <p>I work for Skype (now Microsoft) and have been traveling for business with them for the past 7 years (avg. of 6-8 trips per year) without any additional screenings or problems with check in. I started encountering this problem on my trip to the UK in December 2013. It was especially embarrassing while traveling with my family to Canada on a personal trip and my kids (8,6, and 3) were detained with me for over an hour to go through all the checks). Im hoping this process will resolve this issue for me once and for all. I have the a hobby making a short tourism trip to places around where I live on a weekend just for tourism. Occasionally the trip involves border crossing. I had a summer internship in Los Angeles, CA during summer 2012. And on one of the weekends, I decided to travel to the Mexican border town Tijuana for just tourism. I heard Tijuana is the most toured border town by Americans, and I would like to visit it myself when I got time just to experience a different culture. On this trip, I went alone, and I did not meet anyone while in Mexico. I came back to the United States fine as usual, but since this trip, every time I cross the border, I am referred to secondary inspection by the US Customs and Border Protection. The first time I am referred to secondary inspection occurs in December 2012. Back then I lived in New York City and I was attending Columbia University. After final exams, I joined a Chinese bus tour group to tour Niagara Falls and Toronto. When I came back from the rainbow bridge, the customs officer inspected me thoroughly and questioned about my trip to Tijuana. He even inspected my cell phone. The whole inspection takes about 30 minutes to an hour while others in the same tour group passed through without a problem. Then I have also been referred to secondary inspection back from a family trip to China with my mother in July 2013 at Los Angeles International Airport, as well as a business trip to Amsterdam at San Francisco International Airport in October 2013. This time I had a three-day weekend since there is no work on Friday for me. I am presently working and living in Chicago and I decided to tour the American motor city Detroit and learn about the history of car culture in America. I booked my stay in Windsor, Ontario for two reasons: 1. It is cheaper than staying in Detroit. 2. I would also love to visit Windsor as it is also a popular tourist destination by Americans. On Friday, after arriving in Detroit by Amtrak from Chicago, I took the tunnel bus to Windsor and checked in my stay at Days Inn. I then visited Windsor that afternoon and evening. On Saturday morning, I took the tunnel bus back to Detroit with the plan to visit the Henry Ford Museum and also go on their factory tour. I was selected for secondary inspection by a CBP officer for about 40 minutes before let go. On Saturday night, I headed back to my hotel in Windsor, and on Sunday morning, I took the 9:20 tunnel bus back to Detroit but this time I have been detained by the CBP for almost 4 hours. The CBP officer thoroughly checked everything I brought, including my cell phone and iPad (the officer asked me for the iPad password, and I gave it to her). She also questioned about my visit to Detroit-Windsor area as usual. As a result of this check, I missed my originally scheduled 11:20am train back to Chicago, and I have to buy a new ticket for \$80 to take the 6:23pm train. The 6:23pm train is also delayed for 2 hours, so I did not get back to Chicago until 1:30am Monday morning. This entire experience at the custom on Sunday morning is very frustrating. I am an honest American citizen with a passion for tourism around our great nation to learn about our history and culture. I dont get why I am stopped for secondary inspection by CBP every single time I cross the border after my trip to Tijuana. I have done no harm to our society, and have never participated in any criminal activity or have connections with any criminal organization. Also, the check for my cell phone and other electronic devices at border raises my privacy concern (especially when the officer asks me my iPad Password). I would appreciate if you can let me know why I am stopped for additional inspection every time and also make my border crossing experience more enjoyable in the future. I shouldnt have to spend 4 hours to cross the border and missed my train when I have done nothing wrong.

Dear Madam/Sir: Thank you for reviewing this appeal. I was traveling from Toronto to Boston for a project kick-off at a client in Andover, MA ( Draeger Medical Devices). As always, I was not able to check in online or by kiosk, so the Air Canada agent at the checkin counter had to make a phone call in order to check me in. I have always successfully obtained a US boarding pass this way. Today however, the agent got off the phone and told me I have been denied entry to the US. I was given no reason for the denial. I was told that I am already supposed to know that I am barred from entering the US. I do not recall ever receiving such a notice or being told by anyone. In fact, I just attended business meetings in New York (Feb 2-4 14 and Jan 20-22 14), shortly after having lived and worked in New York on my L1B (Sep-Dec 13). In Feb 14, I returned to live and work in Toronto on a renewed Canadian work permit. I am a frequent business traveler to the US after previously having lived in the US on security-cleared visas for school (Virginia Tech, Harvard) and work (ThoughtWorks) since 2001. I have no criminal record in any country (including USA), have never violated or overstayed my visa terms, and have never been denied entry to the US before this. I am always selected and cleared at secondary screening at YYZ and US airports. Some concerned immigration officers have also tried to explicitly remove me from the list because I repeatedly get sent to their office only to be cleared after exhaustive interrogation and screening. I would like to kindly request your careful consideration of this appeal as I need to travel to the US on a regular basis as part of being a member of ThoughtWorks North American leadership. I am willing and able to promptly provide any additional information to prove my innocence in the matter, in person or otherwise.

To whom it may concern, My husband and I went to Seattle outlet for shopping with our two other friends on Nov 23, 2013. We used the adjacent Pacific Highway (the Truck Crossing) for border crossing. It was a day trip, so when I left home that morning, I just grab some left over cash from my last trip to the US. I knew there were about 300 US dollars. One of our friends is holding Chinese passport, so he needed to go to see the officer to get his B2. So we all went inside with him. When one officer asked me how much money I had with me, I answered 300 US dollars. But when he looked through my wallet, he found 340 US dollars. He said I lied. I said that I didnt count the change. I have been crossing the US border for 14 years, I always gave the round amount of money that I had with me, there was never a problem. Then he started to ask my purpose for the trip, I replied: for outlet shopping, but he said that he didnt believe me because I lied about the money. Then he kept asking the same question again and again. I just gave him the same answer because that was the true answer. Then he looked through my husband and 2 other friends wallet, but didnt find anything illegal, then he let us go. On Feb 15, 2014, my husband and I drove down to LA to visit our daughter who is attending university there. We were planning to stay there for weeks so we brought a lot of stuff with us. When we crossed the same border, we got called inside the office again. Then we realized that our names were on the watch list. The officer who was on duty that day checked our money and asked questions, our car got searched outside the office at the same time. But they didnt find anything suspicious. And I told the offer about what happened last time when we across the border there, he said he was going to talked the other officer who was questioning us from last time. When we came back to our car, we saw all the luggage has opened and looked through, the interior of the car was full of the dog foot prints. We cleaned it up and started to drive to Portland for our first stop. But after we arrived hotel that night, I found my MacBook Air was not working properly. The suitcase with my laptop in was put underneath a heavy suitcase by the officer who did the inspection. Looked like my MacBook got compressed on the way. I was little bit mad and tried to have it fixed later. Because we were on the road trip, the communication was not convenient, we didnt contact the border to complain about this. On April 6, 2014, my friends invited me to go to the Tulip Festival in Skagit Valley with them. We used Peace Arch border for crossing. I was called inside again but nothing was found. I mentioned MacBook incident to the officer, he said I should talk to the supervisor of the Pacific Highway border. Thinking of I need to book an appointment, driving all the way to the border, it is very time consuming, I just gave up. On May 12, 2014, I was travelling to San Jose by myself. At the US border inside the Vancouver International Airport, I got called again. After I described what happened to me and my husband before, the officers who worked there gave me the information about DHS trip and asked me to issue the inquiry. I am not sure if my husband is on the watch list as well. Just for your reference, his name is: (b)(7) birthday: (b)(6) place of birth: Jinan, Shandong, China. Other contact information is the same as mine.

Our whole family loves your country, that is why we let our daughter go to US for university. We wont do anything that it is illegal or harmful to your country. Our daughter has just finished her 1st year university, she is our only child. In the next several years, my husband and I will be travelling a lot to US to visit her. All the repeatedly security check really gives us a lot of inconvenience. If I lied for a big amount of money, I would just accept it. But just for \$40 that I didnt intend to lie about, I feel this is just too much. I understand claiming the amount of money I am carrying with me is my obligation, I will try to count the exact amount of money in the future. Thank you so much for your attention! However, upon return from a recent international trip, my wife and I were listed as random Secondary Security Screening Selectees (SSSS) in Beijing, China on a United Airlines flight on our way back to Washington, DC. This meant that we were given extra scrutiny at the gate that was not afforded to white passengers. Upon arrival into the United States we proceeded to the Global Entry Kiosk where my entry was denied and I was instructed to report to secondary inspection. At the secondary inspection location, my pregnant wife and I were subject to long wait times only to be asked personal questions about our travel, similar to questions that would be asked during interrogation of a criminal suspect. Since that incident in March of this year, we have been subject to repeated selection for SSSS on JetBlue Airways and American Airlines even though the DHS has previously cleared us as trusted travelers. Our three instances of SSSS treatment in the past 60 days have included the destruction of the packaging of a gift for my nieces first birthday and the swabbing of every item in my possession, including my government issued laptop, HSPD- 12 PIV Card, and sensitive case files without any basis. Our selection for the random screening was so suspect that when I handed the TSA officer my HSPD-12 PIV Card, he was surprised that we were selected and even more surprised that we were familiar with the process as we had been selected three times in a row.

During a recent screening, the TSA employees at Dulles also took my ID and make photocopies of it and made disparaging remarks.

When I tried to check in online, I was denied and was advised that I had to check-in, in person. When I attempted to check in, the person at the Kiosk told me to stand by while they call my name in. After they called my name in, I almost didnt make my flight when the supervisor for Southwest Airlines assisted me and escorted me to the TSA check point. There I was handed off to a TSA supervisor with a beige suit and a badge. He escorted me under close eye to the check point where I was further asked to show my identification. I showed them my Retired US Navy military ID. The woman looked at it and then another man escorted me to the check point where I had to empty my pockets and laptop bag. After I did that, I was told to walk through the most violating machine ever where I had to stand there with my hands in the air. I wasnt given an option to be searched instead because after I left that machine, they searched me from head to toe. While they were searching me from head to toe, my military ID was taken away from me for someone else to copy it or something. I just noticed another person took my ID to copy some information down therefrom. While they were copying information from my identification, the TSA agent asked if I prefer to be searched in private or in public (in the open). I preferred in the open because of fear that I would be detained and miss my flight. After I was searched, the individual returned my identification after taking down any and all of my information. I was given my items and I caught my flight. Even after serving in the United States Military for 20+ years, Im treated like a terrorist! Really? <p>For the second time in the last nine months, on Apr 26, 2014, I was directed to secondary screening at the immigration control. The first time was on Sep 14, 2013 (MIA Intl Airport), on which I was explained that my passport and US visa have been reported as stolen. I explained to the official that it was an unfortunate mistake, since what actually happened was that both my wives and my sons passports had been stolen from my home in Santiago. I was the one that reported that robbery to the US Consulate in Santiago, Chile, but my passport was never stolen. Ironically, both my wife and my son, traveling with me at the time, were cleared from immigration without any issues (with their brand new passports and visas, of course), and I was the one under questioning. No explanations served well enough the immigration officer Mr. (b)(6) who decided to cancel my visa for allowing me to enter the United States and continue my vacation trip (I actually showed him the exchange of emails with the US Consulate in Santiago, that I still had on my laptop). Once back in Santiago, I had to go through the undeserved process of getting a new visa; the US Consulate confirmed me that they had wrongly included my passport and visa as stolen, along with those of my wife and son. The same situation took place again on Apr 26, 2014 (MIA Intl Airport): notwithstanding the fact that I was then holding a brand new visa, issued in October 2013, I had to go through the same nuisance, once again interrupting my vacation trip with my family for hours. I must say that this time the immigration officer at the secondary screening post was much nicer than on my first experience, and I have no complaints about his treatment. When I was about to leave I asked him if this was going to continue forever, and his comment was that very likely it would.</p>	<p>I am 54 years old, my business is construction and real estate. I have studied in the US under an F-1 Visa (1989-1992). I have worked in the US under an L-1 Visa (2002-2004). After a few background checks, I am always "cleared" and I am told - that it has something to do with my B1 VISA being cancelled which "marks" me for "secondary processing". ----- Background: Earlier - I held a 10-yr multiple entry B1 VISA (b)(6) which was issued on 17th April 2012. During my B1-Visa interview - I had stated that I had to attend a "2-weeks training program" at San Jose. However, later on - there were some changes in training plans + added some personal plans - and I ended up staying in U.S. for "7 weeks" on B1 Visa. Reasons were: 1. The training got postponed by 2 weeks - as some trainees from the clients Hong-Kong branch did not reach as per original schedule. 2. Duration of training was "extended by 2 weeks" - covering more areas than planned. (Also added a "case-study" - because we required special improvement in some areas). Please note - our company (PERSISTENT SYSTEMS INC) has strong work ethics and any such "change" in plans - had to be "approved" by a high position in management. I have the attached the mail communication as proof! - that- "extending planned dates" is not a common practice and done in the rarest of rare cases. At no - point - was I doing any "productive" or "assigned" - "work" - and was only learning and improving my understanding. I was also not "paid" for any "work". I was provided Hotel accommodation and a daily allowance (for food and transportation). Also - the last "8-9 days" were my "personal leaves". I had told my manager - well in advance - that whenever I visited US, I would take some "time-off" for sight-seeing and visiting my cousin sister in Boston; I adjusted my return-ticket dates accordingly. It was a pleasant surprise for my sister. I didnt think extending my stay for personal reasons would have any implications. Note: the I-94 date was 23rd Oct 2012 - 6 months. I returned in 7 weeks! ----- Incident during my H1B visa stamping interview at Mumbai (India) : During my H1B visa interview - the officer at the embassy - asked me why I had "over-stayed" on my B1 Visa. I felt the word "over-stayed" was a little harsh and came as a shock to a law abiding citizen like me - since I had returned to India after accommodating some professional and personal plans (well within the I-94 date) - but I respect his concern. I gave the reasons mentioned above. I could see that he wasnt convinced - so I explained a little more about my company and client and what I did there. FYI: My client company - specializes in Digital Video Broadcasting (hardware + software). The "broadcasting environment and devices" is "country specific" and so there was a lot to learn and explore as these things were rarely "accessible" in India. A specific question from the officer - which may have caused some confusion was - "what were you doing when your training had not started?" to which - I replied "Waiting! Trying things in the lab - which I normally wouldnt get to do in India; Understanding how devices are configured...". I honestly - believe he misunderstood the word "Waiting" with "Working". As a result - he cancelled my B1 Visa and entered some notes in the system along the lines - "The candidate admitted to have been "working!" -which is far from the truth!! Also - in that - same interview - He approved by H1B visa! - which seemed strange - but I did not question him (cancelling B1 and approving H1B in the same interview) ? I have played that interview many times in my head. The mis-communication on the word "waiting" vs "working" and the fact that I could not convince him well enough - caused such extreme steps (i.e cancelling my B1 visa and marking me for secondary processing). -----After getting by H1B visa approved, I have been working in San Jose on H1B since 9th Dec 2012 - and I have been to India several times. As a consequence of B1 Visa getting cancelled - I am sent for secondary processing every time. I always mention these details - along with stressing on the fact that "I was not "Working" on the B1 Visa". I have offered to show of the officers - my "6 month salary slips" - which prove that I was not being paid for any "assumed work" on B1 Visa and that in fact it was just a training cum a pleasure trip. (I have the ticket to Boston too!). I have almost started planning for the for the time delays caused by the secondary processing!! This time one of the officers suggested that I write to DHS to see if they can "unmark" me.</p>	<p>I have had an exciting and fruitful time in the U.S. so far. My other six return dates, all in 2014, are February 10th and 24th both from Kingston Jamaica on DL384; St Lucia to ATL on DL349; St Marten on April 27th and June 4th on DL328; Aruba to Atlanta on June 18th, this screening also resulted in me missing my flight and having to overnight again in Aruba and take the flight the following day on DL. On a few of my returns, especially those from Jamaica, which is home for me, I was asked if I am taking anything illegal back. I was taken aback that anyone would ask me such a question. I could only feel profiled with such a question. 	On April 16th I was approved as a Global Access and TSA Pre-check member, my PASSID is (b)(6). On the one flight where I wasn't initially assigned the 4 Ss, I gave the girl at the airline checkin my Global Access / TSA pre-approved PASSID number, she entered the number and the ticket came out with Secondary Security Screening Selection. I spoke with a TSA manager at the airport who said it was highly unusual for me to receive the 4 Ss and be a member of TSA-Precheck. I have been subjected to extra screening and unnecessary delays, to a degree far beyond the ordinary. I am a seasoned traveler who has made a living over the past 15 years traveling both within the US and abroad, I've never experienced this degree of scrutiny and feel I have been treated unfairly... especially because I went through the face to face interview required to obtain my GOES and Trusted Traveler designation. While traveling today I received the 4x Ss. During the screening process one of my electronic devices was unable to start up due to a low battery level. I was given two choices... surrender a \$450 iPad or leave the screening area and charge the pad. Ill be damed if you think Im going to hand over a iPad to some kid who cant get a job flipping burgers at McDonalds. So... I left the area, charged the device, and returned only to have some stranger feel my junk for the second time in twenty minutes. Its criminal the way I was treated today... Buying an airline ticket should not mean a total stranger gets to feel up my junk! Anyway, after the agent finished feeling me up, he suggested I keep the devices charged when I travel because "you should expect to be subject to this type of extra screening in the future." He didnt even look at the sponsor letter of my father or the bank statements. He twisted my words and made me sign a protocol and told me if I wouldnt sign this I would be banned and probably even go to jail. I was really scared and signed the paper. They cancelled my visa and two police officers led me away to the next plane. I felt like a criminal although I never did anything wrong. When I arrived in europe the stewardess gave me back my passport. That was the first time I saw the stamp "Cancelled with prejudice" on my cancelled visa. I have had SSSS printed on my boarding pass the past three times I flew. Additionally, I was unable to check in online or at a kiosk, and was asked to undergo additional security screening at the security checkpoint. The secondary screening first occurred when I was returning from a trip to Europe last month (countries visited: Turkey, Romania, Hungary, and Croatia, flying back to Washington through Frankfurt). At the Frankfurt airport I was given a full patdown twice and asked to turn on all of my electronics twice before reaching the gate, and was then called for additional document checks when boarding began. On a subsequent domestic trip to Atlanta to visit family, I also received additional screening and SSSS for the outbound and return flights. Before SSSS began appearing on my boarding pass, I had received TSA screening notices in my checked bags the past several times I checked a bag.

Most of my international travel to date has been work related: until June 2014 I worked for the U.S. State Department in the Office of the Global AIDS Coordinator. I traveled frequently for work (1-2 weeks per month), usually to Africa to work at U.S. Embassies on U.S.-funded HIV/AIDS treatment programs. Countries I visited on official business included Nigeria, Kenya, Ethiopia, Cameroon, and South Africa. Because I was a contractor, I traveled on my personal passport rather than official/diplomatic passport. I also flew to Atlanta frequently for meetings with the CDC. I also enjoy traveling internationally for tourism (I use the frequent flier miles accrued from my work travel and credit cards to travel as often as possible). It may also be worth noting that for my most recent international trip I was backpacking with friends, and booked two one-way tickets with United miles because of changes in our travel plans (Outbound Ticket: Washington to Istanbul, return ticket: Croatia to Washington via Frankfurt). Having SSSS on my board passes, subjecting me to secondary screening whenever I travel, has made my travel experience both difficult and humiliating. On several occasions my wife and I have been subjected to extensive and invasive questioning by TSA agents, and our personal belongings, including my laptop and smart phone, have been confiscated and searched. We find these tactics to be a deep invasion of our privacy. I understand the agencies goal for security, but I am in no way a threat and I am not comfortable with being treated like one every time I travel. Moreover, I believe TSAs targeting of me and my wife may be based on our race and religion, not for any justifiable suspicion of wrongdoing. Below are the instances in which the TSA has subjected me and my wife to unsavory delay: In January 2014, upon returning to SFO from visiting family in Iran, I was questioned for three to four hours about my contacts and family overseas. TSA agents took my belongings including backpack, wallet, flash drive and searched them, possibly copying the contents of it. I know this because when they were returned to me all items was misplaced. My wife experienced a similar four hour delay in February 2014. In April 2014, upon returning from a business trip in Germany, my point of entry into the United States was in Vancouver, Canada. I was questioned there over six to seven hours. I was asked extensively about my relationships and contacts overseas. Furthermore, TSA agents took my smart phone and business laptop and I believe made copies of their contents. Some of the items were taken from my possession for 6 hours. I DID NOT GIVE CONSENT FOR THESE ITEMS TO BE SEARCHED. Instead, a TSA agent handed me a card stating that he had the right to take and search my computer and other effects, then began doing so. These are just two of the recent incidents and there are more occasions when I or my wife traveled, we have been extensively questioned and delayed. I am very troubled by your agencies practices and request an explanation of why my wife and I are being put through such invasive and degrading screening processes. I plan on traveling to visit family and on business in the future, but I wish to do so without any hassle or delays as any other law-abiding U.S. resident would expect. I understand the agencies goal for security, but I am in no way a threat and I am not comfortable with being treated like one every time I travel. Furthermore, I would like to address any concern the TSA may have about me upfront and immediately to end this torment and save your agency the time and resources it wastes in doing so. It is very demeaning and degrading to feel as though I am being targeted because I am Muslim and not Caucasian. Thank you for your time and consideration into my TRIP Complaint.

On my last visit vacation to the USA a few years ago, when trying to check in for our return flight to the UK we were questioned by a TSA agent at JFK. He asked if I had an iPod in my suitcase to which I replied no, he then said "so you are telling me you dont have an iPod", I said yes I do, its in my hand luggage, to which he got very angry and started yelling at me saying I had lied to him about having an iPod. He then turned to my wife and asked if she had an iPod, she replied yes, he asked how many gigabytes it was, she said she didnt know as it was present, he asked "well how many songs does it have on it", she again replied that she didnt know, to which he accused her of being stupid for not knowing how many songs were on her iPod "how can you not know how many songs are on it, what are you stupid or something" (this sentence is still engrained in my memory to this day). I became extremely argumentative with him as whether or not we have iPods is irrelevant to us trying to check in for a flight, and who did he think he is accusing my wife of being stupid. The agent then took our passports, walked off and entered some info into his PC, then handed them to the check in agent. Had a quiet conversation with them, which was obviously funny as they both burst out laughing, then we were called forward and given boarding passes with four Ss drawn on them. At security we were asked to wait in a separate area to have all of our luggage searched. A formal complaint was logged at the time with the head purser on my Virgin Atlantic flight. Every time I have visited the USA since, whether entering from Canada via Car, or transiting through en-route to another country, I have been subjected to secondary security searches delaying my travel, and almost causing me to miss flights.

Since this incidence, and the experienced difficulty in passing through America since, we have vowed never to travel to your country again. Its just not worth the hassle, and I am not prepared for someone supposedly in authority, to speak to me wife in such a way. However, I unfortunately now find myself in the position where my employer has asked for me to assist in our business in America, and as I am currently the Canadian manager for our medical devices company, geographically it makes sense. As reluctant as I am to come back, it is something that I am being forced to do, so would ask that you kindly look into assisting me by having the Ss removed from my file, which were placed there as a result of a TSA agent on a power trip.

On April 18, 2014 I attempted to enter USA via Massena border (Cornwall, Ontario, Canada) to join this family gathering. I was with my wife and 3 young children. I usually enter USA via Alexandria Bay as I used to live in Ottawa, but in April 2014 I went to Massena border because I recently moved to Cornwall. At the border we were stopped and were taken inside the CBP office for further queries. We have almost always been stopped at the US border in previous visits for a considerable time, which have always been stressful. However, this time I was taken further inside a closed cell and I was kept there for more than 4 hours, separated from my family. This never happened to me before over the past 13 years during several visits to USA. After all the processing and questioning by the Department of Homeland Security officers, we were denied entry into the USA and my laptop and cell phone were also detained for forensic check. This kind of treatment with me and my equipment has never happened before and we have never been denied entry. My laptop and cell phone were returned after two weeks via CBSA (Canada Border Services Agency) and the officer told me on phone that everything was clear and nothing concerning was found. He further advised that we should choose a bigger border next time like Alexandria Bay as they are better equipped. On Oct 4, 2014 I intended to celebrate a religious festival with my mother, I went to the Alexandria Bay border with my family. As usual we were called inside the CBP office and then later I was put inside a room with my hands cuffed, separated from my family. Getting handcuffed without any reason really put a psychological and emotional strain on me (it never happened to me in my whole life). After almost 5 hours of this ordeal, we were again denied entry. Although the CBP officers and DHS officer (who came to interrogate) were all satisfied and were very positive that we will be permitted to enter the USA, they too were surprised when we were denied. They could not tell the reason for the denial, as everything was clear in my file and records.</p>	<p>My family and I are peaceful citizens of Canada. My children were born and are being raised here in Canada. I have done my PhD in Electrical Engineering and I am working in a hi-tech company in Ottawa (which is head quartered in USA) as a Network Diagnostic Engineer. My siblings and mother live in the US and are law abiding and peaceful citizens of USA. We never had any problem and have any records that could be of any concern. I like to visit my aging mother frequently because of her illness and age. I would like to request to please look into this matter and let me know the reason for denying us entry into the USA. We have traveled to USA several times over the past 13 years. Aug 2013 was the last time we were allowed and we had no problem at that point. Since April 2014 we have been denied twice. We would like to know what changed during this period, so that I can clear any concerns and remove any doubts and could be allowed to visit my family. 	<p>Dear Maam or Sir, I was subject to secondary screening during my entry on Nov 21 2014. The purpose of my visit was to spend Thanksgiving leave with my daughter, Lt. (b)(6) United States Marine Corps. I am a valid green card holder and permanent resident of the U.S. I was held for over 4 hours at the secondary screening. The secondary screening was caused when I pre-screened my green card at the point of entry kiosk, and received a printout with a big "x" across the entire sheet. When I proceeded to the entry counter, the receiving agent Officer (b)(6) sent me to the secondary screening after taking my photos and fingerprints, and receiving my customs form. In the secondary screening area, I was called to counter 12/13 and Officer (b)(6) look over processing. Right away my German passport was taken from me and when I inquired the whereabouts of my passport later, Officer (b)(6) initially denied knowledge or possession of said passport. Later I asked a second time, upon which I was told that someone was working on my case. Meanwhile my daughter, who was in the waiting area, was getting concerned as more than 2 hours had already elapsed. I was updating her via text message but was denied usage of my cell phone by a third officer by the name Officer (b)(6). Later I asked Officer (b)(6) who said of course I was allowed to use my phone. However, Officer (b)(6) returned and insisted I was not authorized to use my cellular device. At this point my daughter contacted TSA, who radioed CBP. She also asked 3 CPB agents, who were patrolling the airport, whether I was receiving water and access to a restroom, and Officer (b)(6) (female) went to find out whether my basic needs were guaranteed. At this point I asked to speak with a supervisor, and I was told he would come any minute. However, the supervisor never came, and instead a third investigating officer, Officer (b)(6) joined Officer (b)(6) at the counter. Soon after that the former commenced a brief interview. During the interview he entered the answers into a form. One of the questions was whether I had ever been arrested. I was also asked about my ex-husbands first and last name and date of birth. After another wait Officer (b)(6) returned my passport, and finally after about 4 hours my documents were returned, and without further explanation I was permitted entry into the U.S. My daughter was told that I had been in the secondary screening unit for the longest time out of all passengers that night. She inquired with TSA as it was nearing 0100 on Saturday morning of 22 Nov, and all other counters were closed. TSA radioed CBP and my daughter was told a supervisor would be available later to answer questions. After I was released my daughter insisted to be seen, and after Officer (b)(6) we finally got to speak with the supervisor, Major (b)(6) Citing privacy concerns and the nature of the investigation, he was unable to provide additional insights into how to improve my screening in the future. I am a 66 year old retired teacher of 40 years, and good citizen with no criminal records in any country at all. My daughter is a naturalized U.S. citizen, and has served in a government position protecting U.S. interests for more than 6 years. She is working to keep foreign persons or entities from harming the United States, and to protect those who serve its interest. It is in both her and my interest to identify the underlying issue that caused the secondary screening, so that I can be spared from such humiliating treatment and violation of my basic rights and freedom. This includes to identify and rule out any possible duplicate identities, underlying data errors such as finger prints issues or social security number errors. As a permanent resident, and with my daughter being the sponsor, the basis for the approval of my green card was the absence of a criminal record and good legal, financial and moral standing. My passport documents multiple entries and visa admission stamps to the U.S. prior to being a green card holder. Not once was I subject to such secondary screening procedures before. Instead of improving the admission at the point of entry, my status as a permanent resident has caused more screenings and delays. To whom it may concern, I have had approximately six instances of being put through secondary and or enhanced screening and I believe it is based on my being a Muslim. There could be no other reason. All of these events happened at San Francisco International Airport Terminal. Starting in December 2011 when I returned from a brief holiday to Cambodia and Malaysia is when this all began. At arriving at the customs and immigration line, the officer marked on my arrival card BC in red. I could guess that that meant Bag Check, so, no big deal. I have nothing to hide, and these officers are doing their job. After picking up my luggage I was shown to the luggage check questioning area. All the officers were professional and on opening my bag, they saw my Quran and prayer rug. "Ohhh, your a Muslim? Cool!" says the officer. Ok, no problem for me, everything is professional and courteous, but I find it odd how intently my belongings are checked including your dirty underwear! Haha, ok, fine. The officers ask for my California ID, and I see them intently entering information on their computer terminal. The whole episode lasts probably 30 minutes and I am on my way. Something tells me, this will be happening quite regularly now in the future. I have been traveling regularly to s.e. Asia since 2006. Usually twice a year. Originally I was going just for holiday as I really liked it there, and now I actually live most of the year there as an English teacher with my wife who is a teacher as well. I had a year of and a bit of saving up money until my next trip which was around March 23rd, departing from San Francisco of course (I have lived in the Bay area for many years) and going for ten days. At check in at the airport (EVA airways, I always fly with them) there was a bit of a delay as the ticket agent took my passport to somebody to look at, then came back and issued my ticket. On the ticket on the upper right was a series of SSSSSSS. I did not think anything of it, but now know it means Secondary Search: So, I go to the departure check and sure enough, I am told I will require secondary searching. The officers were COMPLETELY unprofessional. When they saw the SSSSS, one called out to another, "Got one!" somebody else said they were getting a free pizza. What the heck? Here are these officers slapping each other high five in front of me for doing there jobs??? And I am being put through secondary search. Great, ok, no problem, BUT, I know this is all related to my last trip and that I must be on some list now. I get the thorough secondary search and proceed to the gate. After boarding the plane and waiting for around 10 minutes, a group of stewardess approach me and tell me I need to gather my belongings and exit the aircraft. ???!!!! Ok, grab my stuff and exit, head up the ramp with a manger type, they tell me I need secondary screening. I told them I already went through that. They have to call DHS and have them come look at me and confirm that. I wait, nervous, embarrassed, you name it. The whole plane is waiting on me at this point and I am sure they will leave without me. The same DHS officers who searched me, come, see me, and say, "Yes, we already searched this guy". We then wait for a supervisor to come and sign off on that and I am allowed to board the aircraft again. Needless to say, everyone is staring at me and wondering what is going on. I go on my trip, and ten days later I return to SFO. I had met my now wife, but at that time fiancée in Indonesia on this trip. I exit the plane, go to the customs counter, the officer chats with me normally, then get quiet on looking at his screen, marks something on my card and makes a phone call. An officer comes and collects me and takes me to some strange waiting room type place that has several people waiting in it. Great, here we go I think. But I am staying calm and collected. An officer comes and gets me and says lets go get your luggage. I am then taken to the same secondary bag check screening that I went to on my last trip. The whole questioning begins again, but now it is very invasive. I get asked continuously, so, how much money are you travelling with? Really, I got asked it like every ten minutes over the course of two hours. I mean really! I had 50 bucks cash, my debit card, and a pack of cigarettes, and the outcome didnt change the more they asked! At one point, an officer is too my right going through my bag, and officer on my left has my wallet. I then see the officer on my left has taken out a photo of my fiancée she had given me and wrote to me a very personal and heartfelt message on the back. The officer is reading the message and writing down something on his glove he is wearing using it like a notepad. At this point I become very angry and yell, WHAT ARE YOU DOING and take the photo from him. I demand to

see what he had written on his glove. He says it is all routine and that it will help me in the future when we get married and I want to bring her to the USA. Absolutely ridiculous. Then my phone and laptop are taken somewhere and I am just forced to stand there. The entire episode takes around 2 hours while my family member who is picking me up is worried sick and just circling the airport this entire time. June 24th 2013 I am leaving again to go and get married and start my life overseas. Check in like normal, OF COURSE have the SSSSSSS on my ticket and go through the intense secondary screening on departure. Thankfully I am not yanked off the plane this time. So these are my events. On the horrible two hour episode, I asked the officers why this was happening? They would not really answer me. I told them that I know this was because I was a Muslim, there could be no other reason. I have also now had problems here in Cambodia when trying to add pages to my passport and ALSO had my wife rejected for a non immigrant tourist visa (so she could meet my mother!) twice! I mean really, come one! I am an English teacher who HAPPENS to be Muslim. I have nothing to hide and even told the embassy staff if they had anybody that wanted to ask me questions about anything, they could freely do so.

I was escorted by an officer while retrieving my luggage. Thereafter, I was interrogated while the officer searched through my entire luggage. Among the questions were, Who are all your friends there in Cairo? what mosque do you go to? Who is you mentor you follow there? How many times do you pray a day? Why did you go to Mecca for so long? What do you think about when you are at the mosque in Mecca for all that time? I ascertained from his line of questioning that he was assessing my level of religiosity. Unfortunately, I did not record his name 06/18/2014 LAX I returned back home after final exams at Cairos Azhar University and was met by 2 officers at the plane who held the entire plane up until I exited. They escorted me to my luggage and took me behind a door to a secluded area. My laptop and phone were asked for and I permitted the agents to look at them. They were taken to another room with some of my books for about an hour. The questions were more general this time. After the officers were finished, I was escorted to a room where ICE agent Daniel Rocha was seated. I noticed I had been added to the SSSS list for an extensive security search.

I would like to know why I am being held for extensive searching. I am an academic working towards a PhD and my research requires frequent travel. Although I had traveled to Syria in the past for education, I have no further intent to ever go back there. I am involved at the communal level in my area as a religious scholar and work as a lecturer at the Institute Of Knowledge Seminary locally.

Could not check in online for either portion of my flight to Jamaica on 12/6/2014 or 12/13/2014. Pulled for additional screening on 12/6/2014 in Indianapolis Indiana. In the Jamaica airport on 12/13/2014 pulled for additional screening in a closed room while trying to get through security. After clearing customs in Baltimore (coming from Jamaica,) and trying to reenter security to get out our next flight to the Indianapolis airport, I was pulled for "additional screening" which included a full-body pat-down including touching the sides of my breasts, removal of items from my carry-ons, and checking of all items with the swab for explosive devices. This is clearly not random screening and indeed the TSA agent in Baltimore recommended I file a complaint/inquire for redress.

Wrong information: When I had initially applied for U.S Visa, I had given the reason that my brother Late (b)(6) was getting married in U.S and had submitted his wedding invitation also, but it has been wrongly entered by the officials of U.S embassy in Chennai that my sister was getting married. I came to know about this only when I was questioned by the CBP in Philadelphia on 8th Dec 2014. a) When I visited U.S in the year 2011, 2012 & 2013 I had no problem at all. b) My sister (b)(6) had filled in my U.S visa application who lives in Germany and she got married in the year 1997. c) My parents (b)(6) and (b)(6) had also applied for U.S Visa for the same reason. 2. Working in U.S: They also charged me on the context that I worked in the U.S in 2012 as I had Sams Club card and Bank of America card. a) Sams club card was offered to me by the members in Sams club so I bought it, to purchase electronics. b) I opened an account in Bank of America as I was finding it difficult to carry the dollars everywhere and as I had to travel to other places I needed to book tickets online, etc. 3. Reason for Travelling: The main reason of me travelling to U.S now was that my brothers second sons birthday is falling on 5th January 2015 ( For your kind information my brother (b)(6) passed away last year in Washington). a) As my parents are almost 67 years old and cannot travel and my sister lives in Germany ( she has three Children) so I am the only one who needs to travel abroad to visit my brothers kids on behalf of everyone in the family. b) I had accumulated all my holidays for this reason of being with the kids. Its almost a year and half since my brother passed away and we have not seen the children, infact I have not seen the second child till now. 4. About me: My parents have their own house here in Chennai. I also have a own house in Chennai on my wifes name. I am well settled as a P.R.O in Aasife and Brothers Briyani Centre. My wife is the Coordinator of CPS Global school and my kids (Two) are in good school here getting excellent education. So there is NO NEED for me to work there in U.S. 5. Incident at Philadelphia immigration: This time when I landed in Philadelphia airport I got a 6 months permit. But later on the CBP officer deported me on the above mentioned context. a) Also want to inform you that when the officer was questioning me, I was half asleep, but I have given all the information correct up to my knowledge. b) But at the later stage of questioning, the officer asked me too many questions which confused me and he asked me some questions for which I replied "No" but the only thing he kept on asking me was " Do you understand the question" for which I replied "Yes, I can understand" ( meaning I understood his questions) but my answers to those questions were "No". So my Yes was to state that I understood the questions. Later when I received the papers about our conversation for signing I saw that the questions for which I said No was written as Yes and later the CBP officer told me Good Luck . your flight is waiting for you to return after which I was deported and within 5- 10 min I boarded the flight. While having the conversation with the officer my luggage were sent to the flight for return. 6. Request :The main reason for me writing this letter to you is to inform you about the problem that I went through because of a fault of someone. I request you to kindly rectify this mistake and help me come out of this issue as soon as possible as I need to be present during the kids birthday, at least for my late brothers sake. On a recent thanksgiving cruise with my family to Mexico, I purchased medication (using USA prescription carried at all times) and upon returning to the ship, I handed the medication to the cruise security officer (as requested per rules). Once in Long Beach, I was questioned by CBP who approached and advised I could not purchase and bring medication from outside the US, which I had no idea and learned that day. This was the first time I had purchased medication overseas (only due to cost compare to US). I complied with the cruise rules and handed the medication to the cruise security officer before even leaving Mexico and never tried to hide it from authorities, since I was completely unaware of the issue. I suffer from degenerative disk disease on my back (L4 and L5-S1) and have been fighting my health problems for over 3 years and I am on pain medication 24 hours a day, so I can have a normal life. In addition to my back, I also have a tear on my annular cartilage (pelvis), which also results in excruciating pain when walking or even sleeping at night. Upon my return to the US (Long Beach) I was taken to the CBP office and asked several questions, the officer advised he had to call my pharmacy to verify the legitimacy of my daily usage of pain medication. In addition to my degenerative disk problems, I was also diagnosed with adult ADD because of my difficulty in concentrating with work, which I am prescribed medication as well. I am prescribed 2-3 tablets of Percocet for my pain on a daily basis and 1-2 tablets of Adderall monthly and the officer confirmed with my pharmacy I actually purchase all medication in the US and my answers were validated. My pharmacy not only verified my medication ordered every month and also provided a copy of the prescriptions to the CBP officer who then release me and gave me an administrative fee (which has already been paid). I have several additional comments but the filed does not let me add much more. I would love to share the rest of the incident.</p>	<p>I have several documents proving my health situation described above. In addition to doctors letters, physical therapy sections, chiropractors, over 4 MRIs in the past 3 years (including the CD disk from the doctor) and everything to prove I am legitimate taking the medication so I can live a normal life without pain. I am happy to share ALL these documents as well as my pharmacy contact so you can refer to them and confirm my use of all the medications described above and to prove my words. I would never put myself in a difficult situation had I known I could not purchase medication overseas and bring to the US. I learned from the officer the reason is because these are not FDA approved, which make total sense. I am a citizen without any previous arrests or infringement against the law. In addition, I had Global Entry status, which I proudly applied and was given because of my high level of trust with my country. Please review and request any additional documentation so I can have my name and reputation cleared from any unfortunate mishaps. Again, I had no idea this was not permissible and am embarrassed for myself and my family, but I didnt have any intentions to lie or hide my actions from the US CBP or the US laws. Again, I handed the medication to the ship security after coming on board not knowing this was not allowed, and fully complying with the cruise line rules and CBP rules. Not even on your web site is this stated. Officer (b)(6) in Orlando, FL when I told him I was not answering any questions as per my 5th amendment rights got very abrupt and indignant with me, he then proceeded to tell me to go sit and wait while they make a decision. It was then that I cooperated because I had been on an 11 hour flight still waiting for the connection to Miami. Then I kept asking how long this would take and never received an answer. I was detained for close to an hour while passengers sat on the plane waiting for me to board. This is inexcusable. I told everyone on the plane to contact their Congressman, as I am doing also, to inform them that they sat on a plane for over an hour while waiting for me to clear customs. I never had problems before until I gladly payed the \$100 fee for the luxury of being detained for a misdemeanor that occurred over 12 yrs ago. Is this how you treat an AMERICAN citizen? I feel this is an abuse of power by your agency and have written to the ACLU also am in the process of writing my Congressman Patrick Murphy &amp; Sen Marco Rubio regarding this matter. Feels like I am being put in double jeopardy. The officer asked me to turn on my computer , then my tablet and last my phone and show him my photographs ( which I believe is ) not in standing with my 4th amendment rights. When I was stopped in Ft Lauderdale last month the officer that stopped me told me I was probably gonna be stopped every time. Now how unfair is that. Please get me off your list I travel all the time now and dont look forward to returning to my country because of your wanton disregard for my civil rights. Ft Lauderdale, a tabacco pipe I had paid 60 dollars for was blatantly thrown out as contraband. Never was I given a receipt, also neither of the 2 airports had any signage as to how long this process would take. The thing that bothers me is that the officer in Orlando was asking me about computer crimes, I dont know if thats a note left from Ft. Lauderdale or not but computer crimes never in my life. As of 2nd May 2014, I started to be repeatedly referred for secondary screening when clearing U.S. Customs and Border Protection; at either arriving or leaving the country. At the first time, I attended a computer science conference (ACM CHI) at Toronto, Canada 27th April-2nd May 2014. When I was returning to US, a CBP officer asked me to go with him for secondary screening. They interrogated me and then investigated my luggage. While this might be considered as a regular screening process, I felt my privacy has been violated as the officer without my permission took my cellphone starting to check my information. When I told him that I have some photos that because of my religion, he is not supposed to see but just a woman can see, without asking a woman officer to do that, he just said "law is above religion." I believe that was not really a respectable behavior any person should receive regarding any gender, religion or nationality. In addition, when the screening process ended and they gave back my documents, I found out that they forgot to return me my I-20, the most important document for an international student after passport during their residence in US. I had to come back to CBP office that meant passing all the regular security points again and after I got there and I asked for my I20, they handed it without even an apology! If my flight had not a delay, I would have missed my flight. This behavior of CBP officers at Toronto border was really far from respectable behavior they should have. The next secondary screening I had was at 8th Nov 2014, at Chicago OHare airport when I was leaving US to Barcelona for another computer science conference (Socinfo) and then visiting my family during thanksgiving in Iran. This time I was investigated just before boarding just before entering the airplane door, when I already passed all the security checkpoints! Even this time the officer treated me good and I'm thankful of their behavior, but that was an inappropriate place to screen a passenger; particularly when all the other passengers were passing to enter the airplane and they saw me was screening. I believe this is a violation of privacy and it really made me feeling discomfort during my flight. The third secondary screening was 5th Dec 2014, at Chicago OHare airport when I was coming back from my trip mentioned above. This time there were two officers standing outside the airplane and when passengers stepped out the airplane, they checked their passport and when it was my turn, they asked me to follow them to a secondary screening place. They asked my electronic devices and also get my fingerprints. Finally, they checked all my baggage. When I asked them if there was a problem, they told me its a random check and I dont need to be worry. However, to me it was more than a random or regular check since it was the third time it happened to me. Since I'm a PhD student, I publish scientific papers in computer science conferences and I need to present them in those conferences. So, I will have more international travels during the upcoming years of my PhD and it would be a trouble for me if each time I'm leaving or entering United States, I needed to be checked in this way; particularly as this screening already violated my privacy and discriminated me against on the basis of my race and religion. This time we were stopped at the U.S. pre-clearance at Toronto Pearson Intl Airport, photographed and fingerprinted twice (including my 12 year old son). Our luggage and wallets/purses was searched and our electronics taken, including my childrens iPads. I was questioned, generic questions like where do you live and for how long? Where do you work and for how long? What was the purpose of your visit to Qatar and Dubai in the summer? (We had visited my brother-in-laws family and my mother. I worked a few Emergency shifts in Qatar to offset the cost of the trip). Have you worked with Doctors without Borders? No. He even made a comment about how his brother was an Emergency Room nurse and how crazy emergency can get, to which I concurred. After around 3 hours I was taken into a room with 3 officers and told we were not being allowed to continue our travel because the officer "was not confident we would return to Canada". I was also told to contact the U.S. Consulate in Toronto but was provided no further information on who to contact and what to say. I was asked to sign a paper saying that I withdrew my application for entry but wasnt provided an explanation why I should do so. I wasnt comfortable signing the paper without knowing its contents and consequences, so I enquired "what happens if I refuse to sign?" to which the officer swiftly answered "you just did, and youre not getting any copies of these papers", without providing any further explanation before or after. We are at a complete loss. I am sure there must be some misunderstanding. The last time we were in the U.S. was in April 2014 where I went to write the American Board Exam in Emergency Medicine (ABEM) and took my family along for a road trip. I am wondering if that visit was interpreted as a future intent to stay and work in the U.S. I have absolutely no intention to do so, as I have a full time job that pays well. I make more money in Canada than I would in the U.S. I have recently started my own clinic, I own property here and I have multiple family ties. I have numerous qualifications from several countries, the ABEM was the most recent. I was able to write this exam as my Canadian training is recognized for that purpose. Further to this, the CBP still have all our electronics, including my laptop, iPhone, my daughters laptop and my childrens iPads as mentioned. I have tried contacting the CBP at the number provided several times, but no answer, last time was today. I have left them voicemails to enquire about the status of our belongings, but have received no reply. It is essential for me to have this information in order to avoid refusal of entry in the future and be eligible for the visa waiver program again. Demanding that I obtain a visa in order to visit seems an inappropriate burden based on the sole fact I had some old checks in my possession. On February 22/2015 I flew from Munich, Germany to Logan airport, Boston, USA with a return ticket for a planned three week trip to visit friends in Boston; name of friends (b)(6) address (b)(6) (b)(6) The discrimination started at Munich airport. On this occasion, as every occasion my family and I have traveled to the US, I got SSSS on my boarding pass. And couldnt print my boarding pass at home or check in a day before the flight. Because of the SSSS on my boarding pass I had to be repeatedly screened at Munich airport, which made me feel like a criminal, and then after all the screening at Munich airport CBP officers at Logan airport, Boston treated me badly and refused me admission to the US. The experience was humiliating and expensive. Immediately after disembarking in Boston the CBS officers took me to be searched they treated me very very badly with no courtesy or respect for my civil rights, or my personal belongings. I was treated like a criminal without a charge. I tried to ask what was wrong but they did not give me any answers. I can only assume that the lack of respect with which I was treated was based on my name and appearance. They took me from one room to the other where they gave me a pat down search. During this process I was very cooperative and did everything they asked and told me to do. They took my laptop and my two cell phones to be checked without giving me any document recording what they had taken. They returned only one cell phone and the laptop. When I asked one officer where my other cell phone was he said it was in the laptop case but when I told him that it was not in the case he said that he did not know where it was. My laptop now contains files consistent with forced and un-consented of my files. I have no idea whether anything was seized, copied, or damaged as a result of this intrusion. At the end of my statement I was orally informed that they could not ascertain the basis for my visit, despite my information substantiating same. I had a return ticket, a family, and business in Germany to return to. There was absolutely no basis for a finding of immigrant intent. I trust that the treatment I received does not comply with US regulations of entry to non-citizens and would like a written statement explaining why I was refused entry and why my name has been removed from the visa waiver program so that I can comply with entry requirements in the future. It is especially important that my case is reviewed so that my name is removed from any watch list and I can take part in the visa waiver program again. Thank you. Yours faithfully (b)(6)

Several incidents have led up to this request. In February 2014, I attempted to enter the US in Houston (IAH). When I entered my passport info into the automated system prior to speaking to an immigrations agent, the automated system printed out a document with a large X. I was then redirected to an office, where I waited behind several other individuals before being questioned by an agent. Family and friends had driven a long distance to pick me up, and they, of course, had to wait a long time while I was delayed. A similar situation occurred in February 2015 when I entered the US in LAX. These have just been the issues occurring while entering the country. At LAX, when I went to get my domestic boarding pass, I was given a boarding pass with SSSS written on it. This resulted in additional screening (e.g., pat down) at security. I was also requested to turn on my electronic equipment. This was a problem because, after approximately 15 hours of flying to Los Angeles, the battery on my laptop had run out. So, I had to be escorted out of security, charge my laptop, and go through security again. Just a couple of days later, I went through a similar screening in Seattle. And then, just a couple of days after that, I went through yet another screening again at LAX. So, within a 10-day span, I had issues entering the country and 3 additional security screenings.

I was detained by CBP officers around 1:35 pm, when I was crossing the border by Otay Mesa using the Senti Lane. I was the passenger. After the officer told the driver to open the trunk and turn off the vehicle, three officers opened my door and handcuffed me, they took me into an office were they searched me, grabbed my belongings. They took my finger prints and photos, not even at that point I was not told why I was detained. Then they put me in a small isolated room, that is when the officers told me for the first time that I was detained, because the car where I was the passenger had drug in the trunk. A couple of hours later, two detectives came in the room and took me to another room for interrogation; I explained them how my day was. I was traveling with a co worker to visit a customer of our company in Tijuana, every Wednesday I travel with my co worker to see customers in Mexico, so when we were going back to US last Wednesday we were detained. I was not aware of the content of the trunk, I facilitate all information to detectives, even my record of calls and text messages from my cell phone, and laptop information to help them to complete the investigation and prove my innocence that I am no involved in any illegal activity. They took me back and into the isolated room, and around 8 pm they came in again and told me I am free of charge, that my innocence has been proven, and the officers were about finish all paper work, that they will release me soon. Later on, an officer took me to the front desk and we were there waiting for the paper work until 3:30 am, almost 8 hours had passed since I was told that I am free of charge and I was good to go. It was 3:30 am when the officers returned me my belongings, they told me my Senti was revoked for life. I asked them for a written resolution about the incident, to have a written proof that I am free of charge, and the officer denied me to give me any physical paper that I am free of charge, there is where my main concern stars. Two days after I crossed the border again with no problem, but the second time after the incident that I crossed I was sent to secondary inspection, when I asked for a reason they told me that from now every time that I cross the border I will be sent to secondary inspection.

When I arrived to the SFO, the first CBS officer did some clearing process, finger print and took my picture and told me that you should go to the back office, officers in back office ask me a lot of questions, question regarding to my wife my children and so on, and I answered them all, then CBS officer took my laptop and cell phone and said they need to be screened for some reason and I was asked to be wait for few minutes( short time) but it take more than an hour and it was so more than I expect, during the screening I got so stress which nerves me a lot. There were no files and documents in my laptop and cell phone and nobody answer me why it take a long time.

On Jan 12th, 2014 and on August 13th, 2014 I was arriving from Shanghai to Seattle, then on to Minneapolis. Both times I got detained when I was traveling from Seattle to Minneapolis. They put me in a waiting room with other people, I couldnt use electronics. The first time I was detained was for 1 hour, the second time was 2-3 hours. Both times I didnt know why this happened.

I am a government contractor, working for Leidos Company and I travel for business all the time. During my last four trips I was pulled into secondary every single time and during my most recent trip I was searched twice, asked to check-in my laptop, cell phone and iPod and travel internationally without any mean of communication. Every time I traveled internationally for almost a year now I have been receiving the "SSSS" code on my boarding passes. I ask for your assistance to investigate this matter and take the needed action. I look forward for an updated status from your respected office. Thanks. (b)(6)

1- I had to call the airport after I got back home in order to recover my Closed cellphone, which was kept from me for no reasons. 2- I feel that the CBP officers have treated me very badly and unfairly refused me an entry into the United States for no reasons. My family and I have never overstayed at anytime we traveled to the US. And therefore I ask you please fairly to review my case, and to clear my name from any watch list, and that I be allowed to use the visa waiver program again.

I applied to the United Nation in Jordan and my case was transferred for resettlement to USA, I was very happy as I was dreaming to live in USA and becoming part of this great nation. I arrived in Houston, Texas in 2010 and I was not very successful there, I moved to Maine and started to work as medical interpreter to support my family and their needs, as I am near Canada I traveled for leisure time sometimes with my friends and sometimes alone, when I was traveling there was no problem at all till one time I was traveling alone in the winter of 2014 and the CBP officers stopped me for questions and it was lengthy procedure, I asked for any documentation or if there is any reason for that lengthy procedure and they said they cannot provide me with any. When I returned home I applied for redress program and they provided me with redress number and I contacted the congressional office in my city and they helped in contacting an officials to ask about my case, I went to Canada and on the way back I was handcuffed by the CBP officers for 5-6 hours and they also did not tell me why, at that time they treat me like I am not in the great land of free men, I know the world is crazy and bad people are trying to harm our nation, which I consider my self-part of it, but I am one of the good guys, so I went back home and applied for Nexus program and then I got denied and the reason was not clear so I contacted the CBP and explain to them my concerns yet they said they cannot help I felt depressed and lost so I called the FBI office in Boston and I told them my story and offered them that I can be subjected to any interview but not to make me like this when I travel they said they will touch base with me, so it was left there till I had to go to Iraq on June 7th to visit my Mom who was sick, I contacted the congressional office at that time and explained that I had to and if there is any measures or agencies that I have to inform, I went there and I came back home on the 16th of the same month when I came back the CBP officer questioned me for one to two hours and then confiscated my laptop and iPhone and iPad which were returned to me in 3 weeks by two federal officers. After that me and my wife and my kids travelled to Canada for the new year evening of 2014-2015 on the way back the CBP also subjected me to lengthy questions also not clear why. Officer [REDACTED] grabbed me and shoved me through a door slamming me against a wall and handcuffing me, breaking my glasses. After this he put me in a detention cell and cuffed me to a bench. I banged on the wall hoping to get someone elses attention, I did a hole group lead by officer [REDACTED] I asked why I am being held and that I needed an attorney I was told I do not deserve and attorney and was not required an explanation they all left. A few of them kept grabbing my penis asking if I liked it. They handcuffed me to the bench and refused me to see a Doctor. On top of that, another tie would be my return flight, which I booked at the same time as my entry flight, as well as my family members. I am, and was well aware at the time of entry, that staying beyond the allowed stay is illegal and such actions will get me permanently barred from entering the U.S. again. Staying over my allocated time would have meant that I could possibly never see her again, which would be an inhumane thing to do. I told the officer that this is becoming a pattern since I was also stopped on October 5, 2014 in the similar manner when I returned back to Seattle after a trip to India. The officer then suggested that I go to the DHS.gov/trip website and file my experience and seek redress.	I am filing this report because I faced same situation two times in a row. First time, on Oct 5, 2014 when the machine at the Seattle airport immigration did not clear me and I was referred to an officer. the officer then called another officer who took me to a separate section and then cleared me after just a couple of questions. Next, I was stopped at the customs exit point and then my bags were thoroughly checked including all papers in my laptop bag and any notes written on my notepad. I felt it was one of those random checks since I had not faced this issue earlier whenever I returned home after international travel. When a similar incident happened in my very next international trip (on May 4, 2015), I thought it is best to use DHS trip to file my incident and seek redress. In this process not only my physical luggage is searched my equipment such as my phones, ipad and laptop have been confiscated and kept for hours. Also on a recent trip I was asked to give my ipad, iphone and itunes password. In another occasion I was questioned about a certain person who went to school with me in Qatar, I gave all the information regarding that individual to the officers. I also had received an email from that individual several years ago that I forwarded to a homeland security officer. I also informed that officer that I do not agree with content of the email or the views of that individual. I also made a commitment that if I am ever contacted by the individual in question I will reach out to Homeland Security as soon as possible. Lastly I would like this issue resolved because i have had several occasions where this extensive search has led to several financial and schedule issues. - I have missed my connection once, due to longer search procedures. - I have missed a bus ride which led to me paying for a hotel night for my self and students who I was chaperoning in New York City. - Almost missed my connection in Atlanta - Have kept family and friends waiting due to longer questioning - My students who travel with me have been questioned while entering and leaving the country These are some examples of situations that I have encountered. In Dec 2010 I travelled to the US for two months under the VWP (Visa Waiver Program). I undertook some training on behalf of my employer in the UK for which I did not receive any payment in the USA except for subsistence expenses (hotel, meals, transport etc). I delivered the training - both field- and classroom-based - to a company in the USA which is a partner of my employer in the UK. I have at times been in a relationship with someone in the States, and have come over a few times to visit. I have never stayed longer than 90 days, or had any paid work, problems or issues. All trips were for vacation only. In 2011 I tried to enter the US to visit my partner for a few weeks. I was detained at the border in Detroit by the TSA and questioned over a period of several hours. My laptop and phone were searched without my permission, and the agent demanded my Facebook password, stating "You have to give it to me. I was repeatedly brought to tears by accusations and statements against my character. Eventually my application to enter was denied and I was returned to the UK. I have not tried to come back to the States, and my relationship with that person has ceased. The main issue seemed to be that I had undertaken the training in 2010. After a barrage of questions and accusations I was asked to state that I had taken paid work, but this was not worded clearly and I feel that I was misled. I explained what had happened in 2010 with the training, and was told "what you did is what this is, sign here to state that you undertook that activity". To stress, that information was false. I did not work in the USA. I was young, scared, denied any contact with my family (or legal representation), and held for hours without food in a cold airport detention area while TSA agents alternately left me for hours without information or made accusatory and unfounded statements. My partner was contacted by phone, and questioned in an extremely misleading manner. I had mentioned to her previously that while in the States I may research potential job offers, and if work seemed to be available, I would apply for an Immigration VISA and go through the official channels. There was no contact with any US companies at the time, and no intent to do anything illegal or to work without the proper VISA. My partner mentioned this to the TSA agent in good faith. She (my partner) told me that the agent reassured her that my intentions were legal, but once he obtained her statement he told me that I was entering the US to work and that I was now denied entry. The TSA demanded my Facebook password and searched my entire message history, and I could point out messages to the effect that I was only planning a trip (and no message in my email, phone or Facebook that pointed to me having any other intention). This was ignored. A different (more calm) TSA agent told me that in his opinion I hadn't done anything wrong, and once I explained the situation he told me that I would be best off withdrawing my application to the States, contacting the relevant Embassy/Authorities and explaining what had transpired. He reassured me that the chances of a reinstatement were high. To be honest, the experience was traumatic. Despite the reassurances from the calmer agent, I broke off the relationship, abandoned plans to challenge what had happened and continued with life in the UK. I do not have an application number, incident report or report number. However, the company I work for in permanent, full-time employment (UK) has now asked that I apply for a reinstatement of the VWP, or for a casual business visa, as our clients in the US (The Walt Disney Company) will need me to travel there for very occasional business meetings. I am currently the CEO and Director of Lagimed Corporation, a large medical device manufacturing and distribution company in Vietnam. Lagimed is headquartered in Ho Chi Minh City with a branch office in Hanoi and between the two offices, distributes a large variety of medical devices both national and internationally. On 8/12/14, I was issued an M class visa that expires on 8/10/2015. In 9/5/14, I traveled to the U.S. to explore investment options for my corporation. Under this visit, I was allowed to stay until 3/5/15. On 1/28/15, PRIOR to my visa expiring, I filed for an extension of my status because I had additional investment opportunities to review. This application is still pending. On 6/7/2015, I traveled back to Vietnam to handle issues related to my corporation. On 6/20/2015, I was denied entry into the U.S. based upon my overstay despite the pending application for extension of status.

When a visitor applies for an extension of stay BEFORE his visa expires, he will not accrue unlawful presence while the application is pending. Unlawful presence only accrues AFTER notice is issued that the I-539 application has been denied. In this case, the application was pending. (b)(6) left BEFORE it was adjudicated and therefore is NOT subject to the 3 year bar because he has not accrued any unlawful presence and had a visa that was still valid until 08/10/2015. Therefore, there should not have been a denial of his entry into the United States.

Last May 27th, I boarded a flight from Manila to Denver with Layovers in Tokyo and LAX. When I landed at LaX, immigration counter 35 officer, asked about my return ticket which I do not have since I am not sure if I am leaving from Canada, Mexico and the USA. I know I have less than 90 days for this trip, too, if I travel within the USA. The officer asked when my last trip to the USA was and I left the USA just a couple of weeks to indulge my mother for her birthday and Mothers Day. I was supposed to be in Canada to see family and friends and another friend is going home to Utah from Germany I could meet before I go somewhere else. Anyway, for a country so big, with so many places to see and things to do, less than 90 days is pretty short, not to mention if ur driving and visiting as many cities and states as I can. But the officer said he would send me to another officer, and this 2nd officer, made me wait until I missed my flight to Denver. He accused me of working illegally teaching zumba and he insisted I have to get out of the western hemisphere if I want to go back to the USA. I know I did nothing wrong and I did not break any rules or violated any laws and certainly, DID NOT teach zumba. I attended and visited as many gyms and instructors as I can when I am staying in a city. My friends have to work so we went on roadtrips on their days off and on weekends. The 2nd officer (b)(6) something, sent me to detention, took all my stuff and went through all my belongings. I waited in detention, could not stop crying from embarrassment and humiliation, surrounded by other suspects, without any means of communication to family and friends. I was passed to this 3rd officer (b)(6) who interviewed me and made me sign this document that is NOT a word for word transcript of my interview but his understanding and interpretation of what I said. He said he even saw my resume on my tablet which means nothing since my CV is online and I am on vacation and had no interest in going back to work anytime soon. He was insisting on me going back to the Philippines which I do not understand since I am a Korean citizen so I asked to call my friend to get me a ticket back to Seoul from Tokyo with a layover in Manila. This 3rd officer, also informed me that I will be taken to another place and he also took my picture and finger print. He also showed me the zumba website which is a generic website for all licensed instructor. Of course, I am on that, and yes, my location was Aurora, Denver, for shopping and shipping purposes. He would not listen. He also would not let me talk to his supervisor and he said the supervisor already approved of me being sent back to Manila coz he said that was my flight and that is where I came from. I was able to talk to the Korean embassy and informed them that I have been detained over 12 hours now and that they told me I cannot go back to Seoul but the female officer interrupted and said nobody would tell me that. But the 3rd officer did, the American airlines lady heard that, too. Anyway, I was already up almost 24hrs, u comfortable, humiliated and embarrassed and afraid for my safety. The 3rd officer also informed me that he could not find my iphone coz when he asked if I had a fone I said no but the 2nd officer offered to charge the fone and I thought there would atleast be proper transfer of all my stuff they took from me. Anyway, after midnight the 2 DHs officers came and took me to their center. It was a cold and noisy place with no toilet doors almost like prison without a bed but a metal benches attached to the wall. I was without coffee and cigarette and awake and tired and hungry for so long at that point. I could barely walk straight. But I remember, in the vehicle, in darkness, they flashed a light at me, ambe to check up on me but all I could think of, it could be worse, flashlight in my face was rude and mean or for safety reasons. When we got to the center, one officer named (b)(6) and another, they asked me why I was there, and of course, I was told I was illegally teaching zumba. And the female officer asked if I were OK, and who would be after all that I had to go through. She even said outloud I had no bra when she patted me. I cannot help but wonder if that was even another form of verbal abuse, humiliation or just your normal procedures for dhs suspects. I was able to eat an apple that night and a pear in the morning. When I was taken back to the airport, with my escorts, I guess, that was protocol, public humiliation. I was taken to board my plane back to Tokyo as soon as I got there, I was allowed one phonecall before boarding and they had already checked my bags and I was not given the yellow envelope with my passport and tblet and phone until the plane door closes.

Please have this incident carefully checked. I have no idea why they would detain me, accuse me and take my ESTA away. I have not done anything wrong and I followed the rules. Was it so hard to believe that there are people who can travel as long as they want and as much as they want within the rules and boundaries you have set? Why was there not proper investigation while I was in detention of all their accusations? Why am I not allowed back to Seoul? Why did you have to write on passport and what was that writing about? Dont I have the right to know? Was it not enough you stamped my passport, detained me and denied me entry? How could you take my ESTA away coz of unfounded accusations and without proof and evidence? Did I do anything wrong? Please explain everything to me. Please tell me you will do everything in your power to correct this mistake and give me justice. I would like my name cleared and cleaned and my freedom to travel to the USA back. I believe it was a mistake you have made and why do I have to keep suffering for your mistakes. I have made promises I would like to keep - meeting my friends and seeing places. I do not suppose you could keep all your bad officers away and have them reprimanded and disciplined. I hope and pray you would do what is right and what is just.

On the way back from Great Falls were we encountered a barrage of humiliating and dehumanising questioning from a lady officer from cbsa on the canadian side. Questions ranged from who told you about montana? , why did you leave from Calgary? , and dont you have anything sharp that can harm us as a few examples of the questions that we were asked. To my surprise going to montana was apparently suspicious and we were immediately told to empty our pockets and handover my pin number for my phone. I am a peace loving Christian who can coincide with other people regress of their faith. At that point in time I had a friend from work whom is a MUSLIM and we used to joke about Islam . These jokes were not in twitter or Facebook as this would obviously attract unnecessary attention so it was over whats app and text messaging. I feel as though my phone is a very personal device and to be asked to give up my pin number is a great violation of my privacy. The officer in question saw these messages and obviously didnt know the "context" in which these jokes were written. The sad part is I wasnt asked to explain what these messages meant at the border only to find myself being called by RCMP and CSIS 4 days later. It was the shock of my life . I am still gobsmacked till today. I have cooperated with both agencies and I told them the truth . I must agree joking about staff like this is a series concern I will not do this again. To add insult to injury I was embarrassed in JANUARY 2015 as I was flying back to Ottawa CANADA after 4 days in England for my dads 60th surprise party. Due to the flight going through US airspace I was told I am on a no fly list. I have never planned anything related to islamic terrorism as I am not a MUSLIM to be labelled as such is disspaiting to say the least.</p>	<p>I would like to categorically comment and state that i am not a Muslim. Further, CBP officers harassed me with unnecessary, intrusive interrogation. On my own, on March 16, 2015, I filed a civil action in U.S. District Court contesting the seizure, and my property was returned to me (by Homeland Security Investigation) within 5 hours of filing the complaint in court. The second incident was on July 8, 2015 at JFK Airport, New York. I was detained for 2 hours by CBP for an unnecessary and intrusive interrogation. My property was not seized. Further, on every flight to the U.S. and within the U.S. I am selected for extended screening and the "SSSS" code appears on all of my boarding passes. First of all the information in the DHS databases are incorrect, and I am not a threat to state security or to air or ground transportation. There is data in those databases derived from kangaroo court cases in which I had no defense, and so a criminal conviction transpired. In any case, whether the initial charge was true or false, the data should not persist in the DHS databases to make me appear to be a perpetual, lifetime threat. On April 13, 2015, I sought the assistance of the Icelandic government in this matter of cyber-bullying and bullying by Homeland Security. After three months in Iceland after communicating with the DHS Office of Civil Rights and Civil Liberties, I felt that I could withdraw my asylum application in Iceland and return to the U.S. But, I am still having incidents with Homeland Security because of the persistence of erroneous data in the DHS databases. I decided to cross over to the United States, as it was not a priority at the time, and I was busy with school work and finishing my education. My business, CapBeast was selected by Ventureout NY as one of Canadas 10 most promising technology startups. I was traveling to attend a weeklong event with the aim of raising funds from American investors interested in my business. Their investment would contribute to hiring a team of US workers to expand my business in the United States. Proper documentation as well as contact information was submitted to customs officials upon request. I spoke with officers (b)(7) and (b) as well as supervisor (b)(7) and Im thankful to share that they were all very kind, courteous and understanding. Please allow me to give some context by explaining my past business. Up until around 4 years ago I was a singer in a band called The Sound of Reason. I have performed in over 100 shows for tens of thousands of people worldwide. Our lyrics were designed to spread a message of peace and love, with such songs as "Share the world", "Mom song" and "Light the globe". Both my former partner, (b)(7) and I are Muslim, and therefore our music caught on with that particular audience. Different Muslim charities/organizations would invite us to perform at their events. Before performing, we would verify that the charities we performed with met all of the standards for charity accountability of the BBB wise giving alliance, which is a national charity monitoring organization affiliated with the Better Business Bureau system. In attempt to expand my business I would network at these events to generate leads for other performances. Naturally, would come across many individuals, strangers (completely unknown to me), only knowing that they may want to book us for another show. I would introduce myself and inquire about other events that my band could be a part of. Despite keeping their contact information, I had such little contact with these individuals that most remained strangers. If you were to tell me the name or show me a picture of most of them, I would be hard pressed to recall ever having seen or met them. Given this background information, please let me address the issues raised on August 2nd that prevented me from entering the United States. Issue A, I had a contact on my phone that was of interest. When office (b) showed me his picture I didnt recognize him. The nature of booking shows in the music industry requires that I speak to many individuals, before learning about their background. Often, I would be given contact information for the shows booking agents and keep this information on my phone. This is still common practice with my e-commerce business. I research pertinent contacts and add their details to my phone for future reference. I have performed in over 100 shows and networked with countless people, most of whom I wouldnt recognize if I saw them today. Having notable Muslim contacts on my phone and laptop is because I was being contacted by and was contacting Muslim organizations in hopes of booking shows. I did not know these people personally. Issue B, I had a spreadsheet of show organizers on my computer. I have worked in sales for many years. Seeing an opportunity within the Muslim niche (especially with charity organizations), I would generate lead sheets of various events being held by Muslim charities. These organizations usually held events that featured performers like my band, I would try to identify the different organizations in each country, and then I would get the contact information of those in charge of booking these shows. In sales, this is called "chasing leads". I didnt know these leads/individuals personally, nor did I know their background. Sometimes, I would not even reach these people or get a call back. Issue C, having met (b)(7). This is someone who was a volunteer for a concert that I participated in 8 years ago, in 2007. He tried to contact me a few times after the event. I was polite in the beginning, but found him a bit "off" and avoided all subsequent contact with him. Without meaning to sound arrogant, my band had many fans. As a result, I have taken pictures and shaken hands with thousands of people. I do not know the vast majority of them. Because I met someone at a show, it doesnt mean that I am their friend or that I associate with them. Also, please note that any information concerning my contact with (b)(6) was given to U.S. customs voluntarily without their asking, after I had been let go to catch my flight. I have nothing to do with this individual.

To whom it may concern, my name is (b)(6) and I have been a proud, law abiding Canadian citizen all of my life. I am the co-founder and COO of CapBeast, which was selected by Ventureout NY as one of Canadas 10 most promising technology startups. It is an honor to be selected for the opportunity to attend a weeklong networking event with the aim of raising funds from American investors interested in my business. Their investment would contribute to hiring a team of US workers to expand my business in the United States. A very sizeable investment is at stake that would benefit not only my business but would help to contribute to American employment as well. I am a proud Canadian, I believe in community and working together. Until last year I was elected president of the New Democratic Party of Canada in Pierrefonds/D.D.O. I have organized events for NDP leader Thomas Mulcair (running for Prime Minister of Canada) and I continue to work with our local member of Parliament (equivalent to congresswoman in the US). I ask that you have me for an interview. I would like to clear my name at your earliest convenience so that I can continue my business in the U.S. I will be happy to answer any questions that you may have in further detail. I was stopped again because he will insert the notes to my record but this is the 3rd time I stopped in a row for secondary inspection. It was Officer (b) in Los Angels who took care of my secondary inspection on July 31st 2015 who suggested me to to file this complain.

Every time I am stopped for secondary inspection it takes 3 - 4 hours My job is to coordinate medical device conferences in US and bringing cardiologists from Europe to US. My next big conference is http://www.crf.org/tct Oct 11 - 15) in San Francisco (this is the biggest interventional cardiology meeting in US attracting 12,000 attendees from world wide and I will be bringing 30 cardiologists from Europe with me. If I am stopped again for secondary inspection, I will not be able to do my job. I would appreciate your kind consideration in removing any red flag on my profile causing this great inconvenience.

On August 4th, 2015 I was on my motorcycle attempting to cross into the USA at the Oroville, WA border crossing. The female Border Patrol officer asked me if I had ever used Marijuana in my life to which I replied yes. She then wrote on a form and gave it to me and asked to park the motorcycle to the side and to go into the building and give another officer the form, to which I did. I was asked by the male officer if I had any illegal drugs, firearms or weapons food or cash over \$5000 with me. I replied no. I waited 15-30 minutes for the female officer who then informed me she had searched my motorcycle and bags. She had found nothing. She then asked me to follow her to another room and emptied my pockets out into a basket and asked me to prove to her that my pockets were empty, she asked to see my ankles. She then gave me a long questionnaire and declaration card to fill out as she took my possessions in the basket with her out of my eyesight. She returned 15-30 minutes later and asked me to follow her to another room which had cameras, a fingerprint machine, a height backdrop chart and a desk with a computer. She then asked me several questions most of which I had already answered on the questionnaire. She was typing my responses to the questions on the computer. This questionnaire took approximately 30-45 minutes. I did nothing illegal, I had no illegal intentions and I have no criminal past. I admitted to taking drugs a few times in my 34 year life span. I was then taken back to the previous room and had to wait. When she returned she asked me to follow her again to the room where she previously questioned me. She then took my fingerprints, took a video of me and took photos of me standing in front of the height chart. She then told me to follow her to another room where she informed me that I would not be permitted to enter the USA at this time or ever again without first applying for a waiver. Her reasons were because I admitted to using drugs in my past. I was given my pocket possessions back and asked to pack up my motorcycle and go back to the Canada.

I want to say that I am a good person. I do not have a criminal record, I live by the rules, I pay my taxes, I lead a positive and healthy lifestyle, I work hard and I try to be a positive role model for others. I have never had any drug charges, I do not have any outstanding fines. I enjoy travelling the world, meeting new people and seeing new things. I am an honest man and believe honesty is the best policy. When asked by the border patrol I admitted to having done drugs a few times in my past 34 years. I have made those mistakes. I have never purchased drugs and only have taken them a few times when peer pressured. I have no intention of ever doing drugs again. I feel being punished by my past personal mistakes by being denied access to visiting the USA and every other country via the USA, extreme. I have no intention of doing anything illegal while travelling the USA. Please do not take away my privilege and joy of visiting your awesome country. Missing my week long motorcycle trip through the USA this past week is punishment enough for my previous personal mistakes. Please wipe my slate clean. I thank you for your consideration.

I attempted to enter the U.S on a category B2 visa for the purposes of travel within the U.S. I had in my possession two letters from employers verifying that I had worked in my home country, a Point of Entry Letter for a Canadian visa that I must activate before May 2016, and bank statements showing I had \$6,200 dollars in my possession. From the outset my explanations were not listened to, I explained that I had not booked a return flight as I was unsure as to whether I would proceed to Canada or return to my home country to continue working before the May 2016 deadline. The border officers wished to know why I had recently been in the U.S. as I had very recently travelled on an ESTA, I explained that I wished to continue travelling in the U.S and sought more time to do so. The reason I did not travel on the B2 initially was that I was awaiting acceptance/rejection from a college course I had interviewed for, as my time was running out to go to the U.S. I opted to travel on the ESTA and heard of my course rejection after my arrival (I presented this rejection letter to the officers), as I had already allocated this time period for either travel or study I decided to inform my places of work that I was going to continue travelling and applied for the B2 visa with the aim of travelling west once I had returned home from the east coast and obtained the visa. I was held for questioning for 12 hours and while I was offered food, there were no options for me as I do not eat meat and there were no alternatives. I was asked a series of questions including was I unemployed, my reply that I was not unemployed was not accepted and my statement was rendered as "Yes", I was asked why I had a resume on my laptop listing my U.S address, my response was that I was looking for work in Canada and listed my most recent correspondence address, I also stated that I sent a single email to Columbia University with regard to doing something voluntary, something I immediately desisted upon realizing that this isn't permitted under ESTA. I was asked why I had no further hotel/travel bookings made and I truthfully answered that, having travelled before, I wished to plan as I went e.g. not commit to spending an overly long time in one place if it was not to my liking or stay longer if the opposite turned out to be true. I had a hostel booked for my first two nights in Washington, the officers claimed this was suspicious as it was for a short time, I explained that a friend was meeting me for the weekend and thus if I decided to stay for longer I would book myself a shared dorm as I would have no need to pay for private twin room. I was informed "You have no money" despite having presented my bank statements and affirmed that my parents had agreed to supplement my travels and could attest to that if required. I also explained I could book a return ticket promptly if that was of issue as I had every intention of departing the U.S.. I was told I had two options; to withdraw my visa application or face a five year ban. Despite my repeatedly asking why anyone would choose a five year ban, surely there must be some chance of acceptance that incurs the risk of a ban, I was given no more information and given three minutes to decide what to do. I then had to sign a sworn statement which had to be reprinted as it misquoted my statements, I had to re-sign these and then re-sign again once another officer took over the shift as the second set were also done inaccurately. It was approximately 21.30 when I signed and 00.30 when my fingerprints and photo was taken. This was after 10 hours of waiting and interrogation and I had not at this stage been offered to make a phone call to any family members or friends waiting for me. I had given the officer two phone numbers to call two friends who were expecting me in Washington at approximately 20.00 and these phone calls were not made until 00.00. I was allowed speak to one friend for ten seconds. I then asked could I phone my mother in Ireland and was told I could not. I was then told I would be taken to a holding cell but this was not carried out until after 2am, 12 hours after landing and 7am Irish time, I had been awake at this point for 26 hours. I was finally taken to the holding cell, made to remove all clothes apart from jeans, socks and a vest. I was locked in and slept until I was awoken at 11am to take my contraceptive pill (I had informed I needed to take it at 10am). I repeatedly asked when my flight home was to which I was given no answer. The previous nights officer (Officer (b)(6)) told me that I would be put on a flight the next morning, I was placed on a flight at 6.40pm after spending over 16 hours in a holding cell. I was threatened with being handcuffed as I repeatedly asked what time it was and became irate when told how long I had to remain in the cell. I asked for food and was fed two packets of animal crackers as there were no vegetarian meals available.

When my personal items were gone through I was asked if I had a boyfriend in the US or Ireland, I responded that I had an "on/off" relationship in Ireland. The officer found my contraceptive pills and condoms and claimed this was evidence that I was meeting a partner in the U.S., something I rebuffed. I believe this was unfairly targeted towards myself as a woman as I don't believe a man would be questioned over the use of contraceptives. This same officer found my personal diary and read extremely personal excerpts aloud detailing issues of mental health and self worth in a crowded area of customs with the pure intent of humiliating me. He confiscated my phone and pointed to photos friends had sent me of jobs they had applied for as evidence that I was seeking work, when I pointed out that neither my name or career background was listed in these emails I was told to "stop playing" and that "its always a friend, dont you have your own life?" My phone froze while being questioned by another officer so on his command I removed the sim card to put it back in again and was then told to place the sim card on the desk and sit down. Upon receiving my phone 24 hours later my sim card was missing and I was told by another customs officer that there was nothing they could do as I had signed my items in at the holding cell despite not having been allowed touch my phone in the interim. I repeatedly asked could I call someone to vouch for me, could I have an attorney present, could I do anything to help my case to which I was told to "be quiet" and that the officers "didn't have all night", I was given no information, fed improperly, had my items and writings invaded, not allowed contact very worried friends and family members and continuously treated like a criminal. Officers also carried on a conversation in front of me about a previous officer and how forceful and inhuman his methods were, the name of whom I can provide.

He answered honestly that he has been told that he needs to ask us these questions because of our travel pattern. I basically told them that we have identified ourselves as US citizens, they have searched our belongings and I have nothing more to add to that. We were sent back to the original seating area. Office (b)(6) came to me again with a paper that had a cell phone and an email address written on it and asked if I recognized them. I had not provided CBP with both. I am assuming they had it from before. I said that I am not going to confirm and verify them. He said so yes? I said I will not verify. He left. It was almost 8:25am by now. An airline representative came and asked if I would be allowed to fly. Another agent said that it will take a little more time. By 8:30am we were almost sure that we were missing this flight as well. At that time, Office (b)(6) handed over our passports, our boarding passes and let us go. He made complete photocopies of my passport as well as my wife and towards the end my kids passports as well. After a little while, the officer asked all of us to another searching area with an X-ray machine. We found that they had already disembarked all 9 of our bags from the airplane and x-rayed them. They asked and I gave all the keys to them. They opened 2-3 of them and inquired about the content including magnetic tiles of my son and some bangles and asked if we were carrying any electronics. We weren't. He started asking questions about where I lived and what I did for a living. I answered appropriately. He was very interested in where I was in the last 2 years. He started inquiring about my wife if she was a housewife. I told them that she was and that she also helped me with my online business. He started asking about the business and what we teach, when I basically asked why he was interviewing us? He answered honestly that he has been told that he needs to ask us these questions because of our travel pattern. I basically told them that we have identified ourselves as US citizens, they have searched our belongings and I have nothing more to add to that. We were sent back to the original seating area. Office (b)(6) came to me again with a paper that had a cell phone and an email address written on it and asked if I recognized them. I had not provided CBP with both. I am assuming they had it from before. I said that I am not going to confirm and verify them. He said so yes? I said I will not verify. He left. It was almost 8:25am by now. An airline representative came and asked if I would be allowed to fly. Another agent said that it will take a little more time. By 8:30am we were almost sure that we were missing this flight as well. At that time, Office (b)(6) handed over our passports, our boarding passes and let us go. We had to run towards the plane and were happy to learn that they had held it for us because of the hour delay in issuing us boarding passes. We were the last ones to board.

I am harassed and intimidated at ports EVERY single time that I travel. It is more than a mere inconvenience to me. I feel I am being treated as a second grade citizen. These violations of my civil rights must stop

I, (b)(6) passport (b)(6) arrived in LAX, Los Angeles, on August 16, 2015, travelling Asiana Air, flight OZ201, at 10:30 am. I was selected for secondary screening. I highly object to U.S. Customs agent (b)(6) offensive, aggressive tone, practice, and extreme interrogations. I am a law abiding citizen of the United States. I have served 18 years as an engineer, 10 years as a high school teacher, and have never been accused of suspicious or unpatriotic behavior. I informed (b)(6) that I had not slept in two days getting home, that I was completely exhausted, and my family was waiting for me in the lobby. (b)(6) replied, "I could care less about how you feel or your pickup arrangements!" (b)(6) immediately set the tone by talking to me in an abusive, and disrespectful manner. (b)(6) asked me some preliminary questions. I told (b)(6) that I am a high school teacher, I travel during my school breaks, that I had traveled to the Philippines, and that I have a girlfriend who lives in Manila. (b)(6) was not satisfied with my answer. He wanted me to give account in detail for every day that I was there. I didn't know how to answer him, or what he wanted me to say. Whatever I said, he responded as if I were lying. (b)(6) pulled a small paper tablet out of my backpack. I use it to take notes, numbers, addresses, and directions while traveling. He began to ask me questions about every entry in the tablet. He asked, "Who is this person? Where did you meet him/her? How long have you known him/her? How many times did you see him/her? Are you going to see him/her again? Where is he/she right now? What are these directions for? Where were you going? Why did you go there?" I would answer the questions and he would ask me the same question again and again. On numerous occasions I said, "This is the fifth time I have answered the question, I will not answer it again." When I didn't give a satisfactory answer, he barked at me in a more disrespectful and abusive manner. Next he opened every single paper in my bag and read it. Then he asked me questions about every receipt, every name, number, and business card, everything. (b)(6) sat on a stool and spent 7 or 8 minutes reading from start to finish a poem and a song that I wrote for my girlfriend. Is this standard procedure? Why would he read a poem and a song I wrote? I carry a copy of my passport, a list of contacts, and a business card in a small plastic zip lock bag when I travel. If I am rendered unconscious, or killed, the authorities will find vital information on my person. I have two sets; I keep one in my pocket, and one in my backpack. (b)(6) opened the plastic bags, unfolded the copy of my passport, and then the contact list. For some strange reason he believed my contact list, of all California numbers, to be some diabolic list. He kept asking me who these people were. I kept telling him that they were my emergency contacts, but after being asked six times, I said that I would not answer the question again. I (b)(6) had spent 10 seconds looking at it, he could have easily detected for himself what it was. After about 95 minutes of tearing my things apart and interrogating me with mostly the same questions, I said, "This is harassment! You are simply harassing me!" (b)(6) a U.S. Customs officer stared hard at me and replied, "So you want to do something about it? You can find me at the LA Fitness Gym in Norwalk!" He then stood glaring at me, as if to challenge me right there and then. I left shaking, and have not slept more than three hours a night since. Is this how a person representing the United States is supposed to act? Is this how a Customs officer is supposed to treat a common U.S. Citizen? Is inviting a citizen to his gym to fight appropriate? After (b)(6) inspected my backpack, interrogated me, and patted me down, he unfolded the two emergency contact lists and walked over to what I presume was a supervisor, and he then returned with a smile, scanned my passport and began typing something in my electronic file. (b)(6) did not take the folded copy of my passports, or the plastic zip lock bag to show the supervisor the totality of circumstances, he took just the emergency contact lists. I am very worried about what he typed or did to my passport and travel privileges. Will (b)(6) be allowed to treat other citizens as he did me? and challenge them to fist fights at his gym? Why was I treated like a drug smuggler, a criminal, a terrorist? no reasonable suspicion What did (b)(6) type into my electronic passport portal? Was I put on some kind of watch list? Will I have problems or be subjected to second searches in the future? Why was I selected for secondary screening 2 of the last 3 times that I traveled abroad?

I have not met with an attorney yet, but the treatment that I was subjected to seems a violation of my Equal Protection, Due Process, 1st and 4th Amendment rights.

	<p>My family and I tried to take our first full family vacation to Arizona in our leased home we plan to purchase (b)(6) from Calgary Alberta on July 28th 2015 at the sweet grass port of entry. Myself, two kids ages 1 and 2 and childrens father had intended to stay for approx 6 months, had over \$40 000 in savings for the trip and work documents showing proof of the operations of our construction company in Canada. My partners brothers, mother and sister also accompanied us for a 2 week vacation and thereafter returning for work and school in Calgary. We had brought our dogs (due to length of stay) and a 5x8 trailer with electronics and summer rims, other misc things to live for 6 months. I have a home I own, and we rent another home, my ID and my current residence was of that of a home a rent out, the guard was not interested in ALL my other documents showing we have a second residence, w bank and bills all to prove that address as current and true. I felt totally violated that she went through all of our stuff, took everything she felt was negative in our case and left everything to prove my case for residency and ties to Canada out of the equation. I have lived in Canada my entire life and only been to the US for periods of time no longer than a week at a time. My goal is to keep my established business in Canada and be able to travel within the US as per our regulations of 4-6 months at a time Without an immigration visa as i do not plan to immigrate here illegally. I strickly would like to come to visit, run our business with our employees in Canada while we are in the US just as we do when in Canada, through many sources I have looked at as a Canadian I do not require to have a visa for the purpose of travel. We do not earn and income here, nor do we have to survive. After sitting in the lobby, and my partner and brothers being in a holding cell for 8 hours we were release and denied entry, our belongings were all searched and packed incorrectly, damaged and left no room for our stuff, leaving no room for our dogs to go in their kennels and demanding we leave without rearranging to accommodate room for our items and dogs. After being turned away we went back to our house and made plans to fly out, hopefully being laced with enough evidence to not have issues but yet again I was stopped, asked to produce information, which I gladly did, once again the officer took ONLY what he felt would better his case and worsen mine. This time I wasnt going to let this happen, it was me &amp; my 2 infants their grandma and auntie, they told me grandma, auntie and the kids could go but not me. Feeling totally hopeless and embarrassed in front of others and my family, as I broke into tears I was demanded to hand over my phone and to take a seat where all 5 of us sat for 4 hours, missed our flight and totally left again with no explanation. I finally stepped up, asked for a manager/supervision and told 1 will come out when ready, I had nothing to loose so we waited, waited and waited some more. After 3 hours of patiently waiting, without a peep, I got up again to ask for a supervisor, and within 5 mins he came out - which made me believe the first attempt I made to speak with one was bluntly ignored. He asked me questions, I was able to answer, he asked the officer why he didnt see that information in the submission of my denial and the officer had not ONE word to say. He finally granted me access to the US and we were sent home to catch flights the following day. I was issued a b2 visa granting access until Oct 15th as that is when I have to come back to canada to meet with my family doctor, attend a court hearing for a traffic ticket, and collect and file information to our accountant. I plan to come back to the US to extend our stay as planned until February and I feel like they are going to again give me issues. I feel this assessment of myself and family is completely unfair, and I have more then enough to prove we earn money without physically being in Canada. I love the US as a vacation destination, and as our kids arent in school I hope we can live our wishes in owning here and coming to and from without going through this process everytime. I entered the United States of America on March 6, 2008, as a visitor, visa B1 B2. I was fearing for my life and fled Colombia. On September 26, 2008, I applied for asylum. I was represented by Attorney (b)(6) On December 16, 2008 I had a meeting with the judge and I was referred to Intensive Supervision Appearance Program (ISAP), Electronic Monitoring System. On December 15, 2010 I had the hearing and my application for asylum was denied. I was told that I could either appeal the decision or voluntarily depart in the following 30 days. I decided with my family to depart. On January 12th, 2011, before departing we had our last appearance with ISAP with the purpose of letting them know that we were leaving the country to go to Canada and wanted to follow the appropriate procedure for the removal of our electronic monitoring devices and leaving the United States. Once they removed our monitoring devices, we were never given any paperwork to sign after that. Three (3) day before of the deadline, I departed from Miami and arrived Two (2) days later at VIVE LA CASA in Buffalo New York in order leave the United States of America and go to Canada. Unfortunately, Immigration Canada gave me the appointment Two (2) weeks later. On February 1, 2011, I left the United States of America with my family. On January 24, 2015 with my wife and 2 of my kids (my daughters) both minors, I went to the PEACE BRIDGE, NY, POE. We wanted to know how to close our case in the USA. I spoke to an officer of the primary line and told him that my intention was to request information about how to close my case not to enter the United States and to ask if we were eligible to apply for a visa. He started asking questions about why we were there and requesting that information, we told him that our lawyer had told us to do so. He misunderstood us and kept thinking that we were requesting a visa there, instead of the consulate and deemed it an illegal entrance attempt, even after we had made it extremely clear that we were not wanting to enter. He took our passports and asked us to wait. After some time, he came back and told us to leave all our belongings and to follow him. After that he was referred to a secondary line, to see the officer in charge who also interviewed me (b)(6), (b)(7) CBP Enforcement officer File number: (b)(6) sigma Event: (b)(7) Event Number: (b)(6) The treatment was abusive and coercive. My wife and I were interviewed separately by this officer. The treatment was extremely rude and we felt extremely scared. Some questions were asked repeatedly until I gave the answer they wanted to hear, answers that are NOT true due to fear and feeling like we were being pressured to do so. We were repeatedly called liars. The person signing as witness to this interview is (b)(6), (b)(7) CBPO. The officer also said in the interview that ICE (U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement) said that we absconded which is not true, and I made sure I told him that I did not know why they were saying that. The officer threatened us by saying that they would take our children and they would make it so that they would be punished and be unable to enter the USA for 20 years. We felt bullied, threatened, and incredibly scared. It was a horrible experience. They could send me to federal jail and they would take away our children and no one in Canada would be able to claim them. I would like to know if I am eligible to apply for a visa to the United States of America.</p> <p>I was driving from a trip into Canada back to my home in Kalispell. I pulled up to the Border crossing (Port of Entry - Porthill Idaho) on Saturday, 9/29/2015. As I recall, there was 3 lanes at the crossing. The far right was closed or blocked as I recall. The center lane had a semi truck parked in it. The inside lane, closest to the windows had oranges cones in it blocking traffic. It appeared to me that the lane was closed as I've seen the various parks, campgrounds, etc around with cones blocking the closed lanes. It appeared that the center lane was the only lane open so I parked behind the semi truck. After a few minutes a guard/officer came out and was yelling (loud, very offensive voice) something. He was shouting at me asking me what they had to do so I could understand which lane to go through. There was a small sign the pointed right for trucks and left for cars. Given that there was cones, a semi truck and other things distracting from the sign, it does not seem unusual that I would not see this little sign. Its not my job to determine what they should do to make it clear as to what lane to go through. I expect that I should be able to pass through the crossing and be assisted by professional, courteous agents and not be harassed by same. I did talk to another agent who was very professional and courteous. Also, the supervisor was very professional and helpful and I was appreciative of that but I still have an issue with the abusive agent. I am sure that you all have cameras as this is probably one of the most secure places in the US. Accordingly, you must have cameras and I expect that you can review the tapes.</p> <p>from jan 1996 to sept 2005, i lived in the us as a student in f1 status. i earned a bachelors degree and a masters degree. my last f1 visa was issued june 30, 2003 valid to june 29, 2005 (no. 60218015). it was cancelled without prejudice, when i decided to leave the us without using my opt work permit (because my wife was pregnant and she wanted to return to saudi arabia to have the baby). i was issued a b1/b2 visa in ryadh on february 20, 2006 valid for 2 years. in april 2007, i was traveling to the us for the annual offshore technology conference (otc) held in houston, tx. i was traveling with my colleague bader mohammad a. alabdulkarim. we were both members of a delegation organized by the us commercial office at the us consulate in saudi arabia. usually there are about 40-50 saudis at the annual otc. bader and i both encountered the same problem. we flew from saudi arabia to amsterdam, then to minneapolis, and we were supposed to fly to houston. at the airport in minneapolis, a dhs officer was waiting for us when we came off the plane, even before we went through immigration. this was during the time of special registration. they separated us and took us each for interrogation. the dhs officer asked for my computer and then accused me of having inappropriate videos (child porn movies) - which was absolutely not true! the same thing happened to my colleague. dhs refused to show me any evidence of such videos and, in fact, they never returned my computer. the dhs officer told me i have 2 options: (1) sign a statement saying my computer had the videos and return to saudi arabia immediately, or (2) enter the us and they would prosecute me. after 5 hours of interrogation, under pressure, being threatened with 2 years in prison, i finally said yes to the child porn accusation even though it was not true. given the anti-arab climate at that time (special registration and guantanamo bay detentions), i was genuinely frightened that they would lock me away for a crime i did not commit and i wouldnt see my wife or child for years. they never let me call my family or a lawyer. i could not talk to anyone or eat anything during that time. so they cancelled my visa right there at the airport in minneapolis, and i flew back to saudi arabia without participating in the otc. i signed the statement and the visa was cancelled on april 9, 2007 under ina section 212(a)(2)(a)(i) for "possible moral turpitude based on laptop contents." the exact same thing happened to my colleague. please believe me, i am a respectable business man with a wife and children. i never had any child porn videos on my computer! after the incident explained above, i applied for a new b1/b2 visa at the us consulate in about 2011. my application was denied for the same reason - ina 212(a)(2)(a)(i). i realize that i signed a statement in 2007 saying that i had inappropriate videos on my computer, but i hope you will consider the circumstances and realize that i was forced to sign that statement under intense pressure and it was not true. the dhs officer never showed me any evidence of the videos he accused me of having. he never let me talk to a lawyer or to my family or to anyone. i was genuinely afraid i would be locked up for years with this alleged crime used as an excuse to justify my arrest. i believe this was a violation of my civil rights. please put yourself in my shoes, with a wife and child, during the time of special registration and guantanamo bay detentions, and please consider what would you do if you were a man coming from saudi arabi - even if you knew you were innocent? i was forced under threats by the dhs officer to sign that statement, but it was never true. since then i have traveled to the uk, spain, switzerland, france, germany, italy, australia, south korea, russia, seychelles, lebanon, qatar, uae, and bahrain - all without incident. mostly, i travel for business, and i have solid business relationships in many countries. it would be mutually beneficial for me to be able to attend the conference in houston, texas on an annual basis as i did before this incident.</p>	<p>N/A</p> <p>Closed</p> <p>9/11/2015 2:56 PM</p> <p>Closed</p> <p>9/21/2015 3:18 PM</p> <p>Closed</p> <p>9/21/2015 4:55 PM</p> <p>I would expect that something be done about this and I would like to know that something is done pursuant to correction of a very serious manner. (b)(6)	<p>My Report on Delta Airline Plane I am writing concerning my recent trip to the United States of America, in which I met with some rather unfortunate circumstances. On Sunday June 8, 2014, I boarded a plane with Delta Airline from Lagos Nigeria to Houston. We took off around 11pm, while we were in air I asked one of the crew member if I could charge my phone battery and she directed me to use the charging outlet in the restroom. I plugged my phone battery in the hope to have enough charge to call my relative on arrival in America. Few minutes later, I was approached by two men who identified themselves as onboard security personnel. They asked why was I charging my phone at the restroom and why was a white tape around it? I told them I needed to charge my phone to be able to call my family on arrival and the white tape was to hold the battery firm to the charger since the clip was broken. I also mentioned that I had asked a flight attendant if I could charge my phone. Subsequently, I was asked a few questions about my travelling and both my passport and boarding pass were collected. I answered all their questions to the best of my ability. Thereafter, I was told for precautionary reasons the plane will have to divert to an airport in Dakar, Senegal. They wanted to be sure the charging device was not a source of any security and safety threat. On arrival in Dakar Senegal, I was led out of the Plane into the waiting hands of Dakar Policemen who ran all sort of test and examination on me to verify if I was in possession of an explosive or anything that was illegal but they found nothing implicating on me. Thereafter, I was informed I would not be able to continue with the Flight to Atlanta and will have to re-book my flight to the United States of America. I strongly agree that our national security is an important issue and it should never be compromised. However, upon due diligence and very strict security screening which I went through coupled with the testimonies of the security personnel that nothing implicating was found on me, I asked why I was left behind in Dakar. When I asked why, I was told this was in order to avoid any embarrassment and to assure the safety of passengers on flight. Delta airline official report testifies to this. I was immediately approached by a Delta representative and booked into a Hotel (King Fahd Hotel) by her. I was given access to call my family members already awaiting my arrival in America. I was re-scheduled for a flight to Nairobi, and from Nairobi to Lagos on Kenya Airline. I boarded the plane going to Nairobi on the night of Monday 9th June 2014; we stopped at an airport in Abidjan to drop off some passengers and also to pick up others to join us to Nairobi, which took several hours. On getting to Nairobi on Tuesday, I missed my flight to Lagos and was told there was no other flight to Lagos the same day and will have to spend the night in Nairobi. I was stranded. After explaining my ordeal to a Delta/KLM representative by my brother, they decided to reschedule me for a flight to Houston going through Amsterdam. On getting to Amsterdam, I was checked in at the immigration stand waiting to enter the plane; a lady approached me for the Department of States and cancelled my Visa. She asked me to return to Lagos and contact the embassy for further explanations. I am a Christian and a responsible child of a Senior Pastor in the Redeemed Christian Church of God in Nigeria. 	<p>I have traveled for years all over the world. I have come in and out without incident until this summer. I am a traveling RN currently working in Texas. A friend that I met on assignment here in Odessa asked me down to his grandfathers ranch (which borders the Rio Grand) We were pulled over on the road by border patrol and detained for about an hour. Then later we were stopped and detained at the checkpoint outside El Paso. Stopped and detained at crossing in Presidio (went over to have leather work done on a saddle for friends grandfather) Stopped at crossing and detained twice in El Paso. This last weekend I was preparing to leave the cruise ship and 3 border patrol agents knocked on door and searched room and had my travel partner and I standing in the hallway with other passengers passing. They found nothing and asked us what we had bought in Mexico? I stated "t-shirts and a wall hanging and medication that I had gotten from a (b)(6) while on an overnight in Puerto Vallarta. I started to get a migraine and he gave me a low dose of codiene 80 tablets. When leaving the ship when I swiped card to leave ship a loud alarm went off. They detained us until agents arrived with new friends we have made that week gawking at us. Once we collected our luggage we were escorted to a room and our luggage was searched. The medication I told them about earlier and had claimed on my slip was found and the officer said i could be arrested and charged a felony. I was surprised because I had been perscribed these medications by a MD and got them from a pharmacy. They seized the medication which is no big deal. I had taken 11 of 80 tablets and had 69 left. He told me this could be on my record and I may have trouble getting a job in the future. He told me I already had a record and this was just an addition so he really didnt see the big deal. I totally accept that I have a record of misdemeanors from my youth. I have been in zero trouble for almost 15 years. I have been sober for 10. I went to college and got my nursing degree and I am helping people today instead of drinking and partying. I am not sure how or if this will be an issue without being charged/convicted etc. I claimed them on my declare sheet and was not making an attempt to bring them in under the radar. I know that this is a controlled substance and did everything possible to be upfront about this. I would do nothing to jeopardize my career. I further would like to know what I did to earn this sudden interest by border patrol. Do I have an acquaintance that I am not aware of that is up to no good? Did I make a political statement on Facebook that raised alarm? I had thought this harrassment was over because I occasionally get TSA pre check. Well the officers ransacking my suite in front of fellow passengers proved otherwise. Please help me understand what has changed. In March 2015, coming from MIA to GCM I had my personal items searched and detained including my laptop, cell phone, cards (credit, debit, gift), etc. I gave my passwords to my electronics and asked many times what was going on without any feedback other than answering interrogatories. This caused havoc because of surprise plans with a minor coming to the trip on a separate flight, not knowing where to go internationally, since we missed our flight. This was the first time I ever encountered something like this and was bewildered at the circumstances not knowing what was going on. Coming back from GCM to IAH, I was searched again. In June 2015, LIS to EWR, searched and my interview for Global Entry was retracted; PVR, SIN to IAH, searched - and I think this had the one time I wasnt in one of these trips. Since the withdrawal, I have been legally admitted as a J1 (November 2012), been paroled (June 2015) and legally admitted as a returning lawful permanent resident. During my October 5, 2015 entry I presented my Alien Resident Card for admission, yet was still sent to immigration secondary. The questions are always the same: "Have you ever illegally accepted work in the U.S.?" I am a lawful permanent resident now. I should no longer be questioned about my right to be in, remain, or accept work in the U.S. The primary inspector should know the difference between a non-immigrant and resident alien, as well as when a record is no longer relevant to the applicant for admission. On October 5, 2015, I waited for 3-hours in immigration secondary only to be told, everything was all right and to file a "request for redress" with DHS TRIP. Ridiculous. He told me he will search my phone and come back to me when he is finished. I went back outside into the room. After being held for approximately 3 hours, the officer came to me with my belongings (passport, boarding ticket, cellphone, etc etc.) and told us that we had missed our flights, therefore we would have to rebook our flights for the following day as there are no more flights for the night. I had no issues with that although i was fairly upset why we missed our flight in the first place. The next day we came back to the Ottawa airport, at the check in desk, a lady scanned my passport, and had told me that i am inadmissible to enter the US. So i asked her why, and she directed me to a phone where i can speak to the US Customs. I followed her instructions and did that, but when they picked up the phone i explained my situation and they said they cannot help me because they cant verify who they are speaking to over the phone. I have been inadmissible to enter the states ever since then. I had booked a ticket to go back home to visit my family on September 25th, 2015, and i got denied boarding due to the plane overflying the US. The third time, I stayed for 13 days. The fourth time, I stayed for 14 days. So this was actually my fifth time in the United States and I intended to stay for 22 days. I furnished officer (b)(6) with the address and telephone number of my host. She searched my hand bags and these are the items she found inter alia A KLM airline return ticket for 17th October 2015 A letter from my Doctor to KLM Airlines, stating that I was very fit to travel. The letter also stated my due date in November, 2015 A cash amount of \$1,500 and two ATM cards for Wells Fargo Bank and Barclays Bank Calcium and Vitamin supplements, Lip gloss, a pen, etc. Officer (b)(6) told me the money I had with me was not enough. I also told her that since I had money in my Wells Fargo and Barclays Bank accounts, there was no need travelling with a lot of cash when I could always cash money with my ATM cards in the United States. I also told her that I wanted to buy a two in one stroller and car seat, an electric breast pump, a sophie teething toy and some clothes for my baby and also get some rest before returning to Ghana. Officer (b)(6) seized my 2 phones and Samsung tablet. She went through all my messages, whatsapp, telegram, viber, line, tango, facebook, pictures and my yahoo mail for over two hours and she did not find anything. Officer (b)(6) placed a telephone call to my host and spoke to him in my presence. She asked my host what will happen when the baby decides to come early. My host assured her that if that should happen, he and my husband are well capable of taking care of the bill. Otherwise, all things being equal, I will leave the United States for Ghana on 17th October, 2015. Based on these facts, I wish to state that Officer (b)(6) did not have any evidence or proof what so ever to determine that I was going to become a ward of the government. She only saw a vulnerable pregnant woman like me and decided to pick on me. That, I must say is against my human rights. Officer (b)(6) took my 10 finger prints and a smug shot/picture of me. I did not do anything wrong. Why did she do that to me? I was tired from the long flight, I was hungry with swollen feet and totally confused as to what she was doing. Eight tablets were confiscated out of each box and I was allowed to enter the US with 4 tablets per box. The manager first stated I failed to declare but I told him I clearly stated I had 120 pills. I also had a prescription for the medicine and I didnt exceed the number of pills allowed to bring into the US. He then stated I wouldnt be charged but I was not allowed to double stuff boxes. I explained that is how I purchased them from the pharmacy. I was not fined or charged but they did take 80 tablets from my possession. My wife and I travel out of the US several times a year for vacation and our entire travel party have been subject to extensive secondary searches each time we return to the US. Weve missed connecting flights and have had great difficulty traveling because of these delays. I have a clean criminal history and own several businesses in the US and work as a consultant for Defense Contractors requiring extra security clearance and have never had an issue. On my way home from Turkey I was unable to check in for my flights online/receive a boarding pass. My flight home connected through Toronto, where I was pulled aside at customs for an interview and hand search of my luggage. My boarding pass and passport were taken during this interview process. This took almost an hour, at which point I had to hustle to try and make my flight. When trying to go through security I was again subjected to extra pat downs and hand searches, and had to turn on all electronics. Ultimately I missed my flight back to New York because of this hassle. Last month I traveled to New Mexico to visit a friend and had a similar experience. I was unable to check in to my flight ahead of time, and once again endured extra security screenings including a full body pat down and hand search of my bags, asking me to turn on all of my electronics. The staff at JFK referred to me as a "house guest" and complained to one another about who was to take care of the various parts of my extra screening. The same process occurred on my flight home. I was also held up at the gate on my way home, because after this whole process, it seems that someone from the security staff forgot to sign my boarding card. After a series of calls were made I was eventually let onto the plane. I am traveling to Chicago this weekend on a different airline, and still am unable to check in online. I imagine I will be subjected to the same security processes. My limited research into this shows that many American travelers to Turkey have been subject to similar issues. All of our boarding passes are flagged SSSS. As I mentioned, I am a graduate student studying the art and archaeology of the ancient near east, hence my previous travels to Turkey. Returning to my job as a U.S. government contractor in Saudi Arabia, I went through Secondary Security Screening Selection at San Antonio airport and was also interviewed by CBP. Upon arriving in Houston I was again approached by CBP and was also directed to go through TSA security screening once again before boarding my connecting flight to Frankfurt. I left US to travel back to Taiwan on January 18, 2015 to spend Chinese New Years with my family. When I returned to the US (LAX entry,) I was detained by customs at LAX airport for over 7 hours. They bodied search me, finger printed me, took away my personal belongings without permission including going through my personal information on my cellphones. Custom agents even threaten me that they would send me back to Taiwan. I have been properly enrolled in school and have never worked in US. I have fulfilled and been compliant with all the requirements of my F1 visa. I would like to inquire as to why I was detained for over 7 hours and would like correct any concerns so that this will not happen again.</p>	<p>I am a legal full-time student with F1 Visa status in US. <p>Over the past few years, I've been chosen almost every time I've traveled for some kind of extra screening, whether suitcase check or explosives check. The worst time prior to this last trip was leaving Chicago 6 years ago (but I no longer have that flight information) where I was chosen for an explosives check, moved on to my gate, and then approached by 2 agents telling me I was randomly chosen for a suitcase check. Last week, on Nov 8, 2015, I was flying stand-by, approached check in counter, answered questions, and told I was randomly selected for extra security check. There was a misunderstanding at the flight gate where my name was called, I was told by one person to get into one line, I got into that line, then was told by another person to go back to original person, and that person was shocked I was still there because apparently, I was supposed to have been escorted to another part for the security check. I was finally escorted, waited, and was then called to a part where they put my luggage through an X Ray again, took out every single item of my belongings, I had to turn on my laptop, tablet and phone, and I also received a pat down. I was sent back to sit down in their area and then escorted back to the area where my Mom was seated. I then went to the bathroom, came back and one of the guys who had escorted me to the security check was confused to see me walking around and he said I was supposed to only stay in line to board to plane, which no one told me, so I had to go through the extra security process again (he did apologize for whoever didn't escort me all the way to the line to board the plane). When I was finally allowed to board the plane, right before boarding, I was called back by an agent because they needed to scan my passport. When all was well, I boarded. When I landed in Miami, I went to the computer in customs where you fill out questions and get your picture taken. My picture receipt printed with an X on it, so I had to go for extra questions with a customs agent. Being standby, we didn't get a seat that evening on a flight from Miami to Phoenix, so I left the airport with my Mom, and came back first thing the next morning. When I reached the agent that takes your passport before security, I was again flagged and he called an agent that escorted me through security, gave me a pat-down, while two agents looked through every item in my bags. I asked the agent (and she was very nice) why this kept happening, and she said she didn't know, but that I could contact you.</p>	<p>I have traveled internationally, but not that much, so am genuinely confused here. <p>I traveled out of the country to Cancun, Mexico and upon my return 11/19/15 I was subjected to a situation that I am requesting answers to. I arrived in Denver and was cleared thru Customs, Border Control and Immigration. Upon reaching the TSA agent I was told my boarding pass was flagged and I would need additional screening. It was at this point I felt I was detained for an unreasonable length of time. It became very apparent that there was something wrong. I was repeatedly told the agent did not know why but that I was being treated as "special". During the process of being treated as "special" I feel I was subjected to intense search of my personal belongings and my physical body without explanation beyond being "special". During the x-ray of my purse, suitcase and electronics I was separated from these items which exposed my purse and personal belongings to possible theft. There was clearly more concern for the "special" treatment. I continued to be detained after repeated requests by a supervising agent who held my passport and boarding pass hostage for a female agent, one finally came to conduct the search. This agent was thorough and respectful. She was doing her job, but again there was no explanation given as to why I was going through this procedure. To say my rights were violated will most likely be dismissed. I completely disagree and require an explanation. I understand and appreciate the need that exists in the world to screen carefully. What I completely disagree with is the lack of answers to my questions. The experience at the security check point in the Denver airport was appalling and very upsetting. I was detained much longer than seemed reasonable during which time I was not given any explanation or justification for the search. Being treated as "special" by TSA is not an experience I wish to repeat. I showed them my travel tickets, addresses were I would stay during my visit including my hotel reservation I made for my stay at michigan for the graduation on the 19 december 2015. I was called in again for the second time and question about my intention of working illegally in california as a cab driver. I showed them my university graduation letter, my returned tickets and host of other documents to prove I have every intention of returning to the uk as a british citizen. I had an approve holiday request from my curent employer which is a permanent position, I had my daughter who I was intending to travel with so that she can witness my life long dream of gradauting but the mum who I am seperated with, refused closed to the time of my trip. She prefer to spend time in london for christmas with my daughter. Thus I made the trip alone for the purpose intended and to return back to work on the 10 january 2016. I was later accused of not having enough fund to sponsor my trip. This I found intimidating as I have four hundred dollars, eight hundred pounds worth of credit card, a debit card with five hundred pounds and a saving account of four thousand and five hundred pounds. I went on the made another application through the embassy which was successful. I planned my trip in two fold one to attend my graduation and visit neama bereteh in california. I have no intention whatsoever to live and work illegally in the usa. 	<p>I live and work overseas in international development (for past 12 years) and return to the US for home leave once per year or every 2 years. My most recent visit was from November 19 - December 19, 2015. I was questioned prior to boarding a flight from Doha, Qatar to Washington Dulles (IAD) on November 19th by a US TSA/CBP officer and then upon arrival in the US was also screened again by CBP. I understand that the reason is likely because of my residence and travel overseas and the agent handled the inquiry well. However, during my home stay I traveled on holiday with my family (wife, children aged 3 &amp; 5, and mother) to Mexico. We left the US on November 29, 2015 from Dulles Airport. Both me and my wife (Anca D. King) were subject to additional security screening (the "SSSS" printed on our boarding passes). The screening took approximately 1 hour and my children and mother had to wait for us. There were no problems and we passed the screening. I assumed that we had simply been selected at random but when we next left the United States on December 19th, 2015 for return to our current home in Myanmar, we (me, wife and children aged 3 and 5) were again subjected to enhanced security screening. In this instance the extra screening took over 2 hours and my young children were subject to a very long wait during the process. Furthermore, at the end of the screening, my wifes laptop computer would not power on due to the battery having died and her power cord stopped working while we were on vacation. At this point TSA agents told us that because the laptop would not power on we would have to abandon the laptop or check it into a checked bag. I found this to be an unacceptable risk to our privacy given the sensitive nature of information contained in the laptop and the TSA officers were deliberately placing our identities as risk for theft through abandonment of the laptop or the the potential for theft of the laptop from within a checked bag. The supervising officer was (b) (badge # (b) title: Transportation Security Manager) and his attitude was unpleasant and condescending, showing no concern for our privacy nor right to privacy as US Citizens under the Constitution. He was unreasonable and refused to tell us why we could not continue through security even after a 2 hour process cleared all of our other belongings (for a second time in 3 weeks!). He refused to accept responsibility for any risk to our right to privacy and the security of personal information nor acknowledge that we had not been given any advance information that we would be required to power on the laptop prior to going through the security screening. Luckily I was able to find access to a laptop charger in the check-in area of the airport and charge the battery enough to power on but feel that this should not have ever come to such a risk to our personal information and privacy. Overall, the process took over 2 hours and we just made it to the gate for boarding even though we arrived at the airport almost 4 hours prior to our flight time. Since this was our second excessive and time consuming extra security screening in less than 3 weeks when leaving the United States, I feel that redress is required so that we are not repeatedly subject to unnecessary and unjustified delays when trying to fly out of the United States. My family and I are law abiding citizens who happen to reside abroad, where I am employed as an international development professional, often working under contract to the US Government (USAID), and feel that our recent treatment at the hands of TSA and CBP is not justified and presents my family with undue harassment and unnecessary delays when we travel to and from the United States. I furthermore feel that we were not treated with sufficient respect, courtesy or empathy by (b) in dealing with the laptop issue. The offices who actually conducted our screening however, were very professional, respectful and empathetic to the inconvenience and issues that we faced. (b) was the opposite in both his body language, conduct, and language when we attempted to get redress. On December 16, 2015, I was on my way to Utah (layover in Chicago) for an early morning flight. I went through the normal lines and was sent to additional questioning and then sent to the back area. I was detained at the border for over four hours. My electronics and bags were taken and searched and I was kept under close watch with only a few questions asked of me regarding previous travel. They took my Global Entry Card and said they could not return it. At no point was I told why I was being detained and I was given no information other than at the end they said that they were trying to verify my identity. I was treated like a criminal and given no answers. At one point I was escorted on my way to the bathroom. In the end, not surprisingly, I missed my flights. Initially the airline was not going to be able to book me until the next day, but luckily I was able to beg and they put me on another airline. I arrived at my destination 12 hours later than scheduled. I missed my ride and was forced to rent a car at great additional expense.</p>	<p>As an innocent American citizen, this event was greatly disturbing and traumatizing. I can appreciate the need to ensure the safety of passengers and people in the country. <p>US customs agents mistakenly confused my Melatonin jet lag tablets for "LSD tablets". They detained me for 3 hours in a holding cell, confiscated my cell phone and all my possessions, and they attempted to turn me over to the San Francisco police. However when the police officers arrived, they examined the tablets and told the customs officers they were in error, and I was released while still at the airport. Since that incident, I have been subjected to delayed immigration processing and mandatory customs searches when I have reentered the US. The first incident occurred on March 21, 2015 at San Francisco SFO airport. I arrived on a flight from Seoul, South Korea. Customs agents searched my backpack and found a plastic bag containing a dozen pink Advil (ibuprofen) tablets and white melatonin jet lag tablets. The melatonin tablets are supplements that originally came in a big bottle of 100 have no markings on them. So the customs agents used a drug test kit on them. One of the agents told me "that their test kit had turned the color purple which indicated they were supposed to be LSD", and that when they put me in a holding cell. They wouldnt let me make any telephone calls. Only after the San Francisco police arrived and examined the tablets and tested them themselves did they release me, after 3 hours, and return my possessions. I did some research online and discovered that the brand of chemical drug test kits that agents use on site, which are supposed to change colors in reaction to the presence of certain drugs, will return "false positives" for a number of common medications. I read that apparently the test kits customs agents are using, which detects for something called an "indole ring" which is present in LCD, will also change color and indicate a false positive for melatonin supplements, SSRI serotonin antidepressant medications, and tryptophan supplements among others. The second incident occurred on September 1, 2015 at New York JFK airport, when I was arriving on a flight from Paris. This time, when passing through immigration, I was denied an entry card at the automatic machine that scans your passport. This has never happened to me before. So I am certain that it is because of the incident from March. I was required to wait for over 2 hours in a line in the immigration office, where finally an immigration agent led me directly to customs, where I was subjected to a mandatory customs search. When this happened, I asked the agents what I could do to avoid its happening in the future, and they directed me to your website. I would prefer not to be delayed for 2 hours every time I reenter the US, and be unable to use the automated immigration machines and be forced to wait in a special line, to then have to be searched by customs every time. Could someone please look into this and clear my record so that this doesnt happen every time in the future? My husband who is a retired Navy Veteran and prior DHS employee stated this went beyond for when flying. In fact, an boarded on illegal detention without cause. Using the SSSS process to intrude into a person private property is unwarranted. This redress is to gain audience with the Newark DHS Manager to obtain an apology. No only did this happen to my son, but my phone was taken and browsed through without my consent as well. Although the police officer were cordial and polite, the line between security screening and blatant search and seizure without cause or explaining is not. I will continue to follow this redress until a apology and explanation has been accepted by my Son and I as to why such invasion of privacy was done. I provided all the information required and was allowed to board the aircraft. On arrival at Phoenix I was stopped again and had to wait to speak to a passport control official. This took a while and delayed me on my ongoing journey. I was again asked the same questions about my company and staff. The officer said that I shouldn't experience additional problems as he had all the information he needed. When I attempted to check in online for my return from Los Angeles I was unable to print my boarding pass. At the airport I was stopped going through passport control and was subjected to additional security searches, including a more thorough body search. I was not allowed through as my laptop battery had run down so I had to go out again, charge my laptop and then go through the process again. Eventually I was allowed through and went to board the plane. The process to get through passport control took nearly 2 hours with all the queuing. 	<p>I am a United States citizen by birth and have lived my entire life in the United States. Five years ago I was assigned a job in Dubai, United Arab Emirates by General Electric, my employer of 10 years since college. After my assignment in Dubai I was to return to the USA, however, GE had a need for their power business to be restructured in Pakistan, reluctantly I took that job with the promise of a big promotion and repatriation to the USA thereafter for my wife and I. The pay and experience of operating a huge business was worth the risk of moving temporarily to Pakistan, so we did. Since January 2015 I have had a residence in Islamabad, Pakistan as well as my original home in the great Cincinnati area. It was not until my wife and I returned home for Thanksgiving in 2015 that the problems with CBP/TSA started. We both have Global Entry but around Nov 12, 2015 when I entered the USA my ticket stated "see agent" with a big X on it. The agent then took me to a separate room where everyone at the time was a non-citizen. I waited for 1 hour as my wife and brother had no idea where I was or what I was doing, I was not allowed to leave or make a call. My wife was very worried. Eventually I was questioned by the border agent about why I travel so much and why I am in Pakistan. I explained in intimate detail that I work for GE Power &amp; Water and operate a \$150MM Power Generation business for the company in Pakistan. I explained that it was a unique circumstance and that GE usually never sends expats to Pakistan but our business was in trouble and they asked me to fix it. He was satisfied, took my info and granted entry. The second incidence was much worse, my wife and 6 month old daughter traveled on Dec 23 arriving in the USA on Dec 24, we cleared customs in Abu Dhabi as part of Ethads program with the USA; again, I was brought to a separate room and told to wait for a while and eventually asked the same questions over again as I was in November. I was granted entry and proceeded with my flight. The hard part was when we arrived in JFK, we had an onward flight to Cincinnati and had we not had a 6 hour layover, we certainly would have missed it. This time, BOTH my wife and myself got "SSSS" on our plane tickets and were sent to a completely separate lane in JFK where we went through exhaustive security checks including an invasive body pat down and explosives testing of all items individually in our possession. With our 6 month old daughter in tow, this was very painful, time consuming and exhaustive. Moreover, they tried to confiscate at GE laptop with proprietary information on it; had a passer-by not offered his laptop charger they would have taken it. Through the duration of our trip we received "SSSS" on every domestic flight and were subject to the extra screening with our daughter in tow. We are both United States citizens and both have TSA Pre-Check, we were told "this doesn't matter anyone!" While I completely understand our being in Pakistan raises flags, especially with recent events in California, I would appreciate a comprehensive review of our security status so these episodes can be put behind us. I am an executive at GE and travel several times per month around the world. Continuing to be subjected to this extra security while traveling back to and within the USA is extremely painful. I believe I am providing a service to the United States government and people as I supported the sales of \$800MM in Gas Turbines to Pakistan in 2015 generating dozens of US jobs. Moreover, I support the State Department through the US Embassy in Islamabad with information on the power sector, introductions to key customers/players in the power sector, etc. I've been a key asset to driving bi-lateral trade in Pakistan for the USA and all of this at the expense of my quality of life and ultimately my security as spending significant time in Pakistan is clearly very dangerous for a Caucasian American who stands out everywhere I go. I humbly ask that the reasoning for "SSSS" and screening at immigration be reviewed so that and perceived risk associated with myself or my wife can be eliminated. The last three times I have flown, I have been sent with a SSSS boarding pass to secondary screening which is a very unpleasant and time consuming process. My tickets are purchased by EchoStar Corporation and I fly between IAD and DEN at least twice a month... having to spend an extra 30 minutes getting my luggage and electronics torn apart and then getting put through the full body scanner, metal detector AND then getting a full body pat down are highly questionable. The last three incidents were on UA977 from DXB to IAD on 1/1/2016, then on UA554 from IAD to DEN on 1/18/2016 and lastly on UA344 from DEN to IAD on 1/21/2016. As I mentioned before, I am flabbergasted that having a redress number, a trusted traveler number and having been cleared for TSA Pre apparently is not sufficient to "trust" me as a traveler yet. I realize my going to Pakistan must immediately classify me as a risky traveler BUT I went to visit family and it is nonsense that such an action would vault me on the TSA Selectee List. I have no criminal record and short of a few speeding tickets have never been in trouble with the law. This treatment is aggravating and unjust.

I have both a redress number (b)(6) a trusted traveler number (b)(6) as well as TRA Pre which, of course, I have not been able to use this year. What is the point of getting all of these numbers and working hard to be a trusted traveler to suddenly find myself being screened every time with no clear explanation - this is ridiculous.

When trying to return home from a visit to Egypt on January 12th, I had severe problems traveling. First, while still in Egypt, after swiping my passport in the Cairo Airport, they told me to wait and said they have to call America. The Egyptian security authorities took my United States passport, and I subsequently missed my flight and was detained. On the first day the authorities told me I don't have any problems in Egypt, but they asked me numerous questions about the United States. I ended up being detained for the rest of January 12th, January 13th, and into the evening of January 14th. Authorities came and questioned me about 4-5 times for approximately 10-15 minutes each time. I was finally allowed to board a plane and traveled to Amsterdam on January 14th in the evening. Again, in Amsterdam I had problems as the customs officers called over a supervisor. The customs agents said they had to call America and again I was delayed and it took about 3-4 hours in that airport. I had to go through extra screening again where they searched my bags and then they finally let me get on the next flight to Detroit. Finally, I was able to travel to Detroit. In Detroit after we landed the flight attendant made an announcement over the loudspeaker for me to come to the front of the plane. I gathered my things and exited the plane, where two Customs officers were waiting for me. The officers took my bags, laptop, and phone and thoroughly searched them. They took me into a room and asked me about all sorts of questions, including asking about people that attend the mosque. This took about 2 and a half to three hours. This caused me to miss my flight once again to Tampa. I finally arrived on January 16th to Tampa, FL, my destination.

This was an extremely difficult and disturbing situation for me. I am a law abiding United States Citizen and never expected to have such unreasonable delays and questioning during my travel experience. I ask you to please remedy this situation so that it does not happen again in the future. Thank you.

What are these rules and where are these rules published? This was discriminatory and intentionally harassing behavior and has made me stressed out about travel. Since I travel for business purposes, those customs procedures represent a severe inconvenience. Having SSSS on my board passes, subjecting me to secondary screening whenever I travel, has made my travel experience both difficult and humiliating. On several occasions my wife and I have been subjected to extensive and invasive questioning by TSA agents, and our personal belongings, including my laptop and smart phone, have been confiscated and searched. We find these tactics to be a deep invasion of our privacy. I understand the agencies goal for security, but I am in no way a threat and I am not comfortable with being treated like one every time I travel. Moreover, I believe TSAs targeting of me and my wife may be based on our race and religion, not for any justifiable suspicion of wrongdoing. Below are the instances in which the TSA has subjected me and my wife to unsavory delay: In January 12th, 2014, upon returning to SFO from visiting family in Iran, I was questioned for three to four hours about my contacts and family overseas. TSA agents took my belongings including backpack, wallet, flash drive and searched them, possibly copying the contents of it. I know this because when they were returned to me all items were misplaced. My wife experienced a similar four hours delay in February 2014. In April 12th, 2014, upon returning from a business trip in Germany, my point of entry into the United States was in Vancouver, Canada. I was questioned there for about six to seven hours. I was questioned extensively about my relationships and contacts overseas, the places that I have been in Germany and the people that I met. Furthermore, TSA agents took my iPhone, camera and business laptop and I believe made copies of their contents. Some of the items were taken from my possession for 6 hours. I DID NOT GIVE CONSENT FOR THESE ITEMS TO BE SEARCHED. Instead, a TSA agent handed me a card stating that he had the right to take and search my computer and other effects, then began doing so. I have been asked to give them my SIM card and provide them with the password to access the laptop and the phone. I missed connecting flight in the process and after many stressful hours, I caught the last flight to SFO. My family were in a very stressful situation as they did not know what is going on with me. In September 29th, 2014 upon my arrival to SFO airport, when I was in the passport check line, a TSA agent approached me and asked me to leave the line and go with him for a secondary check. He stated that since I went through this process a couple of time they want to expedite the process for me. Yet, I went through the whole secondary check, searching and questioning again. In January 7th, 2015, I have been stopped at Dubai airport before flying to SFO. The local airport agents stated that they have been tasked by an agency in the US to search me. They asked me to take all of my clothing articles off for a body search. It was the most humiliating and annoying experience that I ever had in a travel. I feel my privacy has been invaded and in my opinion, no one should go through an experience like this. On the same trip and upon landing in Boston Airport, I have been stopped and went through extensive questioning, resulting missing the connecting flight to San Francisco and I had to spend the night in Boston. Ironically when I wanted to catch the connecting flight next morning, the same SSSS mark appeared on the boarding pass of the domestic connecting flight to SFO and I had to go through the whole extensive screening process again to board the flight, which I nearly missed it due to the length of the process. In September 13th, 2015, while coming back to the US through Abu Dhabi, I have been delayed for about 18 hours in the airport. According to airport staff, they had to clear me with an agency in the US first before they print the boarding pass. The airline refused to allow me to leave the airport and refused to provide accommodation for period of about 18 hours. After having the boarding pass, at the passport check point, first I have been stopped and searched by local authorities I believe on behalf of TSA. They body searched me and then asked me to wait for TSA agents. After agents questioned me and asked me to stay and wait in a room for a long period of time, they came back and did another body search. In November 1st, 2015 upon arriving to SFO airport the same issue happened again. When I asked you agent why I am subject to extensive search and delays, he suggested that if I think about it, I can figure it out and he can not provide further information. In January 3rd, 2016 upon arriving to Chicago airport, TSA agents were waiting for me at the gate and I have been asked to follow them for questioning.

I can say that I went through this process tens of times. Each time the Closed agents search all of my belongings and take almost all of the papers, cards and electronic devices that I have on me. They ask me to unlock the electronic devices and I suspect copies are made from the items mentioned above. These are just a couple of the recent incidents and there are more occasions when I or my wife traveled, we have been extensively questioned and delayed. I am very troubled by your agencies practices and request an explanation of why my wife and I are being put through such invasive and degrading screening processes. I plan on traveling to visit family and on business in the future, but I wish to do so without any hassle or delays as any other law-abiding U.S. resident would expect. I understand the agencies goal for security, but I am in no way a threat and I am not comfortable with being treated like one every time I travel. Furthermore, I would like to address any concern the TSA may have about me upfront and immediately to end this torment and save your agency the time and resources it wastes in doing so.

Also in 2014, I traveled by plane to North Carolina with my wife. I had "SSSS" printed on my boarding pass. I was separated from my wife, searched and detained for about one and one half hours. Due to the delay we missed our flight and had to board a later flight. On December 11, 2015, I was returning from a short trip to Toronto, Canada with my family by car. When we got to the US/Canada border in Buffalo, we were asked to pull over to the side of the road. We were detained for about five and one half hours before being allowed to reenter the United States. The border patrol agents confiscated my personal and work cell phones, work computer, my childrens iPod, and several flash drives. They gave me a receipt detailing the items. My electronics were returned two weeks later. Also during the stop on December 11, 2015, I was questioned by three law enforcement officers who identified themselves as being DHS/FBI, IRS/FBI and a supervisor. They questioned me about my trip in Canada and also about unrelated trips I had previously taken abroad.

To whom it may concern: My name is (b)(6) and I have been subjected to constant searches and questioning for the past three years during travel abroad or within the United States. Following are a few examples of the dehumanization I have experienced. On May 23rd 2014 I was escorted out of the airplane and investigated with for approximately 4 hours. I was not informed why such action was taken. All my bags and personal items were checked. My cell phone and iPad were taken and the information on these devices was backed up on Homeland Security's system (as I was informed by the officer). I also traveled from LaGuardia airport to Detroit on June 23rd 2014 and had to wait for a supervisor's authorization at the ticket counter before I was given my boarding pass. The same double authorization on the ticket counter was required on my return flight from Detroit to LaGuardia on June 31st 2014. I was subjected to the same supervisor authorization and questioning on February 26, 2016 on a United Airlines flight from LaGuardia to Washington D.C. I filed two DHS TRIP forms and received replies from Homeland Security, the first, on July 28, 2014 and, the second, on January 3, 2015 with the Redress Control Number of (b)(6). However, there is no change in the way I am being treated at the airport nor any clarification as to why I am being held for questioning. I demand to know why these degrading and offensive measures are being taken against me. I am willing to meet with an agent to resolve this invasive matter. At the airport, during check in, it was difficult to print my husband's boarding pass and after making some calls, it was printed and stamped with SSSS. He was thoroughly examined and questioned at every custom point and even before boarding the flight. Pictures of our passports were taken and he was made to check in all my electronics. On arrival at Istanbul, we were picked up by the police upon disembarking from the plane. We were detained separately without answers in the airport at their holding facility for 22 hours: they said they did not speak English. My husband was questioned again about our reasons for travel. We showed them our tour plans and told them our travel agent was waiting outside. We made calls to our family letting them know what happened and they tried to get us in touch with some persons who they knew in Turkey to help us speak to the Turkish officials in their language. We had connecting flights to Dhaka and asked if we could just go ahead to Dhaka since there was a wedding reception planned for us there. We were ignored and sent back to DC. At the boarding gate, again there was a problem with my husband and they made many calls and asked who his father was - this made us think there was an identity issue. After we told them his fathers name, we were allowed to board. At DC, we were again picked up by security officials and questioned by the FBI. Our bags were fully checked and our electronics removed from us (and possibly information removed from them). After 3 hours, we were again released. Our family waited outside anxiously to take us home and their information was also documented. Since that date, there has been no further communication from any officials. However, we do not know why this happened.</p>	<p>If there was any problem, why were we allowed to board the flight to Turkey in the first place? Why were we sent back instead of being allowed to proceed to our final destination? We still have not met her parents since our wedding and still have not had our wedding reception. After sitting in the plane, I was asked by flight personnel to come out of the plane, and meet with US Immigration person outside who asked me several questions. It was disconcerting to be called upon while sitting in the plane and being questioned outside the plane door in full view of all the passengers and crew. Nevertheless, I kept calm and the US Immigration was professional as well. Once landed in Portland, I was selected for secondary screening by US Customs and Border Protection who, upon inquiry, told me that my name had matched a potential bad guy and they had to complete the process to clear my name. After 1 hour, the secondary screening process was complete and I went through TSA security to enter the terminal where my flight to Sacramento was going to depart. I reached the gate for my next flight 30 minutes before departure and just out of curiosity inquired if my luggage had been transferred. The airline person told me that I could not board the plane until I go through additional security checks by TSA. I informed them that I had just entered the terminal through TSA so why do I need to go through the TSA again? The airline said I had been selected for additional security check and that I will not be able to board until I go back to TSA and checked again. In view of the time, I ran back to the TSA lines, was told that I will be going through enhanced security check which included metal detector, x-ray, an extremely vigorous, uncomfortable, and humiliating pat-down procedure that I have never encountered before, turning on of all my electronic devices, and checking of each and every item in my carry on even keys and sunglasses. Even if I discount the time and other issues with all the security checks, it is very difficult to ignore the humiliating pat-down procedures. On the return leg to Budapest on March 18, 2016, I travelled from Sacramento, CA to Budapest, Hungary, via Seattle and Amsterdam on flights Delta 4754, 142, 9695. Once again, I could not print my boarding passes or check-in online. I went through additional TSA security with same process including the pat-down and checking of electronic devices and all personal items. On September 18, 2015, I travelled from Sacramento, CA to Geneva, Switzerland on flights UA 786, UA 974, and returned from Geneva to Sacramento on October 4, on flights LX 352, UA 900, UA 5402. While travelling to Geneva, I could not check-in online or print my boarding passes. At Sacramento airport, 2 airline personnel spent 25 minutes trying to go through the system to get me checked in to the flight. On my return leg, I was selected for additional security check at London Heathrow airport, then questioned by an individual from US Immigration separately, and upon landing in San Francisco, selected for secondary screening by US Customs and Border Protection. Before that, I travelled from Geneva, Switzerland to Miami, FL on June 20, 2015 on flights BA 0725 and VS 0005 and returned on June 26, 2015 on flights VS 0006 and BA 0732. On my in-bound flight, I was selected for additional security check at London Heathrow airport and upon landing in Miami, selected for secondary screening by US Customs and Border Protection. In addition to the abovementioned incidents, there have been only 4 out of 6 instances in the past 4 years where I have been selected for secondary screening by US Customs and Border Protection while entering the US and the additional security checks have been performed every-time I flew in to the US from anywhere else other than Geneva, Switzerland. When flying in to the US from London or Amsterdam, I have always been selected for additional security check before boarding the plane and questioned by US Immigration official. In one instance, on returning from Geneva, Switzerland to Detroit, MI on August 20, 2012, I was selected for secondary screening by US Customs and Border Protection, and then detained for more than 3 hours, missed my connecting flight to Madison, WI, was not allowed to use my cell phone to inform my friends that I would miss my flight. During the 3 hours, all my luggage including checked-in luggage, was checked by hand, all electronic devices and paper documents were removed and taken away for 2 hours to be checked by security.</p>	<p>I am a Professor at California State University Sacramento teaching in the (b)(6) I have been a permanent resident of the US for the past 1 year, and have lived in the US before that for 11 years as a student and H1B worker. I cannot reserve the flights I would like knowing that I may be delayed upon entering the US. After some time I asked how long this was going to take and they told me it would not be long. Throughout this process the officers came in and out numerous times. After many hours I was told I was being moved to another area. When in this area I was further questioned by CBP officers and the FBI. Eventually I was informed my visa had been revoked whilst I was in the air after my departure from Australia. I was refused entry based upon the fact I did not have a valid visa upon arrival into the USA. I attended the US Embassy in Sydney upon my return and they stamped my VISA with Revoked. On Dec 26th 2015, I was subjected to secondary screening while entering the USA at New York JFK via Paris CDG, flight AA45, due to issues with my ESTA visa. I am a French citizen and lived in the USA between September 2005 and May 2013. I attended Boston University under a F1 student visa, and worked for Philips Electronics North America after graduating, who had sponsored me for an H1B working visa. I returned to Europe in May 2013. I am encountering problems with my ESTA visa as I was arrested on Saturday May 29th 2010 outside of a Wonder Bar on Harvard Ave, Allston, 02134, Massachusetts, for a street fight. A quick summary of the arrest incident. An intoxicated male had approached my friend, insulted him, and threw a punch at him. I stood next to my friend at the time and grabbed the male and pushed him against a wall. My friend who had gotten punched followed up and punched the aggressor. I did not punch the aggressor. Seconds later, the police showed up and arrested all of us. We were summoned to court on June 1st 2010. The judge read the police report and immediately ordered that all the charges be Dismissed prior to Arraignment, please see the Massachusetts Court Document attached, Docket Number [REDACTED]. At the time of the incident I was in the midst of my H1B working visa application, which I was granted on December 28th 2010. I remained in the USA until May 26th 2013, and have returned to Europe since. I decided to go back to the USA for the first time since 2013 in December 2015. While applying for my ESTA visa on Dec 24th 2015, Old Application Number: [REDACTED]. I had misread eligibility question 2 as, Have you ever been ARRESTED AND CONVICTED for a crime that had resulted in serious damage to property, or serious harm to another person or government authority, rather than, ARRESTED OR CONVICTED, and checked the NO box, as the court ordered that the case be dismissed prior to arraignment. At the secondary inspection counter at New York JFK airport, the immigration officer questioned me whether I had ever been arrested and I immediately said yes. She realized that I had made an honest mistake while filling out the ESTA application, and granted me entrance to the USA. The immigration officer also informed me that due to my error on the eligibility question, I would always be called to secondary passport inspection with my current ESTA visa. She ordered me to re-apply for an ESTA visa before my next visit to the USA, and check the YES box for eligibility question 2. She also informed me that I would have to fill out this application to explain the incident and submit my court documents. I am planning to travel to the USA again on June 6th 2016, and have just re-applied for my ESTA visa and checked the YES box for eligibility question 2. However my ESTA application was rejected. Travel Not Authorized. New Application Number [REDACTED]. I would like to know what I could do to resolve this matter, and how I can get an ESTA visa for the USA. I have not been stopped when I left the U.S. On the return it was Cancun Mexico connecting in Miami FL as the first destination to the U.S and that's where I was stopped and been inspected. I have been stopped for 6 hours at the Customs and Protection unit at the airport. I missed my flight to Orlando because of this. When I ask the CBP unit why am I stopped they say we don't know ourselves; we can only say you are free to leave or not. CBP says that they don't have a reason why they stopped me; they just follow what the agency they communicate with. If I ask them would this happen again they say it might and we have to go through the same process again; but what process I have no idea. After 6 hours of investigation and taking my phone away and who knows if they are tracking it they say am free to go! When I inform them that I have a control number that Homeland Security provided me to use when traveling they say this won't help expedite the process. Sir/Mam, I really would like you to resolve this issue as it is not resolved because I have been stopped again and longer than the first time. I know you have worked on my case before but nothing changed. I am a Mechanical Engineer and the company sends me to suppliers domestic and global, therefore, I really need to make sure I am able to travel. Not only that, this is really frustrating and annoying of what is happening. I am a U.S citizen and I live legally and in fact I design Medical Devices at my company to save lives/patients I really should not be treated this way. My company won't be able to rely on me to be sent to customers if this happens over and over again. I would like you to clear this up in the system so when I travel I don't get stopped for these long hours! At least provide some feedback in your system so all airports can see that I have been investigated twice now and they can read through what the result was. I am not living comfortable now and I don't feel safe living here in the U.S until this is cleared. I hope you understand my concern and I appreciate your cooperation. On the 29th April, 2016, I travelled 13 hours from BNE to LAX on Virgin Australia (VA) flight VA7. In my possession was a valid ESTA through the Visa Waiver Program (VWP), a return ticket to Brisbane, Australia, and valid travel insurance for my planned 88-day trip. Upon arrival, I was questioned by a CBP Officer, which was the norm based on my previous experiences with travel to the United States. Unbeknownst to me, the answers I had provided at this initial screening were not satisfactory to them. The CBP Officer informed me that I was to follow her. We went and waited at a second booth for a new CBP Officer to question my arrival and 88-day intended stay in the US. After this CBP Officer seemed dissatisfied with my responses to the same questions, I was taken to a waiting room for further questioning from yet another CBP Officer. At this point, no explanation of why I was there was provided, my phone was confiscated and my passcode demanded. I was provided with a piece of paper that authorised access by CBP Officers to my mobile device after they had already taken my phone. Officer [REDACTED] who had confiscated my phone, was showing its contents to other staff members while smirking and laughing, yet I have no idea what he was showing them. While I was in the initial waiting room waiting for a CBP Supervisor to review my case, I overheard Officer [REDACTED] providing paperwork to a Virgin Australia staff member for [REDACTED]. When the VA employee asked "Is this 100 percent yet?", Officer [REDACTED] replied "Oh yeah, shes goin home", and this was prior to me being interviewed by a CBP Supervisor. I was taken into another room, where all of my belongings were confiscated and I was pushed against a wall for a patted-down search, where my vagina was interfered with and menstrual cycle was questioned. From here, without any explanation, I was taken to a holding room which would be considered basic even by third-world standards. The two tiny cots provided for many detainees were dirty, and a few filthy blankets were on the floor. Officer [REDACTED] arrived to collect me for my "interview" several hours later even though I had already heard the aforementioned statements between Officer [REDACTED] and the Virgin Australia employee stating that I was indeed going home. Officer [REDACTED] the Supervisor who carried out my interview, was smug, patronizing, gave me no chance to speak on the phone to my loved ones, and no chance to explain my case or to show him evidence that contradicted their conveniently chosen "evidence." Officer [REDACTED] advised that I was refused entry and blatantly informed me that he did not want me to speak with my fiancée as this could enable us "to talk our way out of this" - even though neither of us had, or intended to, commit any crime. To exacerbate my current state, I was later informed by other detainees in the holding room that they were allowed to personally speak with loved ones via telephone and explain their case. During my interview, Officer [REDACTED] found my crying amusing. He said "it would be a good story to tell one day" despite the fact that this was the worst experience of my life. Officer [REDACTED] continually informed me that a copy of my statement would be provided to me, yet this was never provided. Back in the holding cell, bathroom breaks were few and far between and many times the CBP Officers ignored detainees requests to use them or told us to "Wait." I was detained in the holding room until I was escorted on a returning flight to Australia, VA8, which was to depart at 11:50pm on April 29, 2016. As I waited with my CBP escorts at the gate, one of these escorts was CBP Officer [REDACTED]. I listened to him brag to the newly employed female officer also escorting me about how he couldn't believe what a "cushy job" he had at CBP after he left the Marines. To my disbelief, he announced that whenever Vietnamese or Filipina women come through CBP for questioning, he grants them entry to the US "no matter what, because they are hot." There were other CBP Officers in earshot of this conversation at Gate 131 (INTERNATIONAL TERMINAL) for flight VA8 on 04/29/16 at 11pm. This revealed to me that had I been of a different nationality, or to the liking of the CBP Officer(s) reviewing my case, that perhaps I would have been admitted to the USA based on my appearance and ethnicity. It would appear that the "power" of refusing law-abiding citizens (from any country), is at the discretion of the CBP Officers mood on the day or feelings for the traveller. I wish to have my "Refused Admission" stamp and history of this experience removed from my name and passport as I have never overstayed an ESTA, nor did I have any intention to do so in the present or future. If I was given the basic right to explain my case, by presenting evidence which demonstrated my intent to return to Australia, instead of being ignored and having CBP Officers select things which suited their basic assumptions, I would not be filing this complaint.

I would like to know how I can get the "Refused Admission" stamp on my passport removed so that I am not treated like a criminal when I travel to the US or any other country in the future. The 17 hours spent with CBP was the worst experience of my life. I am having nightmares of the holding cell and cannot get rid of the smell despite having discarded the clothing I was wearing. During my time in the holding cell and since I have returned home, I have had thoughts of self-harm, which is extremely out of character for me. The emotional trauma I was subjected to far outweigh any financial losses incurred. However, these include the flights booked to Los Angeles, my flight to New York the following day, and the hotel I was to stay in, in LA for the night of 04/29/16. I have been charged by the hotel and received a "No show forfeit" email from Southwest Airlines for failing to advise them I would not be on my flight to NYC on 04/30/2016. I can provide further documents and correlating evidence regarding my intentions to return home after 88 days, and any further documents requested. I am now applying for a B2 visa and have an interview at the US Consulate, scheduled on 05/11/16 in Perth, Australia. I sincerely hope my refusal of entry into the US on 04/29/16 does not affect this in any way, as my entire experience with CBP was unjust.

Firstly I would like to state that I am in no way blaming the CBP Employees as I believe that they are just doing their jobs. Now, I have been traveling with American Airlines as a non-revenue passenger since around 2008 as my wife is an employee of American Airlines Trinidad and Tobago. Since then I have been pulled into secondary almost all of the times that I traveled. Actually, I believe that the only time that I didnt was when I had to do SWIFT Training a couple years ago. Whenever they pull me in it takes almost 2-3 hours to go through their searches or whatever they do. Now it has gotten worse, like 4-5 hours, while I see people coming in and taking less than an hour. I am totally disgusted and frustrated having to do this every time I enter the US, there was even a time where I was going to Jamaica on vacation with my wife and as usual, I had to pass through Miami Intl as I am a non-revenue traveler. I was stopped both on the way and coming back to go home for more than 4 hours both times, which were only 4 days apart. The next thing is that they asked me the same questions over and over again, this is ridiculous. What can change in 4 days? I personally feel as though it is victimization for me having a Muslim name [redacted] and I am totally disgusted about the way I am being treated when I enter the country. It has even gotten worse now where they insist that they go through my Phone, iPad, Laptop, bags and Suitcase(s) every time I go in. This is ridiculous and an invasion of privacy. Besides, how much times will they go through the same devices/ items? Why do they have to? What are they looking for?... I am not a terrorist, I have no criminal record, I am not from Yemen, I have no family that are criminals, I dont do drugs, I dont belong to any "groups". I am not even a Muslim, I dont deal with arms and ammunition, I have never been to the middle east. The only thing that I can see that is wrong is that my name is [redacted] and to me that is not wrong, its just CBP perceives it to be so. On 5/15/2016, after accepting a year-long position with my organization to move to Turkey, I again encountered the SSSS alert on my boarding pass. Fine, no big deal, the first experience was pleasant and easy enough. Finally get to the TSA screening process at Dulles and I knew Id have to go through the process again, but not aware BEFORE HAND that, if my electronics do not power on, then Id have to give it up or go back to check-in to put it in my bag as an option BEFORE getting to TSA secondary screening. I understood that theyd have to swab most, if not all of, my things and test them, then Id have to get a pat-down. Fine, the one item that would not turn-on was my camera and it was flagged because it tested positive for "explosive material", at which point seemed odd, since I had also touched other things AFTER touching my camera (those things did not test positive). I was ask if I wanted a private room for pat-down or do it in the open while they searched my bags: I opted for a private room, at which the woman who was to pat me down seemed annoyed (if thats my choice, then why does it seem like Im inconveniencing you?). I had become visibly miffed that my camera would not turn on for me (nor had time to wait for the battery to charge even though we tried). The TSA agent told me Id have to go through the entire process again if I put my camera in my checked luggage and also said that Id have time to still catch my flight. that was not a guarantee that I could still catch my flight. I had to opt to surrender my camera that I had for 6 years with no problems taking through airports previously, EVER! The thing sat in a closet inside a case. After a while a female traslator came in and the questions began. The main questions revolved on my purpose for the trip, which I told them that it was to spend quality time with my parents and attend some rock concerts and enjoy the outdoors in my bicycle in Salt Lake City. I explained to them that on my previous trip I was unable to relax and visit places as my dad who has been diagnosed with cancer needed attention. In addition, during my previous trip my mom also fell sick and required to be hospitalized and be bed ridden for a while. Both of my parents are American Citizens and they rely on each other, hence my previous visit was busy with taking care of them. The officers didnt feel I was telling the truth about wanting to see concerts and madefun of the simple fact of wanting to see concerts while in Salt Lake City. They further questioned me to what type of concerts I was interested in attending, in which I replied Sebastian Bach, Slijpknot, Marilyn Manson, Korn, Def lepard and Black Sabbath. One Officer than asked me what was my favorite song from Black Sabath, in which I replied War Pigs and Paranoid, they turned laughed and told me that is not correct, which as an avid Black Sabbath fan I knew different, but it didnt seem to matter to them. I then requested to call my father in Salt Lake City, to wich they told me that request will be considered later. The officer directing the interview ordered me to give a cell phone and to have a seat. After some time they called me again and in threatening manner one officer said they wanted to know how long I worked in my previous trip and how much I make. I told them that through my laptop I completed my personal projects, I am a Designer and from Colombia some projects needed completion I completed my personal , and about \$2,500 was set for couple projects. The Officer expressed frustation and anger because they said some messages in my cell phone tell them about some work and revenue from that work. At this point I undertood my cell phone had been searched without my consent. The Officer told meit is an offense to lie to an US Immigration Officer and I told him that I was telling the truth, the Officers were pushing me hard to tell them what they wanted to hear. I felt my integrity was at rick, I was scared, exhausted, humiliated, petrified and I was thinking that maybe telling them what they wanted to hear, my nightmare would end. At the end of the interview I signed some papers which the final questions were if I was forced and intimidated to answer, in which I answered NO. I knew that was not the right answer, but I was scared from the beginning due to the attitude and demeanor the Officer who was dealing with me portrayed. Finally, I was able to call my dad in Salt Lake City and I was directed to another room in which I was held until I got placed in the flight back to Bogota, Colombia.

I am a very decent person with family principles, good education and manners and without a doubt this experience is the scariest, most humiliating one that ever I could imagine. I have never been involved in any misunderstanding like this -not even a traffic ticket situation- and to be treating as a criminal was not pleasant. I am asking you to reconsider the decision to deny my entry for a 5 year period and to reinstate my visa, is important to me have the oportunity to travel to meet my parents when required. I can provide any documentation necessary in regard to my employment and my parents medical issues that ocurred on my previous trip.

I am a british citizen and a solicitor who recently got a job with a us company to head up the immigration team in the uk. I was invited to attend a meeting and training at the us headquarters in bradenton. I applied for an esta and confirmed in the questions asked that I was refused a us visit visa for a wedding in 2011 because the immigration officer in his infinite wisdom assumed that I didnt have enough ties in the uk to return to the uk even though I showed that I was in employment in the uk and have family in the uk. I was also informed that if I had a mortgage in the uk, then that would be sufficient. Then I had an indefinite leave to remain in the uk. I obtained my british citizen the next year and had no intentions of coming to the us until I got this job with a us company where I have been required to do a mandatory training in the us. I applied for an esta and was rejected on the basis that I had been refused a visa in the past. This is so upsetting and distressing as my employer had on the basis that I was a british citizen booked return tickets to the us, hotel reservations were made and car rental booked for me. Also, other counsels from other operational regions in europe and asia were booked to fly in for our meeting. Now I have been unreasonably refused entry and requested to obtain a visa, the process about 4 weeks before one is granted.

My employer has lost monies expended for my travel and accommodation. I have lost a meeting with other counsels from other parts of the world who flew in just for this meeting, missed taking my laptop and phone which I am required to use for my job in the uk, and cannot do work until it is delivered to me. I feel like I am being punished when I havent committed any offence and it is not just very unfair but outright unreasonable. I live in the uk with my 4year old son who is in school and who is close to family. I cannot even conceive the thought of relocating to another country. We are well settled in the uk and this notion that everyone wants to live in the us is not right because I am one of those who do not wish to settle in the us. I only wanted to attend meetings in relation to my work baseds in the uk.

I am always referred to go through secondary screening when clearing US customs. On May 16, 2016 while traveling to Denver from Vancouver (Canada) for a business trip, a CBP officer from the secondary screening handed me some information about the DHS TRIP and told me that if I qualified, it can save me a lot of time and hassle when ever traveling to the US.

When I was 18 years old, I had a one-time incident in which I tried to use a stolen credit card. I was apprehended, convicted and given a sentence of 24 months probation as a result. It was the biggest mistake I have ever made in my entire life. Since then I have worked hard to get my life back on track and become a contributing member of society. I have completed a technical college program and obtained an electronics engineering degree and am able to work in a fulfilling career in the medical industry. My company specializes in dialysis therapy and equipment for renal/kidney failure patients. My responsibility is to provide technical field support for home dialysis patients in the provinces of BC and Yukon. In 2005, while traveling with family for a wedding to Sacramento, I had tried to enter the US from the Peace Arch border crossing (between Surrey BC and Blaine Washington) where I was denied entry for the first time. I was told because of my record, that I was inadmissible to the US and that I would need to apply for a waiver. In 2008, after filing an I-192 form (Advance Permission to Enter as a Nonimmigrant) I was given a letter and the determination from the Admissibility Review Office that I would be eligible for travel to the US. Also that year, I was awarded a full pardon by the government of Canada (National Parole Board) in which my conviction record was expunged. The pardon letter states that I was of good conduct and that the conviction should no longer reflect adversely on my character unless it ceases to exist or is subsequently revoked. I am pleased to say that I am now 36 years old and have really turned my life around in the last 18 years. I can honestly say that I am a law abiding citizen and will continue to be a contributing member of society through leadership, volunteer and respect of the community.

Hello, I am a Canadian citizen that tried to go to the States May 12, 2016 but was denied entry. Here is a quick background of my travels to the States. On Feb.25th 2016, I was allowed entry into the U.S. by a CBP officer. He stamped my passport saying I could stay until August 26th, 2016. On May 20th, the day the incident took place, I went back to the States but I was denied entry. My cellphone was detained by a CBP officer [redacted] name on the shirt. I understand he was doing his job. I did not mind that my cellphone was taken because I have nothing to hide. The way that the situation was handled however, left me feeling really sad. Not only did officer [redacted] not treat me with the respect and courtesy that any person deserves, he also twisted and omitted my words in my statement so that the words would reflect poorly on me. For example, when asked how long I would be staying in the States, I said "One month. Mid-June." Instead he typed "Umm, one month." I asked him if he could please add that I had said mid-June as that is when I knew I would be coming back as I already had a flight booked to Toronto from Vancouver for June 17th, 2016. He scoffed. He also took parts of my e-mails to mean that I was going to be working in the States, and despite me having been completely honest with him about the fact that I would NOT be working in the States and having told him of an e-mail that specifically stated that I would not be getting paid, he still added in my statement that I would possibly be nannying and seeking illegal work as a vocal coach. I explained to him that I used to nanny [redacted] when she lived in Vancouver, Canada. I am good friends with her and her parents and we stayed in touch. I've always wanted to see Portland and thought it would be fun to visit with them. I also told him that another officer had stamped my passport showing that I could stay until August. Officer [redacted] exact words were, "Well Im not him. There are good cops and bad cops. Im a bad cop everyday. Now this is one my favourites, would you like to be barred for five years?" I would like to add that I am a musician, something I explained to him when he asked me about [redacted] my stage name. I explained that since January 2016, my parents had wanted me to quit my work as a music teacher and focus on my career as an artist. My parents are supportive of my craft and would rather me live at home than have me worry about paying bills (car and rent). In my statement, under residence, he added that I have no residence which is not true. I told him that since I had quit my work to go focus on my own company, Versus Records, I needed to cut down on some costs. In my statement, he added that I got rid of my car because I cant make payments. I told him that I transferred the car to my parents but that I still pay insurance on it. Also, he asked me about my cellphone bill and I told him I had gotten rid of my CURRENT plan. I am now on a more basic plan. Instead he added in my statement that I "dropped my phone plan because I could not make payments." When I confronted him about my words being altered he did nothing about it. Under employment, he put that I have no work, which is false. I told him that I am self-employed at my record label Versus Records where I teach music and make productions for singers. A very kind officer on Feb 25th 2016 once said that I should have my parents write a letter to confirm that I am living with them. So, I brought the letter that both parents signed and showed it to officer [redacted]. He threw it back at me saying, "We dont take letters from mothers." I was really disappointed and felt bullied. He also commented that I had been searching the web for places to live in the States. I clarified that my boyfriend was the one doing the searching. Since he doesnt own a laptop, he used mine. I told him that my boyfriend was ALSO looking at places in Vancouver. He was looking for fun and out of curiosity because in a few years he would like to buy property. He asked me how much money I had in my bank account. I told him the truth (-\$10). However, I ALSO said that I had \$80 American cash on me and of course this was not added to my statement. I explained that my parents give me money when I need it for spending and my music project. I was completely open and honest about everything and despite what I said, it seemed like he was still looking for a reason to not let me in. He asked me why I didnt have a return flight and I explained to him the reason: My friend [redacted] is a co-pilot for Alaska Airlines. He gives me buddy pass links where I can buy one-way tickets that are a lot more reasonable in price. Unfortunately, these links only allow me to buy one way at a time. I bought one-way and hadnt bought my return yet, something that I now regret not doing. When the officer told me this was a problem, I offered to buy a return on the spot but instead he had already made up his mind about me.

I'd like to add here that whenever an officer has asked me how long I would be staying in the States, I have always been completely honest with my duration of stay. If I say 1 month, I come back in 1 month. If I say 2 weeks, I am back within 2 weeks. I would also like to add that before having been escorted to officer [redacted] was almost let through. As the officer is letting me go through, he hands me back my passport and ticket and said very nicely, "Have fun. Dont stay long." I told him the truth as I walked past him and told him that I would be back in a month, mid-June. The officer then stopped and asked me to return. If I had said nothing, I would have gone through. I am an honest person and feel that I was unfairly treated despite having been honest. The kind officer that stamped my passport on Feb.25th and said I could stay until August 2016, asked me if my boyfriend and I ever intended to get married. I told him the truth and that is yes. We are in love. I explained that we wanted to apply for a fiance visa one day soon. He was pleased that I even knew about the visa and that I was taking the correct steps should I decide to file for immigration one day. I said the same thing to officer [redacted] but instead he twisted my words and took them to mean that I intend to live in the States now. I dont feel that it is fair that my words were changed. I also feel that officer [redacted] pre-judged me because I gave my car to my parents even though I still pay for the insurance, and that I dont pay rent. He used these facts about my life against me and I dont think thats right. I am very grateful that I have parents that are helping me achieve my dreams. I dont think that my passport should be flagged because my parents support my career as a musician and everything that entails. I am an honest person with nothing to hide. I take pride in the fact that I am a great civilian with no criminal record. I would never do anything illegal.

On 18 Feb 2016 when returning to the US for vacation from working overseas I was singled out for additional screening both at YYK and again at EWR. When I returned to work on 20 Mar 2016 from Greensboro NC I was again selected for additional screening. This happened on every flight I took.

A little about myself, I am a disable combat veteran who continues to serve my country by contracting for the U.S. Department of State in various overseas locations. While I understand the need for random screenings I feel I have been needlessly harassed by these events. I have a clearance for most all of my adult life and currently hold a USDS Secret clearance as necessitated by my current position as a WPS contractor. I can provide verification if it would be helpful. My time at home is limited due to the type of work I do. I feel that a cleared U.S. Citizen travelling internationally for work in support of U.S. Diplomatic Missions as a right to feel harassed when he is singled out on every leg of a flight he takes to and from work. Again I fully understand the point of security and screenings but I feel we can all agree this system is needs some improvements in both its efficiency and effectiveness. I believe the OIG noted this in last years report. The staff that conducted the additional screenings at both locations were extremely rude I waited over 20 minutes both times simply for the screeners to show up and in both cases the screening in total lasted well over an hour from initially being informed to completion. I was also informed that if my numerous electronic devices were not charged and were unable to be turned on they would be confiscated and I would not ever get them back.

As a small business owner in Hamilton Ontario that lives close to the Lewiston NY border, I travel across to the USA often (about 20-30 times a year). I go to pick up commercial goods purchased via eBay at the UPS depot close to the border using my Toyota Corolla car license [redacted] the car is always empty by the way. I declare this and come in to pay the user fee of \$13.05 USD which is no real problem, but it is a bit odd since half of the fee is for agricultural inspection and I work in the electronics field. I have been informed twice now when I went through the border at the Ambassador bridge that my profile has been given a status of automatic secondary inspection, even when I go for trade shows or sales calls that have nothing to do with a UPS run. After hours waiting at that busy border the advice to go back and talk to the supervisor at the Lewiston Bridge was recommended. I did so on my last trip June 1, 2016 and they told me that I had to apply through this website to get whatever status is on my account removed. As I have never had any issues at the border and travel frequently, I suspect that a border officer named [redacted] stashed my account about 1.5 years ago when I asked for backup information of the user fee which they started to administer for UPS pickups even though it was originally passed by Reagan in 1985. To be fair, when I have gone into the US for personal reasons the Lewiston border folks have let me go after a secondary meeting. It is just that the need for a secondary meeting always is mostly because of some issue on what is on my account which I know about but the supervisor I met with said that I should not have. All I ask is that the automatic secondary inspection be lifted and that since we depend upon USA access and have always been upfront and truthful - that the slightly negative connotation we seem to have attracted be amended. Im a PhD student (4th year) on an F1 visa. I am from Spain. Since July 2015, I have been stopped by CBP upon entry to the US and referred to secondary inspection every time. It has happened the last 5 times I have entered the US. Every time this happens I have to wait between one hour and 2.5 hours. Im not allowed to use my phone or any other electronic device, nor I can let my family know that I am fine. No one will tell me whats wrong with my documents and why this is happening to me. I have lived in the US for a combined time of 6 years and this had never happened before. My school (MIT) says that they cant help me and that this application is my only hope. Whenever Im in secondary inspection, Im released as soon as an officer handles my case. Most of the times they do not even ask me any questions, and just tell me that Im free to go. However this takes 2.5 hours some times. Please help me fix this problem. Thank you for your help.

CBP officers are extremely rude and condescending. You cant talk to them, as any attempt to ask why this is happening will result in them getting pissed and telling you to sit down and shut up. Also, they do not even know the rules themselves. Last time I asked an officer why I was being kept in the inspection room, he told me that this is always the case for every F1 student upon entry to the US, why I know is completely false, as I have been a F1 student for many years. As I was leaving, I was asked if I had any luggage from a baggage airport employee, not customs employee. I told him no and he said loudly that I didnt. The Customs officer asked me and I told him no. He asked me how many days I was in Mexico and I told him one. I understand when he sent me to sit in a small room, later with approximately 16-20 people. After no communication from customs and 25 minutes, I asked the Supervisor (b)(6) what was going on. She said I was being held for undisclosed reasons. I asked her how much longer since there was no one attending to us sitting in the room. SHE SAID AN HOUR OR MORE. I went back to the room. After several peoples phones went off, she continue to order people to shut off there phones. About an hour past while in the room, I went back outside and asked her how much longer. She said 10-15 minutes before they got an officer to start helping us in the room. After about 1.5 hours, an officer came in. She began to run passports on her computer. Within 12-15 minutes, I was released when she got to my passport. It appeared she ran my passport and released me within 4 minutes. I was released somewhere before 1am on 6/14, approximately two hours after my flight landed.</p>	<p>First, I would like to ask if 1.5-2 hours is reasonable to detain me. No one was being processed in the room and we, as a whole room, were given any communication as of what was going on or expected time. Second, (b)(6) ordered us to put away our cellphones, and turn them off. Is this right? We have families that expect us. We are ordered to not use our cell phone and to turn them off. Even arrested criminals have rights to use a telephone within a time frame. So my biggest concern is: Is it REASONABLE to be detained for two hours BASED on this circumstance? What ever it is, lack of personal, or etc., it was not right to be held in a room and not allowed to make any contact outside of this room. My family wants to know. I also contacted the Airport Media Relations to inform them of this event. From May 2015-June 2016, I was posted to the U.S. Embassy in Islamabad, Pakistan. Whenever I traveled to the U.S. since May 2015, I was subjected to secondary screening from U.S. Customs and Border Protection as well as by Transportation Security Administration (TSA). While attempting pre clearance by U.S. CBP at Halifax Airport in Nova Scotia, Canada, I was placed in secondary screening for over one hour. After CBP made multiple phone calls, I was finally cleared, however I missed my flight and had to wait another 8 hours for the next flight. Also, while going through TSA security clearance at the airport, I was always flagged for secondary as depicted by the four "SSSS" on my boarding pass, both on 26 June 2016 while flying from Halifax to Baltimore, as well as when flying on 01 July 2016 from Washington Dulles Airport to Seattle-Tacoma (SeaTac) airport. During the 01 July screening, I was physically searched extensively, including my private body parts. I also had to check in my laptop, cell phone, and iPad because they werent charged and wouldnt turn on for screening, costing me extra fees and forcing me to go back to stand in United Airline check-in lines to check in my bag, almost costing me to catch my flight. My check-in luggage was also searched. Further, while clearing U.S. customs in December 2015 at SeaTac airport when I was coming back for R&amp;R vacation from my posting at U.S. Embassy Islamabad, Pakistan, I was subjected to secondary screening by CBP. Just after passing through customs and getting my stamp, a different US customs officer, (b)(6) called me into secondary questioning. He demanded I hand over my phone, I did willingly. He asked who I was going to see, and I told him (b)(6). He asked how we met, and I said Bumble, a dating app. He asked if (b)(6) paid for my flight, and I said yes. He then proceeded to question whether I'm an escort and spent the majority of what was approximately 1.5 hours of interrogation trying to get me to tell him how much I was being paid by (b)(6) to fly out and see him, which was nothing. He kept telling me I was lying to him, not cooperating, raising my voice and being disrespectful, none of which was the case. I told him the truth about everything and very respectfully, whilst through tears and sobbing. He mocked me for crying and kept telling me to stop because no one is going to help me. Early on during questioning he asked whether or not I have been arrested, which I answered yes. He barely reverted back to that except when he would say, if you simply tell me how much you're being paid by (b)(6) I will let your past arrest go unnoticed. He told me escorting is legal so why am I bothering to lie. He went through my photos and asked, is this what you wore to escort in this week, to a picture of me in jeans and a low cut blouse. This made me feel extremely uncomfortable. He asked numerous times if I had a job, which I replied yes. He said if he called my boss would he find out I just quit? to which I offered to show pay stubs from the past week or for him to call my boss but he disregarded both. He also asked how much money I have in my bank account. I begged him to read my conversation with (b)(6) for my friends where it was clear I was pursuing a genuine relationship. Throughout the process he kept patronizing me saying have I once raised my voice at you? Have I been mean to you? Why are you crying? How old are you? During the questioning, he also asked me what social media sites I was a part of. I listed them all and he said, no, there is one more, and was looking at his computer and said he could see another. I insisted those were all I knew of and he told me I was on Seeking Arrangements. I told him that is not possible unless someone used my name or unless I made an account out of curiosity but could not recall doing so and was absolutely not active on it. He passed me my phone, told me to sign in, and had already pulled up the login page on my browser for me. I assured him I did not have an account. I had my admission withdrawn and was escorted out by (b)(6) with a second customs officer. I asked what the reasoning was and he reverted back to my failure to provide proper documentation of my arrest even though he spent the whole time interrogating me about being an escort and said my lack of cooperation and lies are the reason he is denying me. April 19, 2016, I was traveling with a close friend to visit her boyfriend in Dallas, Texas and to attend a country concert. I had a letter of reference from my MP supporting my trip to the US and validating my citizenship. I also had a letter of employment from my boss and the paperwork from my arrest, from which no charges were laid. I had to go into secondary questioning once again. I waited approximately 40 minutes before being served while at least 5 people who came in after me were helped first even though I was told we were being served on a first come first serve basis. It was not until (b)(6) was available that I was finally called up. He recognized me and asked for my court papers, which I produced. He seemed satisfied with them after showing his superior. He asked me again about which social media sites I was a part of and when I said no to Seeking Arrangements he tried to deny me access to the US based on lying to him last time. I asked to speak to his supervisor and explained how last time I never once admitted to being a part of the site and that (b)(6) tried to coerce me into believing I had an account. I had never acknowledged this as true and said they could look at the security cameras as proof. After that (b)(6) dropped the issue but questioned me further. He asked who paid for this flight, I did. He asked the purpose of my trip and I showed him the concert tickets. He asked for my phone, I said my lawyer told me I do not need to give it to you and (b)(6) replied you are right, and I do not need to let you into the US so you can leave right now. I handed him my phone. He asked if I was going to see (b)(6) and I said no. He asked why (b)(6) had sent me a photo of a flight to Dallas and I told him that (b)(6) was considering that flight if his work will allow him the time off. (b)(6) asked again, are you going to see (b)(6) and I said, No, that is not the purpose of my trip, I booked this trip before I knew (b)(6) if he comes, it is simply a bonus. He said he was going to deny me today based on lying to a US customs officer to gain entry into the US.

(Continued) I asked to speak to his supervisor and explained I was not lying, I was not going to see (b)(6) as he did not yet have a flight. The supervisor looked at (b)(6) and asked him, have you ever committed a murder (b)(6) replies no. The supervisor looks at me and mockingly says, see, it is that easy to answer a question, do you understand what the term misrepresentation means? and gave (b)(6) permission to deny me. (b)(6) told me I would need a waiver to be able to travel to the US, and told me how to obtain it. I was not told how long I am denied for and was too upset to think to ask at the time. I did nothing for (b)(6) to have pulled me into secondary questioning, especially after already having received my stamp into the US. I am certain I was discriminated against solely based on gender, being a young, (attractive) female traveling alone. There is ZERO reason for him to accuse me of being an escort, which is sexual harassment in itself. He coerced me into believing I had an account on Seeking Arrangements which is false. I felt sexually harassed when he went through my photos and showed me a picture asking if that is what I wore to escort in this week. His mocking was abusive. Escorting me out like a criminal with another officer was humiliating and unnecessary. The whole situation I was cooperating and truthful, yet I was completely helpless and under constant attack. He was digging up irrelevant questions, on his fabricated theory I was an escort and humiliated and verbally abused me. I want to appeal this denial to the US because I have never lied to a US customs officer or been or tried to be an escort. I do not want troubles crossing the US border in the future as this entire situation was completely unjust. I do not want this man to continue to abuse other young, female travelers like myself, which I know is he still doing, because the EXACT same situation happened to a close friend, (b)(6). Please help me clear this up.

Off loaded from booked flight Dublin to Boston by Border Control after being interviewed by USA Border Control, treated in an appalling and humiliating manner by a female officer, who removed her name badge so unable to confirm her name. She laughed at the contents of my suitcase, throw my possessions, including laptop and mobile phone, on the desk, laughing at the content of mobile phone, when she grabbed it from me, showing it to another female colleague and speaking to each other in Spanish and laughing. I was denied the opportunity to speak as she would ask a question and then interrupt and talk over me. She did not give me a formal reason, or document, explaining why I was refused entry to USA but stated "Who do you think will be staying in the USA, it won't be you, it will be me, cos I live there. You're off-loaded. How do you like them apples". Her actions were to humiliate, ridicule and embarrass me to her (and her Spanish female colleagues) delight. Is this really how your USA Border Control Officers should treat another human being? She did not attempt to undertake any checks, contact my friends in Boston or try and verify the little information I tried to give her.

I had booked a return trip to USA, due to leave the USA on 28 September 2016, well within the ESTA regulations. It was my intention to spend this time travelling around but use Boston as a base, as I have friends there that were expecting me. I was left abandoned in Dublin and offered no assistance by anyone. I repeat that I was not given an official explanation for the refusal other than being told that she said I was talking "bullshit" to quote the USA female Border Control Officer - and that was the end of my dream trip to the USA. I have no idea about my status for future trips, am I no longer ever able to go to the USA - your Officer was too busy having fun humiliating me to act in anything close to a professional manner. I wish to appeal the decision to refuse me entry to the USA.

The questions included where I spent my time in Lebanon, what I did, who I met with, names birthdates, phone numbers, emails (if any) and occupation of my wife, kids, my two brothers (and their wives), my sister (and her husband), my sisters in-law, my brother in law, people I met such as my cousin, places Ive been to in Lebanon. My wallet was checked one item at a time, along with my backpack and checked bag. I had with me my work MacBook in case of a work-related emergency, along with my work-supplied iPhone 6. I was asked me to unlock the phone and provide the password, which I did. I was asked for the password of the MacBook for which I replied that I needed to first check with Verizons Legal or Corporate Security as the password is a work Domain password. However, I offered to unlock the MacBook myself and provide it to the agent unlocked which they agreed to. The agents took both devices along with another older Samsung smartphone which I gave to my mom 2 years ago and brought back with me to replace its bad battery. They took all 3 devices for inspection for over 3 hours without my presence. Prior to the departure of the flight to DFW (about 4.5 hours later) I got the all clear and I managed to make my flight. My bag did not and it was delivered the next day. My family returned from Lebanon on 8/4 and booked a 10-day trip (Aug 8-17) along with my sister-in-law to San Diego, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Denver prior to back-to-school. As I already took some time-off from I couldnt join them for the entire trip but I booked a flight for Saturday 8/13 morning to meet them in SFO and spend the weekend together and return to work Monday morning. My boarding pass was not issued online. The ticketing agent had to call to issue it. I couldnt proceed through TSA, and was asked me to wait for a supervisor. An agent took my ID and boarding pass and performed a manual pat-down asked me to go through the metal detector and the micro-wave scanning. I had only a backpack with clothes for 2 nights in SFO and my cell phone. All went through X-ray along with my shoes. Also, were swiped and tested for explosive residues. They came clear but my shoes which triggered an alert. The agent said theyd bring a "Specialist". 15 mins later an Explosives Specialist, per imprint on his shirt, showed up. The gentleman was very professional, took my shoes and asked me to wait. 10 minutes later he came back with an all clear. I got my boarding pass and ID back and headed to gate where more TSA agents were inspecting boarding passes and IDs for my flight. I showed mine to an agent and handed my boarding pass to an airline agent which asked for my ID again before boarding. The same happened this morning at 4am on my way back. I got my boarding pass at the counter after a phone call, got the alert at the TSA counter and I went through the additional screening. This time, fortunately enough, the same shoes did not produce an alert, and I proceeded to my gate. At the gate there were 3 or 4 TSA agents checking boarding passes and IDs. In Dallas I cleaned up and went to the office where I met my colleague,  who got back on 8/14 eve from a vacation with his family to London. While boarding his flight in London, a security agent asked him how he knew me and his relationship to me, and why his AA reservation had my name on it. I repeatedly replied that I have not and that was not an as that I placed. On further inspection the screenshot was of a community ad to join a womens soccer team while i was in the US to meet new people. Further to this the officer who inspected my phone asked for details of my friend (b)(6) who i workout with to call and confirm that i instruct classes, which again i refuted as i did not instruct or work at any time i was in the USA. He decided to speak to my american boyfriend instead who backed up my claims. The officers were hostile. Further to this they told me that my visa would be cancelled. That i had to answer questions under oath for my case to be reviewed. I answered all these questions to be told that they would not be reviewed because there was too much paperwork to do so i could be returned to australia (my choice rather than back to germany and i paid for the flight) so quote i dont want to babysit you all night At this stage I am distraught and an emotional wreck. Upon being escorted to my gate my phone was returned, the officer who had searched my phone began to refer to my personal photos and videos. One occasion asking what i was smoking in a video which was a peach flavoured vape and in no way had any relation to my cancelled visa. He then proceeded to ask me questions about how to stay fit and nutrition advice. he made mention to photos he had seen of me in my phone and comments that i look super fit and that workouts i do are intense. i find this to be highly inappropriate. In denver this officer also used his personal phone whilst i was under their supervision. In LA both officers used their personal devices whilst i was under their supervision as well and i have a photo i can share with you showing this. I didnt face any problems in IST though at Schiphol airport. I was asked for additional screening at the gate before getting on the plane. The process was simple and fast. I didnt mind at all. Unfortunately, upon my return on June 23rd, 2016, I had to wait for almost an hour at TSA. For some reason, there werent any second screening personal present, it took 20 minutes or so for the supervisor to join me. I was asked to have chargers ready and make sure that my phone and laptop would turn on. They went through everything and I was so stressed out and horrified to be treated like such. I felt very disrespected and even I had mentioned that i would miss my flight, nothing was done. After an hour or so and lots of stress tears, I was the last one to get on the plane. I need help to clarify an issue with my name, which has made me go through secondary immigration inspections sometimes when I enter the USA with a B1-B2 Visa. I have been through secondary inspections when entering the USA 3 times: 2008, 2010 and the last one in January, 2016 (these 3 times I was entering the USA with an B1-B2 Visa). This last time, I was on my way to the Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas. I work in a department store in Chile and I attend this fair every year because we sell electronics, among other things. I have attended this fair 6 times before (2008, 2009, 2010, 2014, 2015 and 2016). The reason Immigration Officers have given me is that my name matches someone wanted for serious crimes. I must emphasize that I have never been denied entrance to the USA after these procedure. I must say also that Officers have always been kind and respectful and have behaved in a professional manner. I am not sure why I keep going through these inspections, because I have entered the USA many times without the need of secondary inspection. In fact, I lived in the USA for almost 2 years as a Graduate student with an F1 Visa between 2010 and 2012 when I attended UCLA to pursue a Masters Degree. I had no problem to obtain my student visa and never had a problem while living in Los Angeles. I also have never had a problem to obtain a B1/B2 Visa (my current B1-B2 visa expires in 2020). On September 23, 2016 at approximatley 4:30pm I arrived at Houston International Airport where I arrived from Cancun, Mexico via Spirit Airlines flight NK489. As I proceed to CBP I approached the Automated Kiosk and followed the instructions. During this process the computer printed out a receipt with a "X" on it. I proceeded to the line to the right and from there I was escorted to the secondary holding area. I sat in the secondary holding area for 1 hour before anyone approached me or spoke to me. After an hour of sitting around, I was approached by Officer (b) who stated that he didnt know where to start with me or doesnt know why I am here. He also stated as a U.S. Citizen, he doesnt know why I was referred to secondary. Officer (b) kept saying that he didnt know why I was in the immigration secondary as a U.S. Citizen and then began asking of I was a federal agent and if I was conducting some type of investigation on him. I am not sure if this was some type of investigative tactic that Officer (b) was using but the type of questioning that followed was very concerning to me. Officer (b) although very professional for the most part, began asking me intrusive questions about where I was, previous travel and other personal questions. During these questions, my phones and laptop were taken from me against my will where they were examined. This was the second time my electronic items were taken from me and examined by CBP Officers. I was expecting to leave the secondary inspection area when (b) advised that I will leaving after about 2 hours but then the Chief of CBP arrived and advised me that he will stop this from ever happening again if I cooperate by unlocking my phones and computer for him. As I have already had my electronic devices inspected on a pervious trips and missed my flight before, I refused to unlock my phones or laptop again. After about 3 additional hours of sitting in CBP Secondary, they finally returned my electronic devices and told me they will let me leave to catch my flight. At this point, I already missed my flight to Detroit which departed at 8:20pm. I was detained in secondary for over 5 hours and when I was finally released, Officer (b) told me to catch the United Airlines flight back to Detroit as CBP already spoke to the airline to take me on their flight to Detroit. When I got to the United Airlines ticket counter, the ticket counter manager checked his system and found no tickets or reservations for me to return home. He also stated that CBP did not notify them of my re-routed flight to Detroit. I was left to fend for myself with no flight home and no hotel for the night. The United Airlines gate agent advised me that they do not have flights to Detroit that late in the evening which meant the officer just made up information to get me to leave with some hope of catching a flight home. As a United States Citizen and tax payer, I am very disappointed by how I was treated and detained for 5 hours against my will. CBP made me miss my flight, lied to me about rebooking me on another flight and left me to pay for my own hotel and make my own arrangements to fly back to Detroit the following day. This is the second time I was detained for over 1 hour and missed my connecting flight. I have been referred to secondary every time I returned to the United States because of an encounter I had in Detroit over 10 years ago, when a CBP Officer at the Ambassador Bridge found a photo of my brother who lived in Yemen at the time. The picture was of my brother carrying what appeared to be an RPG during the civil war he was fighting in Afghanistan, which the United States supported during that time. For the record, my brother died fighting in that war and I barely knew him as that was one of the only photos I had of him which is why it was in my vehicle. The other photo that the officers found was a picture of me posing with a rifle in Yemen wearing sunglasses and smiling when I was in my early 20s. I only took this photo because I thought it was cool because it was my first time holding a rifle and I wanted to show off by showing the photo to my friends when I returned to the states. As many of us Americans do when hunting or just posing with our weapons stateside, I was doing the same thing with my relatives weapons in Yemen. I understand that looking at the picture can raise some red flags but if the officer at the time would have taken my truthful statement for its face value, I wouldnt be flagged in your system and stopped at the border for extended periods of times. I believe that the officer(s) in Detroit over exaderrated what they found and turned it into something much worse and ruined my life just to get themselves a "good catch" for the day. I am a law abiding citizen, working as a (b)(6)

I have held this armed position with the Sheriffs for over 14 years and I have a sworn duty to serve and protect the American people not because it is my job, but instead, I chose to do this because I care about our country, the safety of Americans and want to be a positive influence on my children and other young Americans. I also work full-time for Chrysler for over 17 years, which is a very labor intensive position. These two jobs, along with my wife and 4 children have been my reasons for traveling during the times my worksite is on shutdown. I take vacations with my friends and family so life is not always about working but when I return to the U.S. from out of the country trips, I get sent to secondary and detained for hours at a time. These encounters with CBP are embarrassing, stressful and making me feel like a criminal. I have lost sleep over this situation and the anxiety I get when I travel has caused me to become sick and disgusted with how Americans get treated by the government employees who are supposed to protect us. I am asking you to please have the flagging of my name removed from your database and allow me to live a peaceful life as a law abiding citizen. I will be awaiting a response from your department and if this issue does not get rectified, I will have no choice but to contact my congressman and state representative, giving them details to what entailed during my CBP encounters, as I feel my civil rights were violated.

I have been traveling without any problems up until January 2014, when I was stopped for some questioning returning from Saudi Arabia from Umrah (religious pilgrimage). Since then, I have been stopped for questioning every time I have boarded a flight. (I don't fly very often, so there were probably about 4-5 instances where I was stopped and questioned.) In one incident, in April 2015, I was scheduled for a flight from Indianapolis to NYC. I was unable to print the boarding pass, and was directed to the ticket counter, where I was told to wait for an unreasonable amount of time, by the end of which I was given a boarding pass stamped with "SSSS", and missed my flight. I was then told my flight was rescheduled to 2 hours later. After waiting two hours, I go up to the boarding pass counter, where I was told I cannot board the flight because I was on a government watch list and I was flying standby. I ended up taking a bus (over a 12 hour ride) in order not to miss my appointment in New York. In another incident, I was traveling with a group of friends to Toronto by car. (It was around May 10, 2015). We were detained at the border (Sarnia) for over 2 hours (from 11 P.M. to 1 A.M.) before it was decided that we needed to gather information about "who was funding our trip" (the actual reason most likely being that I was on the U.S. Government watch list), and that we could come back tomorrow with the information. So we turned around back towards the U.S. side of the border, where I was specifically taken out of the car, handcuffed, and taken to a room, where all of my belongings were taken, and I was questioned. After questioning, I was taken to a locked, monitored room, where the rest of my friends were waiting, also stripped of their belongings. (None of them are on the list, which means they were most likely held because of me.) We waited there for over twelve hours (from 1 A.M. until almost 2 P.M. the next day), not given any place to sleep, nor any food, occasionally being called, one by one for additional questioning. After this long ordeal, we were finally told that we can go, but my phone and my friends laptop were to be sent in to D.C. for extra testing. So I had to live the next two weeks without a phone, after which my phone was returned, with nothing remotely suspicious found.

I was stopped in each one of these incidents, because I was on one of the government "lists", although I do not believe I have done anything to deserve to be on the list, never having committed any crime, nor having any sort of affiliation, or even signs of leaning towards, any terrorist/extremist organization, nor any political ideology. So I humbly request that my name is taken off of the list, so that traveling will no longer be a fearful, long, arduous experience. I understand the governments concerns of security considering recent attacks/tragedies, but I am a peaceful, law abiding citizen who wishes nothing but good for my country and her people.

I am asked to provide not only all my luggage, but also all my personal belongings including laptop, cell phone, wallets, and keys to the examining officer. In one instance, a couple of agents appeared at my residence a few days after arrival for more questioning. I find this entire process extremely inappropriate, intrusive, exhausting, and unnecessary. I am a senior retired citizen, and get very embarrassed every time I travel. I have become a U.S. Permanent Resident to be close to my U.S. Citizen children (both established faculty members at prestigious U.S. Universities), and to be a proud member of this beautiful free society for the remainder of my life. Given that I have already gone through the exhaustive screening process for my Permanent Residency application, and upon my first time entry to the United States, I am perplexed to understand the reason for having to go through this intrusive, inappropriate, and exhaustive process. Every time I've traveled from or returned to the US, I've been subject to additional screening and questioning. These include travels in 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2016. In 2013, I was invited to be part of a panel discussion on the Darfur conflict at The Pulitzer Center for Crisis Reporting in Washington DC. As I tried to mount my Qatar Airways flight in Khartoum, Sudan, to Washington DC, I was told to wait. I waited for nearly 30 minutes before being allowed to proceed. While in transit in Doha, Qatar, I was questioned by an American agent for nearly 15 minutes before being allowed to proceed. When I arrived in Washington DC, I was escorted by an agent as I was picking up my luggage to a side area at Dulles International Airport. Agents went thoroughly through my luggage, I believe made copies of my notebooks, photographs from my camera and questioned me extensively about my work. After three hours, I was allowed to leave to meet my brother who was waiting for me outside. On March 24, 2014, I traveled to Washington DC from Nairobi, Kenya, via Amsterdam to visit my father who was very ill. While in transit in Amsterdam, I was taken to the side by an agent as I was about to board the plane to Washington DC and questioned for several minutes (by an agent, who after examining my passport, was apparently amused by the fact that I was born in Utah). In Washington DC, I was taken to a side area, questioned, agents went through my luggage, and I believe copied my notebooks and photographs. I was taken to a room after that and question for nearly 20 minutes by an agent (I believe DHS). I was not only asked about what I was doing abroad but also about my opinions on political matter. After a couple of hours, I was allowed to leave to meet family who were waiting outside patiently for me. On February 4, 2015, I traveled to Washington DC from Khartoum, Sudan, to visit family. Again, I was delayed at Khartoum International Airport, in Doha and in Washington DC. I was taken to the side area at Dulles International Airport, questioned, my luggage searched thoroughly, before being allowed to proceed. On July 16, 2015, I traveled to Washington DC from Nairobi, Kenya, via Amsterdam, as I ended my stay in Africa to attend graduate school in New York. Again, delayed and questioned in Amsterdam, delayed for several hours at Dulles International Airport before being allowed to proceed. But the most extensive screening was when I returned to the US from Sweden on January 9, 2016, at JFK Airport in New York. Agents escorted me from the door of the airplane, pass a long line of passengers to a side area (a French friend who happened to be on the same flight thought I was given special treatment as an American to pass the long passport line). For three hours, I was questioned, my notebooks and camera was taken (to make copies I assume) as was my laptop. I was asked about details of whom I met and interviewed, asked for contacts, telephone numbers, emails, and I was physically searched. I was allowed to leave after three hours. I have also been subject to added screening when trying to depart, whether from the US or from other international airports. I have not been able to print boarding passes electronically.

I am a journalist. I've worked in conflict zones, sometimes being one of few, or the only, journalist reporting for Western media. Press organizations have invited me to be on panel discussions. Western diplomats have asked for my opinion on political and security matter overseas. I've given a TEDx talk critical of racism and promoting coexistence. To continually be subject to additional screening and delays makes my work as a journalist more difficult. I cannot exclude discrimination based on ethnic and religious affiliations as a reason. Even worse, I believe, it interferes with my right to privacy and press freedom when traveling becomes a burden and security agents copy my notebooks, photographs, contacts and hard drive. It has also come to my attention that a colleague was traveling through an airport was held for several hours and questioned if he knew me. This impacts my ability to work and credibility. I would like this matter to be solved as soon as possible so I can continue my work as a journalist without being treated as a suspect.

I flew from Venice (Italy) to Las Vegas on Sep, 19th with connections in Amsterdam and Salt Lake City. At the time of boarding on the aircraft, I've been interviewed by a CBP officer. when I arrived at the CBP counter in Salt Lake City, I had another interview in a room with another officer after a long wait that made me miss the connection flight to Las Vegas. I travelled back to Italy on Sep, 30th from Las Vegas to Venice with a connection in NYC. I wasn't able to complete web check-in from the hotel. At security check I had an accurate scan with metal detector, full body scanner and path-down scanning. I had all my belongings in the backpack checked, and I was asked to power on my laptop.

The CBP agent directed me to the Customs Inspection station where a detailed search of my baggage, cell phone and laptop was conducted. This kind of search happened every time when I returned back to the US.

<p>I am a US Citizen with a Global Access Card (b)(6). My last 4 trips I have been selected for additional screening ("SSSS"). Initially they stated that it was random, but after 4 trips in a row, it is clearly no longer random. I will explain my first, last trip and my current trip. The 3rd trip was similar to my last trip. The initial time that I had to go through additional screening was about 5 weeks ago on my trip from Toronto back into US. I checked in, but had to get my boarding pass from ticket agent. I was escorted through security lines and went through additional screening (see process as described below in my last trip). However, in this case, when I spoke with the boarder patrol/customs folks, they asked more detailed questions about my trip to Canada. They also then escorted me into a separate room where I waited about an hour until someone came in and provided me with a document where they asked for information about me, my business, my travels, people that I am working with, etc. Then I was asked various questions about my previous travels before I was told I could leave. At this point, they told me it was a random selection for purposes of checking my Global Access. My last trip on October 13 I was departing Toronto to come home to Chicago. I was able to check in, but not able to print a boarding pass which was similar the previous two times, so I need that I would receive additional security screening. I went to the ticketing agent and they had to print my boarding pass. I was escorted to through the standard or regular security lines where I had to remove my shoes and then they looked through all my baggage and electronics. I also had to go through both the metal detector and xray machine prior to them stamping my boarding pass and letting me go through. Today, 10/26/16, and the 4th time this has happened, I am departing to go to Canada and was put through a far more extensive screening, which included going through both metal and xray machine and a pat down. The TSA agents went through all my belongings in great details, tested for any chemicals and then went through in great details all my luggage. <p>I have reported a Lebanese passport with a US visa on it stolen in 2009 (by fax to US embassy in Ottawa). The passport was with other documents in a laptop bag that was stolen from my apartment. <p>On September 23, 2016 at approximatley 4:30pm I arrived at Houston International Airport where I arrived from Cancun, Mexico via Spirit Airlines flight NK489. As I proceed to CBP I approached the Automated Kiosk and followed the instructions. During this process the computer printed out a receipt with a "X" on it. I proceeded to the line to the right and from there I was escorted to the secondary holding area. I sat in the secondary holding area for 1 hour before anyone approached me or spoke to me. After an hour of sitting around, I was approached by Officer (b)(6) who stated that he didnt know where to start with me or doesnt know why I am here. He also stated as a U.S. Citizen, he doesnt know why I was referred to secondary. Officer (b)(6) kept saying that he didnt know why I was in the immigration secondary as a U.S. Citizen and then began asking of I was a federal agent and if I was conducting some type of investigation on him. I am not sure if this was some type of investigative tactic that Officer (b)(6) was using but the type of questioning that followed was very concerning to me. Officer (b)(6) although very professional for the most part, began asking me intrusive questions about where I was, previous travel and other personal questions. During these questions, my phones and laptop were taken from me against my will where they were examined. This was the second time my electronic items were taken from me and examined by CBP Officers. I was expecting to leave the secondary inspection area when Lopez advised that I will leaving after about 2 hours but then the Chief of CBP arrived and advised me that he will stop this from ever happening again if I cooperate by unlocking my phones and computer for him. As I have already had my electronic devices inspected on a pervious trips and missed my flight before, I refused to unlock my phones or laptop again. After about 3 additional hours of sitting in CBP Secondary, they finally returned my electronic devices and told me they will let me leave to catch my flight. At this point, I already missed my flight to Detroit which departed at 8:20pm. I was detained in secondary for over 5 hours and when I was finally released, Officer (b)(6) told me to catch the United Airlines flight back to Detroit as CBP already spoke to the airline to take me on their flight to Detroit. When I got to the United Airlines ticket counter, the ticket counter manager checked his system and found no tickets or reservations for me to return home. He also stated that CBP did not notify them of my re-routed flight to Detroit. I was left to fend for myself with no flight home and no hotel for the night. The United Airlines gate agent advised me that they do not have flights to Detroit that late in the evening which meant the officer just made up information to get me to leave with some hope of catching a flight home. As a United States Citizen and tax payer, I am very disappointed by how I was treated and detained for 5 hours against my will. CBP made me miss my flight, lied to me about rebooking me on another flight and left me to pay for my own hotel and make my own arrangements to fly back to Detroit the following day. This is the second time I was detained for over 1 hour and missed my connecting flight. I have been referred to secondary every time I returned to the United States because of an encounter I had in Detroit over 10 years ago, when a CBP Officer at the Ambassador Bridge found a photo of my brother who lived in Yemen at the time. The picture was of my brother carrying what appeared to be an RPG during the civil war he was fighting in Afghanistan, which the United States supported during that time. For the record, my brother died fighting in that war and I barely knew him as that was one of the only photos I had of him which is why it was in my vehicle. The other photo that the officers found was a picture of me posing with a rifle in Yemen wearing sunglasses and smiling when I was in my early 20s. I only took this photo because I thought it was cool because it was my first time holding a rifle and I wanted to show off by showing the photo to my friends when I returned to the states. As many of us Americans do when hunting or just posing with our weapons stateside, I was doing the same thing with my relatives weapons in Yemen. I understand that looking at the picture can raise some red flags but if the officer at the time would have taken my truthful statement for its face value, I wouldnt be flagged in your system and stopped at the border for extended periods of times. I believe that the officer(s) in Detroit over exaderated what they found and turned it into something much worse and ruined my life just to get themselves a "good catch" for the day. I am a law abiding citizen, working as a (b)(6)</p>	<p>I have held this armed position with the Sheriffs for over 14 years and I have a sworn duty to serve and protect the American people not because it is my job, but instead, I chose to do this because I care about our country, the safety of Americans and want to be a positive influence on my children and other young Americans. I also work full-time for Chrysler for over 17 years, which is a very labor intensive position. These two jobs, along with my wife and 4 children have been my reasons for traveling during the times my worksite is on shutdown. I take vacations with my friends and family so life is not always about working but when I return to the U.S. from out of the country trips, I get sent to secondary and detained for hours at a time. These encounters with CBP are embarrassing, stressful and making me feel like a criminal. I have lost sleep over this situation and the anxiety I get when I travel has caused me to become sick and disgusted with how Americans get treated by the government employees who are supposed to protect us. I am asking you to please have the flagging of my name removed from your database and allow me to live a peaceful life as a law abiding citizen. <p>That day, my family and me tried to cross into the United States to join my in-laws that were already there in Mcallen, Texas; not only we were denied entry but our immigration visas were retained. I want to add that we have had an immigration visa for 25 years and the US had been our go to place to vacate and go shopping. We came in to Pharr International Bridge my wife (b)(6) pregnant at the time, my daughters (b)(6) 6 yo that day) and (b)(6) 1 yo that day), and me (b)(6) Cano de Pau. While showing my visa to the officer we were asked to go to secondary inspection. Then another officer came and asked me about my father, which I responded that I did not know where he was, something that it was true at the time. Then the officer told us to leave. While I was starting the engine another officer came in to the car window and told me to get off the vehicle. I, then accompanied the officers to the office inside and officer (b)(6) started interrogating me, asked for our cellphones, checked our contacts, emails, calls and message and even tried to call my fathers cell phone. He then kept asking me questions: where was my father, where did I work, where did I get the money to start my business, how much money we had in our accounts, how much money we had at the time with us, and asked about my father businesses. I answered the truth, that I did not know anything about his accusations, that I did not know where he was, that the last time I saw him was 3 months back and that he had been remarried and lived with his new family. All that time, the officer behaved very rude and arrogant. He also laughed at us and kept saying that he would take our visas, that we did not deserve to be in the United States. Four hours went by and our daughters were crying that they were hungry and wanted to leave, one of them was sick and had a fever, and we were not allowed to leave for the medicines. She kept crying and then my wife asked the other officer that was with her for her cellphone so she could call my in-laws so they could come and take them, since they are american citizens because they were born in the US. So they came in and took them, and then the officer started harassing us about my wifes labor, that how did we pay for it, which hospital did we go to, if my wife had used medicare, which we answered no. He then, went back to ask about the businesses, which I responded that I did not know about it. We were there about 6 hours, until officer (b)(6) made a phone call to ask for authorization to take our visas. He did not explain to me about making a statement, so when he asked me to declare I said no; he then said that I was a persona non grata to the American government; so I said I wanted to declare, and even officer (b)(6);(b)(6) who was also there, told him to let me declare, but he refused, saying no. I think that we were in a situation of power abuse of officer (b)(6);(b)(6) that he shouldnt have taken our visas, since my other siblings have come and go without any problems. I have nothing to do with those charges against my father and have not been benefited from it as he said. My family and me are good people, I am a professional, I have my own businesses, well established and we dont have any charges nor here in Mexico or the US. We cant make an explanation of this, which is why we come to you and ask please in the most respectful way to help us resolve our problem, review our case objectively, so we can get our visas back. I am a person that follows very straight the laws of my country and the United States, and I am in complete disposition of going to a visa appointment or to the embassy and explain my case to the person who can help us. On Wednesday, November 9, I travelled from Portland, OR to BWI and returned from Washington Dulles to PDX (through SFO). This was an entirely domestic flight and I was subject to the additional screening indicated by "SSSS" on my boarding pass, but the screening was far more intrusive. I was put through the scanner and the metal detector and my bags were picked apart piece by piece for special scanning. I was forced to consent to a very intrusive pat down which included the TSA worker touching my intimate areas through my pants several times. I do not believe they were unprofessional in their conduct; I believe they followed a procedure that include an overly intrusive search of my person. I was given no choice but to consent and told I would have to contact TSA to be removed from the watch list that forced this treatment. 	<p>We prepared a tour of 2,500 miles across the American West with two others couples. To this end, we applied for the simple visa Esta advocated for French nationals holding passports bioelectronics. We left for Montreal, the day before we left Minneapolis to Bozeman by September 15th at 4:20 am. After checking baggage and passing the security check, we went to the input control in the USA. The control agent asked me to follow him. My husband followed me with an agent asking me questions in american, a language I do not understand even despite the help of an interpreter. My husband proposed to attend the examination and he was violently rejected by the two officers present. After having held beyond the departure time of our flight at 6:20 am, Interrogation where I exposed my family situation: divorced Armenian citizen, resident in France since 15 August 2007, married since 02 May 2009, with my two children with us since October 2009. I confirmed to have been refused a visa for the USA in December 2005. That my husband did not know when he established the visa applications, which was said to screening officers. The two control officers made me sign papers that I could not understand and told me they would give me a copy, they did not. They invited us to go to the US Consulate General in Montreal for the establishment of a visa, claiming that there was no problem, that our situation had been passed, and we could fly 10:38 am on which our flights were booked. After collecting our luggage, we went to the US Consulate General in Montreal, where two security agents denied us access, although we exposed them the urgent situation. Faced with this desperate situation, I collapsed. My husband took the initiative to return to France, after changing our plane tickets. Because of zealous agents, devoid of any respect for human relations, both at the airport and at the Consulate in Montreal, we found ourselves deprived of a dream trip that turned into a nightmare, and separated from the group that had no choice to continue his trip. When returning home (DIA) on my first trip, I used the automated Kiosk for re-entry and it worked fine. On every subsequent trip out of the US (about 15 business trips), I am flagged with an X and referred over to see an officer. I do this of course and they pull up my passport, ask me if the trip was business or pleasure and send me on my way. I have asked several times to the officer why I am not cleared at the Kiosk and I am never provided any information. I have researched this online and the only articles I could find reference if items are being declared, but my travel just for a week at a time to see my team down there, and basically just bring back what I leave... laptop and clothes. Is there something flagged or wrong with my passport? Its embarrassing when traveling with companions for work and I am always deferred to a very long line only to be passed through. My Passport # is (b)(6) If you can look into this and let me know what information I can provide or if there is something wrong in the system, maybe a space or something where it shouldnt be. Everything looks correct on my passport, but when I book flights is puts my first and middle name together as (b)(6) so maybe that has something to do with it? In June 2012 I was denied at the border after 11 hours of detention in a cell without any justification, even after I asked several times what was the issue. I simply came to spend my day at Burlington then cross the lake to go to Plattsburgh. But when I arrived to the border, the agents told me right away to step out of my vehicle, then I had at least 4 agents around me and they even handcuffed me. Once in the office, they searched my many times, touching me everywhere, it was almost a sexual harassment. Then I had to wait 11 hours in a cold cell wearing only shorts and a t-shirt. When I asked for a jacket they said no. They even interrogated me 4 times. At the end of the day, before leaving, the border agents simply told me not to worry, its only for this time, next time it should be fine. Also, they confiscated my laptop, which I had to come back by myself to get it back 10 days after. I found out it was disassembled bugged and not reassembled properly. Then, in April 2014, I had tickets to Mexico with only an hour of layover in the USA. The border agent in Montreals airport told me its simply a routine check and it should be fine after a few verification. I spent 6 hours waiting, only to be told that they dont feel comfortable to let me in the US, with no further justifications. I obviously missed my flight and couldnt get a refund for it, nor for the hotel reservation. I lost 1346\$ this day. Now Im an engineer in aeronautics and I may have some training in my career. I have no idea why I got denied and the most frustrating thing is that the border agent dont refuse me right away, they make me wait several hours, telling me every once in a while that theres nothing to be worried about, its simply a routine check and Ill be able to cross in the next hour, but at the end, I still get denied. I need to know exactly whats wrong, in details. Can I cross the border or not?



(b)(6)	<p>For reasons unclear to myself, I have been repeatedly flagged for additional security checks over the past 15 years and have been advised to share my experiences with the hope that I might find a way to decrease similar experiences. I was born in Mexico but have lived most of my life in the U.S. I became a naturalized U.S. citizen in 1996 and have completed my education in the U.S. I received my undergraduate degree from Stanford University in 2004, worked at the National Institutes of Health for 2 years, received my medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania in 2011, and a Masters of Public Health from Johns Hopkins in 2010. I am currently a board certified internist completing my rheumatology fellowship at Stanford Hospital. I have no past criminal or drug history. I am the recipient of the (b)(6) (b)(6) for my commitment to leadership and community service in the medical field. I have also co-authored several scientific papers. Today (9/7/16), I returned from a short trip to Mexico City where my wife and I were vacationing. Upon clearing customs, I was flagged by TSA agent at the Dallas-Forth Worth (DFW) airport and instructed that I needed to wait to be seen by an additional agent without clear explanation except that I might require additional screening. I was made to wait in front of the front security agent for about 5-10 minutes. Agent (b)(6) (b)(6) Security Supervisor Officer) then approached me and noted that additional screening was needed. No specifics as to what this would entail were noted at this time. I was taken to an empty screening line that was still within visible sight of other passengers and made to wait until a separate bag detector was ready to be started. About 3-4 passengers were then made to go through this detector while I was waiting with my bags on a completely isolated lane. The bags went through the detector and I was made to go through a metal detector which I cleared. Without any explanation I was then told I needed to go through the body scanner which again resulted in further delay as it required interruption of other passenger screening and additional humiliation of being rescanned after already completed screening through the metal detector. After clearing the body scanner I was then instructed that I would need to undergo a thorough body search including groin checks which were still within visible sight of other passengers. I also underwent additional hand swab screening and a manual bag check by Agent (b)(6) where he examined my electronics, wallet, backpack contents. Non-discreetly one of my training books (Rheumatology Secrets) was taken out of the backpack and placed such that other passengers could note that I was a physician. A Northwestern folder I carry in my bag was also removed and contents examined. The folder was again left out within viewing sight. An additional delay was made in calling in the overall search results. The overall delay of the additional screening was such that I barely made it to my connecting flight to San Francisco (SFO) despite.</p>	<p>I have traveled regularly during the past 15 years with friends and family and it has been clear to us that I have been disproportionately selected for extra screening on multiple international flights as well as domestic checks. While this previously appeared somewhat coincidental, several individuals have remarked that I appear to be unfairly targeted for extra security. In reviewing a recent article published in the Economist, this seems to be a violation of my Fourth Amendment right to avoid unreasonable search and seizure (though I understand the importance of screening for maintenance of passenger and national security). It is no longer merely an inconvenience but has caused personal harm in terms of humiliation and near disruption of entire group travel plans by causing me to nearly miss connections or have to make unnecessary accommodations. This most recent episode also resulted in what seems to have been unnecessary screening (for example, is the metal detector really needed if I was going to be screened by the whole body scanner as well as manual body search). It is also not clear why I have been targeted for such checks. Also, some discretion would have been appreciated as well as some guidance at the beginning regarding expectations and degree of screening that would be expected would have helped to make the process less frustrating. I ask that TSA look into this case and assist me in helping to avoid similar experiences in the future. I was advised by a separate and thoughtful TSA agent to apply for a redress number and it seems that this is no longer an isolated event. I appreciate your assistance. 	<p>I am a PhD student with good standing at UCLA. I was asked to go to another room (where no cellphone or laptop was allowed) and made to wait there for over 2 hours and was told that some information regarding the SEVIS ID on my I-20 had to be verified. I had all the required documents and travel signatures. One official told me it could be that my university (UCLA) hadnt updated some information. I checked with the university and everything is up to date. Surprisingly, this is not the first time this issue is happening. It happened on my previous entry as well - on 9/23/2016 and I was made to wait over 3 hours that time. It has never happened before that in the previous 2 years when I came into the country 4 times on the same F1-Visa. I would greatly appreciate it if the matter could be resolved so that in future, I can pass through customs without any additional delay. It is extremely tiring after a long 24 hour journey to be made to wait for 2+ hours. Additionally, the lack of cellphone usage causes worry to my family in India who expect me to have reached home by then and contacted them about my safe arrival. I tried explaining this to the officers both times and was met with cold rude responses on both occasions. No one was willing to give me any information about how long the process could take either. 	<p>I was travelling on Qatar Airways (QR707) via Doha to IAD, Washington DC on the 7th of December. Before boarding the flight to DC, there was security check. I was asked to remove my shoes and my full leg brace so that it could be scanned. I was told that I needed to do this in compliance of US security regulations. I did all that with everyone watching me. There was no enclosure or closed place to do all this in privacy. After the brace and shoe was scanned, it was given back to me. I wore it and was taken to the counter. The staff of Qatar Airways told me that I need to be scrutinized again and my brace and shoe needed to be re-scanned. I had gone through it once and was okay to go through it again but I needed privacy and dignity to go through this again. They said they dont have it. Qatar Airways was apologetic and kept saying that they have to do this in compliance of US Security regulations. My name has SSSS on my Boarding and hence they need to comply with US Security regulations. It was humiliating to go through this with all men watching me lift my skirt, remove my full leg brace and wear it all over again. I felt violated. Incident 2 This incident occurred on 11th December 2016 at IAD Washington DC. I had to Board QR 708 to go back to my home country India via Doha. I reached the Qatar Airways counter and the lady at the counter issued the Boarding card. Within seconds she said, and I quote, "I am sorry, your name has SSSS and you will have to be screened separately by TSA". And she marked SSSS on my Boarding card. An officer from TSA came and he said that I need to go for Secondary Screening and that everything in my hand bag will need to be scanned, screened with hand held devices and inspected by hand. There will also be a complete pat down with hand. I told the officer that I have already experienced this in Doha when I was flying from India to come to DC. It was not a nice experience to go through this in full view of public with everyone around watching me. He said they will ensure full privacy for me and pat down will happen in an enclosed private space. I asked, what is SSSS and on what basis my name has SSSS. He said he didnt know and that they have to comply with the regulations. The staff was courteous, I was not asked to remove my shoe or brace and a complete pat down happened in privacy and with dignity. Every single shred of paper in my cabin and hand bag was inspected by hand. Items of personal use and hygiene like my lipstick, lip balm, sanitary napkin were opened and checked. I understand that when it comes to security, emotions of the person who is marked as SSSS do not count and everyone is just doing their job, but the memory of what happened in Doha, Qatar on 7th December 2016 was so raw and fresh, that it still felt like violation and infringement on privacy and dignity.</p>	<p>I came to the US this time after 7 years. The last I had visited was in October 2009. I came on the invitation of US Senator Tom Harkins. My tickets were booked by Handicap International, US. Previously also, I had visited US on the invitation of Department of State for International Visitor Leadership Program. I was a fellow of Ford Foundation and studied at UIC from 2002-2004. I dont understand the logic behind the selection of my name under SSSS. My whole history of travel and stay in the US can be traced, and tracked from August 2002 onwards. I have worked with the World Bank in DC in early and mid-2003-2005. I have no idea, if on account of my disability, I have been labeled as SSSS. I am a Hindu, Indian national, happily married disabled woman and a mother of 2 year old child working for a Corporation in India holding a Senior Management position. I want to get my name off this list. I have declared everything here about my history and record of travel frequency to the States. 	My name is (b)(6) Esq., a licensed Barrister and Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Nigeria based in Abuja, Nigeria. I have visited the United States of America on several occasions starting from 2006 when I was first issued a B1B2 visa. On all my visits to the U.S in the past ten years, I have never over stayed my allotted period of stay and I have never been a charge on the American Government because I have always paid my bills. I also, most importantly, never breached any of the laws of the US. On 03 November 2016, I flew into the U.S on a scheduled vacation. On arrival at Chicago OHare International Airport. I was denied entry into the United States, after more than three hours interrogation and ordeal and my visa cancelled and revoked for five years. Whereas, I understand, that possessing the visa does not guarantee entry into the U.S and entry is a privilege and not a right, suffice it to say that the grounds and reason for the US Immigration Officers treatment handed to me is baffling. My interview with the Immigration Officer I later came to know as (b)(6) was routine and usual until I told her I planned to stay in the U.S for two months during this visit. She had concerns with my period of stay and asked how I planned to spend two months. I informed her that I had not taken a vacation for years due to work, caring for my sick mum and a special needs brother. I told her that while in the US, I intended to unwind, read, and develop a book that I am writing. I also informed her that I had once spent three months in the US on vacation and left as scheduled. At this point, she requested to search my luggage, instructed that I opened my book diaries and input the passwords to my electronic devices. She threatened to deny me entry into the US if I refused her access to my diaries and phones. I submitted everything for her perusal. During the search of my luggage when she saw my academic certificates and asked why I carried them, I told her that that within my vacation, I would love to visit a school in Boston regarding an MBA starting September 2017, to see the school for myself, discuss with a representative face to face and about my desire to have modules different from the ones I had taken for my degree in London. I took my documents to have them readily available for the visit should it be necessary to show such representative and discuss of my certificates. I tried to explain to her that I had not formally applied to the school or any school in the US and so did not have an admission. It takes about a year to process an MBA in the USA, time this single entry cannot accommodate. After nearly four hours of waiting, Officer (b)(6) informed me that she had reached a decision to deny me entry to the USA, to revoke my visa and put a ban of five years on me. I requested to know the basis of her decision and she gave me a report that read that my visa was being revoked because I am AN IMMIGRANT NOT IN POSSESSION OF A VALID UNEXPIRED IMMIGRANT VISA, ENTRY PERMIT, BORDER CROSSING CARD OR VALID ENTRY DOCUMENT REQUIRED BY THE IMMIGRATION AND NATIONAL ACT. Her explanation of the decision was that I was coming to the US to procure an F1 visa. Officer (b)(6) reasoning and decision were unfounded, baseless and wrong. I was coming into the US for an overdue holiday to which I provided her every information. Consequently, Officer (b)(6) action is based on two faulty and wrong premises: I did not have any admission, and had not taken any steps at converting my B1B2 visa into a F1 visa and should that had been the case, which is clearly not, it is an act permissible and provided for under U.S law. Also, an F1 is not an immigrant visa for that matter. Officer (b)(6) also alleged that she saw information in my phone wherein my intended host sent money to me in Nigeria, to which I explained to her that the money was for my hosts family to make a purchase in Nigeria. During her search, she had made a call to my host to ask majorly about the money and not to ask any questions to support or verify my story, knowing she was to make a serious decision about my entry, and bar to the US for years. Another very disturbing and peculiar treatment of me by Officer (b)(6) was that Officer (b)(6) made and communicated her decision to deny me entry, revoke my visa and place a five year ban on me before she decided to interview me and put issues on record. When I registered my concern she gave me a written statement, for my review and signature, of her latter questions to me which came after informing me of her decisions. I was shocked to notice that, what she had put on paper as my responses were misrepresentations. Most shockingly, she did not include my explanations about my holiday or about my certificates, the very premise for her decision. I drew her attention to it and when she refused to make corrections, I declined to sign it.	I did not get the chance to speak to a lawyer or my hosts who were waiting to pick me up in Tulsa. I was subsequently fingerprinted, put on a returning airplane and my travel documents handed over to the pilot only to be released to me in Europe. I felt like a common criminal being deported amidst the injustice meted on me. I most respectfully implore you to use your good offices to look into my case and make a review. The fate of a denial of entry to the USA and a bar for five years, having the prospects of adversely affecting my good and genuine travel records and future visits to other countries, is a fate that should be deserved. I am a law abiding citizen of Nigeria, in all countries I have visited including the United States, or have lived in such as the United Kingdom. It is an injustice to let the action of a single immigration officer, which I consider to lack merit, paint me in negative light and adversely affect my ability to travel to the United States or any other country for that matter. The room was extremely hot and full including families with small children. After an hour and a half I was called and given my passport with no explanation or answers to any of my questions. On January 15, 2017, I made a trip to the United States through American Airlines. I made a connection in Dallas Texas, my final destination was Newark, New Jersey. A planned trip to visit the cities of New York and New Jersey and celebrate on (b)(6) the birthday of my mother (b)(6) American citizen. Arriving at the immigration module at Fort Worth Airport in Dallas, Texas; I was arrested and taken to the CBP offices, received by the official (b)(6)-(b)(7) who made a complete record of my belongings, just like on my cell phone, where I read a conversation with my sisters husband, and misinterpreted said conversation, he assumed that I was coming to work in the USA. To which I replied that my real purpose was to spend my working vacation visiting different places in New Jersey and New York. Officer (b)(6)-(b)(7) told me he would call my sister and her husband to confirm the information I had given him; After a few minutes he approached me and said that I talked to them and that they confirmed that I was coming to work in the USA and that they would pay me 60 dollars a day, THIS IS NOT TRUE. Officer (b)(6)-(b)(7) also told me that the times I had presented myself to the American embassy in my country Peru, had done it with lies, that I was not a credible person, and that this is what the authorities had put in the computer; Which is NOT TRUE because the times that I present myself to the American Embassy in Peru, was with THE TRUTH. That is why, after going through a 12 month administrative process on May 6, 2016 I was granted the American Visa B1 / B2 with number (b)(6) in force until May 4, 2026. I ask the authorities of the United States to consult my record in the offices of the American Embassy in Lima, Peru, and also to review the interrogation that the (b)(6)-(b)(7) interrogated me because, at all times, he told me in a threatening tone; "this room has Cameras and speakers, watch what you say because it can be used against you as a criminal offense, this is your last chance to tell the whole truth to make a decision if you enter my country or you are returned to yours", harassing me, trying To frighten me and to pressure me to say what he wanted to hear. I always told him the truth that he came to spend holidays and see my family. I also request to review the phone calls between the official (b)(6)-(b)(7) and my relatives. The official (b)(6)-(b)(7) made the interrogation in the Spanish language and after this it makes me sign papers where it indicates to me that they are written there my answers; But since everything was in English, a language that was not read or understood, I did not know what I signed. Today in the tranquility of my home, using the translator of google I see that the answers of the interrogation are false. IT IS NOT THE TRUTH OF MY ANSWERS. In the lower part of one of the sheets that sign says "witnessed by (b)(7) CBP officer "which means that there was a witness in the interrogation, which is FALSE. There was never another officer present who was not the official (b)(6)-(b)(7) My air ticket was back and forth, I brought all the legal documents that the USA requests for entry to the country as they are Passport and American Visa. Do not bring anything illegal and still I was arrested and locked up in a cell as a criminal. I am a person of good, active worker with 8 years of experience, with an administrative position of Assistant Warehouse and Expedition, working for one of the best companies of Peru, located in the TOP TEN as is ARCA CONTINENTAL-LINDLEY official bottler of COCA COLA COMPANY. The vacation leave of my work was shown to the official (b)(6)-(b)(7) to whom it did not take any importance to him. I respect the laws and agree to comply; What is not acceptable is the humiliation and the psychological and moral abuse that the officer (b)(6)-(b)(7) committed to me. I was unfairly denied entry to the USA. I have been returned to my country of origin. I will return to the American Embassy in my country to request a new Visa and hopefully God will not again be a victim of discrimination as I was in the lamentable morning January 15, 2017. Any act of racial discrimination must be condemned.(USE THE GOOGLE TRANSLATOR TO WRITE THIS COMPLAINT)

On my flight to Toronto I was put under SSSS and I was searched at each lay over next to the boarding gate. I had two layovers one in Phoenix another in Charlotte. My checkin bag was lost and returned to me very broken and torn.

I was travelling to San Jose on August 15th 2016 for my MS in Electrical and Electronics Engineering starting from August 24 2016. I was detained at San Francisco airport for questioning. Initially the officer asked me my purpose of visit, Why SJSU University for Masters, Why Electrical and Electronics Engineering. After which the officer asked if he can see my transcript. The officer said my transcript and scorecard was fake. I told them that my university and transcript was verified by World Education Services and sent to San Jose State University for admission decision into masters program. Later the officer asked who is funding for my studies, I told them my parents are sponsoring me. The officer asked for the financial documents, I had accidentally forgotten to carry them and hence showed them the bank statement and also the proof of first semester fee payment in email and requested them to give me 5 minutes of time so that I can contact my parents and get them the financial documents by mail or fax or in next flight. They told me they cannot believe in bank statement from any Indian Bank and they need the amount in US Bank. I told them I will open an US Bank Account tomorrow and ask my parents to transfer funds for my studies. They told me I would be short of funding for my studies. In reply I told them I have sufficient funds for my study and stay in US and also I would get them the proof of the other documents which shows that I have full funding for my Masters program and cost of living if they allowed me to contact my parents. They asked me how much money did I bring, I told them I have 300 in cash and 600 in card for first 15 days of my stay and my parents would send the money to my US bank account once I share the details of the bank account with them. I had accidentally forgotten to carry the financial documents. I requested them to give me 5 minutes so that I can get them documents by mail or fax or in next flight to SFO and they can cross verify it and if they find the funds are insufficient for my study and stay or documents are fake they can take any decision. They declined to listen to me and insisted me on accepting that while here in US I would seek part time job and also that they see many Indians doing part time jobs in Indian restaurants, gas stations etc. I showed them the proof of my 2.5 years work with HCL Technologies in India and told them my sole purpose was only to do my Masters at San Jose State University. They questioned me for nearly 10 hours and finally I was forced to accept that I would seek employment while being in the US much against my will. I was sent back from SFO airport revoking my F1 visa with 212 a 7 A I I and 235 b 1.

I feel that the officer could have given me 5 minutes of time in the entire 10 hours of interrogation to prove that I had sufficient funding for my studies and to show fee payment proof of first semester. Also that the officer could have sent me back without forcing me to accept that I would seek part time employment while being in US.

On Dec 27 2016 around 3:30-4pm I and my family attempted to cross back to the United States at Windsor Tunnel Border Crossing (Canada). We were told "my name is similar to" a person they are looking for. Multiple border patrol agents approached our car. I was asked to step out, handcuffed, and detained. This was in front of my family and children (who were horrified that their father was being handcuffed and taken away). My family was asked to leave all personal belongings including electronics in the car (which most likely was searched) and told to wait in another room. When all was done, I was NOT "the person they were looking for." I was informed that despite the fact that I am a law abiding citizen of the United States of America and have no criminal record, that I should expect to be questioned and/or detained/handcuffed when I travel again across borders. Also, apparently is some twisted form of kindness they stated to me that they would "wave" this questioning/treatment for one year. Again for being a completely law abiding citizen of the United States of America with no criminal history. No other paperwork given or explanation. Then told we were released.

I understand that border patrol agents have to do their job and screen all who cross the border to keep this country safe. My complaint is: 1. That I was needlessly handcuffed and taken away in front of my children (who were visibly shaken by the experience) and family, with only questionable reasoning for detainment. There was no visible or immediate threat. 2. There is no reason that I should "expect" this treatment again for no reason other than my name was "similar" to another individual. 3. What authority gives this "one year waiver?" Again, for no specific cause. 4. Also no information was given to me in the form of an incident number, reasoning for detainment, or any acknowledgement of the events that occurred that day.

I travelled to San Diego for a short business trip on 14th January from London Heathrow on VISA B1/B2 (b)(6) issued on 21 July 2008 and expiring on 17 July 2018. I was held up at the gate at Heathrow by CPB staff for 20 minutes for an interview and extra checks. At San Diego, at the customs control point, I was asked to wait for a secondary inspection. The wait was for 2 hours during which time I was given little information. My luggage was checked and I was interviewed. I was not allowed to use any electronic devices. The situation was embarrassing and led me to cancel a work dinner. At the end, when I was released, I was told to register my complaint on a CPB compliments and complaints website as CPB staff have no right to pass any information to me. I did this when I returned in London. I received an email from CPB Compliments and Complaints on 24 January, saying that they cannot help me and directing me to this website. I have been subjected to extra secondary inspection checks each time I have travelled to the United States since October 2015. As my circumstances are identical before and after October 2015, I am inferring that Homeland Security systems are flagging me due to an error that needs to be identified and resolved as its causing embarrassment and inconvenience. The other times since October 2015, I have had to go through secondary checks and the associated, embarrassment, delay and inconvenience are: - 18 October 2016 on a trip from London Heathrow to JFK in NYC on business. I was travelling on the same passport and Visa as for the San Diego trip (see above). I was subjected to extra checks at the gate at Heathrow and to a 3 hours wait with little information at JFK before I was released. The room at JFK was stuffy, I was not allowed to use electronic devices and most staff were curt and gave little information. I had to delay work dinner arrangements as a result. - 7 October 2016, I tried to check in on a BA (British Airways) flight from Heathrow to Washington DC on an ESTA that had been approved on line a few days before. I was told by BA staff that the ESTA had been withdrawn at that point. The BA staff contacted Heathrow CPB staff which referred me for extra information to the US consulate. At the US consulate they told me that it had nothing to do with them and that "Heathrow CPB staff often refer UK residents to the US consulate to get rid of them". I was told I should fly to the US with my old VISA rather than on an ESTA. By that time it was too late to go back home and obtain it, so I missed my flight and the business meeting at significant material and business cost (let alone the frustration and the stress). - 18 May 2016: I was travelling still on my old passport (b)(6) (expired 22 July 2016) and on ESTA (b)(6) approved on 13 August 2015. I flew from Frankfurt airport into Dulles Washington DC on business. My boarding pass was flagged "SSS" and I was subjected to extra checks in Frankfurt airport that took around 15-20 minutes. - I should clarify at this stage that I was travelling on ESTA because when I issued my VISA in 2008 Greece (I am by birth a Greek national although I have resided in the UK since late 1987) was not part of the VISA-waiver program with the US. Since Greece was admitted to the program, my office in London who organizes my business travel has been applying on my behalf for ESTAs. I had an ESTA before the 2015 one, and I never had any issues travelling with it in the United States. -9 January 2016, I was travelling on my old passport and ESTA as per 18 May from Heathrow to Kansas City via Chicago on business. My boarding pass was flagged "SSS" at Heathrow and I was subjected to extra checks. - 25 October 2015, I was travelling on my old passport and ESTA as per 9 January 2016 from Heathrow to Washington DC (Dulles) to attend a wedding of a friend. My boarding pass was flagged SSS at Heathrow on the way in and at Dulles on the way back (31 October) and I was submitted to extra checks, lasting 15-20 minutes each. Before October 2015, I have never had been subjected to extra security checks whilst travelling into or out of the US. My circumstances are identical before and after October 2015. I have lived in the same London address for 12 years. I am married to the same person for the last 17 years and I have worked for the Bank of England (central bank of the United Kingdom) for the last 21 years. I am therefore at a loss to understand what is causing the secondary security checks. The last two times in particular have been especially inconvenient with me being held up at customs control for secondary inspections for a few hours with little information. I am concerned that this pattern will continue until the situation is investigated and cleared. I am next due to travel to the US on business on 16 February (to JFK on a BA flight from Heathrow).

The last several times I returned to the United States from abroad, I was told by the Immigration Officer that my fingerprints, because of my age, could not be "read" by the scanning device, as a result of which I was subject to additional screening.

After boarding flight AC 7357 on 9-Feb-2017, from Baltimore, MD Toronto, CAD, someone came onto the plane and took my passport saying they will bring it back, but giving no explanation as to why they were taking it. They did so in haste without identifying themselves. It was brought back to me within some minutes and no explanation or apology was provided, the woman said nothing. It was a traumatizing and embarrassing experience for me. I frequently travel to the US on behalf of my company IndustryBuilt, and I've noticed in the last 3 months I almost always go through further screening when leaving the US and coming back to Canada. I would be searched, swabbed, and my electronics, bags, etc checked. I would like to understand why this continues to happen practically every time I travel and if there is any way this can stop.

There is a flag on my name at the CBP to search exhaustively all my personal belongings and my cell/computer. These secondary searches have been going on every 2 weeks I travel for the last 3 months at San Juan International, and the CPB has not found anything of alarm. I request that the label be removed since the many futile searches prove they are no longer necessary. Because of my regular travel last year, they were determined to find wrongdoing in me. In November 2016, ICE found photos I downloaded to my hard drive of young women from emails or texts they themselves sent to me from Latin America, none of which are from the US. They are from dating websites and classified sections that I have found over the last 3 years with the intention of finding a healthy mutually fulfilling stable relationship between man and woman. Most of the photos are fully clothed, as far as I know above 18. Only a very few were nude, and may have been under 18. I have since strictly eliminated possibly confusing images from my electronics to avoid suspicion that I am committing some crime against anyone, from the US or abroad.

I never take photos of nude adolescent women for any purpose at all. Just because I can afford leisure travel to Latin America often, they incorrectly assume I should be suspected of some form criminality. Please remove the stigma of a flag by my name that unnecessarily burdens me every time I cross the border.

I am a 32 year career flight attendant starting with 5 years @ Eastern Airlines in 1985 and now 27 years with Delta/NWA. I fly ONLY international trips. This means that some months it is possible for me to clear Immigration & Customs 5-6 times in ONE calendar month. I am excessively sent over to extensive secondary screening even when returning in full uniform from my work trips, as well as personal travel, for no reason. Over the past few years I have been checked approx 2 dozen times including twice just this past week. Nothing has ever been found nor confiscated from me...EVER. I have never violated any customs law, always claim even the most trivial of purchases outside the USA and have NEVER been arrested anywhere (a question the officers often ask). I am a law abiding, tax paying US citizen, yet getting the "shake down" excessively when entering my home country, being made to feel like a criminal until the officers ONCE AGAIN determine that Im "good to go"...even when it has only been a week since the last "shakedown" and them going through the same bags, same electronic devices, same dirty socks and underwear.

While I understand that random checks do and SHOULD happen, my circumstances certainly seem not at all random. I understand the officers are just doing their jobs and are usually, but not always, respectful. Even so, the excessive, extensive and repeated secondary screenings are unfair and obviously unnecessary if my perfect Clearance History would just checked. If it was only on the random occasion I would not be filing this report, but SO many times feels like harassment and I would be grateful if the appropriate actions are taken to make this stop. Thank you in advance for your prompt attention and consideration in this matter.

For several years, I have always been delayed when entering the USA, whether by road or air-even if I am just changing planes. I believe this is called "secondary screening", when I am asked to come into the office and wait while CBP staff do something. When they give me back my passport and allow me to enter, I ask what the problem is. I am always told "We are not allowed to tell you". When I was changing planes at MSP 5 days ago, I was given a DHS trip slip of paper, and instructed to make an online enquiry. So here it is. I do hope that you can correct this problem, as the delays have caused missed flights and separation from my companions, who are often disabled. I will send you copies of my Canadian passport, drivers licence, and my I-407 and I-831 form from when I gave in my Green Card after we moved back to the USA. I am retired from clinical practice now, so you may phone me without disturbing patients, if you need further information. However Email is my preferred mode of communication.

I did fill out and try to submit this form from my mobile device, but the process seemed to freeze up. So I am submitting this form from my laptop, with the hope that it will be submitted to your satisfaction. (b)(6) MD A number (b)(6) Mar. 3, 2017.

I am not guilty of violating any of the immigration conditions of my F1 status during my one and a half year stay in the U.S. I am now slated to graduate in May this year after completing the last 2 subjects this semester. I came to India on a short visit to meet my family and while returning back on the 5th March 2017 was not allowed entry into the U.S and was sent back and reached my hometown early yesterday morning (7th March). I traveled for 23 hours from India to Chicago and after being interrogated for 5 hours was sent back traveling another 23 hours before reaching my hometown. During the 5 hours detention at Chicago airport, I was interrogated and was being told to accept that I was illegally working there when that was not at all the truth. I was repeatedly told that I was lying and was not allowed to show evidence to support the facts. My phone and laptop and wallet were checked. The immigration officers formed their opinions from the following: 1) A message from Royal liquor to whom I spoke for a job in CPT- but realizing that it was not appropriate did not take up this. Seeing a message from this person the immigration officer checked with him and was told that I worked with him. Later on receiving a text message on my mobile phone from this person of Royal liquor, I confronted him as to why he gave false information. He said that he did it only to be helpful, thinking that it was a job referral. Now, this turned as an evidence for the officers to believe I am lying. I can send you screenshots of my conversation with this person and can also show you the actual message in my phone in support of the above. 2) I was asked about changing my University from Lawrence Technological University to Trine University which I did solely because the course offered at Lawrence was of lesser interest to me than the one given at Trine. This was a later realization but since this is allowed I shifted to Trine. This was held back against me saying that my GPA at Lawrence was low while no recognition was taken of my good scores (3.8/4) at Trine saying that Trine is not a university of repute. If admissions are offered to international students at Trine as an accredited institute this must be an acceptable university. 3) Moving to Chicago instead of continuing in Detroit was viewed as a reason for finding illegal employment. Trine University which was attending was 30 miles farther from Chicago than Detroit but at Chicago, I had an advantage of combining my travel with other classmates there. I was pressurized into accepting that I worked illegally in America (Detroit & Chicago) but I told them it is not true. 4) Purchasing a used crown victoria car for my commuting was another reason which led the immigration officers to believe that I was working as a cab driver. They said that they found a blank template of a cab bill in my laptop which was made as a sample format by me for a business model and were not meant for any billing purpose. They also based their conclusion on a blank template of a cab bill which they found in my laptop. This was made as a sample format by me for a business model and not for any billing purpose. They were many other templates in the laptop which were not seen by the officers. They included business proposal for a manufacturing company for food and spices and also there was a construction business plan which was required to be done as part of the curriculum of the masters program. So without any evidence they concluded that I was working for the cab company when this is an imaginary and a hypothetical proposal where no such company exists. 5) The officers then opened a file in my laptop where I documented they amounts being transferred into my account by my father and also showing my plan for repaying to my father when I will be legally earning either in the U.S. or elsewhere. They also concluded from the above budget file that 1750 USD which was brought from India in cash currency in August 2015 where I first arrived in the U.S. was of an income from a part time illegal working. Also, 1440 USD which was deposited as my credit card payment after drawing from my sisters travel card into my Bank of America account was also assumed as an income from illegal working. My parents are sponsors for both me and my sister and I can provide the bank statements of both of us. 6) The officers have picked up things from my mobile and laptop and concluded on suspicion that I have worked illegally. Had they examined authentic documents and statements like bank accounts they would have reached factual conclusions. The officers were not allowing me to talk and their attitude was as if I was a criminal. During the process, they have got several papers signed by me which I did under a compelling situation. My original I20 showing approved CPT and the questionnaire were also not handed over to me. (b)(6) Passport # (b)(6)

After this episode, I am quite distressed with the manner in which the In Process process was conducted continuously labeling me as a liar without giving me a chance to explain. Without any substantiative evidence, I was told that I was working illegally which to an immigrant who was honest and law abiding and with a clean record during the entire period of one and a half year of his studentship in the U.S. is a serious and a demoralizing allegation. After being admitted for an education program on published terms and conditions and conducting myself within the stipulated conditions and the framework of law and after investing my time, effort and money on this education and reaching to the end of my graduation, I wish to know on an evidenced basis as to why I am being stopped entry into the country. Though I am greatly dejected now, I have a liking to the country and its systems which had drawn me to pursue my studies there. I still have faith that there will be some authority above who will review factually and withdraw the false allegations. An early resolution of the above will enable me to continue my education and obtain my graduation as originally contemplated.

On January 7th, I was flying back with my husband from Mexico City where we had spent four days on our honeymoon. We were unable to check in online to our AeroMexico flight (Mexico City to Miami) and upon arrival to the airport my boarding pass noted SSSS, which the Mexican attendants noted was extra security as directed by the United States. I was subjected to having my bag and person searched at the gate prior to boarding the plane leaving Mexico City to Miami. Upon arrival at MIA border control, I received an X on my customs border entry paper, while my husband received the check mark. We were directed into a line where the customs officer noted, you have one of those last names after I inquired why he was unable to grant me clearance. He then called for another agent who directed us to a smaller room with several other people and asked to wait. Following that we were taken to another larger waiting room with one other person and asked to wait. Soon thereafter I was seen by a homeland security officer who although friendly proceeded to interrogate me regarding my trip, my occupation, my siblings, and my relationship/closeness to my siblings. He appeared particularly interested in my eldest brother and asked questions regarding his whereabouts, his occupation, and contact information. I found all of this rather intrusive, as I have never been subjected to this level of questioning while travelling and the purpose of which was never explained to me. I left without incident after approximately a 10-15 minute interview. The following day I was flying on Southwest (Jan 8 MCO to EWR) as I was returning to the Northeast area for work as I am a resident physician within the psychiatry department at Yale University School of Medicine. I again was unable to obtain my boarding pass online, again the first time I was unable to do so. Furthermore, upon arrival to the airport when I went to obtain my boarding pass at a kiosk, I printed a document that stated that I proceed to security and that I would need to obtain my boarding pass at the gate. Again on this document was the label SSSS. Upon reaching the TSA agent, I presented this document and my drivers license and he called over his supervisor who noted that I was to undergo an extra security check which would include powering up my devices, one of which was uncharged and thus I had to plug it in at an outlet in the airport prior to proceeding with the search of my items and person. I spent approx. 30-40 minutes having each item of my belongings removed and examined. I then was also subjected to a body search, which although the TSA agent was respectful, was rather invasive and troubling. I was then allowed to proceed to the gate, where I was then given a boarding pass. Upon boarding the plane, the boarding pass I was given halted the ticketing agent and she needed the original document in order to proceed to allow me on the plane. I arrived to my destination without further incident.

I am a born and bred proud US citizen, with no criminal history, who In Process went to college at Stanford University, went on to medical school at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School, and currently work as a physician resident at Yale University School of Medicine in the Department of Psychiatry. As a (b)(6) helping heal our nations finest and often most forgotten individuals. Working at the VA already lends itself to a more intensive security check and fingerprinting with approval through Homeland Security, which is more than the average citizen, yet I was still subjected to an excessive, atypical level of security at the airport. I feel like I was treated as guilty and as a threat without basis, given the level of scrutiny I experienced. This level of screening without reason has made me feel targeted and profiled simply for my religious beliefs and has caused me and my loved ones great distress. I believe this treatment goes directly against what I believe is valued in our country, where people are not defined simply by their race, religion, socioeconomic background, etc. but by their commitment to American society and their desire to be fruitful citizens. I, as a Muslim American of African American and Colombian descent, psychiatry resident, sister, wife, daughter and many more identities strive to embody the universal ideals of being a compassionate and thoughtful person who would simply like to travel freely as other American citizens are able to do.

Every time I am boarding a flight from outside of the United States that is destined for the United States, after going through normal security, but before being allowed on to the plane, I am required to go through secondary screening, where my bag is searched, I am searched, and I have to turn my electronics on. I am told that I have been randomly selected, but this happens every single time that I fly into the USA from outside. My boarding pass has SSSS printed on it. Sometimes, they will scan the pass, the phone will ring, and they will ask me to wait. In addition to this, I can generally not print boarding passes at the kiosk, and have to go to one of the check-in desks. This has never happened when I fly within the USA, only when I am flying in from outside of the USA.

I arrived to Boston with my documentation in order to ask for a TN visa. As the officer told me that my school reports weren't appropriate because they were not translated in English. I then choose to withdraw my application. At the time, I did not seek Consular help and wasn't aware of all the consequences of withdrawing an application in the situation where I would have to make my visa demand at my destination, which was located in the United States. Considering the fact that I had a few belongings in the US as well as sports tickets for an event, I tried to enter the US as a visitor and was then denied entry. The agents searched my electronic devices and found that I had been working on making templates for the work that I was going to be hired for with the TN visa I had applied on a few days earlier. I was interrogated regarding these actions. Needless to say that this whole process made me extremely nervous as I never had problems before and I had been on many visas in the past and always respected all the requirements and deadlines for everything. I did not realize at the time that this was going to be an issue as I was in the process of applying for the TN and had a full offer from an employer and all of this was part of my overall contract that would have started as soon as I got my TN. The result of the very limited knowledge of the law regarding the work visa, the amount of nervousness of going through this process as well as not asking for consular advices resulted in an issuing of a five years ban from the border agents.

I am now seeking to enter the US again on a visitor's visa with the permission of Homeland Security. Thirteen months have passed since the event and I fully blame my lack of knowledge about the visa process and the specific laws surrounding it and specifically the fact that I could not do what I did for the two or three weeks prior to apply for a TN. What is making me ask for this permission is the fact that during my time as a student in the US, I did make a lot of friendships that I would want to be able to go visit a few times a year for a couple of days. My family also owns a property in Florida which we usually go to in the winter and during the summer vacation. I am now fully settled in Quebec City. As I have a full-time job, own a condo and still doing part-time studies here, I do not have the intention anymore of trying to work in the US but I would just want to be able to travel with the rest of my family, go visit my friends in the US for a few days and be able to transit in US airports if I travel to another continent. At the time, I was not informed of both the consequences of withdrawing a TN application nor did I know that I could have asked for consular advices as I never had any issues regarding an entry in the United States, despite the multiple types of visas I've had and my many leisure and family trips.

We would like to be able to avoid extra screening in the future though. We have 2 small children and international flights are stressful, it'd be nice to not have to worry about the extra screening.

The fact that I have to go through secondary screening every time I enter the US makes this a much more painful process.
