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Executive Summary

The University of New Hampshire Survey Center conducted a survey for Rhode Island Public Radio (RIPR), ABC6, and the *Providence Journal* to gauge public opinion among Rhode Islanders in the run-up to the 2018 election. Five hundred and sixty-one (561) Rhode Island adults were randomly selected from state voter lists and were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between September 27 and October 6, 2018. The margin of sampling error for the survey is 4.1 percent. Included were 503 likely 2018 general election voters (margin of sampling error +/- 4.4 percent).

The following figures display survey results including any demographic differences, Appendix A contains detailed tabular results, Appendix B contains the survey instrument.

Key Findings

Engagement with 2018 Election

Interest in the 2018 election among Rhode Islanders appears quite high. Three-quarters of Rhode Island voters say they are extremely or very interested in the 2018 general election, four in five say that they often or sometimes discuss the election with their friends and family, and nine in ten say they will definitely vote or will vote unless there is an emergency.

Republicans and Democrats report the same level of interest in the upcoming election and are equally likely to say they will definitely vote, but Republicans are slightly more likely to say they often talk about the election.

Gubernatorial Election

Rhode Islanders are divided in their assessment of Gina Raimondo's performance as Governor and in their view of her personally. Her opponent in the 2018 election, Cranston Mayor Allan Fung, has similar personal favorability among Rhode Islanders, but trails Raimondo for the election by a considerable margin (49% for Raimondo, 36% for Fung). A small percentage support Joseph Trillo for Governor while very few support Anne Armstrong, Bill Gilbert, or Luiz Daniel Munoz. Six in ten Rhode Islanders say they have definitely decided who they will vote for, with slightly more Raimondo than Fung supporters feeling this way.

Senatorial Election

Rhode Island junior Senator Sheldon Whitehouse is broadly popular in Rhode Island, with more than half holding a favorable view of him. His opponent in the 2018 election, former State Supreme Court Justice Robert Flanders, is relatively unknown; less than a third hold a favorable view of him and three in eight are not aware of him at all. When leaners are included, more than half of Rhode Islanders say they will vote for Whitehouse over Flanders, who garners just over one-third of the vote.

National Politics

Rhode Islanders have a negative opinion of Donald Trump's performance as President; six in ten disapprove of his performance and more than half of Rhode Islanders strongly disapprove of his performance. Partisanship plays a strong role in Rhode Islanders' views of the President; four in five Republicans approve of Trump while ninety percent of Democrats disapprove. Despite this clear disapproval of Trump, only one in five Rhode Islanders want their representatives in Congress to vote as soon as possible to impeach the President, with the rest divided between wanting further investigations or no impeachment at all. Overall, Rhode Islanders are quite pessimistic about the direction of the country, with just over a third thinking things in the country are going in the right direction.

State Legislature & State Issues

Half of Rhode Islander registered voters think the state is headed in the right direction. Most who believe the country is headed in the wrong direction believe the state is headed in the right direction and most who believe the country is headed in the right direction say the state is headed in the wrong direction. Jobs or the economy, infrastructure, education, and corruption or honesty in government are the most frequently cited most important problems facing the state. More than three-quarters of likely voters plan to vote in favor of the \$250 million bond issue for school repairs on the ballot in November. Seven in ten would support the legislature enacting legislation to protect legal abortion in the state, but Rhode Islanders are more divided on a prospective bill outlawing the sale of new semi-automatic rifles in the state, with just over half in favor.


Voters largely disapprove of how Nicholas Mattiello is handling his job as House Speaker of the General Assembly, with low levels of support among Democrats, Independents, and Republicans. Rhode Islanders are similarly negative in their assessment of how Thomas J. Tobin is handling his job as Roman Catholic Bishop of Providence. Self-identified Catholics are nearly evenly divided in their opinion on Tobin's performance.

Engagement with 2018 Election

Just under half of Rhode Island registered voters (44%) say they are extremely interested in the 2018 general election, a third (32%) are very interested, 16% are somewhat interested, 7% are not very interested, and less than 1% don't know or are unsure.

Democrats (47%) are as likely as Republicans (44%) to say they are extremely interested while Independents (39%) are slightly less likely to say so. Rhode Island voters with a household income below \$30,000, those with a high school education or less, and those who did not vote in 2014 are less likely to say so.


Figure 1: As you may know, there is an election in November for Governor and US Senate. How interested would you say you are in the 2018 general election?



Registered voters in Rhode Island give similar responses about how frequently they discuss the upcoming election. Just over half (51%) say they often discuss the election with their friends and family members, three in ten (30%) say they do so sometimes, 12% do so only rarely, 7% never discuss the election, and less than 1% don't know or are unsure.

Republicans (57%) are slightly more likely than Democrats (50%) and Independents (48%) to say they often discuss the election. Those aged 18 to 34, those with a household income below \$30,000, and those with a high school education or less are less likely to say they often discuss the election.

Figure 2: How often would you say you discuss the election with your friends and family members?




Four in five Rhode Island registered voters (81%) say they will definitely vote in 2018, 9% say they will vote unless an emergency comes up, 4% say they may vote, 3% say they will probably not vote, and another 3% just don't know at this time.


Democrats (84%) and Republicans (84%) are equally likely to say they will definitely vote in 2018, while Independents (71%) are less likely to say that they will definitely vote. Those with a household income between \$30,000-\$59,999, those with a high school education or less, those who did not vote in 2014, and those aged 18 to 34 are less likely to say they will definitely vote.

% Definitely Vote in 2018 - by Party ID




Gubernatorial Election

Registered voters in Rhode Island are divided in their assessment of Gina Raimondo's performance as Governor. Fifty percent approve of Raimondo performance, 43% disapprove, and 8% are neutral or don't know.

Self-identified Democrats, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, self-described liberals, and those who identify as non-white are more likely than others to approve of Raimondo's job performance. Self-identified Republicans and Independents, those who voted for Donald Trump or did not vote in 2016, self-described conservatives, and those who went to technical school or have some college education are less likely to approve of Raimondo's performance.

Figure 4: Generally speaking, do you approve or disapprove of the way Gina Raimondo is handling her job as governor?




Governor Raimondo and Cranston Mayor Allan Fung have similar levels of personal favorability among likely voters in Rhode Island. Currently, 46% have a favorable view of Raimondo, 7% are neutral, 43% have an unfavorable view of her, and 4% don't know or are unsure. Forty percent have a favorable view of Fung, 12% are neutral, 41% have an unfavorable view of him, and 7% don't know enough to say.

Former State Representative Joseph Trillo is seen far less favorably by Rhode Island likely voters. Only 15% have a favorable opinion of Trillo, 14% are neutral, 38% have an unfavorable view of him, and 33% don't know enough to say. Other candidates in the gubernatorial election are largely unknown among likely voters in Rhode Island. Five percent have a favorable view of political activist Anne Armstrong, 4% have a favorable view of political activist Bill Gilbert, and 3% have a favorable view of businessman Luiz Daniel Munoz. More than seven in ten don't know enough to say about Armstrong (72%), Gilbert (75%), or Munoz (75%).


Three-quarters of Democrats (75%) have a favorable view of Raimondo but only 27% of Independents and 13% of Republicans agree. Seventy-three percent of Republicans and half of Independents (51%) have a favorable view of Fung, but only 17% of Democrats agree. Republicans (24%) and Independents (17%) are more likely than Democrats (9%) to have a favorable opinion of Trillo.

Figure 5: As I read each name, please say if you have a favorable or unfavorable opinion of this person or of you don't know enough about them to say.




If the 2018 gubernatorial election was being held today, 48% of Rhode Islander likely voters would vote for Raimondo, 34% would vote for Fung, 5% would vote for Trillo, 1% each would vote for Armstrong, Munoz, or Gilbert, less than 1% would vote for another candidate, and 11% don't know or are undecided.

Figure 6: If the 2018 gubernatorial election was being held today, would you vote for...




When Trillo, Gilbert, Armstrong, and Munoz supporters (N=36) were asked who they would vote for if their preferred candidate were not running for governor, 53% say they would vote for Fung, 15% would vote for Munoz, 9% each would vote for Trillo or Raimondo, 3% would vote for Armstrong, 2% would vote for Gilbert, 5% would vote for another candidate, and 4% don't know or are unsure.

When respondents who don't know or are undecided who to vote for (N=53) are asked who they are leaning towards, 15% say they are leaning toward Fung, 10% are leaning toward Raimondo, 7% are leaning toward Trillo, 3% are leaning toward Armstrong, and two-thirds (65%) remain undecided.


Figure 8: Which candidate would you say you lean towards? (N=53)



When leaners are included with those who have decided, just under half of Rhode Islander likely voters (49%) say they would vote for Raimondo, 36% would vote for Fung, 6% would vote for Trillo, 1% each would vote for Armstrong, Munoz, or Gilbert, less than 1% would for another candidate, and 7% remain undecided. Rhode Islander likely voters who have voted in all recent midterm elections (since 2006) have similar preferences for the governor's race as those who have voted in some or none of the recent midterms.


Eighty-three percent of self-identified Democrats would vote for Raimondo, while 76% of Republicans would vote for Fung. A ..

Sixty-one percent of Rhode Islanders say they have definitely decided who they will vote for in the 2018 gubernatorial race. Among those who would vote for Gina Raimondo, 71% have definitely decided who to support, 14% are leaning toward someone, and 15% are still trying to decide. Sixty-five percent of those who would vote for Allan Fung have definitely decided, 19% are leaning toward someone, and 15% are still trying to decide. Trillo supporters are less definite about their choice; only 41% have definitely decided while 31% are leaning toward someone and 29% are still trying to decide.

Figure 10: Have you definitely decided who you will vote for Governor in 2018, are you leaning toward someone, or have you considered some candidates but are still trying to decide?




Senatorial Election

Rhode Island junior Senator Sheldon Whitehouse is broadly popular in the state. Fifty-five percent of likely voters have a favorable opinion of Whitehouse, 4% are neutral, 35% have a unfavorable opinion, and 5% don't know or are unsure. Most Democrats (85%) have a favorable opinion of Whitehouse but only 41% of Independents and 16% of Republicans agree.


His election opponent, former State Supreme Court Justice Robert Flanders is relatively unknown in Rhode Island. Thirty-one percent of likely voters have a favorable opinion of Flanders, 12% are neutral, 19% have an unfavorable opinion, and 38% don't know enough to say. Just over half (57%) of Republicans and 43% of Independents have a favorable opinion of Flanders, but only 10% of Democrats agree.

Figure 11: As I read each name, please say if you have a favorable or unfavorable opinion of this person or of you don't know enough about them to say.




If the 2018 Senate election was being held today, 57% of Rhode Island likely voters would vote for Sheldon Whitehouse, 33% would vote for Robert Flanders, 3% would vote for another candidate, and 6% don't know or are undecided.

When respondents who don't know or are undecided who to vote for (N=32) are asked who they are leaning towards, 21% say they are leaning toward Whitehouse, 20% are leaning toward Flanders, and 59% remain undecided.


Figure 13: Would you say you are leaning towards Robert Flanders, the Republican, or Sheldon Whitehouse, the Democrat? (N=32)



When leaners are included, 58% of likely voters in Rhode Island say they would vote for Whitehouse, 35% would vote for Robert Flanders, 3% would vote for another candidate, and 4% remain undecided.


Ninety-one percent of self-identified Democrats would vote for Whitehouse, while 81% of Republicans would vote for Flanders. Independents are split, with 45% supporting Whitehouse and 45% supporting Flanders.

Sixty-one percent of Rhode Islanders say they have definitely decided who they will vote for in the 2018 Senate race. Sixty-nine percent of those who would vote for Whitehouse have definitely decide who to support, 11% are leaning toward someone, and 19% are still trying to decide. Among those who would vote for Flanders, 64% have definitely decided, 13% are leaning toward someone, and 24% are still trying to decide.

Figure 15: Have you definitely decided who you will vote for US Senate in 2018, are you leaning toward someone, or have you considered some candidate but are still trying to decide?




National Politics

Registered voters in Rhode Islander are negative in their assessment of how well Donald Trump is performing as President. One-third (35%) approve of his performance, 60% disapprove, 5% don't know or are unsure.

Rhode Islander registered voters are deeply divided by partisanship in their assessment of the President: 81% of Republicans approve of Trump's job performance but only 34% of Independents and 8% of Democrats feel the same way. Ninety percent of Democrats and 56% of Independents disapprove of Trump's job performance but only 14% of Republicans feel this way.


Figure 16: Generally speaking, do you approve or disapprove of the way Donald Trump is handling his job as president?



Despite clear disapproval of Donald Trump's performance as President, Rhode Island registered voters are divided on what they would like their representative in Congress to do regarding possible impeachment of the President. Only 20% want their representative to vote as soon as possible to impeach the President, 36% would like to further investigate to determine a decision on impeachment, 41% do not want their representative to impeach the president at all, and 3% don't know or are unsure.


Self-described liberals, self-identified Democrats, those with a household income below \$30,000, and those who identify as non-white are more likely than others to want their representative to impeach the president as soon as possible. Self-identified Democrats, those who have completed postgraduate work, and those aged 18 to 34 are more likely than others to support further investigation, while self-identified Republicans, self-described conservatives, those with a household income between \$60,000 and \$74,999, and those with a high school education or less are more likely to not want their representative to impeach the president at all.

Overall, registered voters in Rhode Islander are pessimistic about the direction of the country. Thirty-seven percent think things in the country are going in the right direction while 58% say things are seriously off on the wrong track and 6% don't know or are unsure. Opinion on the direction of the country is closely tied to partisanship: three-quarters (75%) of Republicans thinks things are heading in the right direction but only 37% of Independents and 15% of Democrats agree.

Figure 18: Do you think things in this country are generally going in the right direction or are they seriously off on the wrong track?




State Legislature & State Issues

Rhode Island registered voters have a negative assessment of how well Nicholas Mattiello is handling his job as House Speaker of the General Assembly. Just under a quarter (24%) of approve of his performance, 40% disapprove, 37% don't know or are unsure.

Low approval of Mattiello's performance as House Speaker is bipartisan: only 22% of Democrats, 24% of Independents, and 26% of Republicans approve of the job Mattiello is doing.


Figure 19: Generally speaking, do you approve or disapprove of the way Nicholas Mattiello is handling his job as House Speaker of the General Assembly?



Rhode Island registered voters are also negative in their assessment of how Thomas J. Tobin's is handling his job as Roman Catholic Bishop of Providence. Twenty-three percent approve of his performance, 37% disapprove, 41% don't know or are unsure.

Approval of Tobin's performance as Bishop of Providence differs slightly among partisan groups: 15% of Democrats, 32% of Independents, and 28% of Republicans approve of the job Tobin is doing. Self-identified Catholics are nearly even split on Tobin's job performance: 38% approve while 41% disapprove.


Figure 20: Generally speaking, do you approve or disapprove of the way Thomas J. Tobin is handling his job as Roman Catholic Bishop of Providence?



Fifty-one percent of Rhode Island registered voters think things in the state are going in the right direction while 42% say things are seriously off on the wrong track and 7% don't know or are unsure.


Many Rhode Islanders have differing opinions on the directions of the state and the country. Overall, Rhode Island voters are a good deal more optimistic about the direction of the state than the direction of the country as a whole. Sixty-five percent of those who believe the country is going in the right direction think that the state is going in the wrong direction, while 64% of those who think the country is going in the wrong direction think the state is going in the right direction.

Nineteen percent of Rhode Islanders believe that jobs or the economy are the most important problem facing Rhode Island, 13% mention infrastructure, and 11% each say the most important problem is education or corruption or honesty in government. Fewer respondents mention taxes (7%), the state budget (5%), Governor Raimondo (3%), or the environment (2%) as the most important problem facing the state. Twenty-four percent say something else is the most important problem facing the state while 5% don't know or are unsure.


Figure 22: There are many problems facing the State of Rhode Island today. In general, what do you think is the most important problem facing the state of Rhode Island today?



Rhode Island likely voters are overwhelmingly in favor of the \$250 million bond issue for school repairs. More than three-quarters (77%) say they would vote for the bond issue if the election were held today, 12% say they vote no, and 11% don't know or are undecided.

Those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016 and those who identify as non-white are more likely than others to say they would vote yes on the bond issue. Self-identified Republicans and Independents, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, and self-described conservatives and moderates are less likely than others to say they would vote yes.


Figure 23: If the 2018 election was being held today, would you vote for or against the \$250 million bond issue for school repairs or would you not vote on this question?



Seven in ten registered voters in Rhode Island (71%) strongly (56%) or somewhat (15%) support the General Assembly passing a bill to protect legalized abortion in the state. Four percent neither support or oppose this measure, 20% somewhat (5%) or strongly (14%) oppose it, and 5% don't know or are unsure.

Self-described liberals, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, self-identified Democrats, those with a household income between \$75,000 and \$99,999, those who identify as non-white, and those who have never been married are more likely than others to support such a bill. Those who attend religious services once a week or more, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, self-described conservatives, self-identified Republicans, and those with a high school education or less are less likely to support it.


Figure 24: Thinking about the next session of the General Assembly, would you support or oppose the General Assembly passing a bill to protect legalized abortion in the state?



Rhode Island registered voters are more divided on a bill outlawing the sale of new semi-automatic rifles in the state. Just over half (55%) strongly (48%) or somewhat (7%) support such a bill, 4% neither support or oppose it, 40% somewhat (7%) or strongly (33%) support such a bill, and 1% don't know or are unsure.

Self-described liberals, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, self-identified Democrats, and those who have completed postgraduate work are more likely than others to support such a bill. Self-described conservatives, self-identified Republicans, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, and those with a high school education or less are less likely support such a bill.

Technical Report

Rhode Island 2018 Election Poll Methodology Conducted for Rhode Island Public Radio, the Providence Journal, and ABC6

Conducted by the UNH Survey Center Fall 2018

Field Period: September 27 to October 6, 2018

Hours: 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Sample Size: 561 randomly selected Rhode Island registered voters
503 randomly selected Rhode Island likely voters in the 2018 General Election

Sampling Error: +/- 4.1% (all respondents)
+/- 4.4% (likely voters)

Response Rate (AAPOR #4): 18%

These findings are based on the latest *Rhode Island 2018 Election Poll*, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center and funded by the *Rhode Island Public Radio, the Providence Journal, and ABC6*. Five hundred and sixty-one (561) randomly selected Rhode Island voters were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between September 27 and October 6, 2018.

How the Sample Was Selected

The random sample used in the *Rhode Island 2018 Election Poll* was purchased from Aristotle International, Inc., Washington, D.C. This sample came from a list of randomly selected registered voters in the state of Rhode Island with phone numbers appended. Approximately 69% of all registered voters had a phone number appended. Only the registered voter selected could participate in the survey, no substitutions were allowed. If, for example, the randomly selected voter is not at home when the household is first contacted, the interviewer cannot substitute by selecting someone else who happens to be there at the time. Instead, he or she must make an appointment to call back when the person is home. Seventy percent of surveys were completed on cell phones, while thirty percent were completed on land lines.

When the Interviewing Was Done

Respondents were interviewed between September 27 and October 6, 2018. Each selected respondent was called by a professional UNH Survey Center interviewer from a centrally supervised facility at the UNH Survey Center. Telephone calls during the field period were made between 9:00 AM and 9:00 PM.

Weighting of Data

The data have been weighted by respondent sex, age, and voter registration to those demographic distributions in the voter sampling frame. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.

Sampling Error

Like all surveys, the *Rhode Island 2018 Election Poll* is subject to sampling error due to the fact that all voters in the state were not interviewed. For those questions asked of five hundred (500) or so respondents, the error is +/-4.4%. For those questions where fewer than 500 persons responded, the sampling error can be calculated as follows:

$$\text{Sampling Error} = \pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{P(1-P)}{N}}$$

Where P is the percentage of responses in the answer category being evaluated and N is the total number of persons answering the particular question.

Design Effect

These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.1%.
