PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

You have requested that this reporter furnish you with a memorandum detailing some of the pertinent facts concerning apparent Communist or pro-Communist activities in the Los Angeles A. F. of L. movement, which were revealed as a result of developments in the recent 10-months trial of the \$200,000 libel suit known as Jeffers v. Screen Extras Guild, Inc., L. A. Superior Court #573,634.

Since the complicated circumstances of these pro-Communist maneuvers make this report necessarily quite long, your reporter wishes to set out a summary of certain conclusions at the start, which are supported by the documentation which will follow.

--THE NEW COMMUNIST PARTY LINE--

First of all, it is my belief that, since the failure of the "Progressive Party" campaign of 1948, and the definite exposure of the Communist-led unions which were expelled from the C.I.O. in 1949 and 1950, there has been a gradual revision of the Party line until today the "United Front" tactics and the infiltration methods of the early 1940's (June, 1941 - August, 1945) are being renewed with full vigor.

Second of all, since the 1952 Presidential election and the truce in Korea, we know that the C.P. line has been laid down specifically to resume active Communist participation in (1) established non-Communist

or even anti-Communist labor organizations, particularly the A. F. of L.; (2) the two major political parties, particularly the Democratic; (3) the fields of mass communication and entertainment, particularly motion pictures, television, and the "liberal" press.

Third, the same type of C.P. exploitation of genuine U.S. liberal sentiment against "Hitlerism" in the 1940's is being repeated today in the formation of a "United Front" against "McCarthyism".

---THE ROLES OF CERTAIN LEADERS IN LABOR, THE
DEMOCRATIC PARTY, AND THE "LIBERAL
PRESS" IN L.A.---

In Southern California, this has led to a strong three-pronged Communist drive for power during the past two years aimed at the American Federation of Labor, using influence upon the Secretary of the Los Angeles Central Labor Council as a focal point; the Democratic Party, using the Chairman of the Los Angeles County Central Committee and influence upon the Southern Division Chairman of the State Central Committee as the key points; and the "liberal" press, using the Daily News in a broad area and Frontier Magazine in a more specialized area.

Key figures to be examined in this entire situation are (1) W. J. BASSETT, Secretary of the Los Angeles Central Labor Council; (2) Labor Attorney GEORGE E. BUDLE; (3) JOSEPH T. DeSILVA, Secretary of Retail Clerks Local 770; (4) RALPH BODDY, "business manager" of the A.F. of L. Council's newspaper; (5) CLINTON D. McKINNON, new publisher of the Daily News and Southern California Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee; (6) RICHARD RICHARDS, Chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee and candidate for State Senator; (7) GIFFORD PHILLIPS, pub-

lisher of Frontier magazine; and waiting in the wings, (8) HERBERT K. SCRELL, leader of the Hollywood studio strikes of 1945-46, who is barred from office in the Painters' Union until 1956.

There are numerous responsible trade union leaders in California who find it difficult to believe that "BILL" BASSETT or "CLINT" McKINNON are consciously aiding the current resurgence of Communist activity in Los Angeles. Some have said they are just being "duped". Others contend they are being "pressured", or even "black-mailed". Your reporter would prefer to submit the following facts without expressing any conclusion on this particular question.

(NOTE: SECRETARY BASSETT stated on May 14, 1954, in his by-line column ["/BASSETT SAYS"/] on the front page of the Los Angeles Citizen, the official A. F. of L. paper,

"I have been a consistent fighter against Communists and fellow travelers since I became affiliated with the labor movement some 30-odd years ago...

"For the benefit of any late comers, I might add that I not only believe all proven Communists, persons who advocate the overthrow of the American government by force, should not merely be eliminated from labor unions and other organizations, but should actually be ELIMINATED. Period." ["/underscoring added/"]

The front page of the Citizen for May 7, 1954, contains two stories favorable to ATTORNEY GEORGE BODLE and displays BODLE's picture. The issue of May 14th, which carries BASSETT's claim of antipathy for "Communists and fellow travelers" carries another front page story quoting BODLE extensively on the subject of pension plans.)

TEXT OF REPORT

--THE 1950 ATTACK UPON THE SCREEN EXTRAS GUILD--

On April 5, 1950, the Screen Extras Guild, Inc., (a branch of the Associated Actors and Artistes of America, A. F. of L., affiliated with the Los Angeles Central Labor Council, Hollywood A. F. of L. Film Council, California State Theatrical Federation, and the California State Federation of Labor), issued a "newsletter" to its members as a reply to a "recall scheme" against all S.E.G. officers and directors. The "recall" movement, just before the Guild's regular annual election, was led by MICHAEL D. JEFFERS, a suspended member, and former business agent of the SCREEN PLAYERS UNION, which actively supported HERB SCRELL's CONFERENCE OF STUDIO UNIONS during the 1945 Studio Strike.

This "newsletter" was a reply to a series of written attacks upon the Guild, its officers and board of directors in support of the Jeffers "recall" campaign. They appeared in the columns of "HOLLYWOOD NIGHT LIFE MAGAZINE" (also latterly known as "HOLLYWOOD LIFE"), a "scandal sheet" published by JAMES TARANTINO, recently convicted of extortion through "blackmail" in San Francisco, and also in unsigned, mimeographed pamphlets circulated by JEFFERS and his followers on sets in the motion picture studios and in the vicinity of the offices of the State Department of Employment where extra players' benefit claims are handled. --THE COMMUNIST ISSUE IN THE JEFFERS CASE--

Among the statements contained in the S.E.G. "newsletter" of April 5, 1950, was the charge that "Jeffers would like the extra players to forget

that he was part of the Commie-influenced Conference of Studio Unions that pulled two disastrous jurisdictional strikes in 1945-46."

Approximately 10 days later, the Guild received similarly worded demands for retraction of the entire newsletter from TARANTINO and JEFFERS. (Jeffers testified on deposition and at the trial that he had conferred with Tarantino before the attacks began in "Hollywood Night Life" and spoke to him over the telephone before sending his letter, which is dated two days later than Tarantino's demand for a retraction. An affidavit by a former TARANTINO employee, one POLLY GOULD, in the files of the Los Angeles Police Department, states that she arranged a meeting back in 1946 between HERBERT K. SORRELL, President of the Conference of Studio Unions, BEN MARCOLIS, attorney for some of the C.S.U. striking unions, and JIMMY TARANTINO, where discussions were held about editorial support for the C.S.U. strike in "Hollywood Night Life" in return for C.S.U. patronage for the magazine. [Testimony regarding this affidavit was given by "Buck" Harris, at the Jeffers trial.])

In May of 1950, a libel complaint seeking \$100,000 general damages and \$100,000 special damages was filed against the Guild, its officers, all members of its board of directors, its executive secretary, H. O'NEIL SHANKS (a member of the Executive Board of the Los Angeles Central Labor Council and Recording Secretary of the Hollywood A.F.L. Film Council), its public relations counsel, E. T. "BUCK" HARRIS, (who is also public relations counsel for the Screen Actors Guild and the Hollywood A.F.L. Film Council), and its legal counsel, ROBERT W. GILBERT, (member of the labor law firm of Gilbert, Nissen & Irvin, Los Angeles).

--FERRY BERTRAM AND ALEXANDER SCHULLMAN--

This action was brought on Jeffers' behalf by ATTORNEY FERRY BERTRAM of Los Angeles. (From 1944-1946, Jeffers, as an officer of the now-defunct SCREEN PLAYERS UNION [S.P.U.], an independent union of extra players, had been represented by ALEXANDER H. SCHULLMAN, who is the former attorney for Retail Clerks Local 770, A.F.L., attorney for the local District Council of Painters; sometime attorney for the Painters' International and the Carpenters' International in various National Labor Relations Board proceedings arising out of the Hollywood jurisdictional strikes of 1945-46; former attorney for Retail Clerks Local 905, A.F.L. SCHULLMAN was also defense counsel for the ex-head of the Los Angeles C.I.O., ex-President of the Los Angeles Newspaper Guild, PHILLIP M. "SLIM" CONNELLY, in 1952, during Connelly's trial at which this People's World editor was convicted for violation of the Smith Act. During 1946, in proceedings before the National Labor Relations Board (Case No. 21-R-3206), SCHULLMAN opposed the Screen Extras Guild, A.F.L., as counsel for Jeffers' Independent Screen Players Union and BERTRAM, who had been an attorney with the Department of Labor from April of 1942 until December, 1944, intervened as counsel for a so-called "UNITED ACTORS ASSOCIATION", a "paper" organization headed by HAL CRAIG. Craig was an associate of Jeffers in the S.P.U. during 1944-45, who supposedly "broke" with Jeffers during the 1945 Studio Strike and resigned from the S.P.U. Board.)

BERTRAM is the same attorney who filed several Superior Court actions against the Screen Extras Guild in 1946-47, (Lind et al. vs. Screen Extras Guild, L.A. Sup. Ct. #516,442; Raymond et al. vs. Screen Extras Guild, L.A. Sup. Ct. #530,304), for the purpose of forcing S.P.U. to accept

several unemployable extra players who were associates of Jeffers into Guild membership. In 1948, when Jeffers was campaigning against a "YES" vote in the pending union shop authorization election being held by the National Labor Relations Board upon S.F.G.'s petition (Case No. 21-UA-217), BERTRAM and JEFFERS filed a representation petition (Case No. 21-RC-449) seeking certification of the defunct SCREEN PLAYERS UNION, independent, as bargaining agent for extra players, supported by "authorizations" from only 99 out of the more than 3,000 extras in the bargaining unit.

BERTRAM appealed the dismissal of this "RC" petition to the Board in Washington, D. C., which resulted in holding up the counting of ballots in the Guild's union shop election (Case No. 21-UA-217) and suspending its contract negotiations, until the appeal was denied.

---BACKGROUND OF PERRY BERTRAM---

Since 1945, BERTRAM has been a member of the NATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD, described by the Attorney General (Eiddle and Brownell), the House Committee on Un-American Activities, and the California Committee on Un-American Activities as "the legal arm of the Communist Party." He was delegate from the Los Angeles Chapter of the NATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD to the CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE CONFERENCE, a recognized Communist front organization. BERTRAM was a member of the EXECUTIVE BOARD of the local branch of the LAWYERS GUILD at least during 1950-52. (During 1952, he was on that Executive Board, together with N.L.G. President WILLIAM ESTERMAN, former attorney for the CONFERENCE OF STUDIO UNIONS (C.S.U.), an identified Communist who took the Fifth Amendment before the House Committee in 1953 and the original C.S.U. attorney GEORGE E. BODLEY, who succeeded RONALD REAGAN as

attorney for Retail Clerks Local 770, A.F.L., headed by JOSEPH T. DE SILVA. Bodle testified as an "unfriendly witness" before the California Committee in 1942 and was classified as an "evasive witness" by Committee Chairman Hugh M. Burns when subpoenaed to testify again in January, 1954.)

Note: The foregoing facts and numerous other facts establishing BERTRAM'S pro-Communist connections can be established by the transcript of BERTRAM'S testimony at the Jeffers trial in November, 1953, which contains more than 350 pages of his cross-examination.

Some of the principal items thus established regarding BERTRAM'S pro-Communist background are the following:

(1944) Chairman of the Educational and Legislative Committees of Local 245, UNITED FEDERAL WORKERS, C.I.O., while an attorney for the U.S. Department of Labor attached to the Los Angeles branch of the Wage-Hour Division. (People's World, 5/24/44, p. 3; 6/24/44, p. 3; Bertram Testimony, pp. 137-138. The successor to this Union, the UNITED PUBLIC WORKERS was expelled from the C.I.O. for Communist domination on February 15, 1950.)

(1945) Joined the local chapter of the NATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD, October 11, 1945. (Bertram Testimony, p. 11) While a Lawyers' Guild member, BERTRAM says he met BEN MARGOLIS (pp. 7 and 59); FRANK PISTANA (pp. 12 and 61); WILLIAM ESTERMAN (p. 14); LEO GALLAGHER (pp. 16 and 55); JOHN T. McFERNAN (pp. 26 and 60); DAVID AARON (p. 49); CHARLES J. KATZ (p. 56); JOHN PORTER (p. 62); MILTON TYRE (p. 69); and other attorneys identified as Communists during the 1952 House Committee hearings. SELMA M. BACH LIS, identified as a Communist by 6 witnesses before the House Committee, and a member of a Burbank C.P. group with CHARLOTTE DARLING (Testimony of Charlotte Darling Adams at Jeffers trial, pp. 17-18), was a classmate of BERTRAM at U.C.L.A. and at Law School, and worked with him in the Lawyers Guild. (Bertram Testimony, p. 52)

(1947) Spoke on Labor Law panel with BEN MARGOLIS, MILTON TYRE, and JOHN W. PORTER at 3-day conference of "progressive lawyers" from Western States and NATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD Executive Board, Santa Monica Ambassador Hotel, August, 1947. (People's World, 8/18/47; Bertram Testimony, pp. 139-140)

(1947 or 1948) "Assigned" as a delegate from the National Lawyers Guild to the CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE CONFERENCE, (Bertram Testimony, p. 185).

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(1948) One of group, including WILLIAM S. LAWRENCE, I.L.W.U. official, PHILLIP M. "SLIM" CONNELLY, ex-C.I.O. official, SAMUEL J. BERLAND, UNITED PUBLIC WORKERS representative, DR. SANFORD GOLDNER, representing AMERICAN JEWISH LABOR COUNCIL, and BERTRAM, representing the NATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD, which appeared at L.A. City Council to oppose "loyalty check" for City employees. (C.I.O. Labor Herald, 10/26/48; Bertram Testimony, pp. 143-146)

(1948) Co-sponsor of display ad in Los Angeles Daily News during November, 1948, protesting contempt actions against IO C.P. leaders, including PHIL CONNELLY, and his wife, DOROTHY HEALY, subsequently indicted and convicted under the Smith Act. Adv. bore imprint of CIVIL RIGHTS CONGRESS, a listed subversive organization. Ad urged attendance at CIVIL RIGHTS CONGRESS rally at Embassy Auditorium, and solicited financial contributions. (People's World, 11/6/48, p. 3; Daily News, 11/10/48; Bertram Testimony, pp. 146-157) Other sponsors included SELMA PACHLIS; DR. SANFORD GOLDNER; LEO GALLAGHER; FRANK PESTANA; JOHN W. PORTER; and MAYNARD J. OMERBERG, discharged employee of L.A. Teamsters Joint Council, and I.P.P. candidate for Assembly in 57th A.D.

(1949) Member of Lawyers Committee of 33 to elect PAUL MAJOR to L.A. City Council, 5th District, headed by RUDOLPH PACHT, another classmate of BERTRAM. (Bertram Testimony, pp. 164-169) Other committee members included BEN MARGOLIS, JOHN McTERNAN, CARY McWILLIAMS, MAYNARD J. OMERBERG, ELLIS PATTERSON, FRANK PESTANA, MILTON S. TYRE, and FORMER STATE ASSEMBLYMAN WILLIAM ROSENTHAL. (People's World, 3/31/49; Bertram Testimony, p. 166)

(1949) Members of Lawyers Committee against Loyalty Oaths, together with D'N MARSHALL, CARY McWILLIAMS, CHARLES J. KATZ, PAUL MAJOR, JOSEPH AIDLEN, ALAN CARSON, and others, including ALEXANDER H. SCHULLMAN. (C.I.O. Labor Herald, 5/31/49; People's World, 5/24/49; Bertram Testimony, pp. 169-177) BERTRAM says he has known SCHULLMAN since about 1943 (Bertram Testimony p. 170). Regarding ALAN CARSON, who took the Fifth Amendment during L.A. Housing Authority investigation, see 1953 California Committee Report.

(1949) One of group of attorneys defending BEN MARGOLIS on contempt charges for refusing to answer questions regarding C.P. membership during proceedings against IO C.P. leaders, including "SLIM" CONNELLY et al. Other defense lawyers included ROBERT W. KINNY, JOHN T. McTERNAN, and WILLIAM B. ESTERMAN, in addition to Bertram. (People's World, 6/13/49, p. 3; Bertram Testimony, pp. 177-180)

(1950) Spoke in capacity of past president of ^{Ronald Reagan-5468} San Fernando Valley Jewish Community Center at CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE

CONFERENCE meeting protesting the McCarran Act at Alexandria Hotel, L.A., October 26, 1950. (People's World, 10/24/1950, p. 3; Bertram Testimony, pp. 182-183)

(1952) Signed statement and brief opposing subpoenas issued to 21 Los Angeles Communist lawyers by House Committee. (People's World, 9/15/52; Bertram Testimony, pp. 191 and ff.) Among those subpoenaed were BEN MAROULIS, FRANK PESTANA, WILLIAM ISSERMAN, and other Lawyers Guild members, who took the 5th Amendment.

--ABRAHAM J. ISSERMAN--

In addition to legal representation by SCHULLMAN and BERTRAM, JEFFERS, while the business agent of the SCREEN PLAYERS UNION, was represented before the National Labor Relations Board in Washington, D. C. during the latter part of 1945 and the early part of 1946 by ATTORNEY ABRAHAM J. ("ABBY") ISSERMAN of New Jersey, who later represented some of the top leadership of the COMMUNIST PARTY, U.S.A. in the Foley Square trial under the Smith Act and as a result of his contemptuous tactics has been permanently disbarred by the New Jersey courts (9 N.J. 269, 87 Atl. (2d) 903; 9 N.J. 316, 88 Atl. (2d) 199) and by the Supreme Court of the United States. (See In re Isserman, 345 U.S. 286.) The details of ISSERMAN's representation of JEFFERS' S.P.U. are established by testimony of Jeffers and Herbert K. Sorrell, in the libel suit, and by various exhibits, including S.P.U. minutes and documents (e.g., a memorandum from Isserman to Jeffers stating S.P.U. has "no more chance than a cake of ice in an atomic blaze" and a telegram from Isserman to Jeffers care of FRANK PESTANA, an identified Communist attorney who took the Fifth Amendment in 1952, stating "Herb [referring to HERBERT K. SORRELL, President of the C.S.U.] has all the details".)

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in 1933 Reichstag fire trial in Berlin; presently a candidate for United States Senator in California, (June 8, 1954 primary).

3. JOHN T. McTERNAN, partner in Margolis, McTernan & Branton; active in local branch of National Lawyers Guild with BERTRAM, BOBLE, ISTERMAN, etc. According to testimony before House Committee and in Jeffers trial, by DAVID AARON, a highly secret meeting of selected Communist lawyers was held at McTERNAN's house in 1947, just before the National Lawyers Guild Convention in Santa Monica, where the "fraction" was addressed by ROBERT J. SILBERSTEIN, national executive secretary of the Lawyers' Guild from Washington, D.C., who himself has been identified as a Communist and taken the Fifth Amendment.

4. MILTON S. TYRE, former partner in Margolis, McTernan & Tyre. Active with BERTRAM, et al. in Lawyers Guild. Admitted Communist membership in sworn statement to investigator for House Committee, William Wheeler; later took the Fifth Amendment when asked to testify in public session in 1952.

5. DAVID AARON, former employee of National Labor Relations Board, 21st Region (Los Angeles office); handled individual strikers' cases involving assault & battery etc. during 1946 strike; active in Lawyers Guild with BERTRAM et al.; brother of BENJAMIN AARON, former MSB Public Member and teacher at UCLA Institute of Industrial Relations; admitted ex-Communist who named 32 other attorneys, including ISTERMAN, MR. and MRS. FRANK PESTANA; MARGOLIS, et al., as having been fellow members of the C.P. lawyers' group in L.A., known as the "Angels Club" in 1946. Testified before House Committee in 1952 and at Jeffers' trial in 1953.

6. RICHARD RICHARDS, present chairman of the Los Angeles Democratic County Central Committee and Democratic-endorsed candidate for State Senator from L.A. County (36th District). RICHARDS has for several years shared law offices with ALEXANDER H. SCHULLMAN. He has NOT, to this reporter's knowledge, ever been identified by sworn testimony as a Communist Party member. (A pre-Jeffers juror in the libel suit, MRS. ESTHER M. SMITH, 1037 Hyperion Ave., Los Angeles, who admitted after the trial that she had been a student at the ACTORS LABORATORY THEATRE, a Communist-run little theater group in Hollywood, has stated that RICHARD RICHARDS is the son of a woman relative of hers, apparently her aunt or cousin.) RICHARDS himself called the S.B.O. counsel during the trial to request that CHARLES DAGGETT, subpoenaed as a witness, be released without being required to testify. DAGGETT was an "unfriendly" witness before the House Committee in 1951, but testified in 1952, admitting previous C.P. membership and naming 32 fellow members of the C.P. DAGGETT was a member of the SCREEN PUBLICISTS GUILD. RICHARDS handled individual strikers' criminal cases for the C.S.U. during the 1946 strike.

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12. JOHN W. PORTER and JACK TURNER, associated with MARCOLIS, McFERRAN, TYRE, etc.; identified as Communists before House Committee by AARON and TYRE; took the Fifth Amendment in 1952. Limited participation in C.S.U. affairs.

All of these attorneys, except Bodle and Richards, have been publicly identified as Communists or ex-Communists.

--BACKGROUND OF GEORGE E. BODLE--

As stated above, GEORGE E. BODLE "drew up the Constitution of the CONFERENCE OF STUDENT UNIONS" according to SCRELL's testimony at the Jeffers' trial. (P. 47)

Bodle is a graduate of Stanford University Law School and was admitted to the California Bar in 1934.

In 1937, Bodle became associated with the PACIFIC COAST LABOR BUREAU (now known as the NATIONAL LABOR BUREAU), and its director, HENRY P. MELNIKOW. The Melnikow "Labor Bureau" provides "economic counsel" and representation in arbitrations for labor unions. Melnikow formerly served as economic counsel for Harry Bridges' INTERNATIONAL LONGSHOREMEN'S AND WAREHOUSEMEN'S UNION. (According to a statement by JAMES LANEY, Bodle's former law partner, and information received from BEN JOHNSON, former employee of the Melnikow staff, BODLE has a current "working arrangement" with MELNIKOW, whereby Melnikow handles union arbitrations and refers legal matters to Bodle. Under this arrangement, Melnikow and Bodle have handled matters within the past two years in Los Angeles for RETAIL CLERKS LOCAL 770, A.F.L., headed by JOSEPH T. DEBELVA, and the Metropolitan Bus Lines Grievance Committee of the BROTHERHOOD OF RAILROAD TRAINMEN.)

While apparently still associated with the Pacific Coast Labor Bureau (1937-39), Bodle commenced representing Ronald Reagan-5474 Southern

California, in the printing trades and the motion picture industry.

Sodle became the attorney for the SCREEN CARTOONISTS GUILD, in 1937, which Jeffers, Sorrell, and MAX SILVER, former Organizational Secretary of the Los Angeles County branch of the Communist Party, all admitted in sworn testimony at the Jeffers trial, was a Communist-controlled union. The secretary of the Screen Cartoonists Guild, CHARLOTTE EARLING (married name - Charlotte Earling Adams), was a C.P. member when the Guild was created. She testified in 1953 before the House Committee and at the Jeffers trial (pp. 5-8) that she attended C.P. meetings with ED GILBERT and FRANK BELLIX of SCREEN SET MEN'S LOCAL 1421, who helped the cartoonists organize their own Guild. She further testified at the Jeffers trial (Testimony, p. 11) that WILLIAM POMERANCE, an employee of the National Labor Relations Board, had been hired as the business agent of the Cartoonists Guild upon the recommendation of Herb Sorrell and the Pacific Coast Labor Bureau. Sorrell told the Kearns Subcommittee in 1948, "I didn't know Pomerance... Now Mr. Sodle - I blame him for getting Mr. Pomerance the job, because Mr. Sodle recommended him." (Hearings pursuant to H.Res. 111, 80th Cong., Vol. 3, p. 1917). (POMERANCE was identified before the House Committee as a Communist by at least three witnesses; took the Fifth Amendment as to prior membership in the C.P. SOBLE himself testified before the California Committee in 1942 that he knew CHARLOTTE EARLING and DAVID HILBERMAN in the SCREEN CARTOONISTS GUILD, but never noticed or observed any Communistic influence in any of the unions he represented. HILBERMAN has been identified as a C.P. member by at least two witnesses before the House Committee; (see also Adams Testimony at Jeffers trial, p. 10). HILBERMAN is currently in business with POMERANCE in New York making T-V

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films.) After leaving the Cartoonists, POMRANCE became executive secretary of the SCREEN WRITERS GUILD, and was active during the 1945 C.S.U. strike as a member of the so-called "Citizens Committee to Aid the Motion Picture Strikers", identified by the House Committee and the California Committee as a Communist front organization.

BOBLE's ex-wife, Alice Kenneman, who reportedly left him because of opposition to his pro-Communist activities, and is referred to in the 1943 Report of the California Committee under the name of Alice Ingraham [p. 94], was Assistant Executive Secretary of the Screen Writers Guild during the administration of WILLIAM POMRANCE. In 1946 or early 1947, POMRANCE announced he was resigning his Screen Writers Guild position to devote full time to helping the second C.S.U. strike. [See Hearings, pursuant to H.Res. 111, 80th Cong., Vol. 3, p. 19167]

BOBLE was also attorney for the SCREEN OFFICE EMPLOYEES GUILD, (S.O.E.G.), another affiliate of the Painters' International, which Jeffers, Sorrell, and MAX SILVER all admitted at the Jeffers trial was another Communist-dominated union. (BERNARD "BERNIE" LUSHER, S.O.E.G. business agent has been identified as a C.P. member before the House Committee; took the Fifth Amendment in 1953. After the second C.S.U. strike was lost, LUSHER went to work as business agent for the Los Angeles local of the UNITED OFFICE AND PROFESSIONAL WORKERS OF AMERICA, identified as a Communist-controlled union.)

While associated with the Pacific Coast Labor Bureau, Boble was frequently seen in the company of JEFF KIBRE, also known in the Communist Party as "EARSE WOOD". (At least one witness known to your reporter believes he saw Boble and Kibre together in San Francisco meetings

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in the middle 1930's.) KIBRE has been identified as a Communist by at least three witnesses before the House Committee. (See also Adams testimony at Jeffers trial, pp. 12-14.) Secret reports by KIBRE on his activities within the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (I.A.T.S.E.) in Hollywood in 1937 and 1938, written to LOUIS GOLDBLATT, secretary-treasurer of Bridges' I.L.W.U., and to top C.P. officials fell into the hands of the police and excerpts were printed in the proceedings of the Kearns Subcommittee investigating the Hollywood Motion Picture Jurisdictional Strikes. (Hearings pursuant to H.Res. 111, 80th Cong., Vol. 3, p. 1750-1758, February and March, 1948.) BODLE admits meeting with KIBRE during this period, and knowing GOLDBLATT's brother, SAM. (See California 1943 Report, p. 94.)

According to his testimony before the California Committee (See 1943 Report, p. 95), BODLE participated in the formation of the "Unemployment Conference" of Studio Unions in 1938. Others participating were KIBRE and SCORRELL, according to testimony at the Jeffers trial by CHARLOTTE DARLING ADAMS who was the secretary-treasurer of the "Unemployment Conference". (Adams Testimony, pp. 14-15) SCORRELL was the chairman, and he claimed that "We accomplished quite a number of things in this unemployment conference in spite of the fact that it was called communistic". (Kearns Hearings, Vol. 3, p. 1873.)

Also, in 1938, (See 1943 California Committee Report, p. 94), BODLE became acquainted with LEO GALLAGHER, and was associated in a trial with CHARLES J. KATZ. (According to the Los Angeles Times, issue of June 2, 1941, BODLE, SCORRELL, and others co-sponsored a testimonial dinner in honor of LEO GALLAGHER at which the announced theme was "ON THE RIGHTS OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY".)

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In 1939, JEFF KIBRE was expelled from the I.A.T.S.E. and he then formed the UNITED STUDIO TECHNICIANS GUILD (U.S.T.G.), as the vehicle for taking studio workers into the C.I.O. led in California by BRIDGES and CORRELL. This effort failed when the U.S.T.G. lost an N.L.R.B. election conducted industry-wide and KIBRE vanished from the Hollywood scene. (He was active in the Communist-led aircraft strike at North American Aviation Co. in 1940, and then became head of the C.I.O. International Fishermen and Allied Workers Union on the West Coast. When that union (I.F.A.W.A.) was expelled from the C.I.O. as Communist-dominated in 1950, it affiliated with HARRY BRIDGES' I.L.W.U. with KIBRE remaining at the head. At present, KIBRE is a legislative representative for the I.L.W.U. in Washington, D. C.) A defense of KIBRE and CORRELL on charges of Communism appears in the May, 1954, issue of the pro-Communist magazine, FRONTIER, at pp. 20-22. This article, entitled "The Hollywood Story", specifically refers to Correll's denial of Communist Party membership "in a libel case that arose from the 1946 dispute", obviously referring to the Jeffers case.

According to this Frontier article, "After Kibre failed, the trade union opposition to the Bioff regime fell to the A.F.L. Painters union, led by Herb Correll, a tough ex-prize fighter who finally met the same fate as Kibre."

(At the Jeffers trial, in 1953, CORRELL testified he joined the HARRY BRIDGES DEFENSE COMMITTEE and other movements to oppose the I.L.W.U. leader's deportation as an alien Communist, because "Bridges gave me help when I needed it and the least I could do was to get on Harry Bridges' Committee". That "help" from BRIDGES, according to Correll's testimony

(p. 313) was given when the I.L.W.U. leader "financed JEFF KIRBY and the U.S.T.G." For a discussion of successive visits by HARRY BRIDGES and GEORGE BODLE to a San Quentin convict who was refusing offers of help from a Communist-influenced "defense committee", see 1943 California Committee Report, p. 176 and ff., especially p. 197.)

Late in 1940 or early in 1941, according to the transcript of testimony of MAX SILVER at the Jeffers trial, Communist Party officials launched another effort to "establish a progressive trade union center in Hollywood instead of the I.A.T.S.E." (Tr., p. 5; see article headed "L.A. Steelpigeon 'Sings' in Libel Suit", in People's World, 1/18/54.)

Preliminary discussion about the organization of the Conference of Studio Unions was held between ATTORNEY GEORGE BODLE, MATT PELLMAN (also known as MAX APPELBAUM), Trade Union Secretary for the Los Angeles branch of the C.P., and MAX SILVER, then head of the Los Angeles Communist Party in BODLE's law offices. (See Testimony of Silver, pp. 7-9; Hollywood Reporter, 1/12/54; Hollywood Citizen-News, 1/15/54; People's World, 1/18/54.)

According to Silver, the C.S.U. was built around four Communist-created unions: the SCREEN CARTOONISTS GUILD, the SCREEN OFFICE EMPLOYEES GUILD, the SCREEN PUBLICISTS GUILD, and the FILM TECHNICIANS, LOCAL 683, I.A.T.S.E.. He identified as key Communists in the Conference: WILLIAM POMERANCE of the Cartoonists; BLANCHE COLE, sister of one of the "Hollywood Ten", who became C.S.U.'s Recording Secretary; BERNARD LUSHNER of the S.O.F.G.; JOHN MARTIN and NORVAL CRUTCHER of the Film Technicians, and MIN SELVIN of the S.O.F.G. (See Testimony of Max Silver at Jeffers trial, pp. 5-33.)

In his testimony before the California Committee, BODLE established that he "was the attorney for the Union Guild Council which had been formed from independent Hollywood unions in 1940 or 1941"; that his work "was not

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for the Council as such but as the legal representative for certain of the Guilds which formed the Council". (California 1943 Report, pp. 94-95.)

According to the Daily Variety of November 3, 1941, the C.S.U. was publicly "launched" at that time with the adoption of the Bodle-drafted Constitution by Sorrell's Local 644, with similar approvals soon to follow from the SCREEN OFFICE EMPLOYERS GUILD, SCREEN CARTOONISTS GUILD, and FILM TECHNICIANS LOCAL 683.

Between 1940 and 1942, BODLE was attorney for the Screen Cartoonists Guild, the Screen Office Employees Guild, and the Screen Publicists Guild. (During the 1945 and 1946 strikes, S.O.E.G. and the Film Technicians were represented by BEN MARCOLIS. The Screen Publicists were represented by MILTON TYRE and another former National Labor Relations Board official, MILTON GOTTLIEB, became the business representative.) As such, BODLE worked with William Pennerance, David Hilberman, Charlotte Earling, Herbert K. Sorrell, and Norval Crutcher. (Bodle Testimony, 1942). Crutcher later became the husband of Min Selvin. (Sorrell testified to the Crutcher-Selvin marital relationship, at the Jeffers trial, p. 657.)

A dossier of pro-Communist action taken at meetings of the CONFERENCE OF STUDIO UNIONS for the period 1942-1946 was made part of the record in the Kearns Subcommittee hearings. (Hearings pursuant to H.Res. 111, 80th Cong., Vol. 3, pp. 1621-1622.) True copies of the actual C.S.U. minutes were produced by BODLE pursuant to the instructions of the Court at the Jeffers trial and admitted into evidence.

The following typical excerpts from a few of the C.S.U. Minutes for 1942 reveal active participation by BODLE in pro-Communist activities of the Conference:

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1. Meeting of February 18, 1942 - "George Bodle reported on the activities of the Dies Committee" and "Reported on Tenney Committee activities."

(Note: According to the People's World, August 30, 1941, BODLE was a co-sponsor of a state-wide conference on "civil rights", to be held at San Francisco, September 27, 1941, protesting the California Legislative investigation of Un-American Activities and opposing legislation aimed at outlawing the Communist Party.)

Bodle "recommended that Conference go on record against any further appropriations."

"President Sorrell appointed Bomerance, Cole, Martin, and Bodle to draft telegrams" opposing appropriations for investigations into Communist activities, which were sent to Governor Olson and "to local Congressmen".

"Motion by Hilberman...that a committee of three be appointed to wait on the producers in regard to questions of enemy aliens in the studios."

"John Martin...stated it was his belief that the union's obligation to these people should continue until any charge of subversive activities had been proved by the Federal government."

"Bodle suggested policy to be laid down..."

"Sorrell appointed Martin, Bodle, and Sorrell was suggested as the third member" of the Committee...

"Motion by Hilberman, second by Cole that Committee on Alien Matter Martin, Bodle, and Sorrell ...inform [a person described in the minutes as "turning over information to Jack Tenney"] that the Conference opposes the handing over of any information gathered from unions to any but responsible authorities." Motion carried."

2. Meeting of March 12, 1942 - /attended by George Bodle, and his legal associate, Lou Stein -- "Secretary McNight stated that the telegram protesting the Dies Committee had been sent to the ... House Representatives from Los Angeles County."

(Note: In January, 1943, Herbert S. Sorrell, Attorney Louis Stein, and other Hollywood figures signed a message opposing renewal of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.)

"The Conference discussed attitude on matter of questionnaires in the studios" and "a committee to draft a statement on matters of common interest outside the scope of production was appointed by President Sorrell. The following delegates were named to serve on the committee, Bodle, Cole, Ronald Reagan 5478."

"President Sorrell appointed Hilberman to take Cole's place on the committee to draft publicity pamphlet."

3. Special Meeting of June 1, 1942 at office of Screen Cartoonists. - Present - 11 delegates, including Sorrell, Lusher, Cole, Pomerance, Hilberman, and Attorney George Bodle.

"Meeting was called to discuss the situation regarding the middle action against Harry Bridges, and to determine what action, if any, should be taken by the Conference and its affiliated unions."

"Pomerance, Sorrell, and Bodle particularly supplied data and information regarding the history of Bridges' work and the campaigns which have been conducted against him. They pointed out the implications of the move on Bridges' part at this time; what forces are working against Bridges and finally what an extremely bad effect such action must have on the unity of the country at this time and particularly on the effort of labor in the war."

"After considerable discussion of the facts involved, the motion was offered by HILBERMAN, seconded by LAMBERTSON [a Cartoonists' delegate] that 'The C.S.U. put out a factual bulletin on Bridges which shall be sent to the membership of all affiliated unions.' Motion carried."

"Committee composed of POMERANCE, BOBLE, and LAMBERTSON was appointed to compose a factual bulletin, which should be brought to regular meeting, Wednesday, June 10th, for approval of delegates."

(Note: MAY SILVER, a Communist for 20 years, testified at the Jeffers trial [Testimony, pp. 29-30] that "the Conference was politically alert and some of the delegates were always raising things that the Party thought were essential to the future welfare of the working class. I was under the impression at that time and still am that the Conference of Studio Unions occupied itself with political problems to a greater extent even than such Communist-dominated unions that were later expelled from the C.I.O. for Communist domination.")

According to HERB SORRELL, "Mr. Bodle was with me most of that time" during the formative years of the C.S.U.; Sorrell says that he "released him to go to the War Manpower Commission at the beginning of the war. Later, he went into the Army", and it was not until 1947 or 1948 when the

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C.S.U. President was "able to associate myself with him" again. (Hearings pursuant to H.Res. 111, 80th Cong., Vol.3, p. 1872.)

Sometime during World War II, as Sorrell testified at the Jeffers trial, BODLE informed SORRELL he needed help in representing the C.S.U., and formed a partnership with FRANK PESTANA, known as BODLE & PESTANA. (Sorrell Testimony, pp. 47-48.)

The record is not quite clear as to BODLE's military status during World War II. Presumably, as appears from Sorrell's testimony, BODLE was either reclassified I-A by his draft board or actually directed to report for induction. On or about August 24, 1942, BODLE was appointed Deputy Regional Director for the War Manpower Commission in this area, with offices at 1355 Market Street, in San Francisco. He served as deputy to War Manpower Commission official WILLIAM K. HOPKINS, presently Labor Relations Manager for Columbia Pictures Studio in Hollywood. At the Jeffers trial, SORRELL testified he "got Mr. Bodle his job" at the W.M.C. (P. 838 of Sorrell Testimony at Jeffers trial. In an off-the-record exchange, SORRELL told the S. J. attorneys, Robert W. Gilbert and Louis A. Nissen, who had accused him of lying, that he had conferred with W.M.C. Head PAUL V. McNUTT, regarding HOPKINS' appointment. Seeking to corroborate his challenged testimony that "Paul McNutt was a personal friend of mine" and that he got Bodle his job, SORRELL said that early in the War, HOPKINS was being considered for appointment as W.M.C. Regional Director, and HARRY BRIDGES had blocked his appointment. SORRELL said he "always found Hopkins to be a good guy", so he spoke with McNUTT and then "called up Harry Bridges and got him to withdraw his objections". In gratitude, according to SORRELL, "Hopkins let me pick one of his two chief deputies,

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and I named George Rodle for the job". This story was confirmed in part by RALPH CLARE of Studio Transportation Drivers Local 379, I.U.M.W., who knew of the incident generally insofar as it related to HOPKINS' appointment. CLARE says that some of these long distance calls were made from the office of PAT CASBY, former labor relations advisor to the Major Motion Picture Producers.)

On October 17, 1942, RENA VALE, an admitted ex-Communist functionary who gave testimony to the California Committee that GARE SCORRELL had acted as the door-keeper at the Los Angeles County Communist Party convention on or about May 1, 1938, also charged that GEORGE F. BULL, attorney for the Screen Readers Guild and the Screen Publicists Guild, had been an instructor for the Communist Party in San Francisco, California, during the period when she had been a party member. (In 1948, SCORRELL told the Kearns Subcommittee in Washington that RENA VALE "went to the insane asylum". (Hearings pursuant to H.Res. 111, 80th Cong., Vol. 3, p. 189)) During the Jeffers trial, SCORRELL said he received his information regarding RENA VALE from the attorney who represented him at the Kearns Subcommittee hearings, GEORGE BULL, (Correll Testimony, p. 767), but that what BULL actually said was that she "had been in an institution". (Correll Testimony, p. 339.) SCORRELL contends that later BULL explained he meant that RENA VALE had been incarcerated in Bisbee, Arizona, for running a house of prostitution. (Correll Testimony, pp. 834-835.) Although challenged at the Jeffers trial in 1953 to produce any evidence that RENA VALE had been in either an insane asylum or a jail, SCORRELL failed to do so, saying "I haven't seen Mr. Rodle ...I called him and he is tied up on something." (P.833))

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Following World War II, BODLE returned to the Southern California area and his association with SORRELL. According to the L. A. Times, issue of March 10, 1947, he was chosen Chairman of the American Veterans Committee (A.V.C.) for this area. According to the People's World of May 2, 1947, the Local A.V.C. was conducting a drive to secure investigation of an alleged "Anti-Jewish Party". (RONALD REAGAN, past president of the Screen Actors Guild, testified at the Jaffers trial regarding Communist infiltration of the local A.V.C., which led to revocation of the charter of the Hollywood Chapter of the organization.) On October 1, 1947, the People's World listed GEORGE BODLE as a signatory to an American Veterans Committee resolution, opposing the "loyalty check" for public employees in Los Angeles County. (The C.I.O. Labor Herald for September 30, 1947, reported that BODLE was a member of a group that met with Supervisor Darby to protest "loyalty checks" for county employees.)

On October 6, 1947, the People's World stated that Attorney BODLE had filed a writ to place the name of JOHN R. RODEN on the election ballot. (The role of the Communists in the recall of City Councilman Beade McClanahan and the election of City Councilman John R. Roden in the 13th Councilmanic District is well known in Los Angeles political circles. The Daily News of March 19, 1948, lists Bodle as a member of the "13th Councilmanic District Citizens Committee" protesting race restrictions in the Echo Park District.)

On November 25, 1947, the People's World reported that BODLE was a speaker at a so-called "Rally for Freedom" in Civic Auditorium, protesting the interruption of an alleged I.O.P. meeting at the home of HUGH HARDYMAN.

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On March 3, 1948, BODLE appeared together with HERBERT K. SCRRELL as "attorney for Mr. Scrrell" before the Kearns Subcommittee in Washington, D. C., and was sworn in at Scrrell's request to help him reply to "so many assertions and assumptions and analyses and so much hearsay that I am a Communist". (Hearings pursuant to H.Res. 111, 80th Cong., Vol. 3, p. 1837) When a member of the Subcommittee reminded him that "you say you have always disliked lawyers", Scrrell promptly replied "I get along with Mr. Bodle". (p. 1894-1895) During the course of his testimony, Bodle explained the libel laws of the State of California, and his great familiarity with them. (p. 1934-1935) It was in these same hearings that the Federal Bureau of Investigation identified Scrrell's handwriting on Communist Party membership cards. (Hearings, Vol. 3, p. 2200). BODLE stated under oath that these cards "on their face are so open to objection as to be ridiculous as the basis for any sort of charges" and that the charges of pro-Communist affiliation on the part of Scrrell were "false" and "damnable". BODLE said it was "intolerable" for Scrrell to "have his name dragged through the mud in this fashion". (Hearings, Vol. 3, pp. 2120-2121; L.A. Examiner, March 6, 1948. On March 15, 1951, the Painters' International found Scrrell guilty of pro-Communist associations and barred him from holding union office for 5 years. The Findings and Conclusions of the International's General Executive Board regarding Scrrell are contained in Exhibit No. 129 in the Jeffers case. Scrrell says he has a suit pending against the Painters International [Testimony, p. 247], in which he seeks \$64,000 damages for their action. [Testimony, p. 617] BODLE informed WALTER COWAN of the Los Angeles Joint Board of Culinary Workers that he had been conferring with Scrrell while he was under cross-examination in the Jeffers case. Scrrell informed your reporter that among the very first work he got when

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he went into the painting contracting business, after leaving Local 644, were contracts to paint the homes of G. JON BELL on Rosmore Ave. and of J. J. LEMMY, his law partner, on Los Feliz Boulevard.)

In December, 1948, BELL was serving as Vice President of the "Americans for a Progressive Israel" (Hashomer Matzair), affiliated with the Progressive Zionist League (PAZL), which is reported to be the United States branch of MAPAI, (Mifliyet Hashomer Matzair), the openly pro-Communist "United Workers Party of Israel".

On May 6, 1949, the California Jewish Voice listed BELL as President of the "Americans for a Progressive Israel." And on May 20, 1949, the People's World announced BELL would be a speaker at their meeting on May 24th at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Harris. (There is information that BELL is still active in clandestine meetings of this U.S. affiliate of "MAPAI".)

The Los Angeles Examiner of September 4, 1949, reports BELL as chairman of a so-called "Citizens Committee to Investigate Municipal Affairs."

In March of 1951, BELL is reported to have participated in the "Lawyers Committees" against loyalty oaths for members of the Bar.

In 1952, BELL was a member of the Executive Board of the local chapter of the National Lawyers Guild.

Since 1953, Mrs. William C. Taylor (Shirley M. Taylor), identified as an active Communist and white wife of a Negro Communist leader, has been employed as confidential secretary in BELL's law offices in the Spring Arcade Bldg., 541 S. Spring St., Los Angeles. (During the 1950 election campaign, (October 29th), Mrs. Taylor attended a closed C.P. meeting of the Los Angeles Communist Party for discussion of the impending elections. Her husband
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took the Fifth Amendment in 1953 at Los Angeles when subpoenaed during a Senate Subcommittee investigation of subversive activity in the Government Printing Office in Washington, D. C., where he was formerly employed.)

On January 5, 1954, BOELE testified under subpoena before the California Committee on Un-American Activities and his testimony was described by Chairman Hugh Burns as "evasive". (Los Angeles Times, January 6, 1954, Part I, p. 20; Los Angeles Examiner, January 6, 1954.)

---EFFORTS OF W. J. BASKETT TO SUPPRESS TESTIMONY
ADVERSE TO BUREAU---

Los Angeles Superior Judge William B. McKesson twice sustained demurrers filed by Screen Extras Guild to the complaint in the Jeffers \$200,000 libel suit, and finally entered a default judgment against Jeffers and in favor of the Guild for \$3,600.

BERTRAM appealed this judgment to the California District Court of Appeal, which reversed, and remanded the libel action for trial on November 5, 1951. (Hearing was denied by the State Supreme Court on December 28, 1951. Jeffers v. Screen Extras Guild, Inc., 107 Cal. App. (2d) 253; 237 P. (2d) 51.)

The trial was originally set for November 29, 1952. S. .G. began taking Jeffers' deposition on October 31, 1952, and concluded on January 24, 1953. (There are 13 volumes of his deposition.)

During the course of Jeffers' deposition, there were numerous references by him in the form of testimony and explanation of documents produced relating to HERBERT K. SCHRELL, ALEXANDER H. SCHULZMAN, RALPH RODDY,

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and W. J. BASSETT.

(NOTE: BASSETT forced the removal of PAUL COSS, Citizen editor, to make room for RODDY. Your reporter is informed that "The Citizen Advertising Agency" was incorporated for RODDY, "business manager" of the Los Angeles Citizen, official publication of the A.F. of L. Central Labor Council, Building Trades Council, Metal Trades Council, and Allied Printing Trades Council, and BASSETT, Secretary of the Central Labor Council by ATTORNEY SCHULLMAN sometime prior to 1950. RODDY formerly was on the payrolls of Daily Variety and Pat Sassy of the Motion Picture Producer's Association, worked closely with Herb Sorrell.)

For example, during November and December, 1952, Jeffers testified on deposition to the following:

1. That on December 10, 1945, talks were held regarding a proposed merger of the SCREEN PLAYERS UNION (S.P.U.) and the SCREEN EXTRAS GUILD (S.E.G.) at the offices of the Los Angeles Central Labor Council. That the Council was represented there by President "TOMMY" RANFORD and Secretary W. J. BASSETT. That the S.P.U. was represented by SORRELL, JEFFERS, SCHULLMAN, and two of Jeffers' close associates, JACK FITZPATRICK, now deceased, and DON WAYSON. According to Jeffers "I think it was Mr. SORRELL who made arrangements to get together with the Central Labor Council." (Deposition, Vol. X, pp. 72-75)
2. That such merger talks were originally set up with representatives of the A. F. of L. Actors' International (Associated Actors and Artists of America), namely, JOHN DALIS and CLAUDE McCUE, in discussions in the office of STEWART BEACHUM, then N.L.R.B. Regional Director, on November 20, 1945, and in the office of the SCREEN OFFICE EMPLOYEES GUILD (S.O.E.G.) at the "Crossroads-of-the-World" Building on November 21, 1945, by SORRELL, JEFFERS, and GLEN PRATT of S.O.E.G. (Deposition, Vol. X, pp. 77-78)
3. That between the above meetings with DALIS and McCUE on the morning of November 20th at the N.L.R.B. and on November 21, at S.O.E.G., a meeting was held to discuss "Consolidation of S.P.U. and S.E.G." at 5 p.m. on November 20, 1945, at the offices of

Representative referred to was GERRIE CAMPBELL, identified as a C.P. member by Max Silver and others. There is no question about the good faith of the officials representing the Toasters and the Actors in their opposition to BUZZELLE or that their motives were different from those of CORRELL and CAMPBELL.)

Sometime late in 1952, SECRETARY BASSETT contacted LOUIS J. NISSEN, S. J. attorney, by telephone and informed Nissen that "ALAN SCHULLMAN called me about the Jeffers case, saying you were going to try to prove that he (Schullman) was a Commie, and that if you do, he will testify against the Guild and blow the roof off". BASSETT advised Nissen to "lay off of Schullman, because he will hurt your case if he testifies".

Nissen suggested that BASSETT speak with his law partner, ROBERT W. GILBERT. There followed a telephone conversation between BASSETT and GILBERT, in which the Central Labor Council secretary said again that the Guild should "lay off Schullman, because he is a crusader, and if he takes the stand against S. J., there are many things he will go into which will hurt S. J." Gilbert replied that he "didn't know if Schullman was or was not a Commie, or just what he was, but since every attorney Jeffers ever was associated with had Commie connections, the fact that Schullman represented Connelly at the Smith Act trial recently is relevant."

Early in 1953, SCHULLMAN himself called Gilbert's office and arranged a luncheon appointment at Mike Lyman's on 6th Street. Present were Schullman and an unidentified man accompanying him, Gilbert, and Nissen. Schullman stated that he knew BASSETT had spoken to the S. J. attorneys, and that he had called BASSETT after being advised by JEFFERS and BERTRAM that the Guild was going to try to prove he (Schullman) was a

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Communist, because of his legal representation of "Slicia" Connelly. Schullman claimed he had represented Connelly "at the personal request of a Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States" and that he would "make S.I.C. look silly if the issue is raised." (Later in 1953, Schullman advised the L.A. Evening Herald and Express by letter that he had represented Connelly because he heard "a speech by a Supreme Court Justice" advocating legal representation by non-Communist lawyers for unpopular causes.)

Schullman urged that the Guild make a cash settlement with Bertram, but was told he should persuade Jeffers to withdraw the suit.

--THE BOOKBINDERS' LEGAL CHIEF--

Following his refusal to take BASSITT's strong advice to "lay off" Schullman late in 1952, ATTORNEY GILBERT, who had represented the Central Labor Council for almost 10 years, began to receive reports from I.F. of L. clients that BASSITT was criticizing them for using GILBERT, BOBLE & IRVIN, and suggesting they use BOBLE & LAWYER instead. (During 1953, LAWYER suddenly returned to Oregon without explanation. He was succeeded as BOBLE's law partner by DANIEL REGAN, previously a C.I.O. attorney in San Francisco.

One of the first such reports came from WALTER R. STANBERRY, then an International Representative of the BOOKBINDERS INTERNATIONAL. At a discussion in front of the N.L.R.B. offices at 111 W. 7th St., Stanberry informed Gilbert that "BASSITT gave me hell for using IRVIN in that Makerefield case, and told me to go to BOBLE. I told him I always had received good service from your firm and was satisfied." b5489 don't like

being put up against the gun like that. After all, I'm not very high up in the labor movement, and don't want to get caught in the middle with BASSITT."

Shortly thereafter, while he was on a committee from the ALLIED PRINTING TRADES COUNCIL delegated to investigate possible legal representation for a contemplated joint organizing campaign at the L. A. Times, STANSBERRY informed Gilbert that "BASSITT is sore at me for suggesting you on the Times campaign because he is pushing SCULL." (BASSITT was Secretary of the Los Angeles Allied Printing Trades Council for many years.) On a still later occasion, after STANSBERRY had been removed from the Times Organizing Special Committee, he told Nissen the same thing and warned him to "watch out, because BASSITT is out to cut your throat and set SCULL in there".

On November 12, 1952, BERRY BURTEAM filed a libel suit against L.A. BOOKBINDERS #63 and its Secretary, GEORGE E. SMITH, for \$100,000 general damages and \$100,000 special damages, on behalf of a non-union bindery. The communication at issue was a letter by Smith to various printing employers stating truthfully that the firm was non-union and paid below union scale. (Kenneth Smith and Benjamin Grossberg d/b/a S. & G. BINDERY vs. Los Angeles Bookbinders Union No. 63, L.A. Sup. Ct. 606,092.)

During 1953, at BASSITT's urging, SCULL was employed by the Allied Printing Trades on various joint organizing campaigns (Times; Wayside Press; etc.), STANSBERRY ceased objecting to SCULL's representation after the libel suit was filed against Smith and the Local. On one occasion when GEORGE E. SMITH continued to object to SCULL, BASSITT told the Allied Printing Trades group, "If the Bookbinders ^{Ronald Reagan-5490} by their share of Kodak's

fee on this joint program, the Central Labor Council will". On another occasion, DON McCAUGHAN, business agent of PRINTING SPECIALTIES LOCAL #388, told Smith and the group that "If Gilbert is brought in, rather than Bodle, the Printing Specialties will walk out of the joint organizing drive and grab the entire jurisdiction for itself." (JOHN DONOVAN, former employee of the CENTRAL LABOR COUNCIL under BASSETT; brother of Congressman James G. Donovan of New York; husband of SUSAN D. ADAMS, who presently represents BASSETT on Community Chest activities; "former" member of the Communist Party, reportedly appeared before the Senate Committee on Internal Security under subpoena in 1953 to be questioned in executive session regarding his connections in the 1930's with the "Harold Ware Group" of Communists in the Federal Government. DONOVAN is a close associate of McCAUGHAN in his present capacity as Executive Secretary of the WESTERN CONFERENCE OF PRINTING SPECIALTY WORKERS. When forced to drop DONOVAN from the central body payroll, BASSETT arranged for his employment with Local #388.)

In October, 1953, STANSBERRY attended a membership meeting of Bookbinders' Local 63, accompanied by BASSETT, where the Bookbinders' International Representative was nominated for the presidency of the local. At this same meeting, certain "left-wing" members, so identified previously by the International Union, bitterly attacked Secretary George Smith and nominated a woman candidate against him. She subsequently withdrew, in light of the loud boing at the meeting from the bulk of the membership which was directed at Smith's critics. In January, 1954, when STANSBERRY took office as president of the local, he failed to appoint GEORGE SMITH to a single one of the various delegate positions previously held by him.

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As a result of this maneuver, SMITH was forced to resign as President of the Los Angeles Allied Printing Trades Council because he was no longer a delegate to the Allied. (When SMITH asked STANSBERRY the reason for his action depriving him of all delegate positions, he was told to "ask BASSITT why". BASSITT told SMITH that a "deal" had been made by Stansberry with SMITH'S OPPOSITION, supposedly to help SMITH out.)

Shortly, thereafter, STANSBERRY left the payroll of his International Union, and went to work for BASSITT as a paid business representative of the Los Angeles Central Labor Council, where he is now employed. He remains as President of the Bookbinders' Local.

(NOTE: On March 8, 1954, FERRY BERTRAM continued and completed taking the deposition of GENESE E. SMITH in the Bookbinders' libel suit. BASSITT, MOULF and STANSBERRY all pressured SMITH at this time to settle the case with BERTRAM for a cash settlement. BASSITT previously warned SMITH to "watch his step" when talking to GILBERT about the matter, after DANIEL FOGEL overheard SMITH making an appointment to see the Bookbinders' regular attorney. STANSBERRY insisted on accompanying SMITH to his conference with Gilbert and Nissen, long-time attorneys for Local 63, before the deposition and attended part of the deposition, on which occasion STANSBERRY urged that the Union should make a cash settlement with BERTRAM. The Bookbinders' libel suit came to trial on April 27, 1954, and after selection of the jury, on May 3, 1954, Superior Judge Harold F. Hule sustained the Union's objections to the introduction of any evidence;

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discharged the jury; and placed the case off calendar, ruling that the Union's letter criticizing the non-union bindery was not libelous on its face.)

BODLE is now serving as legal counsel for the Allied Printing Trades Joint Welfare Fund, in addition to the Times Organizing Committee. According to the Los Angeles Citizen of May 7, 1954, Bodle recently represented the Printing Pressmen's International in defending unfair labor practice charges before the N.L.R.B. (WALTER J. TURNER, Vice President of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistant's Union, in this area, is former Secretary of Printing Specialties, Local #38, a close friend of BASSITT, and the official who arranged with BASSITT for JOHN DONOVAN's employment with the Printing Specialties Union.)

The front page of the Citizen, edited by RALPH BERRY, for May 7, 1954, displays BODLE's picture, accompanying an article headed "NLRB DISMISSES CHARGE AGAINST AFL PRESSMEN", and a picture of JOSEPH T. DeSILVA, Secretary of Retail Clerks Local 770, accompanying a story regarding a judgment obtained for the Clerks Union "by its attorney, George F. Bodle".

(NOTE: DeSILVA is the union official who resigned from the Democratic Party Advisory Council on April 5th last, and released to the press his letter to Democratic Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell which said in part "Your handling of the James Roosevelt affair and that of Representative Condon of Northern California points to panic-motivated leadership not called for in these times." DeSILVA's union has the only regular weekly A. F. of L. television program in L. A.)

This same L. A. Citizen, May 7th front page, 5493, carried a cut of GEORGE F. SMITH, accompanying a story and DeSILVA, carried a cut of GEORGE F. SMITH, accompanying a story

headed "BOOKBINDERS WIN AS LIBEL SUIT IS DISMISSED". That story was based upon a news release sent to ROLEY at the Citizen on behalf of the Bookbinders. The published version follows the press release verbatim, except to delete the concluding sentence which read ---"The non-union firm was represented by Attorney Perry Bertram, who recently tried a lengthy \$200,000 libel action against the Screen Extras Guild, A. P. of L., which also resulted in discharge of the jury."

A third front page Citizen story on May 14th is headed "UNION ORGANIZES PENSION PLAN". It discusses the pension plan for members of Miscellaneous Restaurant Employees Local 440, which "was formulated by GEORGE W. BUBLE and DANIEL FOGEL, attorneys for the Union". This Citizen piece quotes BUBLE extensively.

---REPORTS OF BASSITT TO SUPPRESS TESTIMONY
ADVERSE TO BUBLE---

The Jeffers trial commenced on April 3, 1953. It was held before Superior Judge George A. Bockweiler in Department 33 of the Los Angeles Superior Court, ending in a deadlocked jury (6 to 6) on February 16, 1954, ten months later. (There is evidence of jury tampering in both the Jeffers and Bookbinders' trials by the C.P.) The Guild obtained a \$2,600 judgment for costs against Jeffers which is being appealed.

Both JEFFERS and SORRELL, during their extensive cross-examination, kept asking defense counsel if he was accusing BUBLE of being a Communist, when BUBLE's name came up in their testimony regarding certain events or documents relating to the C.S.U. Sorrell concluded his testimony on
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October 5, 1953, except for short rebuttal at the very end of the trial. (As indicated above, WALTER COWAN, Executive Secretary of the Los Angeles Joint Board of Culinary Workers met BOULE in September, 1953, at the opening of a furniture store on Vermont Avenue sponsored by JOE BOSILVA. According to Cowan, BOULE told him he had been talking with SCORRELL about his testimony which was still in progress at the Jeffers trial and SCORRELL was "taking a monkey out of the defense in its efforts to establish that Scorrell was a Commie". Shortly afterwards, COWAN met with the S. D. attorneys for lunch at the Biltmore Hotel, and offered to cooperate with them by making available certain confidential information tending to show the C.P. affiliations of JOHN COOPER, President of the L. A. Culinary Joint Board, who was responsible for replacing ATTORNEY Y LEO RUSIGRAN, former partner of Superior Judge Otto Rame, with BOULE, as legal counsel for the Joint Board. COWAN told the Guild lawyers that the file containing this information had been compiled for him by private investigators and he would turn it over to the S. D. attorneys, if his International President, HUGO ERNST, gave his consent. ERNST gave his consent to GILBERT and NISSON during the St. Louis Convention of the A. F. of L. in September, 1953. Before they could get the material from COWAN, J. W. BIFFELL, who had become a local Culinary Workers official and a voting member of the Joint Board, suddenly passed away. This upset the voting balance in the Board, and COWAN, who had been the target of previous ouster efforts by COOPER, failed to transmit the material in question although promising to do so on several occasions. Subsequently, both COOPER and COWAN were returned to office in the Joint Board without opposition. MAX SILVER can positively identify JOHN COOPER as a C.P. member, who was part of the

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small "social A. F. of L. section" and regarded by Party leadership when SILVER was still an official, as "the most promising young trade union leader we [the C.F.] had in the entire A. F. of L.")

Late in December, 1953, the California Committee on Un-American Activities issued a subpoena to BOYLE, in connection with its investigation of Communist infiltration in the Los Angeles School System. (About this same time, Congressman CLYDE BOYLE, a member of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, received an inquiry from a party he did not identify as to whether Boyle was under investigation.) None of the S.F.C. officials or attorneys were aware that BOYLE had been subpoenaed.

Shortly after the first of the year, HOWARD HOLTZENDORFF, Executive Director of the L. A. Housing Authority, received a telephone call from "IRVING" BRASHNAR, former labor editor of the Daily News who had recently left the paper to go on Bassett's payroll. (BRASHNAR is now editing the "Almanac", a throw-away paper being distributed by the Allied Printing Council as part of the Times Organizing drive. BASSETT, BOYLE and BRASHNAR are the key figures in this campaign, and played major roles in securing national labor backing for former Congressman CLINTON D. MCKINNON to take over as publisher of the News.)

During this phone call just after January 1, 1954, BRASHNAR told HOLTZENDORFF that he "was calling for BASSETT, about a matter of serious concern to the Central Labor Council and the Housing Authority". BRASHNAR said that BASSETT "understands that BOB GILBERT, one of your Housing Commissioners, has arranged to get GEORGE BOYLE subpoenaed before the Burns Committee, in order to smear him in this Extras Guilds libel suit" and "BASSETT wants you to check on this with your special contact with Senator Ronald Reagan-5496

Burns."

HOLTZMANN immediately had a check made with STATE SENATOR BURNS, who said that one GEORGE W. BODLE was under subpoena by his Committee; that he was unaware that this ATTORNEY BODLE was a labor attorney; and that he had "never talked with Bob Gilbert about Bodle or anything else in his life". When HOLTZMANN then tried to telephone BASSETT directly regarding this matter, his calls were not returned.

Not being aware of these developments, the U.S.G. attorneys had been informed by "BUCK" HARRIS, Public Relations Counsel for both U.A.G. and U.S.G. that a "former Communist who was not too friendly with MAX SILVER" had tipped Harris off that SILVER could testify about the formation of the C.S.U. by the Communist Party. (It later was revealed by Harris that this source was MILDRED BERKLEY, once Number Two Communist in the Hollywood Section of the Party, who testified as a friendly witness before the House Committee in 1951 and 1952 and at the Jeffers trial in 1953.)

GILBERT recalled that HERMAN COSTIGAN, an admitted "former" Communist himself was close to MAX SILVER. (COSTIGAN, then temporarily unemployed, came to Hollywood from the state of Washington in 1948 and since then had been associated with ROY W. BRUBER, I.A.T. . . Hollywood Studio Representative, until BRUBER resigned his union post late in 1953.) On or about January 4, 1954, H. OWEN EDWARDS, Executive Secretary of U.S.G., and his two attorneys met SILVER for the first time in their lives when COSTIGAN brought him to meet them for lunch at Davy's Restaurant during noon recess of the Jeffers trial. Among other things, SILVER told

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then about his meeting with BOELE and PATT MILLMAN in BOELE's office in 1940 or 1941, but indicated he was reluctant to testify in the Jeffers case.

On Tuesday, January 5, 1954, BOELE appeared and testified before the California Committee in executive session at Los Angeles. Following this appearance, on the first of the hearings, Committee Chairman HUGH H. BURNS, Fresno Democrat, branded BOELE's testimony as "evasive". (L.A. Times, 1/6/54; L.A. Examiner, 1/6/54; Daily News, 1/6/54; L.A. Mirror, 1/6/54; Herald-Express, 1/6/54)

According to SENATOR BURNS, "His answers were evasive on every encounter." (L.A. Examiner, 1/6/54) BOELE admitted his membership in the AMERICAN VETERANS COMMITTEE and the NATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD, but when asked if he was or had been a Communist, replied, "NOT THAT I CAN REMEMBER...I DON'T BELIEVE I'VE EVER BEEN A MEMBER." (L.A. Examiner, 1/6/54; The News, Mirror, and Herald-Express on that date also quoted BOELE as replying that he "didn't believe" he had been a C.P. member.)

Asked if he had ever paid dues to the Communist Party, BOELE is quoted as replying that he never made any financial contributions to the Party "that I remember". (Daily News, 1/6/54) He said he had never "knowingly" joined the Party or attended a Party meeting, (Herald-Express, 1/6/54); that he "might have attended a meeting with a Communist present, but I can't remember". (Examiner, 1/6/54)

That night BOELE issued the following statements to the press:

"I was called before the Senate Committee on Un-American Activities today and questioned about my 15 years as an attorney for labor unions.

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"I answered every question put to me, including a question of whether or not I had been a Communist. I told the committee that, although some people might think a union lawyer was a Communist, I had not been one, and in this connection I offered to answer any questions about my activities which the committee might want to put to me.

"I make this statement now because I have been informed that after I left the hearing room, the chairman of the committee characterized my testimony as being "evasive". The best answer to this is for the public to read my testimony. In fairness to me, the chairman of the committee should make it public."

BASSETT was the only one of several leading local A.F. of L. officials contacted before BODLE testified, who actually intervened on his behalf. Following his testimony, BASSETT personally called HOLTZENDORFF and asked him to arrange a conference with SENATOR BURNS.

A meeting was held, in the Housing Director's office a day or two later, according to HOLTZENDORFF, attended by SENATOR BURNS, BASSETT, BRASHEAR, and HOLTZENDORFF. BASSETT told the Senator that BODLE was his personal attorney and legal counsel for the A. F. of L. in Los Angeles; that the BURNS statement terming the testimony "evasive" was a "terrible black eye" to the American Federation of Labor; that if BODLE had been evading it was only because he had been informed that GILBERT, his "professional rival", had arranged for him to be subpoenaed in order to "screw him" in the Jeffers case. SENATOR BURNS explained to BASSETT that he had never talked to BOB GILBERT; that he hadn't known that BODLE was an A. F. of L. lawyer when he was subpoenaed; that he had inquired of the Committee staff after HOLTZENDORFF's previous inquiry and found that BODLE's name turned up in the Committee's "screening" of employees of the L. A. School System; that BODLE had been a paid lecturer in the city schools receiving per diem compensation within the past several years, and that is why he was subpoenaed in the first place. (The January 21, 1954, Hearings dealt

with C.P. infiltration into "sensitive spots in the fields of education, communications, transportation and public utilities". Examiner, 1/6/54.

BOYLE had also been attorney for the Electrical Workers' Union, (I. W. O.) during the recent Southern California Edison strike, but is understood has been removed as their attorney by International Representative GEORGE MILKEY. Your reporter is informed that MILKEY, who himself was a C.P. member in the 1920's but is strongly anti-Communist today, spoke to BASSETT regarding BOYLE at the time of his removal as I. W. O. counsel, but BASSETT shrugged it off, saying MILKEY was just bitter at BOYLE for threatening to bring up MILKEY's own background of early C.P. membership when he testified against the C.P.U. during the Kearns sub-committee hearings in 1948.)

When BASSETT asked BURNS how the BOYLE matter could be cleared up, the Senator offered to allow BOYLE to resume the witness stand, since the hearings had not been concluded. The Senator assured BASSETT that if BOYLE gave truthful and direct answers when he returned, the Committee would announce to the press that it was satisfied with his testimony, as so completed. BURNS said that BOYLE could be heard at practically any time within the next several days, in executive session, by merely presenting his card to the sergeant-at-arms at the hearing room. BASSETT told the Senator that BOYLE definitely would be there to testify. However, the next day or so, BRASHEAR called up to say that "Attorney BOYLE was tied up and would be unable to testify, but hoped that the Committee would keep its offer open". (The Committee has again scheduled hearings in Los Angeles, during this coming June, but there is no indication that BOYLE has agreed to testify then.)

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On January 6, 1951, ATTORNEY GILBERT went to see MAX SILVER at his home, where the former C.P. official agreed with him that he would testify in the Jeffers trial if subpoenaed. HOWARD COSTIGAN was promptly informed by S.E.G. counsel of SILVER's decision to testify under subpoena.

During afternoon recess of the Jeffers trial, on January 7th, COSTIGAN told SHAMES and the others that "As a responsible trade unionist, I felt BASSETT should be warned that I had dug up evidence regarding BOYLE which was going to be presented in open court. I had to give the Secretary of the Council a chance to disassociate himself from BOYLE first". He said that during a discussion of the possibility of his (COSTIGAN's) securing employment through the Central Labor Council with the A.I.D. Charity program, he mentioned to BASSETT that SILVER was going to testify regarding BOYLE at the Jeffers trial, in a few days.

That evening, (January 7th), ATTORNEY WILLIAM ROSENTHAL, former Democratic Assemblyman and ex-treasurer of the Democratic State Central Committee, telephoned GILBERT at his home. (It was later reported that SIGMUND ARYWITZ and HOPE BENDOZA, employees of the GARMENT WORKERS UNION (I.L.O.W.U.) had been attempting to secure Gilbert's home telephone during the day on Friday after ROSENTHAL had failed to reach him at the office. ROSENTHAL was serving as special counsel for the I.L.O.W.U. in defending several criminal matters arising out of recent strikes. POLLY GOULD, mentioned earlier in this report, who had been an employee of JIMMY TARANTINO, and was a friend of HERB SCRELL, gave ROSENTHAL as a reference to the S.E.G. lawyers when offering to locate witnesses who could testify regarding the tie-up between Jeffers and Tarantino, if the Guild

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would employ her as an investigator. She mentioned that ROSENTHAL had used her as a paid investigator to locate witnesses in the I.L.O.F.U. cases, and that "as long as the Central Labor Council was supporting S.F.O.", she would be willing work for the Guild. Later, the Guild found out that POLLY GOULE was also performing investigative work for EASSETT, under BOULE's supervision relating to MRS. DAVID SILVIN and the WOMEN OF THE PACIFIC. Although the Guild paid her an investigative fee of \$250, she claimed to have fallen ill, and would not assist the Guild, after ROSENTHAL had talked with GILBERT on January 7th, and the latter said he couldn't suppress the testimony regarding BOULE.)

ROSENTHAL told GILBERT on the evening of the 7th that he was calling at the request of "mutual friends, who were too embarrassed to call themselves"; that BOULE knew the Guild had a witness who had agreed to present testimony in the Jeffers trial regarding his "political background"; that BOULE was "terribly upset" and so was his wife; that if GILBERT presented that witness in court, BOULE "would commit suicide" and GILBERT would be responsible; that ROSENTHAL knew what BOULE was going through, because he had been through the same type of difficulty himself. GILBERT explained that his client, the Screen Extras Guild, already knew about the witness; and that he could not suppress evidence helpful to his client's case. ROSENTHAL urged that the Guild make a cash settlement with JEFFERS, but was told, like Schullman before him, that he, (ROSENTHAL), should persuade the plaintiff to withdraw his action.

The next afternoon, (January 8th), both "BUCK" HARRIS and SOB GILBERT received telephone calls from RALPH ROBBY's office at the Los Angeles Citizen, advising each of them that ROBBY would like to call

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him at his home on Saturday morning (January 9th) "on an important matter". (When Gilbert's secretary got the call, she asked Roddy's girl for the message, since Gilbert was still in court, but was told the message had to be delivered to the attorney personally and that he was told she would be fired if she gave it to anyone except Gilbert himself.)

On January 9th, HARRIS called RODDY at the number left by his office (supposedly RODDY's new home phone). RODDY told Harris that he was informed by a detective friend in the L. A. Police Department that another detective had a recording of "Bob Gilbert attempting to bribe a witness in that Guild case"; that the other side knew about it, and if the Guild used certain evidence it was about to introduce, the recording would be brought in to hurt the C. S. case. Shortly afterward, GILBERT called RODDY, who told him the same story, except in that version it was "somebody in Bob Gilbert's office" who was supposed to have attempted to bribe a witness. (Since there was no truth to RODDY's alleged "friendly tip", it was ignored by the S. J. C.)

(NOTE: In 1952, "Buck" Harris learned that LIBBY BURKE, Communist wife of People's World editor, SENEY BURKE, had joined S. J. C. as a dancer. In April or May, 1952, LIBBY ran her picture on the front page of the Citizen as a delegate to the GENERAL LABOR COUNCIL from the A. F. of L. TELEVISION ARTISTS' UNION. She was later subpoenaed by the House Committee, which located her dancing at the Ambassador Hotel under an assumed name, and took the Fifth Amendment, claiming she was being persecuted for her militant union activities.)

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The next day, Sunday, January 10th, the Guild's lawyers, accompanied by their families visited MAX SILVER and his wife, DR. LOUISE LIGHT, at his home, to make certain he was ready to testify. SILVER called them aside and told them "BOBLE knows I'm going to testify" and that "a certain party whom I won't name, because I think he is being used as an innocent dupe" contacted SILVER and told him, if SILVER testified against BOBLE, "BOB GILBERT would go to jail". (It was later reported by COSTIGAN that the person who went to SILVER was MAX MONT, a Los Angeles representative of the JEWISH LABOR COMMITTEE. MONT is a friend of COSTIGAN, JOHN DONOVAN, and his wife, SUCAN ADAMS. In 1953, COSTIGAN became quite friendly with DONOVAN, because, he says, he gave advice and help to DONOVAN when he was under subpoena by the Senate Committee. COSTIGAN had previously introduced MAX MONT to MAX SILVER.)

It was agreed that SILVER would be picked up by SHANKS just before noon on Monday, January 11th; that he would have lunch with GILBERT, NISSEN, and SHANKS; and that he would testify at 2 p.m.

On the morning of January 11th, before 10 a.m., GILBERT received a message in court that SILVER wanted him to call on an "urgent matter" at the medical office of the wife of the witness, DR. LOUISE LIGHT, also an ex-Communist who testified as a friendly witness before the House Committee. The S.E.G. attorney called the medical office during the 11 o'clock recess of the trial, from the desk of POLICE CAPTAIN JACK DONOHUE in City Hall, where he was reporting the threat he had received about going to jail if SILVER testified. (DONOHUE had previously shown NISSEN the POLLY COULD affidavit and put the S.E.G. attorneys in touch

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with her. He told GIBBY to "ignore" the threat about a "recording" supposedly made by the Police Department.)

DR. LIGHT (MRS. MAX SILVER) answered the call, and said her husband had "gone to the bank" and would be back in "five minutes". A second call was made, and DR. LIGHT said she didn't know why her husband hadn't returned.

SHANE picked SILVER up at the medical office about 12:15 and took him to the restaurant to meet the S.E.O. attorneys. At lunch, SILVER was joined by his son, an attorney named SAM SILVER. MAX SILVER said that the person who had conveyed the threat about "going to jail" had returned to see him on Sunday evening at his home and again on Monday morning at the medical office. He said the person (presumably MAX MONT) told him that BASSETT didn't want SILVER to testify; that this was an internal political matter within the A. F. of L.; that SILVER would only get hurt by mixing into it. SILVER said he would still testify, but told the S.E.O. attorneys he was now a reluctant witness and "you will have to drag my story out of me". At 2 p.m. on January 11th, he did testify, but failed to recall certain of the matters relating to SCRELL that he had previously spoken about. (Silver Testimony, p. 34)

L O VIE, Secretary of the L. A. Building Trades Council, says that on the morning of January 11th, he saw a man answering SILVER's description being talked to sharply by BOYLE, COSTIGAN, and ALFRED P. ("PAL") SCHNEIDER, at the offices of the Central Labor Council. (SCHNEIDER, once employed by I.L.O.W.U., until recently was Executive Secretary of the L. A. Union Label Council, having been nominated for that job by BASSETT.)

VIE says when he walked in on the group, BASSETT signalled to them to stop talking in his presence.

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--THE ACTIONS OF THE WORKING PRESS AT JEFFERS TRIAL--

The People's World reported the SILVER testimony on January 18, 1954. Although SILVER was paid nothing for testifying, the P.W. said in part:

"Max Silver, renegade Communist, who testified in Washington before the Un-American Committee, as did Dr. Louise Light, his wife, is picking up a few pennies these days as a stoopigeon witness in court cases.

"He made an appearance in his new "for hire" role last week in the long pending libel suit of Michael Jeffers against the Screen Extras Guild...

"Lawyers for the Guild called Silver as a defense witness. His testimony was to 'prove' the pamphlet charges of 'Communist influence.'

"Obligingly (for a witness fee of course) Silver set about the task of fingering persons prominent in trade unions, the legal profession and small business..." (Underscoring added.)

Under the influence of the Daily News "court-house best" reporter, BETTE HARVEY, who was aided by JIMMY GREENAW of the Herald-Express, reporters for the metropolitan papers in the City Hall press-room turned in no stories about the Silver testimony. Then WALTER SCRATCH, assistant to the Publisher of the Hollywood Citizen-News read about the SILVER testimony in a motion picture trade paper, (Hollywood Reporter, 1/12/54), he checked with his City Hall correspondent, who told him he had been informed in the press room that all of SILVER's testimony had been successfully objected to and stricken. After reading the transcript of the testimony permitted into evidence, SCRATCH himself wrote a story reporting that SILVER had testified regarding the RUBLE affair earlier that week. (Citizen-News, 1/15/54.) The P.W. story, datelined January 17th, was published three days later. When complaints were made to the City of Ronald Reagan 3506 the Sirror

by a motion picture figure not connected with the Extras' Guild, the reporter for that paper covering the trial, whose first name is Russ, appealed to GILBERT and WISSEN for protection, saying he had killed the story only because "the Central Labor Council is against the S.E.G. in this case."

It is significant that only one week before, every metropolitan paper had carried the story of BOYLE's appearance before the Burns Committee, but none of them carried this story regarding BOYLE until after SCRATCH became interested.

---THE DAILY NEWS SITUATION---

After killing the story of the SILVER testimony, RUTH HARVEY of the News, assisted mainly by JIMMY CHENSHAW of the Herald-Express (who got his job through "ELIM" CONNELLY, when he was working on the desk at the Herald), openly fraternized with JEFFERS and BERTRAM at the trial and showed hostility to S.E.G. officers and attorneys, in the presence of the jury.

It should be noted that the Daily News publisher, ex-Congressman CLINTON D. McKINNON, was scheduled to be the keynote speaker before the CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE CONFERENCE annual meeting at the Alexandria Hotel in Los Angeles in the spring of 1952, until informed specifically by ROBERT W. GILBERT that the California State Federation of Labor had listed the group as a "Communist front" in its Newsletter a few days before. As seen as McKINNON took over as publisher of the News, VICTOR RIESEL's labor column, which is openly anti-Communist, was dropped. When the Hollywood A. F. of L. File Council recently protested, McKinnon replied

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this was done for "economy reasons", although the column only cost them a few dollars a week.

LESLIE CLAYPOOL, political editor of the News, and by-line columnist in the Los Angeles Citizen covering legislative sessions, was reportedly under investigation by the House Committee a couple of years ago. On April 20, 1954, the CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE CONFERENCE mailed out an advertising brochure for its "Legislative Almanac", quoting CLAYPOOL to the effect that "It's a voter's must!", and also quoting a statement by McKINNON that "The groups undertaking this commendable effort have a record of unselfish service in the interest of better government, and the advertising space they make available in the publication should result in better business as well as better government." Neither statement has been repudiated publicly by either CLAYPOOL or McKINNON.

On March 25, 1954, the News ran a three-column cut showing attorneys JOHN BERTIN and WILLIAM BERTIN with Korean Communist David Hyn and his wife at a hearing to oppose his deportation. The story was favorable to Hyn. (BERTIN and BERTIN co-signed a statement opposing issuance of subpoenas against JOHN SCHEER, BEN BARONIS, et al. in September, 1952.)

On April 27, 1954, CLAYPOOL's column ran under the heading "LAST FBI CHIEF'S 'PSEUDO LIBERAL' REMARK". The News ran a somewhat softer editorial on the same subject on the following day (April 28th) deploring J. Edgar Hoover's remarks as creating an "Unfortunate Impression".

The temporary stay granted the National Lawyers Guild against the Attorney General by the Court of Appeals pending a hearing on the merits, in the District Court, was reported in the News on May 5th, 1954, under the headline, "COURT VOTES IN FAVOR OF LAWYER GROUP". Radio T-V Editor
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PAUL PRICE devoted most of his column of May 7, 1954, to a long and highly slanted misrepresentation of the court action in the Lawyers Guild matter. PRICE wrote in this column that "WILLIAM S. ISTERMAN, representing the Lawyers Guild, yesterday telephoned and suggested that the decision is so important it well deserves discussion and explanation on radio and TV programs...If any of our stations, commentators or newsmen are interested, ISTERMAN can be reached at HOLLYWOOD 5-7163."

It was also PAUL PRICE who ran a series of columns in March, 1954, condemning the AMERICAN FEDERATION OF TELEVISION AND RADIO ARTISTS (AFTRA) for suspending a member, Radio Actor JOHN BROWN, for taking the Fifth Amendment when asked about Communist membership before the House Committee. PRICE's column of March 4th, headed "Readers Hit AFTRA on Brown Position" repeated his earlier charge that "AFTRA threatened actor John Brown's constitutional rights" and thus, "evidently decided Congress has repealed the Constitution". On March 9th, PRICE published a reply from AFTRA stating that "the Taft-Hartley law makes it possible for a person to work if suspended or expelled by his union for any reason other than for non-payment of initiation fees and dues". Ignoring that statement, PRICE answers that the Union's denial that it has infringed on Brown's constitutional rights is "a bitter pill to swallow"; that "AFTRA has notified Brown that he cannot plead the Fifth Amendment except on penalty of being tossed out of the union and being denied the right to work"; and concludes "Can AFTRA honestly believe there is no infringement of the Constitution?"

(NOTE: In "The Hollywood Story", Frontier Magazine, May, 1954, the writer makes a similar charge against the Reagan 5509 the

Action Taken by AFTRA" against John Brown.)

On May 11, 1954, News Columnist MATT WINSTOCK ran various items of humor in his column. One of the items was a wordy anecdote attributed to LARR SMITH, former staff member of the "Daily News" who was fired from the paper for pro-Communist activities by the previous management before McKinnon took over. The discharge of LARR SMITH was upheld in arbitration proceedings in 1952. LARR SMITH was the public relations man for the CONFERENCE OF STUDIO UNIONS during the 1946 Strike, and is currently handling publicity in connection with the showing of "SALT OF THE EARTH", the Communist-produced film made in New Mexico by the UMN, WILLIAM WALTER MARKERS UNION. FRANK SCULLY, pro-Communist author of "Fun in Bed", and "Behind the Flying Saucers", and Weekly Variety columnist, is also quoted in WINSTOCK's May 11th column. Your reporter has heard both PAUL BRICE and FRANK SCULLY advancing the Communist line during the second Hollywood jurisdictional strike by telling people that "Roy Brewer is a FASCIST, who called PER a 'crazy cripple in the White House' and made a speech saying that Roosevelt's brain was wrecked by syphilis", etc. etc.

---RECENT DEMOCRATIC PARTY DEVELOPMENTS---

The Communists are engaging in a highly concentrated program in Southern California. It would be possible to document in detail their high

degree of influence in the Democratic Party (where former I.P.P. Third Party people are deeply involved in the campaigns of RICHARD RICHARDS and JAMES ROOSEVELT), as well as in the Daily News.

For example, on May 7, 1954, the Daily News ran a "Letter to the Editor" from DR. HARRY STEINMETZ, recently discharged from San Diego State College Faculty for refusing to answer questions regarding C.P. membership. In his column of the same date, LESLIE CLAYPOOL lists all school superintendent candidates, including HARRY STEINMETZ, without mentioning the fact of his discharge from the faculty. On May 11, 1954, STEINMETZ appeared at the Democratic County Central Committee meeting to be a guest speaker and ELEANOR RAYMOND, EXECUTIVE SECRETARY of the CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE CONFERENCE, also appeared to make a sales talk for the "Legislative Almanac", which, as mentioned above, has been endorsed by MCKINNON and CLAYPOOL. When objections from the floor prevented them from speaking, the formal meeting was adjourned, and both STEINMETZ and RAYMOND "informally" addressed the Democratic County committeemen. (At the Resolutions Committee meeting, a resolution was introduced commending the DAILY NEWS, its publisher, CLINTON V. MCKINNON, and FRONTIER MAGAZINE, as well as FRONTIER's publisher, GEORGE PHILLIPS, for their support of the Democratic Party. When objections were raised, the Resolution was modified to commend the DAILY NEWS, FRONTIER and TIME MAGAZINE for their coverage of the current "McCarthy Hearings", and this modified version was finally adopted at the plenary session.)

Anticipating the forthcoming testimony of Democratic State Committeeman WILT COFFEY of El Cerrito, California, business partner of State Democratic Chairman, GEORGE MILLER, JR. CONFIDENTIAL Reagan 55th Amendment

before the House Committee on April 20th⁷, the News ran an editorial on April 9, 1954, which commenced with the statement that "The rumor is out that when the House Committee on Un-American Activities opens hearings in San Diego next week, it is under orders from the Republican political strategists to do a hatchet job on the Democratic Party in California." The editorial adds "...Since the committee's reputation is already so low, it is easy to understand that the rumors about the purpose of its San Diego hearings should be given credence."

On April 21, the News reported that Coffey refused to say whether or not he had been a Communist before the winter of 1946 on grounds of the First and Fifth Amendments, under the headline "RED HEARING BRANDED 'PUBLIC CONFESIONAL'." The story, by the San Diego Bureau of the Daily News presents only Coffey's side of the matter. (The News failed to report public testimony of Stephen Werob, former FBI undercover man, that Coffey had been an active Communist in 1945 while a Southern California organizer for the C.I.O. Oil Workers; and had appeared 4 or 5 times before the Hawthorne Club of the Communist Party. Other information, not yet made public, reveals Coffey was a C.P. member in New York before being "assigned" to Southern California, and was a member of the Contra Costa section of the Party after leaving Southern California.)

This entire situation is so serious, in this reporter's opinion, as to require the attention of responsible officials of the Government, the American Federation of Labor, and the Democratic Party.

For your information, Governor Reagan, while conversing with Assistant to the Director Cartha D. DeLoach on 1/19/69, indicated in strict confidence that the Board of Trustees of the University of California had received strong recommendations that Serge Lang be hired. Governor Reagan stated he was most suspicious of this individual inasmuch as he had heard rumors that this man was mixed up in various student uprisings at Columbia University while employed there. Governor Reagan indicated he would appreciate being furnished on a confidential basis any information the FBI could give him and stressed that the source would not be revealed.

SERGE ROBERT LANG

Lang was born May 19, 1927, at Paris, France. A source who is familiar with individuals associated with Columbia University and student activities on the Columbia campus advised January 21, 1969, that Serge Lang was formerly a full professor in the mathematics department at Columbia University. He had been at Columbia for a number of years. In September, 1968, he went to the University of California at Berkeley. His exact status at Columbia and the University of California is unknown. Lang could be at the University of California on a temporary basis.

Lang advised a close friend before departing Columbia that he felt it was necessary for him to leave because he had become "too involved" in politics. He wanted to forget about politics for awhile and devote his time to his chosen field of math. He had chosen Berkeley because he had been there before. He has returned to Columbia University once or twice since September for brief visits.

Lang has always been known as a political radical member of the faculty at Columbia. He was outspoken at faculty meetings in presenting his very liberal and radical point of view. During the student disorders at Columbia during the Spring of 1968, Lang supported the students and expressed his support at several faculty meetings. He was not involved in the occupation of campus buildings. He supported the student demands but not the violence. Lang is considered an honest intellectual.

The source continued by stating that Lang was not an affiliate or adviser to the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS). He was completely independent and highly respected by the left thinking students. His radical views usually took the form of letters to the University president, campus newspaper or campus group. His opposition to any defense contracts or military research was widely known on campus. He frequently attacked the "secret research" conducted for the Government.

Serge Robert Lang

The "New Haven Journal-Courier," a daily newspaper in New Haven, Connecticut, September 20, 1968, issue, page one, carried an article captioned "Professor Supports Protestors' Actions" which set forth in part that Serge Lang spoke on "The Crises at Columbia" at a Yale mathematics department lecture and stated that radical Columbia University students were totally justified in their "liberation" of five campus buildings last April. Professor Lang justified the students' demands for participation in University decisions and for an end to Columbia's "obnoxious involvement with the Defense Department and CIA." Lang berated the "American Establishment" which prohibits universities from "going back to education." Lang also discounted press reports of students' vandalism and that liberating buildings seemed to him an infinitely more effective way of presenting demands for change than "rational discourse."

On 4/27/71 Mr. HERBERT ELLINGWOOD, Assistant to the Governor, called. He said the Governor is making a speech, as is noted in the title, and wants to include a good, solid paragraph on the Director and the FBI, assailing the critics of the FBI and showing the FBI's accomplishments. He said if he could get this material together, he would see that the speech-writing staff would include it in the Governor's remarks.

I immediately called Assistant to the Director JOHN P. MOHR, who felt that our participation in such a speech was very good and referred me to Assistant Director THOMAS BISHOP.

Assistant Director BISHOP, after learning the purpose, said that the material would be gotten together and we would be given a call and the material dictated to someone here.

On the afternoon of 4/28/71 JOHN CAMPBELL, Research Unit of the Crime Research Section of the Crime Records Division, called from the Bureau and dictated a two-page, double-spaced, statement, which they said could be given to the Governor. He also advised they had in the mail a copy of an address given by Vice-President AGNEW in New Orleans, Louisiana, on 4/26/71, which we could make available, and the material in it could also be used, possibly paraphrased, and played into the Governor's remarks.

On the morning of 4/29/71 SA THOMAS P. GRIFFIN, who has liaison with the Governor's Office, gave the material which the Bureau had prepared, as well as the copy of Vice-President AGNEW's speech, to Mr. DICK TURNER for the Governor's use.

The informant attended a meeting of all screen publicists held at the time when this change was voted on, and stated that ROY BREWER announced that all publicists employed in the motion picture industry would be welcomed into the new IATSE unit, but that MILTON GOTTLIEB, the business agent, would not be permitted to continue as business manager. The informant stated that Mr. BREWER made it clear that GOTTLIEB would not carry a card in the new guild, since BREWER is of the opinion that GOTTLIEB is a Communist. Motion Picture Industry

In recent months innumerable criticisms have been hurled at the Director for his efforts in trying to point out to the American public that it has been lulled into a period of apathy as the result of Khrushchey's visit to the United States. An outstanding example of this apathy involves the present resurgence of communist elements in the movie industry, with an apparent "so what" attitude on the part of American citizens.

On 1-21-60, ^{Calif.} Otto Preminger, Hollywood producer-director, defied the so-called "blacklist" by openly hiring Dalton Trumbo, one of the "Hollywood Ten," to write the script for the movie version of "Exodus." Today, Stanley Kramer, one of the leading independent producer-directors in the motion picture industry, defied the American Legion in its present efforts to combat communism in the movie industry by stating that he would hire any writer he pleased, regardless of the writer's "past affiliations or suspected affiliations."

The Preminger announcement concerning the hiring of Dalton Trumbo made headlines for a day. After that, it was a dead issue. Stanley Kramer's defiance of the American Legion's efforts will probably be accorded the same treatment. Today, lulled into apathy by a super salesman like Khrushchey, the American public "couldn't care less." Yet, only twelve years ago (1948), it was an aroused public that supported the actions of the House Committee on Un-American Activities for convicting the so-called "Hollywood Ten."

With regard to Otto Preminger, the Bureau files reveal recent contacts with the American communist group in Mexico City. (100-432481, 1)

By memorandum dated 9-4-58, the Central Research Section pointed out that Stanley Kramer's motion picture, "The Defiant Ones," which depicted the controversial "race" issue plainly "backed" the communist cause and would undoubtedly be used by them for propaganda purposes in the future. Further, that

there was no doubt but what the communists were interested in once again regaining a foothold in the movie industry. The memorandum also revealed that although no investigation of Stanley Kramer had been conducted by the Bureau, a former communist had advised that "the Kramer outfit is Red from top to bottom."

In connection with the present American Legion defiance by Kramer, it is interesting to note that J. B. Matthews, former chief investigator for the House Committee on Un-American Activities, prepared an article for the December, 1951, issue of the American Legion magazine in which he stated that Kramer had taught at a communist training school in Los Angeles in 1947. (62-101941; The New York Times Magazine, 8-17-58, p. 70)

KRAMER said he felt that these people were entitled to make a living. KRAMER also accented repeatedly a serious concern for the film industry as an "art form" and the necessity for keeping freedom in the Arts. KRAMER challenged the Legion for keeping what he called a "black list" of persons who should not be hired in the film industry and described this as un-American.

MC KNEALLY substantially said that the Legion was today greatly concerned because of the seeming disillusion of the Waldorf Agreement of 1947, whereby the film industry voluntarily policed itself against an intrusion of Communist oriented writers and performers. MC KNEALLY denied that the Legion had ever kept a "black list." He stated that with the apparent resurgence of writers and other with Communist backgrounds currently in the film industry, the Legion would be derelict not to call it to the public's attention and interest.

It was generally agreed by Agents who watched the screened debate that it was notable restrained in its tone possibly suggestive of either editing or censorship by the network inasmuch as the program was understood to have been taped about a week in advance of its screening.

Concerning ADOLPHE MENJOU, ^{LA-11-100} he is described as a prominent free-lance motion picture actor who testified co-operatively before the House Committee on Un-American Activities, Washington, D.C., 1947 when he alleged that Communists had heavily infiltrated the motion picture industry. MENJOU has since that time been intermittently mentioned in the press as a active and outspoken foe of Communism. He has on occasion furnished information to the Los Angeles Office.

MAURICE REIS is executive director and keeps the MPA's files at home. The organization could possibly be made active if warranted. However, at present time it is completely inactive as a group, and has not held a general meeting for five years. However, much of the anti-CP data and history of the CP in Hollywood in former years which has appeared in Hearst press comes from MPA files from where it is fed to the press by WARD BOND and others who are interested.

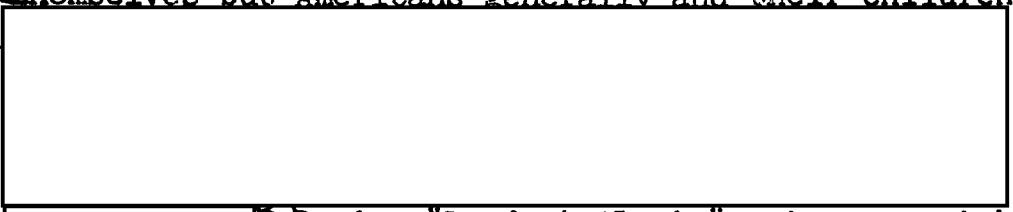

Synopsis:

Professional-Cultural Section, Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP), currently claims only two active cultural clubs - one Writers Club and one Performers Club with an active membership of only 16 members. Professional - Cultural Section Council still meets but meetings are reportedly weak and its members complain that the section is receiving little direction and interest from the Communist Party's district organization. Comparatively little funds being currently raised by Professional-Cultural Group. Principal interest lies in the blacklist Anti-trust suit of certain writers against the film industry. A recording of NEDRICK YOUNG's speech at the rally sponsored by Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC) at Carnegie Hall, New York, September, 1961 has been made for distribution aimed principally at young intellectuals. Speech purported to show the "wasteland of American character" that has been created by the blacklist, and that the real victims are not the blacklisted writers and artists themselves but Americans generally and their children.

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During "Project Alert," Anti-Communist School at Los Angeles in December, 1961, Y. FRANK

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FREEMAN, a spokesman for the Hollywood film industry, told the rally that communists no longer wield influence in the film industry and that a cycle of anti-communist films can be expected out of Hollywood.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS CONCERNING

Organizational Matters

Currently there are only three clubs of the Professional - Cultural Section, Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP), actively meeting. Two of these are so called cultural clubs, one a Writers Club and the other a Performers Club (actors) totaling an estimated membership strength of 12 to 16 members. The third active club is a professional club for scientists and engineers. This indicates that the cultural elements of the CP organization in Los Angeles have continued to lose ground over the past 12 months, in view of the fact that a year ago the Professional - Cultural Section claimed five active clubs.

During a meeting of the Professional - Cultural Section Council on December 11, 1961, at the home of one of the members of the council, it was indicated that information from the District Executive Committee of the SCDCP was to the effect that individual clubs would hereafter be expected to associate themselves more and more with mass work functions. In this connection, however, it was realized that members of the Professional - Cultural Clubs might have difficulty complying completely with this procedure. It was hoped, however, that these clubs would continue to function as best they can.

The Section Council continues to meet on a more or less regular basis; however, these meetings have become progressively weak with very little concrete results. Furthermore, comparatively speaking, not much money has been raised in the Cultural - Professional Groups and considerable..

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disappointment has been expressed in these groups over the apparent lack of direction and interest in the clubs and activities of this particular section from the CP's district or organization.

One such activity which can be expected invariably to be brought up for discussion at council meetings involves the developments in the so called blacklist Antitrust suit by a number of Hollywood writers against the film industry. It is noted that

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Antitrust Suit by so-called Blacklisted Writers by Film Industry

Recent developments concerning the multi-million dollar Antitrust suit against the film industry by self-style blacklisted writers' were discussed at the Professional Cultural Section Council meeting on December 11, 1961. Specifically brought up for discussion was the rally sponsored by the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC) (see appendix) at Carnegie Hall in New York City in September, 1961, at which the principal speaker was writer NEDRICK YOUNG, who is one of the plaintiffs in the Antitrust suit known as "YOUNG, et al. vs Motion Picture Association of America, et al." It was specifically noted at the council meeting that YOUNG's speech at the Carnegie Hall rally had been taped and subsequently a recording had been made of it. Council member FRED RINALDO brought one of the recordings to the meeting with him and noted that a supply was now available for distribution and available at a cost of \$1.50 each, proceeds from which would go to the fund to help prosecute the suit

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of the blacklisted writers. It was also stated that the recording and its distribution was aimed particularly at young intellectuals. [redacted] pointed out at the council meeting that members of the section should arrange to get the record before groups of young people - particularly young college people - as much as possible. [redacted] further noted that it was his information that the attorneys for the plaintiff writers still have high hopes for the successful outcome of the suit either as a result of court decision or possibly through settlement out of court.

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Because of the apparent importance placed upon the speech of NEDRICK YOUNG at the ECLC rally last September, a summary of the speech from a copy of the recording made available by LA T-1 is set out herewith.

Speech of NEDRICK YOUNG
at ECLC rally, New York,

The cover for the recording notes that YOUNG's speech is directed particularly to young writers and the plight they are in today. It notes because the speech was so enthusiastically received at the Carnegie Hall meeting on September 22, 1961, the ECLC had decided to put it on a record. The cover identified YOUNG as, in recent years, one of Hollywood's most sensational writers and author of the award-winning film "The Defiant Ones" of which he was a co-author under the pen name NATHAN E. DOUGLAS. The cover write-up on YOUNG noted that he had to use a pen name in order to get the story accepted for the reason that since 1953, YOUNG has been blacklisted. It went on to note that YOUNG was under contract to Warner Brothers as a writer-director-actor in 1953 when he was subpoenaed before the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA). The write-up maintains that NEDRICK YOUNG was automatically blacklisted by the Hollywood producers following his appearance before the HCUA when in answer to the question put to him by the

committee as to whether or not he was a member of the CP, YOUNG said "...I will not answer your question because to answer your question would be to concede your right to ask it, and this I do not do. I consider this committee a flagrant corruption of the Constitution and I consider it designed to invade the right to think, to speak, to act, to assemble with people freely. This I will never be a party to. I decline to answer your question on the basis of the first amendment..."

The record cover thereafter states that NEDRICK YOUNG subsequently joined with 12 other Hollywood writers and actors to sue the Motion Picture Association of America, Inc., and the Association of Motion Picture Producers, Inc., as well as seven producing and distributing companies and four of their affiliates. It noted that the suit is brought under the Sherman Antitrust Act.

A summary of YOUNG's recorded speech is as follows:

The impact of those who went through 14 years of the blacklist is too bitter to discuss. The blacklisted have been cut off, isolated, defeated in the courts and sustained only by the annual statements of the American Legion about their influence in the motion picture industry. Yet the American Legion is closer to the truth than it suspects. The blacklist is a tremendous influence on the film industry merely by reason of its existence. It is a most potent influence on our film and television screens.

[redacted] is the former editor of a report on the subject of the blacklist in Hollywood and is currently engaged in a study of the effects of the blacklist on young writers and the American character in general. In a recent conversation [redacted] asked NEDRICK YOUNG what has been the effect of the blacklist on the young writer and the mass media. YOUNG suggested to [redacted] that he go and ask the young writers themselves as he YOUNG has had occasion to do.

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Young writers no longer dare speak their own personal experiences. The first young writer with whom YOUNG discussed the subject of the blacklist is or claims to be a realist. He was not even aware of the blacklist and it was his idea that the mass media could never be more than its value at the box office. This young writer did have ambition to do something on his own on some subject like the Freedom Riders, but he felt that anything on this subject would have no box office appeal. When YOUNG pointed out that this in itself was an effect of the blacklist, the young writer promptly terminated the interview with a comment to the effect that he "hears no evil, speaks no evil and sees no evil."

The second young writer interviewed by YOUNG was a slightly more mature individual who had originally come to Hollywood because of some excellent drama he had written for TV. He was a deeply frustrated young man. He worked on an assignment basis. He had no say as to the selection of his material and his convictions were subservient to those of the producers. He acknowledged the existence of the blacklist. He thought that current pictures might be affected by it; that producers are less and less interested in subjects of a social nature. They are afraid of being accused of spreading propaganda. The blacklist has created a taboo on the subject of humanism itself. "Love thy neighbor" might get by, but "All men are created equal" is definitely out.

YOUNG and the second young writer speculated on the situation in which the basic moralities were subversive and only immorality is acceptable. The young writer would like to write about such down-to-earth subjects as family relations; but he is afraid that he might be suspected of trying to abolish the family. The young writer suggested that maybe he should settle for writing just a socially-significant western.

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YOUNG maintains that both these young writers claim to be realists but that what they were writing had not one thing to do with reality. YOUNG maintains that it all adds up to one thing: If you want to make a living as a writer, you are going to have to mouth the idiocies of the political and cultural climate of which you are a part.

If it is suggested to this young writer that the blacklist has had an effect on what he does or does not write, he is indignant, or unbelieving, or suspicious, or all three; but whether he is blacklisted or not, he is bound together with the writer who is blacklisted; and he is no more free than the writer who is blacklisted.

The writer's credo has always been this: The duly-constituted authority must equate with my conscience, or one of us is doomed. It's an old story; but something new has been added; - monopoly and terror. The historical brain rack gets tighter. Power interests once swallow up our press obscure our poetry, invade our magazines, destroy our theatre, reduce our novels and humiliate our tradition and culture. They warn us that if we dare to retrieve them, we will be hit by the blacklist or some other penitent measure.

Take a good look at the theatre. Machinery for comment, protest, glee, pain and so forth has rusted into a showcase for Hollywood. Playwrights offer themselves to be sacrificed and are fooled by royalties and resales. Another group of playwrights is engaged in the experience of fleeing from the realities of a world where values are given first to a bomb and second to life.

The political and cultural tyrant has been incorporated into their conegos and there is no one to fight but themselves. If they can disarm the rest of us, how comfortable for the enemy! The duly-constituted authorities produce these writers, honor them, immortalize them, and the

public follows suit until we are convinced that self-destruction can be fun.

NEDRICK YOUNG cannot subscribe to the proposition that man is not worth saving. He is worth saving and is the only one who can save himself.

YOUNG recently discussed the blacklist and its effect on the mind of young writers with a young university student. The young man is a gifted student and wants to be a writer. This young man says students don't feel blacklisted but are affected by the blackout in their lives. The central theme of their complaint is futility. They do not know where they are going or where anyone else is going either. They see the corrupt, wrong and stupid things at school, at home, in the nation and the world - but what can they do about it? Nothing.

Finally, the young student said, if a professor gets fired for his political convictions, the others get the message; then the students; then the public; and finally you realize there is no point in having convictions because there is no way of putting them to work.

NEDRICK YOUNG says this young student has answered the question put to YOUNG by [redacted] what has been the effect of the blackout on young writers and the American character?

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It is not possible to speak of the blacklist in a vacuum. It is only one cog in the overall blackout that clouds the American scene. Start with a blackout of the writers and you end with a blackout of the teachers, scientists, doctors and the workers.

The real victims of the blackout are not the writers themselves but the American public and their children. The Constitution itself has been found to be unconstitutional when expedient. Basic freedoms have been stolen, not from a few victims of the blacklist, the McCarran Act and the Smith Act but from the whole nation.

In the brief period of 14 years, a wasteland of American character has been created, has stilled our voices, and almost killed our spirits in order to prepare us for the quietude so necessary for those who plan new atrocities at home and in the world at large. Shall a minority of governors, residents, kings and so forth decide the question of life and death for us? Or shall we now begin to make the decisions for them? How else can we liberate ourselves and our children? We as citizens and parents must give them back what has been stolen from us. The arenas of protest and action must be opened.

To be properly informed is to be properly armed. Once so armed, we and our children will know how to secure the gifts of life for ourselves and the people of all nations. It is worth whatever sacrifice is necessary to claim our own humanities once more.

We have created an arena here (the Carnegie Hall meeting) tonight and must have more like this one. The time has come to fight back!

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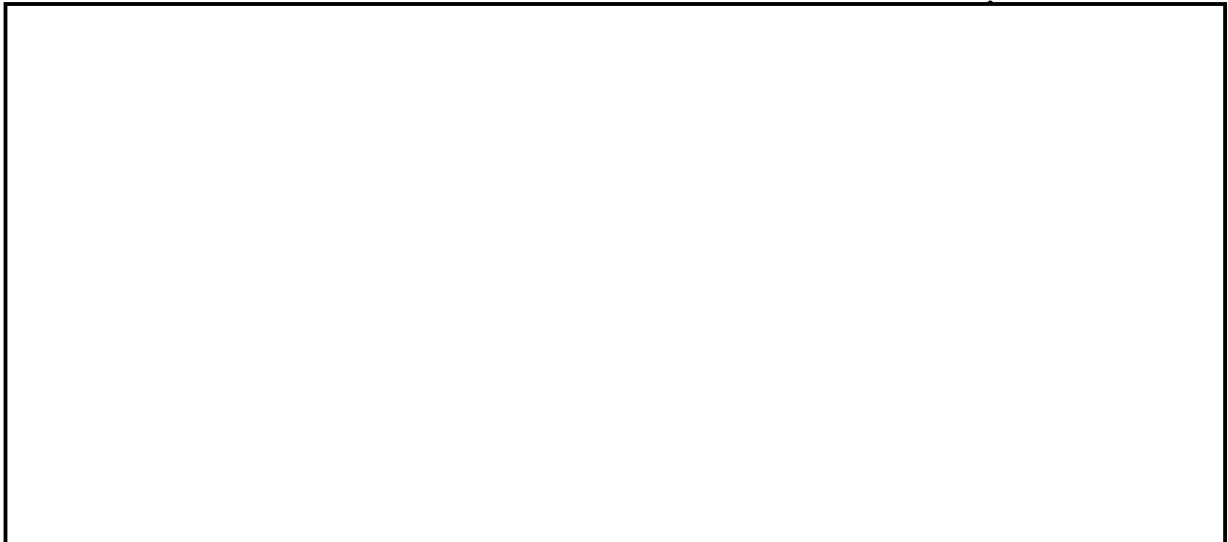
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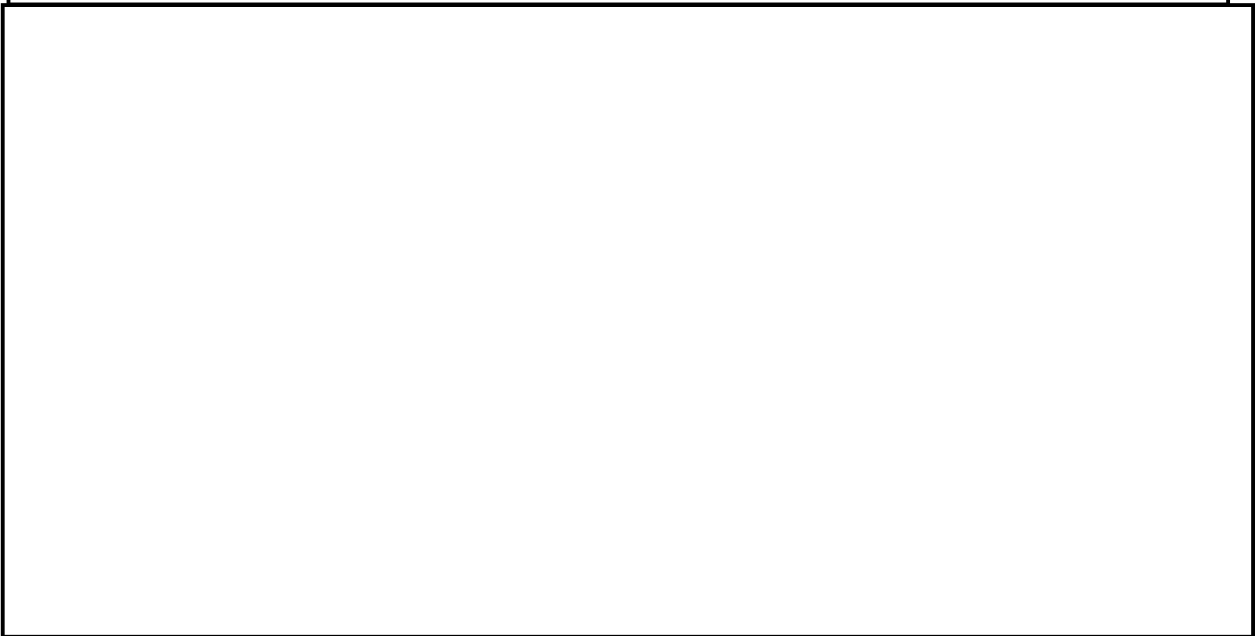
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ANTI-COMMUNIST ACTIVITY

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During December 11 - 15, 1961, a School of Anti-Communism presented by the Navy League and the Marine Corps League, was held at the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles. It was called Project Alert and was, according to its literature, sponsored by the Southern California Freedom Forum, the Citizens Freedom Center and the Motion Picture Alliance.

Included among the speakers on the various subjects during the week, according to the literature, would be outstanding motion picture, TV, radio and newspaper personalities, in addition to leading American sports stars and students. *copy*

During one of the sessions Mr. Y. FRANK ~~FREEMAN~~, Paramount Pictures Executive and a spokesman for the Hollywood film industry, as well as chairman of the Motion Picture Producers Association, addressed the rally. During his talk Mr. FREEMAN stated that communists no longer wield influence over the Hollywood film industry. As reported in the Los Angeles Examiner, a metropolitan newspaper, for December 14, 1961, Mr. FREEMAN predicted, in an interview following his address, that a cycle of anti-communist films could be expected from Hollywood.

The Los Angeles Herald-Express in its issue of December 18, 1961, commented editorially that the prediction of Mr. FREEMAN as chairman of the Motion Picture Producers Association, that there soon will probably be a cycle of anti-communist films produced in Hollywood, is most encouraging for a number of reasons. The editorial pointed out that the motion picture industry holds a responsible position in the communications field and in forming the picture of America and is trusted by the American public.

Synopsis:

Professional-Cultural Section, Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP), currently claims only two active cultural clubs - one Writers Club and one Performers Club with an active membership of only 16 members. Professional - Cultural Section Council still meets but meetings are reportedly weak and its members complain that the section is receiving little direction and interest from the Communist Party's district organization. Comparatively little funds being currently raised by Professional-Cultural Group. Principal interest lies in the blacklist Antitrust suit of certain writers against the film industry. A recording of NEDRICK YOUNG's speech at the rally sponsored by Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC) at Carnegie Hall, New York, September, 1961 has been made for distribution aimed principally at young intellectuals. Speech purported to show the "wasteland of American character" that has been created by the blacklist, and that the real victims are not the blacklisted writers and artists themselves but Americans generally and their children.

During "Project Alert," Anti-Communist School at Los Angeles in December, 1961, Y. FRANK

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FREEMAN, a spokesman for the Hollywood film industry, told the rally that communists no longer wield influence in the film industry and that a cycle of anti-communist films can be expected out of Hollywood.

Currently there are only three clubs of the Professional - Cultural Section, Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP), actively meeting. Two of these are so called cultural clubs, one a Writers Club and the other a Performers Club (actors) totaling an estimated membership strength of 12 to 16 members. The third active club is a professional club for scientists and engineers. This indicates that the cultural elements of the CP organization in Los Angeles have continued to lose ground over the past 12 months, in view of the fact that a year ago the Professional - Cultural Section claimed five active clubs.

During a meeting of the Professional - Cultural Section Council on December 11, 1961, at the home of one of the members of the council, it was indicated that information from the District Executive Committee of the SCDCP was to the effect that individual clubs would hereafter be expected to associate themselves more and more with mass work functions. In this connection, however, it was realized that members of the Professional - Cultural Clubs might have difficulty complying completely with this procedure. It was hoped, however, that these clubs would continue to function as best they can.

The Section Council continues to meet on a more or less regular basis; however, these meetings have become progressively weak with very little concrete results. Furthermore, comparatively speaking, not much money has been raised in the Cultural - Professional Groups and considerable..

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One such activity which can be expected invariably to be brought up for discussion at council meetings involves the developments in the so called blacklist Antitrust suit by a number of Hollywood writers against the film industry. Recent developments concerning the multi-million dollar Antitrust suit against the film industry by self-style blacklisted writers' were discussed at the Professional Cultural Section Council meeting on December 11, 1961. Specifically brought up for discussion was the rally sponsored by the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC) (see appendix) at Carnegie Hall in New York City in September, 1961, at which the principal speaker was writer NEDRICK YOUNG, who is one of the plaintiffs in the Antitrust suit known as "YOUNG, et al. vs Motion Picture Association of America, et al." It was specifically noted at the council meeting that YOUNG's speech at the Carnegie Hall rally had been taped and subsequently a recording had been made of it. Council member FRED RINALDO brought one of the recordings to the meeting with him and noted that a supply was now available for distribution and available at a cost of \$1.50 each, proceeds from which would go to the fund to help prosecute the suit

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of the blacklisted writers. It was also stated that the recording and its distribution was aimed particularly at young intellectuals. [redacted] pointed out at the council meeting that members of the section should arrange to get the record before groups of young people - particularly young college people - as much as possible. [redacted] further noted that it was his information that the attorneys for the plaintiff writers still have high hopes for the successful outcome of the suit either as a result of court decision or possibly through settlement out of court.

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Because of the apparent importance placed upon the speech of NEDRICK YOUNG at the ECLC rally last September, a summary of the speech from a copy of the recording made available by LA T-1 is set out herewith.

The cover for the recording notes that YOUNG's speech is directed particularly to young writers and the plight they are in today. It notes because the speech was so enthusiastically received at the Carnegie Hall meeting on September 22, 1961, the ECLC had decided to put it on a record. The cover identified YOUNG as, in recent years, one of Hollywood's most sensational writers and author of the award-winning film "The Defiant Ones" of which he was a co-author under the pen name NATHAN E. DOUGLAS. The cover write-up on YOUNG noted that he had to use a pen name in order to get the story accepted for the reason that since 1953, YOUNG has been blacklisted. It went on to note that YOUNG was under contract to Warner Brothers as a writer-director-actor in 1953 when he was subpoenaed before the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA). The write-up maintains that NEDRICK YOUNG was automatically blacklisted by the Hollywood producers following his appearance before the HCUA when in answer to the question put to him by the

committee as to whether or not he was a member of the CP, YOUNG said "...I will not answer your question because to answer your question would be to concede your right to ask it, and this I do not do. I consider this committee a flagrant corruption of the Constitution and I consider it designed to invade the right to think, to speak, to act, to assemble with people freely. This I will never be a party to. I decline to answer your question on the basis of the first amendment..."

The record cover thereafter states that NEDRICK YOUNG subsequently joined with 12 other Hollywood writers and actors to sue the Motion Picture Association of America, Inc., and the Association of Motion Picture Producers, Inc., as well as seven producing and distributing companies and four of their affiliates. It noted that the suit is brought under the Sherman Antitrust Act.

A summary of YOUNG's recorded speech is as follows:

The impact of those who went through 14 years of the blacklist is too bitter to discuss. The blacklisted have been cut off, isolated, defeated in the courts and sustained only by the annual statements of the American Legion about their influence in the motion picture industry. Yet the American Legion is closer to the truth than it suspects. The blacklist is a tremendous influence on the film industry merely by reason of its existence. It is a most potent influence on our film and television screens.

[redacted] is the former editor of a report on the subject of the blacklist in Hollywood and is currently engaged in a study of the effects of the blacklist on young writers and the American character in general. In a recent conversation [redacted] asked NEDRICK YOUNG what has been the effect of the blacklist on the young writer and the mass media. YOUNG suggested to [redacted] that he go and ask the young writers themselves as he YOUNG has had occasion to do.

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Young writers no longer dare speak their own personal experiences. The first young writer with whom YOUNG discussed the subject of the blacklist is or claims to be a realist. He was not even aware of the blacklist and it was his idea that the mass media could never be more than its value at the box office. This young writer did have ambition to do something on his own on some subject like the Freedom Riders, but he felt that anything on this subject would have no box office appeal. When YOUNG pointed out that this in itself was an effect of the blacklist, the young writer promptly terminated the interview with a comment to the effect that he "hears no evil, speaks no evil and sees no evil."

The second young writer interviewed by YOUNG was a slightly more mature individual who had originally come to Hollywood because of some excellent drama he had written for TV. He was a deeply frustrated young man. He worked on an assignment basis. He had no say as to the selection of his material and his convictions were subservient to those of the producers. He acknowledged the existence of the blacklist. He thought that current pictures might be affected by it; that producers are less and less interested in subjects of a social nature. They are afraid of being accused of spreading propaganda. The blacklist has created a taboo on the subject of humanism itself. "Love thy neighbor" might get by, but "All men are created equal" is definitely out.

YOUNG and the second young writer speculated on the situation in which the basic moralities were subversive and only immorality is acceptable. The young writer would like to write about such down-to-earth subjects as family relations; but he is afraid that he might be suspected of trying to abolish the family. The young writer suggested that maybe he should settle for writing just a socially-significant western.

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YOUNG maintains that both these young writers claim to be realists but that what they were writing had not one thing to do with reality. YOUNG maintains that it all adds up to one thing: If you want to make a living as a writer, you are going to have to mouth the idiocies of the political and cultural climate of which you are a part.

If it is suggested to this young writer that the blacklist has had an effect on what he does or does not write, he is indignant, or unbelieving, or suspicious, or all three; but whether he is blacklisted or not, he is bound together with the writer who is blacklisted; and he is no more free than the writer who is blacklisted.

The writer's credo has always been this: The duly-constituted authority must equate with my conscience, or one of us is doomed. It's an old story; but something new has been added; - monopoly and terror. The historical brain rack gets tighter. Power interests once swallow up our press obscure our poetry, invade our magazines, destroy our theatre, reduce our novels and humiliate our tradition and culture. They warn us that if we dare to retrieve them, we will be hit by the blacklist or some other penitent measure.

Take a good look at the theatre. Machinery for comment, protest, glee, pain and so forth has rusted into a showcase for Hollywood. Admiral Burke, U. S. Navy (Ret.), good friend of Bureau, has contacted Assistant Director Sullivan to state that movie, "Seven Days in May," which tells of abortive plot of military clique to seize control of U. S. Government, is critical of military establishment and is detrimental to Nation. Burke is in receipt of letters concerning recent attacks on military. One letter alleges communist connections of movie's cast, namely, Fredric March, Burt Lancaster, Kirk Douglas, and Ava Gardner. Another letter cites two new books, "The Passion of the Hawks," by Tristram Coffin, and "The Military Establishment," by John Swomley, and another new movie, "Dr. Strangelove or: How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb," produced by Stanley Kubrick, all of which derogate military. Fletcher Knebel, one of co-authors of "Seven Days in May," criticized Director in "Look" magazine in 1955. Fredric March and wife were subjects of closed security cases alleging them to have been Communist Party members and active in communist fronts in past. Burt Lancaster and Ava Gardner also affiliated with several fronts at one time. Kirk Douglas and wife subjects of pending espionage case (based on information from Army in January, 1964, that anonymous communication received by Army in Germany alleged she had been Nazi agent in Germany in World War II and subsequently a Soviet agent; that Douglas is communist fellow traveler who had two movies financed secretly by Soviets.] Tristram Coffin wrote derogatory article about Director in "Holiday" magazine in 1963. John Swomley is pacifist who favors disarmament and opposes conscription. This Division regards book and movie harmful to our Armed Services and Nation.

"Seven Days in May" Disturbs Admiral Burke

Admiral Arleigh A. Burke, U. S. Navy (Ret.), who is a good friend of the Bureau and is on our Special Correspondents' List, has contacted Assistant Director William C. Sullivan concerning the recently released motion picture, "Seven Days in May," adapted from the novel of the same name by Fletcher Knebel and Charles W. Bailey II. Burke stated that he had seen the film, which portrays every military and civilian leader in it as a man of great weakness, and he feels that the picture is detrimental to the Nation. His appraisal of the picture has appeared in the press, and, as a result, he said, he has received several letters.

One correspondent, according to Admiral Burke, made the following charges concerning the principal members of the movie's cast: (1) Fredric March, together with his wife, Florence Eldridge, have been members of some 20 communist front organizations; (2) Burt Lancaster is a "zealous Moscow stalwart" and was affiliated with several communist fronts; and (3) Kirk Douglas and Ava Gardner have been cited by a California Committee on Un-American Activities.

Another correspondent, Norman Van Amburgh, of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, indicated that two new books, "The Passion of the Hawks," by Tristram Coffin, and "The Military Establishment," by John Swomley, as well as a new movie, "Dr. Strangelove or: How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb," produced by Stanley Kubrick, also disparage the Pentagon.

Admiral Burke said that he was disturbed by the allegations concerning these individuals and would like to know if they are true.

He forces Scott's resignation, along with three other members of the Joint Chiefs and five field commanders. Lyman then tells the American people that their resignations were submitted because they "opposed" the disarmament treaty and were "organizing a formal group in an effort to prevent its implementation."

Admiral Burke, U. S. Navy (Ret.), good friend of Bureau, has contacted Assistant Director Sullivan to state that movie, "Seven Days in May," which tells of abortive plot of military clique to seize control of U. S. Government, is critical of military establishment and is detrimental to Nation. Burke is in receipt of letters concerning recent attacks on military. One letter alleges communist connections of movie's cast, namely, Fredric March, Burt Lancaster, Kirk Douglas, and Ava Gardner. 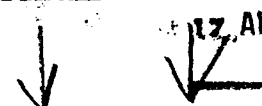

CULTURAL ACTIVITY

[T-11] a reliable source and himself a member of one of the cultural clubs of the Communist Party, Hollywood Section, stated, [on August 2, 1949, that the Communist Party, at least in Hollywood, is shifting its open work almost 100 per cent to front groups and organizations such as the Hollywood Arts, Sciences, and Professions Council (hereafter referred to as A.S.P.). It was this informant's observation that the A.S.P. is currently the key to the Communist movement in Hollywood among the so-called cultural and professional groups.

Hollywood Arts, Sciences, and Professions Elections

On August 5, 1949, last, the Hollywood A.S.P. held its annual general membership meeting at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel for the purpose of nominating a slate of officers to control the activities of this organization for the coming year. It may be noted, however, that on August 4, 1949, the day before the general meeting, [T-12, a reliable informant, well acquainted with the activities at A.S.P. headquarters in Hollywood, learned that DAVID ROBISON, the current A.S.P. Executive Director, had discussed with JOHN HOWARD LAWSON the coming elections and their choices for the nominations. ROBISON was seeking LAWSON's advice in regard to these matters.

[Informant learned] that for National Vice Chairman LINUS PAULING of the California Institute of Technology and screen writer HOWARD KROCH had been nominated, as well as JOHN HOWARD LAWSON, himself; further, that the present policy of A.S.P. is that the officers of the National A.S.P. are ex-officio members of the local A.S.P. Executive Board, without being actually elected. It appeared also that several individuals had already been approached relative to putting up their names for local vice chairmen. They were as follows:

- GEORGE ANTHEIL, Composer
- LOUIS ROBINSON, Doctor
- ALBERT MALTZ, Screen Writer
- LARRY ADLER, Musician
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DAVID ROBISON suggested to LAWSON that GEORGE MILLNER (Hollywood Actors' Agent) would be good for the position of A.S.P. Treasurer, but

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WILLNER was not in a position to handle the job; therefore, ROBISON and LAWSON agreed that this office should be offered to WILLNER's wife, TIBA WILLNER, because she had been such a wonderful worker and deserved the recognition. (S)(u)

Informant also learned that architect GREGORY AIN and screen writer WALDO SALT had indicated to ROBISON that they would accept nominations for the Executive Board. (S)(u)

It may be noted that of the individuals mentioned LAWSON, MALTZ, GEORGE and TIBA WILLNER, AIN, and SALT have all been identified by T-1, [2900] a reliable informant, as members of the Hollywood Section of the Communist Party in 1945. (S)(u)

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Concerning the general meeting to be held that night, ROBISON thought that GEORGE PEPPER should introduce Dr. MURRAY ABOWITZ as chairman for the meeting in the place of KOCH, who would be unable to be there. ROBISON also instructed MARY ROLFE of A.S.P.'s office staff that there were several important resolutions that must be taken up at the membership meeting that evening - one of these being a resolution against the appointment of Attorney General TOM CLARK to the Supreme Court. Other resolutions were designed to put the A.S.P. on record against pending loyalty bills, as well as against the Mundt-Ferguson Bill. GEORGE PEPPER was to be instructed to draw up brief data on both the U. S. Attorney General and the Mundt-Ferguson Bill to present to the membership meeting. ROBISON indicated that he would endeavor to get together with Dr. MURRAY ABOWITZ for a few minutes before the meeting since ABOWITZ was to be chairman for the evening. (S)(u)

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GEORGE PEPPER in the past has been Executive Director of A.S.P. and he, too, has been identified in the past as a member of the Communist Party in Hollywood by T-1. (S)(u)

On 10/26/61, Mrs. MILLER furnished the following information:

HOWARD S. MEIGHAN and JACK BUNCH are currently active in detailing plans for a film based on MILLER's book, "I Was a Spy." Mr. C. J. TEVLIN, who unsuccessfully attempted to interest various movie studios in this production, has withdrawn as an agent for MILLER and all newspaper reports that ELEANOR PARKER had been signed to star in a film version of "I Was a Spy" are erroneous.

On 10/24/61, RONALD REAGAN contacted MILLER for permission to run a two-week sequence based on MILLER's experiences on a future General Electric Theatre TV program. After conferring with MEIGHAN, MILLER declined REAGAN's offer because it was felt that such a TV presentation would kill any movie possibilities.

On 11/1/61, REAGAN again contacted MILLER and urged her to reconsider her decision. After again conferring with MEIGHAN, MILLER informed REAGAN that since no progress had been made to produce a movie, she would agree to the proposal made by General Electric.

HOWARD S. MEIGHAN, who currently resides at 800 Linda Flora Drive, Los Angeles, and has offices at 8961 Sunset Boulevard, Los Angeles, is the subject of a case entitled "Special Inquiry - State Dept. Public Law 402, 80th Congress, Voice of America," Los Angeles file 123-2379. A background investigation conducted by the Los Angeles Office in accordance with Bulet 6/24/52 to Washington Field, developed no derogatory information. At that time, MEIGHAN was a Vice-President of Columbia Broadcasting System, New York City. There is no additional information currently available concerning MEIGHAN.

MOBILIZATION FOR DEMOCRACY

The Los Angeles Office obtained from a Los Angeles police officer a copy of a radio script broadcast on September 9, 1946, in Los Angeles under the title "Operation Terror" which was presented by Mobilization for Democracy, an alleged Communist front organization. This organization was reported to be under the direction of Robert W. Kenny, Attorney General of the State of California. Its Executive Secretary was William R. Bidner, described as a Communist Party functionary. The radio broadcast was narrated by Ronald Reagan and purported to list a number of Ku Klux Klan acts of terrorism in the Los Angeles area. A plea was made for cooperation to bring about better understanding among different elements of society, regardless of race, creed or color. (100-343748-8)

NOTE: Bufiles reveal limited correspondence with Senator Church. His wife, son and friends were taken on a special tour on 6-21-61. [Senator Church had lunch at the Soviet Embassy on 8-25-60 and according to Allen Dulles, he argued on various matters with [redacted] He accepted another luncheon invitation at the Soviet Embassy on 2-16-61.] Ronald Reagan has been very active in anticommunist activities in several Hollywood organizations. Re: RONALD REAGAN

Although he has been extremely anticommunist since about the mid-1940's, he was reportedly a sponsor of the Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy, which has been designated by the Department of Justice pursuant to Executive Order 10450. In testimony before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in October, 1947, he said that he had received some literature from this organization, and that he was duped through a telephone call to lend his name as sponsor of a recital which he later learned was under the auspices of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee. It is noted in his testimony that he said he abhorred the communist philosophy.

In the 1940's Reagan was reportedly a member of Americans for Democratic Action and the American Veterans Committee. In 1950 Dore Schary, prominent Hollywood personality, indicated he and Reagan, as well as others, had been active in the Hollywood Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences and Professions in 1945, but got out that year when communists took over. Reagan became President of the Screen Actors Guild in 1947 and was subsequently re-elected. He was extremely active in the Guild in opposing the communists.

Reagan has visited our Los Angeles Office and relations with him have been cordial. In 1960 he contacted the Bureau regarding his desires to do a television show for the "General Electric Theater," which he narrated, on the Director's pamphlet "Communist Target--Youth." This was declined. On his "General Electric Theater" series, Reagan has produced a two-part program concerning the activities of Marion Miller, a former security informant of our Los Angeles Office.

In March, 1960, we cooperated with Reagan by making inquiries here in Washington regarding Maureen Reagan, the daughter of Jane Wyman and Reagan, who was living with a married Metropolitan Police officer here in Washington. b6

Our inquiries appeared to confirm this situation and information was furnished on a confidential basis to now Senator George Murphy, who originally contacted our Los Angeles Office in the matter. Maureen had, in 1959, been the subject of a favorable Departmental applicant-type investigation in connection with Immigration and Naturalization Service employment; however, the investigation was discontinued.

It is noted that in December, 1964, we received word that the San Diego Patriotic Society (SDPS) intended to make an "American Patriot Award" to the Director for his outstanding services to the United States of America. If there was nothing in the files to prevent doing so, the SAC, San Diego, was instructed he could accept the award on behalf of the Director. The award is connected with the American Patriot Hall of Fame which is sponsored by the SDPS, a conservative group, and several other local conservative organizations. Some time in April the presentation will be made at a formal meeting attended by Ronald Reagan, John Wayne and perhaps former Senator Barry Goldwater, who has been given such an award.

[T-11] a reliable source and himself a member of one of the cultural clubs of the Communist Party, Hollywood Section, stated, on August 2, 1949, that the Communist Party, at least in Hollywood, is shifting its open work almost 100 per cent to front groups and organizations such as the Hollywood Arts, Sciences, and Professions Council (hereafter referred to as A.S.P.). [It was this informant's observation that the A.S.P. is currently the key to the Communist movement in Hollywood among the so-called cultural and professional groups.]

Hollywood Arts, Sciences, and Professions Elections

On August 5, 1949, last, the Hollywood A.S.P. held its annual general membership meeting at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel for the purpose of nominating a slate of officers to control the activities of this organization for the coming year. It may be noted, however, that on August 4, 1949, the day before the general meeting, [T-12, a reliable informant, well acquainted with the activities at A.S.P. headquarters in Hollywood, learned that DAVID ROBISON, the current A.S.P. Executive Director, had discussed with JOHN HOWARD LAWSON the coming elections and their choices for the nominations. ROBISON was seeking LAWSON's advice in regard to these matters.]

[Informant learned] that for National Vice Chairman LINUS PAULING of the California Institute of Technology and screen writer HOWARD KOCH had been nominated, as well as JOHN HOWARD LAWSON, himself; further, that the present policy of A.S.P. is that the officers of the National A.S.P. are ex-officio members of the local A.S.P. Executive Board, without being actually elected. It appeared also that several individuals had already been approached relative to putting up their names for local vice chairmen. They were as follows:

- GEORGE ANTHEIL, Composer
- LOUIS ROBINSON, Doctor
- ALBERT MALTZ, Screen Writer
- LARRY ADLER, Musician

nonclearances, express opinions regarding the suitability of persons for Government employment, or make recommendations with respect to hiring, firing or retaining applicants and employees of other Federal agencies. The purpose of these inquiries is to determine facts about an individual on which appropriate officials can make a sound judgment as to whether or not that person warrants the trust placed in him as a public servant. In the domestic intelligence field, the primary aim of the FBI is to keep appropriate Government officials constantly informed with respect to the activities and plans of the enemies of democracy within the United States so that effective countermeasures and preventative means can be devised. The FBI, as in the past, will endeavor to carry out these investigative responsibilities to the utmost.

Enclosed are several items setting forth my views on these and other matters relating to communism which you may find of interest.

NOTE: Bufiles reveal limited correspondence with Senator Church. His wife, son and friends were taken on a special tour on 6-21-61. [Senator Church had lunch at the Soviet Embassy on 8-25-60 and according to Allen Dulles, he argued on various matters with [redacted]. He accepted another (U) luncheon invitation at the Soviet Embassy on 2-16-61.] Ronald Reagan has been very active in anticommunist activities in several Hollywood organizations. He has been contacted on several occasions by Agents of the Los Angeles Office and has been cooperative and helpful. Last contact with him was in September, 1960, at which time he endeavored to have the Director appear on his television program in connection with a show he desired to do which would be based on the Bureau's pamphlet, "Communist Target-Youth." This, of course, was declined. Editorial ticklers reflect limited but cordial correspondence with the "Twin Falls Times - News," last outgoing 1943.

Although he has been extremely anticommunist since about the mid-1940's, he was reportedly a sponsor of the Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy, which has been designated by the Department of Justice pursuant to Executive Order 10450. In testimony before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in October, 1947, he said that he had received some literature from this organization, and that he was duped through a telephone call to lend his name as sponsor of a recital which he later learned was under the auspices of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee. It is noted in his testimony that he said he abhorred the communist philosophy.

In the 1940's Reagan was reportedly a member of Americans for Democratic Action and the American Veterans Committee. In 1950 Dore Schary, prominent Hollywood personality, indicated he and Reagan, as well as others, had been active in the Hollywood Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences and Professions in 1945, but got out that year when communists took over. Reagan became President of the Screen Actors Guild in 1947 and was subsequently re-elected. He was extremely active in the Guild in opposing the communists.

Reagan has visited our Los Angeles Office and relations with him have been cordial. In 1960 he contacted the Bureau regarding his desires to do a television show for the "General Electric Theater," which he narrated, on the Director's pamphlet "Communist Target--Youth." This was declined. On his "General Electric Theater" series, Reagan has produced a two-part program concerning the activities of Marion Miller, a former security informant of our Los Angeles Office.

In March, 1960, we cooperated with Reagan by making inquiries here in Washington regarding Maureen Reagan, the daughter of Jane Wyman and Reagan, who was living with a married Metropolitan Police officer here in Washington [redacted]

[redacted] Our inquiries appeared to confirm this situation and information was furnished on a confidential basis to now Senator George Murphy, who originally contacted our Los Angeles Office in the matter. Maureen had, in 1959, been the subject of a favorable Departmental applicant-type investigation in connection with Immigration and Naturalization Service employment; however, the investigation was discontinued.

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It is noted that in December, 1964, we received word that the San Diego Patriotic Society (SDPS) intended to make an "American Patriot Award" to the Director for his outstanding services to the United States of America. If there was nothing in the files to prevent doing so, the SAC, San Diego, was instructed he could accept the award on behalf of the Director. The award is connected with the American Patriot Hall of Fame which is sponsored by the SDPS, a conservative group, and several other local conservative organizations. Some time in April the presentation will be made at a formal meeting attended by Ronald Reagan, John Wayne and perhaps former Senator Barry Goldwater, who has been given such an award.

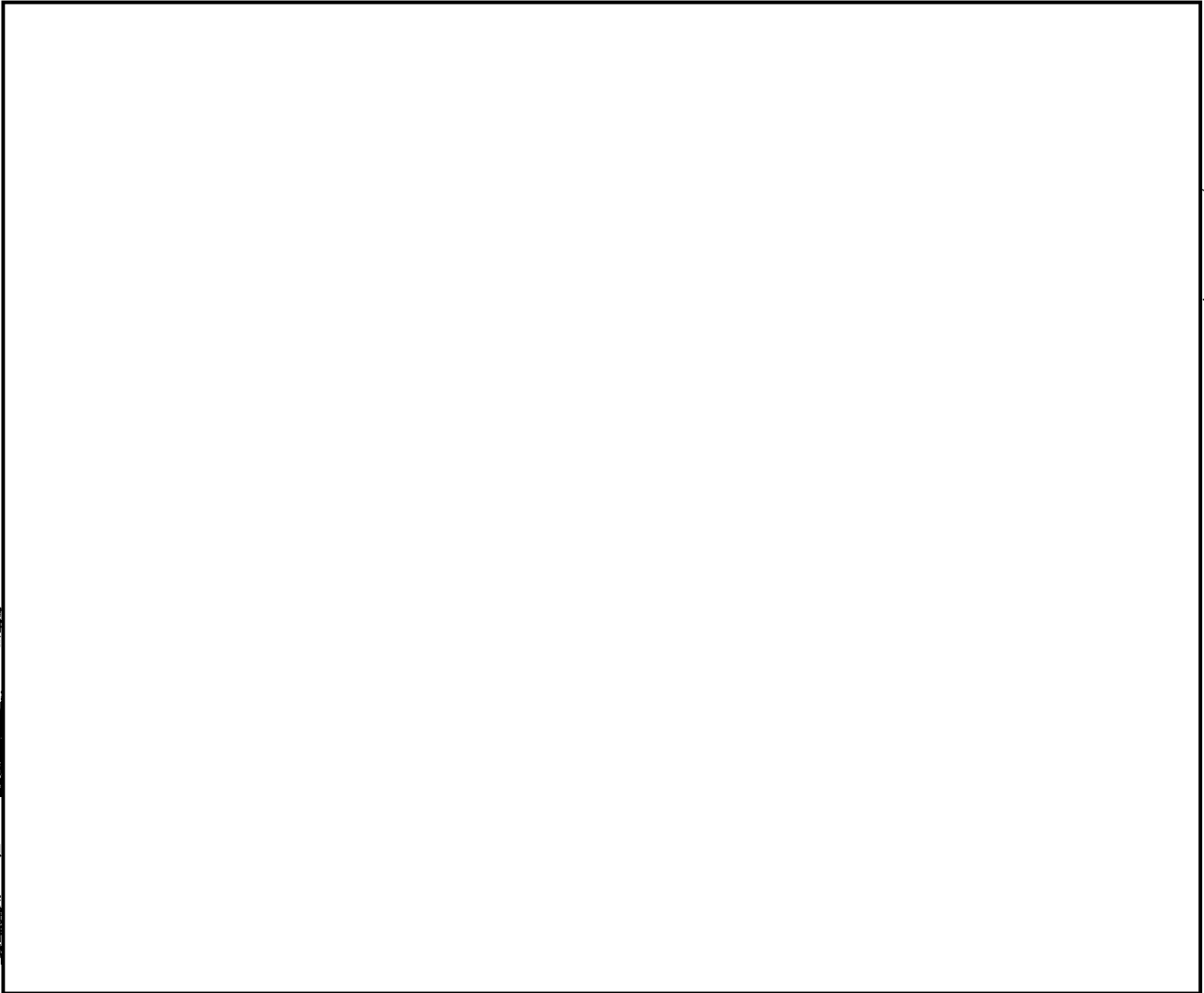

Jack Anderson, of Drew Pearson's staff, called me on 10/27/67, and stated that Pearson had called him from the West Coast to ascertain if any information could be picked up to confirm a rumor Pearson had received while on the Coast. Anderson told me that Governor Reagan had on his staff [redacted]

[redacted] recently complained that her 16-year-old son had been the subject of a homosexual attack by a member of the staff of Governor Reagan. The Governor assigned an investigator by the name of [redacted] to look into this matter. [redacted] placed a microphone in a cabin owned by [redacted]

Anderson stated that Pearson had learned that [redacted] microphone reflected homosexual activities at the above-mentioned cabin on the part of [redacted] another staff member whose name is [redacted] and a third individual whose last name is [redacted] (Anderson was unable to state whether this is [redacted] or not).

While at the cabin one of the visitors reportedly was a young FBI Agent who did not know that the three above-named individuals were homosexuals. [redacted] made a pass at the FBI Agent. The FBI Agent allegedly turned him down and left the place. Anderson wondered if the FBI had any statement to make concerning this matter. I stated we did not.

This is to advise the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) has requested a background investigation of Reagan, present Governor of California, As Governor he becomes a member of the Board of Regents of the University of California, which position has been classified "highly sensitive" by the AEC. Governor Reagan as a member of the Board of Regents will have access to highly sensitive restricted data. The Atomic Energy Act of 1954 requires the Bureau to conduct a full investigation where such access is involved.

As you will recall, the Bureau conducted a full background investigation concerning former Governor Edmund Gerald Brown in May, 1960, when he likewise became a member of the Board of Regents of the University of California.

Bureau files disclose that we have never investigated Governor Reagan; however, our files do contain numerous references to him, primarily concerning his anticommunist activities in various Hollywood, California, organizations. Reagan has spoken in various parts of the country on the evils of communism and was a friendly witness before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in October, 1947. Although he has been extremely anticommunist since the mid 1940's, he was reportedly a sponsor of the Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy, which is listed in the "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" prepared by the House Committee on Un-American Activities. He was reportedly a member of Americans for Democratic Action and American Veterans Committee in the 1940's. In 1950 it was reported he had been active in the Hollywood Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions but got out in 1945 when the communists took over.

In March, 1960, we cooperated with Governor Reagan in making inquiries here in Washington, D. C., regarding his daughter, Maureen Reagan, who had been living with a married metropolitan

Reagan Takes the Helm

Gov. Reagan charted a provocative new course for state government in his inaugural address.

There is much to applaud in the philosophy of his administration and the direction it intends to take in certain areas. Details must still be filled in, however, on many items in his program and it remains to be seen how they will, or if they can, be implemented.

Reagan devoted much of his message to the grave fiscal plight of the state, noting that a new budget held at the same level as the present one, plus "absolutely essential" property tax relief, could produce a \$750 million deficit.

★

"The time has come," the governor said, "for us to decide whether collectively we can afford anything and everything we think of simply because we think of it. The time has come to run a check and see if all the services government provides are in answer to demands, or just goodies dreamed up for our supposed betterment. The time has come to match outgo to income, instead of always doing it the other way round.

"We are going to squeeze and cut and trim until we reduce the cost of government . . . and it will involve every department of government."

That is a laudable goal. But to all practical purposes, unless new legislation is enacted, the fact is that only about one-third of the budget is controllable. That one-third covers the University of California, state colleges, institutions and governmental operating costs. And that's where danger lies.

Although the governor did not mention it in his address, he is considering a 10% cut in university and state college budgets, plus \$400 tuition for the university and \$200 for state colleges.

That drastic change could gravely imperil the quality of higher education which Californians have come to expect. It does violence to the intent of the Master Plan for Higher Education. A 10% slash on top of heavy reductions already made by the Department of Finance could play havoc with operations. Tuition ought not to be used as an expedient for budget balancing, but if it is, then some way must be found to avoid penalizing deserving students who cannot afford the increased fees.

There is a strong possibility, moreover, that such a heavy tuition might force an increased load on junior colleges and thus materially boost local tax levels. This could vitiate the "absolutely essential" property tax relief Reagan calls for.

The proposal has a popular ring, but we suggest it has not been sufficiently thought out.

★

Despite such special reservations, The Times commends the general tone of the new governor's message.

The "Creative Society" he proposes would turn away from the idea that government and those who serve in it are omnipotent. Government would lead but not rule, listen but not lecture. The emphasis will be on seeing that government does not encroach on freedom or assume power beyond that freely granted by the people.

That in itself indicates a refreshing change in administrative direction.

1,500 at Valley State Rally Against Reagan

Gov. Reagan was hanged in effigy Friday at San Fernando Valley State College, where 1,500 students rallied against the governor's proposed tuition and budget cutting plans.

A dummy labeled "Reegin" was placed near an outdoor podium shortly before the rally started, but it was quickly removed by order of State-wide College Affairs Dean Thomas H. McGrath, a scheduled speaker at the rally.

Many students wore printed cards reading, "Our position, no tuition," as they gathered to hear a series of speakers denounce Reagan's proposal to institute tuition in the heretofore free state college and university systems and to slash school budgets 10%.

Student body presidents from Cal State L.A., Long Beach State, Cal Poly, San Bernardino State, Dominguez Hills, UCLA and Pierce Junior College appeared with Valley State President John Cagle.

A student carrying the effigy of Reagan said he represented the Students for a Democratic Society, a "New Leftist" group which has a chapter on campus. Cagle said he thought it more likely that fraternity men had cons-

structed the dummy.

"We are opposed to this type of opposition," the student leader said.

As the crowd gathered, placards were seen with such slogans as "Keep Cal State Free" and "Recall Ronnie."

Officials speaking at the rally included Assemblyman Charles Warren (D-Los Angeles) head of the Democratic State Central Committee, and Mrs. Georgiana Hardy, a member of the Los Angeles Board of Education.

Warren said that if Reagan succeeds with his proposed 10% budget cuts for the 18 state colleges, he thinks the Legislature will be "compelled" to adopt tuition.

Investigation reported herein was conducted by SA MARCUS E. SHARPE on February 1, 1967.

Mrs. JANE ASHWORTH, Records Clerk, in the Office of Mr. GEORGE HEARNE, Registrar, Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois, made available a record maintained in the Registrar's Office of Eureka College, in regard to a former student named RONALD WILSON REAGAN.

Mrs. ASHWORTH stated that this was the original transcript, and that there had never been a request for a transcript for this former student to be sent to any other university or college.

Mrs. ASHWORTH made available the original transcript of records reflecting that RONALD WILSON REAGAN, of 226 Lincoln Way, Dixon, Illinois, was enrolled as a Freshman student in the Liberal Arts Courses offered by Eureka College, on September 14, 1928. There was no indication of the date of this student's birth, nor was there an indication of the names of his parents.

There was an indication on the transcript that this student had graduated in 1928 from the North Dixon High School, Dixon, Illinois, and that he ranked in the middle third in his high school graduating class of among 70 students.

The transcript reveals that he had pursued a Liberal Arts Course for four years, majoring in Economics and Sociology, and by June 7, 1932, he had accumulated 129 semester hours of Liberal Arts credit with 173 grade

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points, or a 1.37 grade point over all average for the 129 semester hours.

Mrs. ASHWORTH stated that this would be a "C+" or almost a "B-" over all four year average for his academic achievement or somewhat better than an average academic achievement.

Mrs. ASHWORTH stated that this record reveals that REAGAN was awarded an A.B. degree by Eureka College on June 7, 1932.

She stated that there is no other record at the college regarding this former student, as to activities or as to his department stating that in the absence of any indication on his transcript, that he had been placed on any academic or other probation, and she could only conclude that this former student had never been the subject of any disciplinary action whatsoever.

Mr. SAMUEL G. HARROD, JR., Attorney at Law, who has offices at 106½ East Center Street, Eureka, Illinois, advised that he has known Governor REAGAN since REAGAN entered Eureka College as a Freshman student in the Fall of 1928. He stated that he, himself was in the 8th or 9th grade, as he recalls, living across the street from the Tau Kappa Epsilon Fraternity House, when he became acquainted with REAGAN who had just moved into the "TKE" House, and lived there during the four years he attended college.

He stated that REAGAN was almost like a big brother to him, he taught him to swim, and helped him in many ways.

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Mr. HARROD stated that he had maintained close contact with Governor REAGAN ever since, mostly by correspondence. He stated that he has visited his home in California on four or five occasions, and on these occasions, met some prominent movie people who were friends of Governor REAGAN, including PAT O'BRIEN, JAMES CAGNEY, GEORGE BURNS, EDDIE ALBERT, and BURL IVES.

He stated that he has closely followed Governor REAGAN's Career in the movie industry and recently in his political career. He stated that he received a handwritten note from Governor REAGAN, wherein he was invited to visit Governor REAGAN and attend his recent inauguration.

In correspondence and personal contacts, he knows Governor REAGAN had his "hands full" for about seven years when Governor REAGAN was the president of the Screen Actor's Guild.

Mr. HARROD could only state that he felt REAGAN was fighting certain individuals in the movie industry, not only actors, but writers and directors and others involved in the movie-making industry, who were apparently known or believed by Governor REAGAN to hold sympathies for other than the best interest of our American way of life.

Mr. HARROD stated that he could only presume that Governor REAGAN was fighting what he, HARROD, presumed to be Communist infiltration of the industry.

Mr. HARROD stated that there would never be any doubt in his mind as to the sincere and complete loyalty and patriotism of Governor REAGAN to our form of Government. He stated that Governor REAGAN has always been well thought of by those who know him, and that he has always enjoyed a reputation for excellent moral character, and good associations.

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Mr. HARROD advised that he would highly recommend Governor REAGAN for a position of extreme trust and responsibility, in our Government.

Mr. HARROD concluded the interview by stating that he did want to mention that a very few months ago, a "long-haired" student from Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio, was reportedly in Eureka, attempting to learn the participation of REAGAN, then a gubernatorial candidate, in an alleged "student strike" in Eureka College in 1928.

Mr. HARROD did not see this student, but only heard of the incident, and he did not know the identity of the student. He heard that the student was apparently attempting to go to all extremes in an effort to learn something of this.

Mr. HARROD stated that he could explain this to anyone.

He then said that when Governor REAGAN first entered Eureka College as a Freshman, being then probably only 17 or 18 years old, that at the very beginning of that school term, the then college president, President BERT WILSON, issued some proclamations which were almost 100 per cent disagreed with on the part of the faculty and students.

As he recalled, there were several proclamations, but that one of these was to the effect that there would be no social functions at the college, such as dances. Another thing that President WILSON also proclaimed, that he was changing the requirements for various academic courses which, if allowed to stand, would prohibit the then juniors and seniors from completing their Liberal Arts degree requirements as to majors and minors within the planned four years and that this would mean that the present juniors and seniors would not have earned their bachelors degrees within the planned four years providing

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these changes would stand.

Mr. HARROD stated that there was then a general "student strike" This strike was against the president and his proclamations.

Mr. HARROD stated that this happened early in the Fall term of 1928, right after Governor REAGAN appeared on the campus as a Freshman student.

He recalled that all students then in this "student strike" refused to attend classes. He stated that Governor REAGAN would have participated to the extent that he was one of the students, and that there was a 100 per cent participation in the student strike, and that Governor REAGAN, as a Freshman student, would have done as the other students did.

He stated that faculty members, almost 100 per cent were against the proclamations of the then college president, and that they advised all students that they would hold classes in the homes of the faculty members, and that the students could carry on their studies in this manner.

Mr. HARROD recalls that a majority of the 24 member board of trustees of the Eureka College met or at least conferred regarding this "student strike" which was beginning to pick up national publicity. President BERT WILSON was fired .

Mr. HARROD's father, who was then the academic Dean of Eureka College, was appointed as acting president of Eureka College, and he held this position for several months until a new college president was chosen and installed several months later.

Mr. HARROD stated that there was nothing reprehensible about this on the part of any student, that there was no subversive activity involved whatsoever.

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Mr. HARROD presumes that now , as this former student has achieved a position of some political prominence, there will be those who will attempt to dig in to history to learn of any derogatory information that could possibly be found regarding him.

Mr. HARROD stated that he knows of no derogatory information regarding Governor REAGAN, and that he knows Governor REAGAN to be a most loyal American citizen.

Sheriff PAUL MEADER, Woodford County Sheriff's Office, Eureka, Illinois, advised that there is no reference to a RONALD WILSON REAGAN contained in the files of the Woodford County Sheriff's Office.

Mrs. BETTY LOHMAN, Information Clerk, Credit Bureau of Greater Peoria, which agency covers adjacent Woodford County, advised that the files of her office contain no reference to a RONALD WILSON REAGAN born on February 6, 1911, and who resided in Eureka, Illinois from 1928 to 1932.

Synopsis: Employment application reflects that RONALD WILSON REAGAN was employed by the Central Broadcasting Company, Davenport, and Des Moines, Iowa, from February 10, 1933 - May 22, 1937, as a sports announcer. Former fellow employees at Davenport, Iowa, are all favorable in their remarks regarding REAGAN. Credit and criminal at Davenport, Iowa, negative. PAUL LOYET, Vice President, Palmer Broadcasting Company, Des Moines, Iowa, advised REAGAN employed with his company from February 10, 1933, - May 22, 1937. Nothing derogatory disclosed. LOYET recommends REAGAN in all respects. Credit and Criminal checks reflect no information identifiable with REAGAN.

DETAILS:

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EMPLOYMENT

Doctor DAVID PALMER, President of Central Broadcasting Company, WOC-AM-FM-TV, 800 Brady Street, and president of Palmer College of Chiropractic, 1000 Brady Street, Davenport, Iowa, advised on January 27, 1967, that he remembers RONALD REAGAN, whom he calls "DUTCH", very well. Doctor PALMER stated that the two of them used to double date together when REAGAN was employed at the radio station in Davenport, Iowa. Doctor PALMER stated that, in fact, he gave REAGAN his first job as an announcer when he first came to Davenport, in approximately 1932, fresh out of college at Eureka, Illinois. Doctor PALMER stated that to the best of his memory RONALD REAGAN, known to his friends as "DUTCH", first came to Davenport, in approximately 1932 right after he graduated from Eureka

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College in Eureka, Illinois. He worked in Davenport as a sports announcer and then was transferred to WHO, Des Moines, Iowa, where he worked for approximately seven years. The two radio stations, WOC, in Davenport, and WHO, in Des Moines, were and still are operated by the same company. Doctor PALMER explained that when REAGAN came to Davenport, and while he worked in Davenport and in Des Moines, he was single, and consequently he and Doctor PALMER had a close social acquaintance together, in that they would often go out together and double date together.

Doctor PALMER described REAGAN as a great American, clean both morally and physically. He stated that his character and loyalty to the country were beyond reproach, and that there was nothing in his background, social habits, or financial handling of his affairs to indicate anything but a very fine person and a sincere American.

Doctor PALMER explained that the only two persons that he knows of that were working for the radio station in Davenport, when REAGAN worked there, and who are still working at the radio station, are Mr. BILL WAGNER and Miss LUCILE MAUGET. He stated that REAGAN's associates while he was in Davenport, were mostly other persons at the radio station. He does not believe that there is anyone left in the Davenport area that was associated with REAGAN while he worked at the radio station, with the exception of the above two persons. While REAGAN worked for WOC, in Davenport, he was a straight announcer. But after transferring to Des Moines, to WHO, he became a sports announcer. Doctor PALMER does not remember the exact period that REAGAN worked for the radio station, but believes he began work in about 1932 and continued for approximately ten years total, at the two radio stations.

Doctor PALMER remembers REAGAN belonging to no organizations while he was in Davenport, and knows of absolutely nothing that would reflect unfavorably upon his loyalty to the country.

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LUCILE MAUGET, Assistant Treasurer of Palmer Broadcasting Company, and secretary of Palmer College of Chiropractic, and Palmer Junior College, furnished the employment application for REAGAN reflecting the following information on January 30, 1967:

The application is titled "Application for Position, Central Broadcasting Company - Station WHO, Index number 480-07-7456, dated February 9, 1933." It is in the name of RONALD WILSON REAGAN, 400 Center Street, (no city or state given), date of birth February 6, 1911, at Tampico, Illinois. The application states that REAGAN resided in Des Moines, Iowa, for four years and in the state of Iowa for four years. His religious affiliation was the Christian church, and his fraternity, TAU KAPPA EPSILON. REAGAN is listed as single with no dependents, six foot 3/4 inch, 170 pounds, brown hair, green eyes. He is listed as owning his car, and having completed grade school, high school, and received an A. B. in Economics and Sociology at Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois. No other employers are listed and no references are given.

The application further reflects that REAGAN began employment for the Central Broadcasting Company on February 10, 1933, and terminated employment on May 22, 1937. His starting salary was \$100.00 per month, as of February 10, 1933, and was making \$325.00 per month as of March 1, 1936, and when he terminated employment. He was employed with the company in the program department as a sports announcer.

Miss MAUGET explained that at this time, when REAGAN was working for the Central Broadcasting Company, she was the company's cashier. The company was owned and operated at that time by Palmer College.

Miss MAUGET explained that no permanent employment records were kept for the company prior to 1932, and consequently she does not know for sure if the period February 9, 1933 to May 22, 1937, covers the entire period that RONALD REAGAN worked for the Central Broadcasting Company, or just the period that he worked for WHO in Des Moines, Iowa. She stated that while RONALD REAGAN worked for the company his brother, J. NEIL REAGAN, also worked for the Central Broadcasting Company from 1934, through 1940, as a radio announcer. When RONALD REAGAN

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first came to Davenport, and began employment with the Central Broadcasting Company, he had just completed his schooling at Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois. She remembers RONALD REAGAN quite well, and remembers that everyone at the station called him "DUTCH". She stated that she does not remember him working for the radio station, WOC, in Davenport, very long. He was a good worker, and must have been a very good announcer, or he would have not been transferred to the Des Moines, radio station, which was the larger of the two stations at that time. While he was in Davenport, he associated mostly with the other persons at the radio station. Miss MAUGET explained that there was a small crowd at WOC at that time, and everyone was very close and usually ran around together. She described REAGAN as an all-American boy type, very clean cut, and from a very good middle class family in Illinois. She stated that he always impressed her as being extremely honest and outward in his thoughts and actions. His character and loyalty to the country are unquestionable in her opinion. She stated that he never gave her or anyone else that she knows of any reason at all to question his loyalty to the country, while he worked for WOC in Davenport. She knows of no organizations that he belonged to while in Davenport, except for his college fraternity. He was very interested in sports, and as far as she knows, dated no one in particular while he was in Davenport. Miss MAUGET stated that she could think of absolutely nothing detrimental to say about RONALD REAGAN in any respect. She described him as a wonderful person and a fine American.

To the best of Miss MAUGET's knowledge, BILL WAGNER, who was auditor for the Central Broadcasting Company at the time RONALD REAGAN worked for the company, and Doctor DAVID PALMER, are the only persons in Davenport, outside of herself, who were employed at the radio station at the time REAGAN was employed. She stated that in addition to herself these two persons would probably be the only people in the area who would know or remember him. Miss MAUGET remembers that while REAGAN worked for WOC in Davenport, he lived at the Perry Street apartments, now known as the Vale apartments, Fourth and Perry Street, Davenport, Iowa. She remembers that he used to kid a lot about the apartments, about the maid service, and about how the beds would fold out of the wall. She stated that

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in fact he would joke and kid a lot with everyone about everything, and always seemed to be in very high spirits and full of life. She stated that he did have a roommate with him in the Perry Street apartment, but she has no idea who that was.

Miss MAUGET explained that after working for Central Broadcasting Company in Des Moines, for awhile, he was sent out to California, to cover the Chicago Cubs in spring training for the station. While out there, a girl from Des Moines, he knew who was in the movies got him a screen test for the movie studios. He passed it, and this ended his announcing career. Miss MAUGET did not know the name of the girl in the movies who got him this screen test.

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Mr. WILLIAM D. WAGNER, Vice President and Secretary of Palmer Broadcasting Company, 800 Brady Street, Davenport, Iowa, advised on January 30, 1967, that he remembers RONALD WILSON REAGAN, very well when he worked for the Central Broadcasting Company in Davenport, and Des Moines, Iowa. Mr. WAGNER explained that he was auditor of the company at that time, and used to go out with REAGAN whom he called "DUTCH", after the night's work was finished. To the best of Mr. WAGNER's memory, REAGAN began work for the Central Broadcasting Company in Davenport, Iowa, in approximately 1932 or 1933, and left the employment in approximately 1936 or 1937. Mr. WAGNER explained that the Central Broadcasting Company was founded in 1929, and bought WOC in Davenport, and WHO in Des Moines. While the station was known as WHO-WOC, "DUTCH" REAGAN was employed in Davenport as a sports announcer. Then all the studio operations for the radio station were transferred to the Des Moines, Iowa, station, in May, 1933. At that time, REAGAN was also transferred to Des Moines, and became the sports announcer for the station. All operations closed up in Davenport, except for the accounting office. Mr. WAGNER stated that REAGAN worked in Davenport for the Central Broadcasting Company for less than a year. He was single the entire time he worked for Central Broadcasting Company in both Davenport and Des Moines, Iowa.

Mr. WAGNER described REAGAN as a very capable sports announcer, and pointed out that his brother, J. NEIL REAGAN, also worked for the station during the approximate same period. When RONALD REAGAN left the employment of the station, in approximately 1936, or 1937, he went to California, and entered the movies.

Mr. WAGNER described REAGAN as a very eager young man in his work, and was fresh out of Eureka College, when he first began work for the station in Davenport, Iowa. He knows of absolutely nothing derogatory about REAGAN, and stated that his character and loyalty to this country were beyond reproach and unquestionable. Mr. WAGNER pointed out that REAGAN's brother, J. NEIL, first went to work to put RONALD REAGAN through college, and then RONALD went to work to put his brother through college. He stated that they were close family from around Dixon, Illinois. Both RONALD and his brother graduated from Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois. During the entire time that REAGAN worked for the

Central Broadcasting Company, Mr. WAGNER stated that he did not say anything that would reflect unfavorably upon his character or his loyalty to his country.

REAGAN's close associates and friends were other person at the radio station. He was a very personable and well liked young man and consequently had no trouble in making friends with the other employees at the station. Mr. WAGNER knows of no organization that REAGAN belonged to while he worked for the company with the exception of the National Guard or Army Reserve. Mr. WAGNER believed that REAGAN was a member of either the National Guard or the Army Reserve, while he was employed with the station in Des Moines, Iowa.

Mr. WAGNER explained that in approximately 1936 or 1937, REAGAN went out to California to watch and cover the Chicago Cubs in spring training. While out there, some friends of REAGAN's who were in the movies, prevailed upon him to take a screen test. He did and passed the screen test, and this ended his announcing career.

EMPLOYMENT

Mr. PAUL LOYET, Vice President of Palmer Broadcasting Company with offices at WHO Radio, 1100 Walnut Street, Des Moines, Iowa, advised the employment files of WHO regarding RONALD WILSON REAGAN reflect the following information:

REAGAN began employment with WHO Radio of Des Moines, Iowa, as a sport's announcer on February 10, 1933, and ended employment March 22, 1937, to accept a job with Warner Brothers. REAGAN's employment application dated February 9, 1933, revealed he was born February 6, 1911, and his permanent address was listed as 400 Center Street, Des Moines, Iowa. His employment record disclosed nothing derogatory.

Mr. PAUL LOYET, advised he knew REAGAN well when REAGAN was in the employ of WHO. He said the people who worked with REAGAN usually referred to him by the nickname "DUTCH".

LOYET stated, if his memory serves him correctly, REAGAN unofficially began his broadcasting career in 1929 or 1930 with station WOC in Davenport, Iowa. He said WOC is also a subsidiary of Palmer Broadcasting Company. LOYET stated reference is made to this on page 50 of the book, Where's the Rest of Me? The RONALD REAGAN Story, written by RICHARD C. HUBLER.

LOYET stated he knew REAGAN to be a man of the highest integrity, and he knew of no reason why REAGAN's character, loyalty, associates, or reputation, should be questioned. He said he knows of no subversive type activities in which REAGAN was a participant or of any organization of this nature of which he was a member.

Mr. LOYET was contacted on January 31, 1967.

DETAILS:

The following investigation was conducted by
SA JOHN J. SHERIDAN, on January 21, 1967:

Education

SHELDON BRCESS, Principal, Dixon High School, Dixon, Illinois, made available the record of the applicant. This record revealed the applicant was born on February 6, 1911, and listed his father as J. E. REAGAN. The applicant attended this school from September 1924, to June 1, 1928, at which time he graduated. Applicant took a college entrance course and his grades were average or above average. Mr. BRCESS advised this record contained no unfavorable information concerning the applicant.

MARVIN WINGER, Assistant Principal, Dixon High School, advised he recalled the applicant and described him as a good student. He stated REAGAN had good habits, good morals and a good reputation. WINGER advised he had no reason to question the loyalty of the applicant. WINGER advised that the applicant's mother had an excellent reputation, however, his father was known to do "a little drinking." WINGER advised he did not have first-hand knowledge of this fact and this came to his attention through rumor.

LUCILLE GORHAM, bookkeeper, Massey Hardware Store, Dixon, Illinois, advised she was a former teacher at the high school and was acquainted with the applicant and his family at the time he attended the high school. She stated the applicant had good habits and an excellent reputation.

GORHAM stated the applicant had very reputable associates and came from a very good family. She stated the applicant's mother sang in the choir at the church, however, his father was known as a social drinker. GORHAM advised she would recommend the applicant very highly for a position of trust, since she had no reason to question his loyalty.

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Employment

JACK KEEGAN, President, Park Board, City of Dixon, Illinois, advised that he had no records available, however, recalled that the applicant worked as a lifeguard at Lowell Park in Dixon for about three or four summers while he was attending high school and college. KEEGAN described the applicant as honest, possessing a good reputation, and he had no reason to doubt his loyalty to the United States. KEEGAN advised he would recommend the applicant highly for a position of trust.

CURT RICE, Bailiff, Circuit Court, Dixon, Illinois, advised he recalled the applicant and his family. He stated he recalled the applicant working as a lifeguard at Lowell Park in the summer during the time the applicant was attending high school and college. RICE advised the REAGAN family had an excellent reputation in Dixon, and he would recommend the applicant highly for any position of trust. He stated the applicant always had good associates.

Credit and Arrest

Mrs. DORIS ARNOLD, Clerk, Lee County Credit Bureau, Dixon, Illinois, advised that her records contained no unfavorable information concerning the applicant. She stated her records revealed the applicant's father to be JOHN E. REAGAN and his mother as NELLIE REAGAN. She stated the family had an excellent credit rating, and there was no unfavorable information in her files concerning the REAGAN family.

JOHN QUERT, Chief Deputy, Lee County Sheriff's Office, Dixon, Illinois, advised that the records of his department contained no information concerning the REAGAN family.

EARL KELCHNER, Chief of Police, Dixon, Illinois, advised his department had no record for the REAGAN family. KELCHNER advised he recalled the family personally and they had an excellent reputation in Dixon. KELCHNER advised the applicant's father had an occasional social drink, however, his department never had any trouble with any of the members of the REAGAN family.

Synopsis: Employments verified at Los Angeles. REAGAN employed Warner Brothers Pictures from 5/24/37 until 4/18/42 when he entered military service. Returned from military service 9/12/45 and returned to Warner Brothers. Contract with Warner Brothers terminated in April, 1949; however, REAGAN remained with studio until 3/15/52. Services satisfactory at Warner Brothers. Warner Brothers officials describe REAGAN as a man whose reputation and character are above reproach. They recommended him highly. Officials of Batten, Barton, Durstine, and Osborne (BBDO), Inc., Los Angeles, state REAGAN employed through BBDO for General Electric Company which sponsored the television program "The General Electric Theatre." Officials recommend REAGAN highly as a man of excellent character and reputation and state that he was very successful in the performance of his duties in connection with the program for "The General Electric Theatre." REAGAN employed Universal City Studios, Universal City, California, from 6/26/60 through 6/26/62 and from 1/10/63 through 5/24/64. Universal officials describe REAGAN as a very high-type person and a man of honesty and integrity and a loyal American citizen. From 10/1/64 through 9/30/66 REAGAN associated with Borax Corporation, Los Angeles. He was employed as master of ceremonies for the Borax Corporation, "Death Valley Days," and acted in some of the shows. He also traveled and made personal appearances on behalf of Borax Corporation. He performed in a most satisfactory

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No other details are available concerning this information. There is no documentation available for the John Birch Society.

Los Angeles file 100-23402-24 is the report of SA LEONARD AUGUSTSON dated April 30, 1946, at Los Angeles entitled, "JOE LOSEY, was, IS-R." On page three of this report, information is set forth which reflects that one MADELINE BURROUGHS on March 26, 1946, contacted LOUISE LOSEY, wife of JOE LOSEY, relative to raising campaign funds for her husband, RUBEN BURROUGHS, who is running for Congress in the 20th District. MADELINE BURROUGHS gave LOUISE LOSEY a list of names of individuals to call in connection with raising campaign funds. One of the names given was RONALD REAGEN.

This report also indicates that RUBEN BURROUGHS' wife is the former MADELINE RUTHLEN, well-known communist.

The information mentioned above concerning RONALD REAGEN is not being set out in the details of instant report because it is nebulous and not considered pertinent.

Co-employees at Borax Corporation consider REAGAN to be a dedicated loyal American whose reputation and character are above reproach. They all recommend him highly for any position of trust and confidence. Reference recommends REAGAN as a man of excellent character, associates, and a dedicated and loyal American. Credit records at Los Angeles satisfactory; however, indicate a Federal tax lien dated 11/1/57, at Beverly Hills, California, for REAGAN and his wife in the amount of \$24,911.00. Arrest records negative for applicant and his family. Superior Court records, Los Angeles, indicate applicant divorced 7/18/49, from JANE WYMAN REAGAN. REAGAN mentioned in "Daily People's World" issue of 12/4/45, in that he would appear in a dramatic play. One RONALD REAGAN included in the program and on the dinner committee of a dinner given by the Hollywood Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions on 12/10/45. One RONALD REAGAN mentioned as on the sponsoring committee of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee in September, 1947. RONALD REAGAN testified 10/23/47, before the House Committee on Un-American Activities concerning any sponsorship by him of any function of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee. Testimony set forth. In 1951, newspaper article reflects RONALD REAGAN, one of three spokesmen who told how Hollywood Anti-Communist organizations "in 1946 beat the Reds at their own game." "Los Angeles Times," 6/10/57, reflects RONALD REAGAN received honorary degree by his alma mater, Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois, for his understanding and courage in recognizing and exposing Communists and their influence during his term as President of the Screen Actors Guild. REAGAN, in 1946, mentioned as sponsor and director of the Los Angeles Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy. Also, in 1946, described as member of the American Veterans Committee. The "Daily People's World," 9/7/46, reflects RONALD REAGAN to star in a series produced in cooperation with Hollywood Writers Mobilization.

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DETAILS:

The following investigation was conducted by

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EMPLOYMENT

Warner Brothers Pictures, Inc.
4000 Warner Boulevard
Burbank, California

On January 25, 1967, and January 26, 1967, Mr. WALTER GLOVER, Director of Plant Security, Warner Brothers Pictures, Inc., advised he had caused a search to be made of the records of this studio for the history of the applicant's employment by Warner Brothers and had determined the applicant initially was employed by this studio as an actor effective May 24, 1937. The applicant remained with the studio until April 18, 1942, when he entered military service. He returned from military service on September 12, 1945, and returned to the studio. His exclusive service contract with this studio terminated in April, 1949, but the applicant remained with the studio until March 15, 1952, under contract to perform in several motion pictures.

Mr. GLOVER said employment records indicate that in 1937 the applicant resided at 1326 Londonderry View, Hollywood, California. His date and place of birth are shown as February 6, 1911, Tampico, Illinois. His father is listed as JOHN EDWARD REAGAN and his mother as NELL REAGAN. His parents' address in 1937 was shown as 9031 Phyllis Avenue, Los Angeles, California. He also listed a brother, NEIL REAGAN, of the same address as his parents and noted that the brother was employed by Warner Brothers. The applicant's wife is listed as JANE WYMAN.

According to Mr. GLOVER, the employment records further noted that the applicant graduated from college (name not indicated) in 1932 and that from February, 1933, until June, 1937, the applicant was employed as a Sports Announcer by the Central Broadcasting Company, Des Moines, Iowa. The applicant also noted he was a Second Lieutenant in the U. S. Cavalry Reserve. The records contained nothing unfavorable concerning the applicant and contained no additional pertinent information.

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Mr. GLOVER said that he personally knew the applicant during the time the applicant was under contract with this studio. The applicant's mother, NELL, also was well known at the studio because for many years she ran the applicant's office at Warner Brothers and handled the applicant's fan mail. Mr. GLOVER said he did not recall applicant's brother, NEIL, although the records indicated he was an employee of Warner Brothers in 1937.

Mr. GLOVER said he had never heard anything unfavorable concerning the applicant. He said the applicant always had the reputation as being a patriotic, loyal American citizen which was exemplified by his membership in the U. S. Cavalry Reserve many years prior to World War II. He added that the applicant's character has always been above reproach and that to Mr. GLOVER's knowledge, he has always associated with reputable individuals. Mr. GLOVER knew of no organizations to which the applicant belonged other than motion picture groups, noting that the applicant was President of the Screen Actors Guild for many years.

Mr. JACK L. WARNER, Chairman of the Board of Directors, Warner Brothers Pictures, Inc., advised on January 25, 1967, that he first heard of the applicant in 1937 when the applicant was a Sports Announcer in Des Moines, Iowa. He invited the applicant to Hollywood, California; was impressed with the applicant; and entered into a contract with the applicant under which the applicant was to act in motion pictures produced by this studio. He said the applicant remained with the studio until World War II when the applicant entered military service. Mr. WARNER said his recollection of the contractual relationship the applicant had with the studio following the war years is hazy, but he recalled that the applicant performed in several motion pictures produced by this studio until about 1950.

Mr. WARNER said that in addition to knowing the applicant as an actor at Warner Brothers Studio that he developed a fairly close personal relationship with the applicant which has continued to the present date. Over the years they frequently have visited in each others homes.

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Mr. WARNER said that for many years the applicant was President of the Screen Actors Guild. He had the reputation for being a fair, responsible individual who had the respect of both motion picture actors and motion picture producers.

Mr. WARNER volunteered that he knew the applicant's former wife, JANE WYMAN, who also formerly was under contract as a motion picture actress at Warner Brothers Studios and he knows the applicant's present wife, NANCY. He said the applicant has always been known as a perfect gentleman and that he lived an open, clean life that would withstand any scrutiny..

Mr. WARNER volunteered that he did not know what goes on behind the closed doors in any man's home, but he could state that he had never heard any gossip concerning the applicant. He added that the applicant is a loyal American citizen of excellent character who associated with people of good reputation. Mr. WARNER said he would highly recommend the applicant for any position of trust and confidence.

Mr. MERVYN LEROY, Producer-Director, Warner Brothers Picture, Inc., advised on January 25, 1967, that he has been acquainted with the applicant since the applicant commenced his career as a motion picture actor. He said he had always held great personal esteem for the applicant and for the applicant's wife, NANCY, and has always identified himself as the "matchmaker" in introducing the applicant to NANCY REAGAN.

Mr. MERVYN LEROY said the applicant has always had the reputation as being a dedicated, loyal American citizen who keenly felt the responsibilities of citizenship. He said the applicant's character was above reproach and the applicant associated only with reputable individuals. Mr. LEROY said he would highly recommend the applicant for any position.

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Mr. WILLIAM SCHAEFFER, Executive Assistant to Mr. J. L. WARNER, Warner Brothers Pictures, Inc., advised on January 25, 1967, that he has known the applicant since 1937 when the applicant originally signed a contract to act in motion pictures for this studio and had a fairly close relationship with the applicant until the time the applicant entered military service in about 1942. Mr. SCHAEFFER said that since World War II his duties did not require a close relationship with actors, and he has had only limited knowledge of the applicant since that time. Mr. SCHAEFFER said he knows the applicant is a loyal American citizen who would sacrifice his life for his country. He said he considers the applicant's reputation and character to be above reproach, and he believes that the applicant associated only with reputable individuals.

Batten, Barton, Durstine and
Osborne (BBDO), Inc.
Advertising Agency
Los Angeles, California

Mr. W. M. STARKEY, Manager, Los Angeles Office, BBDO, advised on January 26, 1967, that the contract Mr. REAGAN had with this company was handled by the company's New York City office; that the local office had no record and no information concerning the contract; and that personnel of the local office did not work with Mr. REAGAN in connection with his duties under the contract. Mr. STARKEY added that Mr. JAMES R. SCHULE, Executive Vice President, BBDO, New York City, was currently in Los Angeles on business and would be in a position to furnish information concerning Mr. REAGAN's association with BBDO.

Mr. JAMES R. SCHULE, Executive Vice President, BBDO, New York City, was interviewed on January 26, 1967, at the Los Angeles Office of BBDO. Mr. SCHULE advised that Mr. REAGAN was hired through the New York Office of this company in about 1952. BBDO held a contract with the General Electric Company under which the General Electric Company sponsored a television program entitled,

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"The General Electric Theatre." The applicant was employed to be the program supervisor for this program; to perform as master of ceremonies for all of the shows; and to act in some of the shows. Mr. REAGAN was engaged under the contract to make personal appearances in various cities, principally those cities in which General Electric Company plants were located, and to give talks in these cities.

Mr. SCHULE said the applicant was very successful in the performance of his duties under this contract. He believed Mr. REAGAN's political ambitions probably were developed during this period of appearing and talking before the American public.

Mr. SCHULE said Mr. REAGAN's services were terminated when the General Electric Company decided to cancel "The General Electric Theatre" and to advertise in a different form. Mr. SCHULE said he did not recall the date Mr. REAGAN's contract with BBDO terminated. He suggested that Mr. RAY MC GOVERN, Vice President, BBDO, New York City, would be in a position to provide an official record of the applicant's association with BBDO. Mr. SCHULE added that "The General Electric Theatre" was filmed at Universal City Studios, Universal City, California, and that Mr. REAGAN's contract was handled through Mr. TAFT B. SCHREIBER of the Music Corporation of America (MCA). He suggested that Mr. SCHREIBER probably would have direct knowledge of Mr. REAGAN's association with BBDO.

Mr. SCHULE said he knew that Mr. REAGAN was a loyal, American citizen whose complete life was an open book. He said he knew the applicant's character and reputation were above reproach. He said he had never heard anything unfavorable concerning any of the applicant's associates.

Mr. TAFT B. SCHREIBER, President, Universal Television, Universal City, California, advised on January 26, 1967, that the Music Corporation of America (MCA) is the parent corporation of Universal City Studios and Universal Television. He said he was Vice President

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of MCA and in that position handled Mr. REAGAN's contract with BBDO for about eight years under which contract Mr. REAGAN was program supervisor for "The General Electric Theatre." He said this television series was filmed at Universal City Studios, Universal City, California.

Mr. SCHREIBER said he has known Mr. REAGAN for the past twenty-nine or thirty years; has been involved with the applicant from 1938 to the present; and was active in Mr. REAGAN's political campaign for the position of Governor of the State of California.

Mr. SCHREIBER said that Mr. REAGAN has been conscious about government all his life and has had a continuing concern about the responsibility of individuals in society. As program supervisor for "The General Electric Theatre," Mr. REAGAN spoke in many cities in America on subject matters of his choice. In these speeches he began to talk about that which concerned him - the responsibility of government and the responsibility of the individual - and this evolved into Mr. REAGAN's present, deep political concern.

Mr. SCHREIBER said the applicant has a deep sense of moral responsibility to his country; that his character is above reproach; and that he has only the finest associates. He said Mr. REAGAN is eminently qualified for any position of trust and confidence.

Universal City Studios, Inc.
Universal City, California

Miss KATHRYN MC TAGGART, Head of Legal Files, Universal City Studios, advised on January 25, 1967, the records of this company indicate that effective January 4, 1955, an agreement was entered into between RONALD REAGAN and BBDO on behalf of BBDO's client the General Electric Company in which Mr. REAGAN was engaged for 39 telecasts. The contract included four consecutive options for 52 weeks (39 telecasts each 52 weeks). The original contract was scheduled for termination on June 27, 1954.

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On April 21, 1955, the original agreement was renewed for 52 weeks commencing June 26, 1955, and ending June 23, 1956. The agreement was renewed on April 9, 1956, for 52 weeks commencing June 24, 1956, and ending June 16, 1957. Miss MC TAGGART said she could not locate an agreement for the year commencing in June, 1957, but apparently an agreement was renewed for that year. She added that the agreement was renewed on June 10, 1958, for 52 weeks commencing June 29, 1958, and ending June 21, 1959.

On June 26, 1960, a loanout agreement was made with BBDO regarding RONALD REAGAN in "The General Electric Theater" television series for the 1960-1961 series consisting of 52 weeks commencing June 26, 1960. This agreement was extended for 13 weeks commencing June 24, 1962, and ending September 27, 1962.

On May 25, 1960, an employment contract was made between Revue Studios (now consolidated into Universal City Studios) and Mr. REAGAN with employment to commence June 26, 1960.

Under the terms of this contract, Mr. REAGAN exercised an option effective on June 26, 1961, for a second contract year. A third year option was not exercised.

On January 10, 1963, an additional employment agreement was made between Revue Studios and RONALD REAGAN under which employment was to commence on February 4, 1963, for 65 weeks to expire on May 3, 1964. This term was extended to May 24, 1964.

Miss MC TAGGART said Mr. REAGAN also made some pictures for Universal quite a long time ago but the files for the contracts under which Mr. REAGAN's employment as an actor was obtained could not be located. Miss MC TAGGART added that the files contained no derogatory information concerning the applicant.

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Mr. JAMES P. NYE, Director of Plant Security, Universal City Studios, Inc., advised that he knew the applicant since about 1960 when the applicant was making "The General Electric Theater" at Universal and when the applicant was under contract with Revue Studios and was making motion pictures on the Universal lot. He said he had never heard anything unfavorable concerning the applicant and believed that his reputation and character were above reproach. Mr. NYE said he knew the applicant was a member of the Screen Actors Guild and formerly was President of the guild. He had never heard anything unfavorable concerning any of Mr. REAGAN's associates. He said Mr. REAGAN is unquestionably one of America's leading patriots and that Mr. REAGAN was well qualified for any position of trust and confidence.

Mr. LESLIE LAVERGNE, Director of Insurance, Universal City Studios, Inc., advised that he formerly held this same position at Warner Brothers Pictures, Inc., and has known the applicant personally since 1937. Mr. LAVERGNE said he has known the applicant both professionally and socially. LAVERGNE volunteered that Mr. REAGAN currently is considering him for appointment to the position of Chief of Industrial Relations (Safety) for the State of California.

Mr. LAVERGNE said that he knows Mr. REAGAN's former wife, JANE WYMAN, and Mr. REAGAN's present wife, NANCY. He volunteered that he did not know the circumstances which brought about the divorce between the applicant and JANE WYMAN. However, he said there was never any rumor or gossip connected with this divorce to his knowledge.

Mr. LAVERGNE said the applicant is a very fine man and that he has never heard "a bad word" concerning him. Mr. LAVERGNE said he has always been impressed by Mr. REAGAN because he was such a "very high-type person." Mr. LAVERGNE said he has such confidence and trust in Mr. REAGAN that he would "trust him with my life."

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Mr. LAVERGNE said Mr. REAGAN always enjoyed a most enviable reputation for honesty and integrity, that he possessed an excellent character, and that he associated only with responsible people. He added that Mr. REAGAN is one of the most patriotic, loyal American citizens he knows and that Mr. REAGAN was qualified for any position involving trust and confidence.

Mr. EDWARD MUHL, Vice President in Charge of Production, Universal City Studios, Inc., advised that he did not know the applicant personally but generally knew of the applicant's history as an actor and was aware that the applicant had worked at this studio in connection with the television series called, "The General Electric Theater," and as an actor in motion pictures. Mr. MUHL said the applicant has a reputation for sincerity and for being deeply patriotic. He said he had never heard anything unfavorable concerning the applicant's character. He knew that the applicant was a member of the Screen Actors Guild and was President of this guild for several years. He knew nothing additional concerning the applicant's associates or associations.

Mr. ROY F. FROST, Director of Personnel, United States Borax and Chemical Corporation (Borax Corporation), Los Angeles, advised on January 31, 1967, that the applicant was employed by this company to be the master of ceremonies for the Borax television program, "Death Valley Days," and to act in some of the shows in the series. Mr. FROST said he had no personal knowledge of the applicant. He added that all information concerning the applicant's relationship with this company was handled through the Division of Marketing.

Mr. JACK F. KERR, Director of Marketing, Borax Corporation, advised on January 31, 1967, that this company's contract with the applicant was handled under his supervision.

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He said records indicate the applicant signed a contract with this company dated July 27, 1964, to be effective for the period of October 1, 1964, through September 30, 1965. The applicant picked up an option on the original contract to remain with the company's television series and signed an additional contract in May, 1965, to run for the period of October 1, 1965, through September 30, 1966.

Mr. KERR said that under the contract the applicant was to act as master of ceremonies for the Borax television series "Death Valley Days" and to act in some of the shows. Additionally, Mr. REAGAN traveled and made personal appearances on behalf of the company and spoke in various cities in the United States.

Mr. KERR said the applicant completed all of his various assignments in a most satisfactory manner and he was considered a tremendous asset to the company. Mr. KERR said he accompanied the applicant during some phases of the applicant's travel and also has met the applicant's wife although his association with the applicant primarily has been a business relationship only. Mr. KERR considers the applicant to be the most outstanding man of his acquaintance. He considers the applicant to be a dedicated, loyal American citizen whose reputation and character are above reproach. Mr. KERR has no knowledge of the applicant's personal associates or his associations but has never heard anything except favorable comments concerning the applicant.

Mr. KERR said that Mr. DAVID PARKER, Vice President, Marketing, Borax Corporation, had some association with the applicant during the time the applicant was under contract with the Borax Corporation. He also suggested that Mr. ROBERT STABLER, President, Madison Productions, who produced the television series "Death Valley Days" might be in a position to comment concerning the applicant's employment with the Borax Corporation.

Mr. DAVID PARKER, Vice President, Marketing, Borax Corporation, Los Angeles, advised on February 1, 1967, that this company has a contract with the advertising

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agency of McCann-Erickson, Los Angeles, where the applicant's brother, NEIL REAGAN, has been employed as an account executive for many years. In 1964, the Borax Corporation was searching for a moderator for its television series "Death Valley Days" and PARKER requested that NEIL REAGAN contact the applicant to determine if he would be interested in the assignment. The applicant's services were obtained in this manner.

Mr. PARKER said he has had some limited social relationship with the applicant and has met the applicant's wife. He has entertained the applicant in his home and has played golf with him. Mr. PARKER said the applicant is an excellent man who has always had a very favorable reputation. He said the applicant seemed to enjoy his assignment with the Borax Corporation and was considered an asset to this company.

Mr. PARKER said the associates of the applicant, to his knowledge, are all excellent people. He said the applicant is unquestionably a loyal American citizen and that the applicant could handle any position of trust and confidence.

Mr. PARKER said the applicant's brother, NEIL, has been in the advertising business for many years and is very well regarded in the business community in Los Angeles. He said NEIL REAGAN has just been named "Advertising Man of the Year" and is being feted by the advertising community in Los Angeles in the near future.

Mr. ROBERT STABLER, President, Madison Productions, 1022 North Palm Avenue, Hollywood, California, advised on January 31, 1967, that he produced the television series "Death Valley Days" for the Borax Corporation and was associated with the applicant for two television seasons in connection with the applicant's duties on this show. Mr. STABLER said the applicant functioned as host-narrator for all the shows and acted in a leading role in eight of the shows.

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Mr. STABLER had no personal knowledge of the applicant prior to the applicant's contract with the Borax Corporation, but came to know the applicant fairly well as a result of their relationship in filming the series. The show primarily was filmed on location and the applicant and Mr. STABLER spent considerable time together.

Mr. STABLER said he found the applicant to be a man of great integrity and sincerity with a very deep interest and concern about the welfare of the country and the people in the country. He considers the applicant to be absolutely reliable with a reputation and character beyond reproach. He believes the applicant to be an outstanding patriot who is devoted to the principles of this country.

Mr. STABLER said he had no knowledge of the applicant's associates or associations but had never heard anything but favorable comments concerning the applicant or his associates. He highly recommends the applicant for any position of trust and confidence.

REFERENCE

On February 1, 1967, Mr. HOLMES TUTTLE, 637 South Hudson, Los Angeles, California, was interviewed by SA JOHN W. WHALEY at his place of business located at 145 North La Brea, Los Angeles, California. He stated that he has known RONALD REAGAN since 1946. He said that he knows REAGAN to be a man of excellent character, integrity, and associates. He said that Mr. REAGAN was an "Horatio Alger" type of man who had worked his way up the ladder of success primarily through his own initiative and perseverance. Mr. TUTTLE pointed out that REAGAN was a fine dedicated American whose loyalty to the United States Government could not be questioned. He said that REAGAN was also a fine family man who was clean living and a man of good habits. He said that he would recommend him without reservation for any position of trust and confidence. He said that he had never ever heard anything unfavorable concerning RONALD REAGAN.

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CREDIT AND ARREST

On January 25, 1967, the records of the Retail Merchants Credit Association, Los Angeles, California, were caused to be searched by IC BERNARD P. BLAIS. These records reflect a satisfactory credit rating for the applicant and his wife but indicate that a Federal tax lien was filed against REAGAN and his wife at Beverly Hills, California, on November 1, 1957, in the amount of \$24,911.00.

Records of the Los Angeles Police Department and Los Angeles County Sheriff's Office, Los Angeles, California, were caused to be searched on January 25, 1967, by IC MILLARD T. ANDERSON and contained no record for the applicant; his wife; brother, NEIL REAGAN; and his ex-wife, JANE WYMAN; or his children.

Records of the Beverly Hills Police Department, Beverly Hills, California, which were caused to be searched on January 24, 1967, by SA WILLIAM D. COSTIGAN contain no pertinent information concerning RONALD REAGAN, NANCY DAVIS REAGAN, or JANE WYMAN.

Records of the San Fernando, California, Police Department, which were caused to be searched on January 27, 1967, by SA ALAN W. MURDOCK contain no information concerning MICHAEL EDWARD REAGAN.

Records of the Burbank, California, Police Department, which were caused to be searched on January 31, 1967, by SA L. ROGER BRANDON were negative for RONALD WILSON REAGAN.

Records of the Orange County Sheriff's Office, Santa Ana, California, the Anaheim, California, Police Department, and the Orange, California, Police Department, which were caused to be searched on January 24, 1967, by SA RAYMOND R. RIEHLE, Jr., contain no information concerning the applicant's daughter and son-in-law, DAVID S. and MAUREEN SILLS.

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Records of the North Orange County Credit Bureau located at Anaheim, California, indicate that DAVID S. and MAUREEN SILLS reside at 134 South Magnolia, Apartment 6C, Anaheim, California, and have a satisfactory credit rating.

MISCELLANEOUS

Records of the Los Angeles Superior Court, which were caused to be searched on January 25, 1967, by SE GAREY D. POWELL reflect the following information, under Docket No. D360058:

Complaint for Divorce was filed May 6, 1948, between JANE WYMAN REAGAN and RONALD W. REAGAN. The records indicate that they were married January 26, 1940, at Glendale, California, and separated May 2, 1948. The children who were born as a result of this marriage were MAUREEN ELIZABETH, age 7, and MICHAEL EDWARD, age 3. She alleged he inflicted grievous mental suffering upon her making it impossible for the parties to live happily together as husband and wife. They both signed a written property settlement agreement February 17, 1948, to divide their community property. She was granted an Interlocutory Divorce June 28, 1948, and received custody of the two children. She was to receive \$500.00 a month for child support. Final Judgment of Divorce was filed on July 18, 1949.

The December 4, 1945, issue of the "Daily People's World" carried an article on page three, dateline December 3rd at Los Angeles. The article stated that Southern California's first mass meeting on atomic energy was called by the Hollywood Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions for December 12 at the Hollywood Legion Stadium. The article stated that film star RONALD REAGAN would appear in NORMAN CORWIN's dramatic play "Set Your Clock at U-235."

On December 17, 1945, LA T-1, who is not available for recontact or testimony, advised that one RONALD REAGAN was included in the program and on the Dinner Committee of a dinner given by the Hollywood Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions at the Beverly-Wilshire Hotel, Los Angeles, on the evening of December 10, 1945.

The report of the Senate Fact-Finding Committee on Un-American Activities to the 1951 Regular California Legislature states on page 268 that the organization originally known as the Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions later became known as the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions. A characterization of the Southern California Chapter of the National Council of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions is contained on the appendix page attached hereto.

The "Hollywood Citizen News" published on September 6, 1947, carried an item entitled, "PAUL ROBESON RAPS 'Fascists'." The article related that ROBESON spoke and sang at a function at the Shrine Auditorium, Los Angeles, under the auspices of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee. The article noted that among those listed on the announcement as the sponsoring committee was RONALD REAGAN. REAGAN was not further identified.

On October 23, 1947, RONALD REAGAN, motion picture actor, testified before the Committee on Un-American Activities. One page 215 of the record of these hearings conducted for the period of October 20 to October 30, 1947, REAGAN was questioned as to whether he had ever sponsored any function of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee. Following is quoted his reply:

"I was called several weeks ago. There happened at the time in Hollywood to be a financial drive on to raise money to build a badly needed hospital in a certain section of town, called the All Nations Hospital. I think the purpose of the building is so obvious by the title that it has the support of most of the people of Hollywood--or, of Los Angeles, I should say. Certainly of most of the doctors, because it is very badly needed.

"Some time ago I was called to the telephone. A woman introduced herself by name. Knowing that I didn't know her I didn't make any particular note of her name and I couldn't give it now. She told me that there would be a recital held at which PAUL ROBESON would sing and she said that all the money for the tickets would go to the hospital and asked if she could use my name as one of the sponsors. I hesitated for a moment because I don't think that Mr. ROBESON's and my political views coincide at all and then I thought I was being a little stupid because, I thought, here is an occasion where Mr. ROBESON is perhaps appearing as an artist and certainly the object, raising money, is above any political consideration, it is a hospital supported by everyone. I have contributed money myself. So I felt a little bit as if I had been stuffy for a minute and I said, certainly, you can use my name.

"I left town for a couple of weeks and when I returned I was handed a newspaper story that said that this recital was held at the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles under the auspices of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee..... I did not in the newspaper story see one word about the hospital. I called the newspaper and said I am not accustomed to writing to editors, but would like to explain my position, and he laughed and said, 'You needn't bother, you are about the fiftieth person that has called with the same idea, including most of the legitimate doctors who had also been listed as sponsors of that affair.'

The Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee was cited by the Attorney General of the United States under the provisions of Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily People's World" a former daily west coast Communist Party publication.

The July 15, 1949, edition of the "Washington Times Herald," Washington, D.C., newspaper, carried an article entitled, "Probers Told ROBESON is a 'Veteran Red'." This article reflects that MANNING JOHNSON, an ex-Communist Party leader, told Congress on July 14, 1949, that PAUL ROBESON had been a member of the Communist Party for many years. JOHNSON said he met ROBESON frequently at the Communist Party headquarters in New York, where ROBESON held secret meetings with EARL BROWDER, WILLIAM Z. FOSTER, and J. PETERS.

The July 17, 1951, issue of the "Examiner," a Los Angeles daily newspaper, contained an item entitled "Filmland Fight on Reds Told." The item stated that RONALD REAGAN, actor and Screen Actor's Guild President, was one of three spokesmen who told how Hollywood anti-Communist organizations in "1946 beat the Reds at their own game of organizing cells, outstaying them at meetings, and using parliamentary procedure to further their aims."

The "Times," a Los Angeles daily newspaper, on June 10, 1957, carried an item regarding the awarding to RONALD REAGAN, screen and television star, of the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters by his Alma Mater Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois. Among other things, the school cited the actor's understanding and courage in recognizing and exposing Communists and their influence during his term as President of the Screen Actor's Guild.

In April, 1946, Mr. HARVEY WOLF, a Communist Party member from 1933, to 1934, who died January 13, 1964, advised that RONALD REAGAN, screen actor, was listed as a sponsor and director of the Los Angeles Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy.

The Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Los Angeles News" issue, April 29, 1946, contains an article concerning the California State Convention of the American Veterans Committee which was held April 26, 1946, through April 28, 1946. This article reflects that film actor RONALD REAGAN is a member of the American Veterans Committee and was a toastmaster at a luncheon session of the convention.

The Fourth Report of Un-American Activities in California which is a report of the Joint Fact Finding Committee to the 1948 Regular California Legislature, dated at Sacramento, 1948, on Page 43, lists among other organizations, the American Veterans Committee, which is typical of organizations "faced with consistent Communist disruption and confusion." The report states that "the California Section of the American Veterans Committee falls into the Communist dominated class and is a vociferous, decadent minority in national AVC affairs."

The "Daily People's World" issue of September 7, 1946, on Page 3, contains an article stating that RONALD REAGAN was to star in "Operation Terror," first in a series of 13 weekly broadcasts entitled, "It's Happening Here," sponsored by the Mobilization for Democracy, on Monday night, September 9, 1946. It was announced that the program would be produced with the cooperation of the Hollywood Writers Mobilization.

The Mobilization for Democracy is cited as follows on Page 220 of the Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D. C.

"1. 'One of the largest, and certainly one of the most potentially potent front organizations created by California Communists' since 1945. 'As an excuse for' its creation, the Communist Party seized upon the appearance of Gerald L. K. Smith in Los Angeles. It is 'a Communist-inspired and dominated organization, carefully window-dressed and directed' and 'engaged in inciting riots, racial hatred, and disrespect for law and order.' It is one of the 'key Communist fronts in California.'

Reagan testified as a friendly witness before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in 1947 at which time he explained how he was duped through a telephone call to lend his name as a sponsor of the recital being sponsored by the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee in the same year.

Mr. Walter Glover, Director of Plant Security, Warner Brothers Pictures, Burbank, California, made highly complementary remarks concerning Mr. Reagan. He advised for the confidential information of the Bureau that he understood the true reason Reagan divorced his wife, actress Jane Wyman, was immorality on her part. Glover stated Jane Wyman had a reputation of promiscuity before, during, and after her marriage to Reagan. Glover stated that when Reagan found out about the actions of his wife, he divorced her.

The records of the Los Angeles Supreme Court show that a complaint for divorce was filed on May 6, 1948, between Jane Wyman Reagan and Ronald W. Reagan. Jane Wyman Reagan alleged her husband, Ronald W. Reagan, inflicted grievous mental suffering upon her, making it impossible for the parties to live happily together as husband and wife. Jane Wyman Reagan was granted an interlocutory divorce, June 28, 1948, and received custody of the two children. Under ordinary circumstances, the divorced spouse of an applicant is interviewed for their comments concerning the applicant; however, in view of the reported reputation of Jane Wyman, she is not being interviewed unless a specific request is received for such an interview from AEC.

Mother BRENDAN, Mother MARGARET MARY and Mother MARY CECELIA who knew the applicant as a student highly recommended her for a position of trust and confidence with the Federal Government, stating she is a young lady of fine character, background and conduct who showed an excellent attitude while attending this school and is considered emotionally stable. They stated they had no reason to believe she is other than a completely loyal American citizen and in their opinion would exercise discretion in the handling of confidential material. Her associates while attending school were her classmates all of whom are above reproach.
