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METHODOLOGY

This research study was commissioned by the City of Albuquerque in order to assess residents' perceptions of the overall quality of life in Albuquerque, satisfaction with City services, and issues relating to crime, safety, and the economy. Results are tracked to previous studies, where applicable.

THE INTERVIEW

A random sample of 607 adult residents residing within the Albuquerque city limits were interviewed by telephone. All interviews were conducted between November 8th and 24th, 2019.

Given the prevalence of cell phone users, approximately 70% of the interviews were completed by random digit dialing cell phone number prefixes that have been issued in Albuquerque.

The telephone interviewers are professionals who are brought together for a training session prior to each survey. This ensures their complete and consistent understanding of the survey instrument. A total of 607 adult Albuquerque residents completed interviews.

MARGIN OF ERROR

A sample size of 607 at a 95% confidence level provides a maximum margin of error of approximately 4.0%. In theory, in 95 out of 100 cases, the results based on a sample of 607 will differ by no more than 4.0 percentage points in either direction from what would have been obtained by interviewing all adult residents within the City of Albuquerque.

SAMPLE BIAS

In any survey, there are some respondents who will refuse to speak to the professional interviewer. A lower response rate among certain types of individuals can result in a sample wherein certain types of individuals are over-represented or under-represented. The potential for sampling bias increases as the response rate decreases. Research & Polling, Inc. often sets quotas and/or weights for various segments of the population who are historically undercounted. This has the effect of minimizing, but not necessarily eliminating, sampling bias.

THE REPORT

This report summarizes the results from each question in the survey and reports on any variances in attitude or perception, where significant, among demographic subgroups. The subgroups examined in this report include.

- Region
- Gender
- Ethnicity
- Age
- Household income
- Education attainment level
- Length of residency
- Children in the household

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This research study was commissioned by the City of Albuquerque in order to assess residents' perceptions of the overall quality of life in Albuquerque, satisfaction with City services, and issues relating to crime, safety, and the economy. QUALITY OF LIFE

Like many cities, Albuquerque has faced many challenges over the past several years, particularly when it comes to crime and homelessness. Crime is at the forefront of many residents' minds when it comes to quality of life issues. While nearly half (48%) of the residents surveyed feel the overall quality of life has not changed in the past year, nearly one-in-three (32%) feel Albuquerque has become a *worse place* to live. There is some good news in that nearly one-in-five residents believe Albuquerque has become a *better place* to live in the past year.

The impact that crime and homelessness is having on perceived quality of life is illustrated by the fact that when asked (unaided) why they believe the City has become a worse place to live nearly half (47%) the respondents cite more crime/crime rate increasing as the reason, while 16% point to increasing homelessness.

Overall, residents appear to have somewhat mixed feelings about where the City is heading, as 49% say they are hopeful about the direction, and 47% say they are concerned about where the City is going.

THE ECONOMY

Residents were read various statements relating to the City of Albuquerque and the economy, and for each one, asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*.

- 42% agree **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of attracting out-of-state companies to open in the city**, though 25% disagree and 27% have neutral or mixed feelings.
- 31% agree **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of helping local businesses and entrepreneurs create jobs**, though 26% disagree and 33% have neutral/mixed feelings.
- 20% agree **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of keeping young local talent from leaving the city**, compared to 43% who disagree (28% have neutral/mixed feelings)

While the City has made strides in encouraging new businesses and economic development, the survey results show that many residents either believe more still needs to be done, or perhaps are not aware of what is being done to encourage more economic development.

MULTIPURPOSE ARENA/SOCCER STADIUM AND PERFORMANCE ART CENTER

There appears to be strong public support for building a new multipurpose arena that could house soccer games for New Mexico United, or a standalone soccer stadium. Two-thirds of survey respondents say they support building a new multi-purpose arena that could be used for New Mexico United soccer games and other events, compared to 24% who are opposed. Furthermore, 61% of respondents say they support a new standalone soccer stadium for New Mexico United, compared to 29% who are opposed.

Residents who support either the multipurpose arena or standalone soccer stadium were given different options where the facility could be located and asked which location they would prefer. Nearly half (48%) say the stadium/multi-purpose arena should be located near the UNM football stadium, basketball stadium, and Isotopes Park. In comparison, just 12% believe the facility should be located downtown and another 12% feel it should be located on the Westside of Albuquerque.

Overall, half of the residents surveyed say they support using public funding to build either the soccer stadium or multipurpose arena that could be used for soccer games. However, 38% are either opposed to using public funds for the facility, or are opposed to building a facility altogether, while 7% say it *depends*.

In a separate question, residents were informed the City of Albuquerque is considering either building a new performing arts center or renovating existing facilities such as the KIVA Auditorium to bring in Broadway shows, popular musicians, and other national touring acts and further revitalize Downtown. They were then asked, if they would prefer that the City **build a new performing arts center** or **renovate an existing facility**, assuming the costs would be approximately the same. The majority of residents (55%) say they would prefer renovating an existing facility, while 30% would prefer building a new performing arts center.

FEELINGS OF PERSONAL SAFETY

Overall, the vast majority (87%) of residents say they feel either *very safe* (57%) or *somewhat safe* (30%) when alone outside in their neighborhood **during the day**.

The majority (65%) also feel either *very safe* (28%) or *somewhat safe* (37%) when alone outside in their neighborhood **at night** (28% feel unsafe alone at night). Those residing in the UNM/Southeast Heights are the least likely to feel *very safe*. Males and those residing in higher income households are more likely to feel *very safe*.

Approximately two-thirds (68%) of residents also say they feel either *very safe* (26%) or *somewhat safe* (42%) when **attending public events** in the City. In comparison, 19% say they feel unsafe when attending public events in Albuquerque.

When asked to rate their feelings of personal safety in different areas of the City, the following results are found. The results show that different areas of Albuquerque are viewed very differently when it comes to perceived safety.

- 79% feel either *very safe* (37%) or *somewhat safe* (42%) in **Uptown**, compared to just 6% who feel unsafe.
- 73% feel either *very safe* (29%) or *somewhat safe* (44%) in **Old Town** compared to just 10% who feel unsafe.
- 70% feel either *very safe* (29%) or *somewhat safe* (41%) in the **Cottonwood Mall area** (just 5% feel unsafe).
- 67% feel either *very safe* (30%) or *somewhat safe* (37%) in **City parks in your neighborhood**, though 20% of residents feel either *somewhat unsafe* (11%) or *very unsafe* (9%)
- 64% feel either *very safe* (23%) or *somewhat safe* (41%) **walking, hiking, or biking trails in the City**. Eleven percent feel unsafe on these trails.
- 51% of residents report feeling either *very safe* (11%) or *somewhat safe* (40%) in the **Nob Hill/University area**, though 28% say they feel either *somewhat unsafe* (21%) or *very unsafe* (7%).
- 38% feel either *very safe* (6%) or *somewhat safe* (32%) **Downtown**. Forty-four percent of residents say they feel either *very unsafe* (17%) or *somewhat unsafe* (27%) when they are Downtown.
- 35% of residents say they feel either *very safe* (8%) or *somewhat safe* (27%) in the **Coors Blvd. and I-40 area**, though nearly two-fifths (38%) of residents feel unsafe in this area (12% have no opinion).

When residents who feel each of the different areas of the City are unsafe were asked (unaided) to give the reasons why, they are most apt to mention homelessness, drugs/drug use, and a high crime rate.

PERCEIVED CHANGES IN CRIME

Residents were asked if they feel different types of crimes in Albuquerque are *going up*, *going down*, or *not changing*. Overall, 64% of residents believe **violent crimes** are *going up* and 62% feel that **crimes involving guns** are *going up*.

Just over half (53%) of the residents surveyed believe **crimes against children** are *going up* compared to 11% who feel these are *going down* and 26% who feel this is *not changing*.

Approximately half (51%) the survey respondents believe **auto thefts** are *going up*, while 17% say auto thefts are *going down* and 27% feel this is *not changing*.

The plurality of residents (43%) feel **home burglaries** are *going up* in Albuquerque, compared to 18% who say home burglaries are *going down* and 31% say this is *not changing*.

HOMELESSNESS, SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES

Homelessness, substance abuse, and mental health are major issues facing many cities throughout the nation with no easy solutions. Just 13% of residents give the City positive marks for addressing the homelessness issue. The majority of residents (59%) feel the City is doing a poor job of addressing homelessness, while 26% give the City a mixed review on how it's handling the issue.

When given the choice of different locations where a new City homeless shelter could be built, 27% of the residents surveyed prefer that it be located Downtown, while 18% prefer it be located near the VA Hospital, 15% prefer the area near UNM Hospital, 11% prefer the Far Westside of the City, and 10% say they prefer Mesa Del Sol.

Just 19% of residents agree **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of providing substance abuse treatment programs for those addicted to drugs and alcohol**. In comparison, 48% disagree the City is doing a good job of providing substance abuse programs, while 23% have neutral or mixed feelings.

Nineteen percent of residents also agree **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of providing support for people with mental health issues**, though 51% disagree.

Although the City of Albuquerque is making considerable efforts to address these issues, many residents appear to be either unaware of what is being done, or do not believe the programs have been effective to date. All of these issues will take time and as the City continues to develop new programs and facilities to address these issues, public perceptions should change over time.

ALBUQUERQUE POLICE DEPARTMENT

When it comes to the Albuquerque Police Department, half the residents (49%) believe APD is **doing a good job addressing public safety issues and making quick responses to emergencies**, while 22% have mixed feelings and 27% do not believe APD is doing a good job in this regard. Overall, these results are similar to those observed last year.

Residents are somewhat polarized when it comes to how well APD is doing when it comes to **interacting with people who have substance abuse and mental health issues**. While 35% believe APD is doing a good job in their interaction with those who have substance abuse or mental health issues, 28% disagree, and another 28% have a neutral/mixed opinion.

The survey results also show that 40% of City residents say the Albuquerque Police Department is doing a good job working with the U.S. Department of Justice to implement new policies and reforms designed to reduce the use of force and encourage policing that ensures residents' constitutional rights. Approximately one-in-five residents (21%) rate APD poorly for implementing the new policies and reforms, while 27% have neutral/mixed feelings.

ALBUQUERQUE FIRE RESCUE

Residents continue to view Albuquerque Fire Rescue highly as 84% of residents agree the Department is **doing a good job responding to emergency medical services needs and making quick responses to medical emergencies**, with 53% who *strongly agree* and just 3% who disagree.

The majority of residents (55%) also agree that Albuquerque Fire Rescue is doing a good job **interacting with people who have substance abuse and mental health issues**, compared to 11% who disagree.

It is interesting that 55% of residents feel Albuquerque Fire Rescue is doing a good job interacting with people who have substance abuse and mental health issues compared to 35% who feel APD is doing a good job interacting with this population.

YOUTH PROGRAMS

There is a perceived need for more before school, after school and summer programs for kids, as nearly three-in-four residents (74%) agree that more of these programs are needed, with 54% who *strongly agree*. Just 7% of residents do not agree that Albuquerque needs more before and after school programs and summer programs. Nearly nine-in-ten (84%) parents with children under the age of 18 feel more of these programs are needed.

Although there is a perceived need for more youth programs, there also appears to be a lack of knowledge about the programs that currently exist. Just two-fifths of the residents surveyed say they are aware the City offers summer and before and after school programs for kids. Among parents with children under 18 years of age, 64% say they are aware of these City programs for kids.


Thirty-six percent of the parents with children under the age of 18 say they have kids who participate in the City summer and before and after school programs. Hispanic parents (45%) are much more likely than Anglo parents (26%) to say they have children who participate in the programs.


City residents were asked if they feel Albuquerque has become a *better place* to live in the past year, a *worse place* to live, or is *about the same*. As shown above, 19% of residents believe Albuquerque has become a *better place* to live in the past year, while nearly one-in-three (32%) residents feel it is become a *worse place* to live. Nearly half (48%) the residents surveyed do not feel the quality of life in Albuquerque has changed in the past year.

It should be noted that as education level rises, so too does the likelihood of believing Albuquerque has become a *better place* to live, as 29% of those who have attained a graduate degree feel Albuquerque has become a *better place* to live in the past year, compared to 15% of those with a high school education or less.

Residents who feel Albuquerque has become either a *better place* or *worse place* to live in the past year were asked (unaided) to give the reasons underlying the perceived changes. Nearly half of the respondents (47%) say Albuquerque has become a *worse place* to live due to more crime/crime rate increasing, while 16% say there is more homelessness.

Ten percent of the respondents say Albuquerque is a *better place* to live because there is less crime and another 10% report that government is working on the issues/good leadership.



Residents were asked if they are *very hopeful*, *somewhat hopeful*, *somewhat concerned*, or *very concerned* about the direction of the City in 2019. As shown above, approximately half (49%) of residents say they are either *somewhat hopeful* (36%) or *very hopeful* (13%) about the direction of the City. However, a nearly equal percentage of residents say they are either *somewhat concerned* (26%) or *very concerned* (21%).

The percentage of residents who say they are hopeful about the direction of the City has fallen from 68% last year to 49% currently, while concern has risen from 29% to 47%.

Residents were read various statements relating to the City of Albuquerque and the economy, and for each one, asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree with each one using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*.

As shown above, just over two-fifths (42%) of residents agree (a score of 4 or 5) that **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of attracting out-of-state companies to open in the City**. One-quarter of residents disagree indicated by a score of 1 or 2, while 27% have neutral or mixed feelings (a score of 3).

Approximately one-third (31%) of the residents surveyed agree **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of helping local businesses and entrepreneurs create jobs**, though 26% disagree and 33% have neutral/mixed feelings.

Residents are twice as likely to disagree (43%) than to agree (20%) **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of keeping young local talent from leaving the City**. Twenty-eight percent of voters have neutral or mixed feelings.

It should be noted that women, Hispanics, and those between the ages of 18 and 34 tend to be more likely than others to agree that the City is doing a good job of **attracting out-of-state companies to open in the City** and **helping local businesses and entrepreneurs create jobs**.



Residents were read various statements relating to how the City is handling substance abuse and mental health issues and asked to rate how strongly they agree or disagree with each one using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*.

As shown above, 19% of residents agree **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of providing substance abuse treatment programs for those addicted to drugs and alcohol**. In comparison, 48% disagree the City is doing a good job of providing substance abuse programs, while 23% have neutral or mixed feelings.

Nineteen percent of residents also agree **the City of Albuquerque is doing a good job of providing support for people with mental health issues**, though 51% disagree.


Residents were asked to rate how well the City of Albuquerque is addressing the issue of homelessness using a 5-point scale where 5 is *excellent* and 1 is *very poor*. As shown above, just 13% of residents give the City positive marks for addressing the homelessness issue (as indicated by a score of 4 or 5). The majority of residents (59%) feel the City is doing a poor job of addressing homelessness as indicated by a score of 1 or 2, while 26% give the City a middling rating of 3.

When given the choice of different locations where a new City homeless shelter could be built, 27% of the residents surveyed prefer that it be located Downtown, while 18% prefer it be located near the VA Hospital, 15% prefer the area near UNM Hospital, 11% prefer the Far Westside of the City, and 10% say they prefer Mesa Del Sol.

When City residents were asked in an unaided manner, **what types of recreational, cultural, performing arts, or sports related attractions or amenities they feel are needed in Albuquerque**, 11% mention more activities for youth and teens, while 9% say professional sports teams and another 9% mention a performing arts center. It should also be noted that a soccer stadium and a sports arena/complex are each mentioned by 6% of residents.



Residents were informed the City of Albuquerque is considering either building a new performing arts center or renovating existing facilities, such as the KIVA Auditorium, to bring in Broadway shows, popular musicians, and other national touring acts and further revitalize Downtown. They were then asked if they would prefer that the City **build a new performing arts center** or **renovate an existing facility**, assuming the costs would be approximately the same.

As shown above, the majority of residents (55%) say they would prefer renovating an existing facility, while 30% would prefer building a new performing arts center.



Residents were informed that Albuquerque has a professional soccer team called New Mexico United and the team is temporarily playing its games at the Isotopes baseball park. Half of the survey respondents were asked, “Do you support or oppose building a new soccer stadium to host New Mexico United games?” The other half of the respondents were asked “Do you support or oppose building a new multipurpose arena that could be used for New Mexico United soccer games and other events in addition to soccer games?”


Overall, there is slightly stronger support for a multipurpose arena that could house soccer games and other events than there is for a single purpose soccer stadium. As shown above, 67% of respondents say they support building a new multi-purpose arena that could be used for New Mexico United soccer games and other events, compared to 24% who are opposed. In comparison, 61% of respondents say they support a new soccer stadium for New Mexico United, compared to 29% who are opposed.

It should be noted that support for either the multipurpose arena or the stand alone soccer stadium tends to be stronger among younger residents and those with children in the household.

Residents who support either the multipurpose arena or standalone soccer stadium were given different options where the facility could be located and asked what location they would prefer; nearly half (48%) say the soccer stadium/multi-purpose arena should be located near the UNM football stadium, basketball stadium, and Isotopes Park. In comparison, just 12% believe the facility should be located Downtown and another 12% feel it should be located on the Westside of Albuquerque.



Overall, half of the residents surveyed say they support using public funding to build either the soccer stadium or multipurpose arena that could be used for soccer games. However, 38% are either opposed to using public funds for the facility or are opposed to the facility altogether and 7% say it *depends*.




Two-fifths of the residents surveyed say they are aware the City offers summer programs and before and after school programs for kids. Among parents, 64% say they are aware of these City programs for kids.

Residents who are more likely to be aware of the City's summer programs and before and after school programs include:

- Hispanics (49%) compared to Anglos (35%)
- Women (47%) compared to men (33%)
- Those under the age of 50 (48%) compared to older residents (32%)
- Those with children under the age of 18 (64%) compared to those without children under 18 (28%)

Those who are aware of the City's summer and before and after school programs for children were asked (unaided) what their primary sources of information about the programs are. The plurality (42%) say they get information about the programs through school, while 28% say they get most of their information about the programs through family/friends.





Thirty-six percent of the parents with children under the age of 18 say they have kids who participate in the City summer and before and after school programs. Hispanic parents (45%) are much more likely than Anglo parents (26%) to say they have children who participate in the programs.

When asked (unaided) why their children either do or do not participate in the City's youth programs, the most common reasons for participating include giving them something to do (11%), children enjoy the programs (9%), good programs (9%), and it's a safe place for kids to go (8%).

Those who have children who do not participate in the City's youth programs are most apt to say their children are too young/old (18%), followed by a lack of awareness (12%) and a lack of interest (7%).






All survey respondents were asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree that Albuquerque needs more before and after school programs and summer programs for children, using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*. As shown above, nearly three-in-four residents (74%) agree that more of these programs are needed (a score of 4 or 5), with 54% who *strongly agree*. Just 7% of residents do not agree that Albuquerque needs more before and after school programs and summer programs.

Residents who have children under the age of 18 are more likely than those who do not have children under 18 to agree that more programs are needed (84% and 70%, respectively).

Hispanic residents are more apt than Anglos to agree the City needs more youth programs (80% and 67%, respectively).


FEELINGS OF PERSONAL SAFETY




Residents were asked to rate how safe they feel outside in their neighborhood alone during the day and alone at night. As shown above, 87% of residents say they feel either *very safe* (57%) or *somewhat safe* (30%) alone in their neighborhood **during the day**, compared to just 9% who feel unsafe.

In comparison, 65% of residents say they feel either *very safe* (28%) or *somewhat safe* (37%) alone in their neighborhood **at night**, though 28% say they feel either *somewhat unsafe* (19%) or *very unsafe* (9%).


Residents living in the Mid-Heights (53%) and UNM/Southeast (56%) are less apt than those in the Far Heights (68%), North Valley/Downtown (68%) and Westside/SW Mesa (71%) to say they feel safe in their neighborhood alone at night.



The 87% who currently say they feel either *very safe* or *somewhat safe* outside alone **during the day** is comparable to the results observed in 2018.



Looking at tracking results, the percentage of residents who say they feel safe alone outside **at night** in their neighborhood has declined from 73% in 2018 to 65% currently, while those who feel unsafe rose from 21% to 28% in the last year.



Approximately two-thirds (68%) of Albuquerque residents say they feel either *somewhat safe* (42%) or *very safe* (26%) attending public events in the City, while 19% say they feel either *somewhat unsafe* (14%) or *very unsafe* (5%).

Residents were asked to rate how safe they generally feel in different areas of the City. As shown above, over-three-quarters (79%) say they feel either *very safe* (37%) or *somewhat safe* (42%) in **Uptown**, compared to just 6% who feel unsafe.

Two-thirds of residents say they feel either *very safe* (30%) or *somewhat safe* (37%) in **City parks in your neighborhood**, though 20% of residents feel either *somewhat unsafe* (11%) or *very unsafe* (9%).

Approximately three-in-four residents (73%) say they feel either *very safe* (29%) or *somewhat safe* (44%) in **Old Town**, compared to just 10% who feel unsafe.

Seven-in-ten residents say they feel either *very safe* (29%) or *somewhat safe* (41%) in the **Cottonwood Mall area** (just 5% feel unsafe).

Approximately two-thirds (64%) of residents say they feel either *very safe* (23%) or *somewhat safe* (41%) **walking, hiking, or biking trails in the City**. Eleven percent feel unsafe on these trails.

Just over half (51%) of the residents surveyed report feeling either *very safe* (11%) or *somewhat safe* (40%) in the **Nob Hill/University area**, though 28% say they feel either *somewhat unsafe* (21%) or *very unsafe* (7%).

Just over one-third (35%) of residents say they feel either *very safe* (8%) or *somewhat safe* (27%) in the **Coors Blvd. and I-40 area**, though nearly two-fifths (38%) of residents feel unsafe in this area (12% have no opinion).

Finally, approximately two-fifths (38%) of the residents surveyed say they feel either *very safe* (6%) or *somewhat safe* (32%) **Downtown**. Forty-four percent of residents say they feel either *very unsafe* (17%) or *somewhat unsafe* (27%) when they are Downtown. It is interesting to note that 57% of residents who live in the Far Northeast Heights say they feel unsafe Downtown compared to 41% of residents who live in other areas of the city.

Residents who said they feel unsafe in the different areas of Albuquerque were asked (unaided) to give the reasons why they feel unsafe. The table above shows the results for each area where residents feel unsafe. For example, 54% of those who feel unsafe Downtown mention homelessness as the reason why they feel unsafe, while 28% say they feel unsafe Downtown because of drugs/drug use and 13% say the crime rate is too high.

Among residents who feel unsafe in the Coors Blvd/I-40 area, 24% mention homelessness and another 24% say the crime rate is too high, while 15% say drugs/drug use.

The plurality (36%) of those who feel unsafe in the Nob Hill/University area mention homelessness, while 23% cite drugs/drug use and 20% say the crime rate is too high.

Residents who feel unsafe in City parks in their neighborhood are most apt to mention drugs/drug use (49%), homelessness (41%), and needles (28%).

Residents were asked if they feel different types of crimes in Albuquerque are *going up*, *going down*, or *not changing*. As shown above, 64% of residents believe **violent crimes** are *going up* and 62% believe that **crimes involving guns** are *going up*.

Just over half (53%) of the residents surveyed believe **crimes against children** are *going up* compared to 11% who feel these are *going down* and 26% who feel this is *not changing*.

Approximately half (51%) the survey respondents believe **auto thefts** are *going up*, while 17% say auto thefts are *going down* and 27% feel this is *not changing*.

The plurality of residents (43%) feel **home burglaries** are *going up* in Albuquerque, compared to 18% who say home burglaries are *going down* and 31% say this is *not changing*.

The number of **auto thefts** and **home burglaries** in Albuquerque has actually declined in 2019. Residents who are aware that auto thefts and home burglaries have gone down are much more likely to be hopeful with the direction the City is going in 2019.

Residents were asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree with statements relating to the Albuquerque Police Department and Albuquerque Fire Rescue using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*.

ALBUQUERQUE FIRE RESCUE

As shown above, 84% percent of residents at least somewhat agree (a score of 4 or 5 on a 5-point scale) Albuquerque Fire Rescue is **doing a good job addressing and responding quickly to fires and medical emergencies**, with 53% who *strongly agree* and just 3% who disagree. These results are very similar to those observed in the past two studies.


The majority of residents (55%) also agree Albuquerque Fire Rescue is **doing a good job interacting with people who have substance abuse and mental health issues**, compared to 11% who disagree (a score of 1 or 2). It should be noted that many residents (34%) either have no opinion or have a neutral opinion (a score of 3).

ALBUQUERQUE POLICE DEPARTMENT

When it comes to the Albuquerque Police Department (APD), 49% of residents believe APD is **doing a good job addressing public safety issues and making quick responses to emergencies**, though 27% disagree and 22% have neutral or mixed feelings. Overall, these results are a slight improvement over those observed in last year's study, though down from 2015 and 2016.

Over one-third (35%) of residents agree the **Albuquerque Police Department is doing a good job interacting with people who have substance abuse and mental health issues**, though 28% disagree and another 28% have neutral or mixed feelings.

It is interesting to note that nearly half of the residents who say they are *very concerned* about the direction of Albuquerque disagree that APD is doing a good job of addressing public safety issues and making quick responses to emergencies, as well as doing a good job interacting with people who have substance abuse and mental health issues.

City residents were informed that APD is working with the U.S. Department of Justice to implement new policies and reforms designed to reduce the use of force and encourage policing that ensures residents' constitutional rights. City residents were then asked, using a 5-point scale where a score of 5 is *excellent* and a score of 1 is *very poor*, to rate how well of a job they believe APD is doing making these changes.

As shown above, 40% of City residents say APD is going a good job (a score of 4 or 5) implementing new policies and reforms, with 13% who say APD is doing an *excellent* job. Twenty-seven percent of residents have a neutral opinion, and 21% say APD is doing a *poor* job (a score of 1 or 2). Residents are slightly less likely to agree and more likely to disagree than was observed in last year's survey.
