



## Views on Education in California During the Coronavirus Pandemic

An EdSource Poll

From August 29-September 7, 2020, FM3 completed 834 online interviews with California voters on behalf of EdSource. The sample included 634 voters statewide and an oversample of 200 voters who are parents or guardians of a child under age 19. The margin of sampling error for the full sample is +/-3.5% at the 95% confidence level; margins of error for population subgroups within the sample will be higher. Due to rounding, not all totals will sum to 100%.

These first questions are to ensure that this survey captures a representative sample of California voters.
